Eagles Romp Over Garden City 36-14

Play Water Valley There Tonight

The Sterling City Eagles safely got through their first conference game here last Friday night, by romping over the Garden City Bearkats 36-14. The first half of the game was close and Coach Dillard's boys led 8-2 at the half. It was still anybody's ball game at that point.

Garden City kicked off as the game opened. Sam Nance caught the kick and returned it 15 yards. Danny Gonzales picked up five yards on the first try and then two tries were for no gains; the Eagles punted down to the 17 yard line. The Bearkats couldn't gain so they punted on their 4th down. Gonzales tried to go through the Garden City 6 man line with no luck. In fact the line was hard to gain through. The Garden City boys, though, couldn't gain a first, and had to kick. Dor McDonald went around the Bearkat end for a nine yard gain and Sam Nance pushed the pigskin over for a first. The Eagles there were stuck for four tries and the ball went to Garden City as the quarter ended.

As the second quarter opened Don McDonald intercepted a pass and ran all the way for a touchdown—the first score of the game. Then he caught a pass from Robert Carter for the two extra points. Score 8-0.

Sterling kicked as play resumed. Dennis Calverly made a first for Garden City and the team racked up another first before bogging down and losing the ball to the Eagles.

Carter pushed the ball over for a first down, and Danny Gonzales took a pass from McDonald and went for a TD but the play was called back and Sterling was penalized for being offside. Sterling tried another pass and it was intercepted. Bearkat B. Fisher picked up a first down but the drive slowed and Garden City punted. Don McDonald got the ball and was tackled in the end zone, thereby giving Garden City a two point safety. The score was then 8-2.

Such was the score at half-time.

The Eagles kicked as play opened the second half. B. Fisher for the Bearkats got a first, McDaniel another and Fisher pushed over for a TD for the Glasscock County boys. They failed to make the extra point and the score was 8-8.

As Garden City kicked following the touchdown, Danny Gonzales made a first down and a three-way pass (Carter to Tony Allen to McDonald) was good for six points. Don took the oval over making the score 14-8 and he got the 2 extra points making it 16-8.

Sterling kicked off to Garden City and they made one first down then lost the ball to Sterling on downs. Sterling fumbled and the Bearkats recovered. McDaniel went over for a Bearkat touchdown but the try for extra point was no good.

Sterling took the kick after touchdown and Danny Gonzales fumbled the ball, but McDonald recovered for the Eagles. That play gave the locals a first and Don picked up another first in two tries. Gonzales picked up six yards and Carter went through a hole in the line for a TD. Gonzales made the two extra points.

Sterling, then to clinch the game, nailed down another TD on a pass from Carter to Jodie Green. The try for extra point was no good.

But to really do a good job of winning, Gonzales went over into pay dirt once more, giving the Eagles a winning score 36-14.

Mrs. R. L. Boston, 61, of Garden City was to be buried here today at 1:30 p.m. in the Foster Cemetery. She died in the Clinic-Hospital Wednesday of this week. Rites were held at the Robert Massie Chapel in San Angelo at 10:00 a.m. this morning.

Mrs. Boston was born Mae Sullivan March 15, 1898 in Sterling City. She was graduated from Sterling City High School and Hardin-Simmons University. She had been an English teacher at Robert Lee, Mercedes, El Paso and San Antonio before serving as principal of Robert Lee high school for a time.

She was married to the late R. L. Boston, April 3, 1932 in San Angelo. Mr. Boston had come to San Angelo as a young man and started working for his uncle, D. K. McMullan, Sr. who ranched on the Devil's river in Sutton County.

About 1918, Mr. Boston turned to ranching himself, acquiring land in Glasscock and Nolan Counties. He also owned property in San Angelo. He died in April 1946. Mrs. Boston had operated the ranch near Garden City.

AROUND THE COUNTY by

The coming of frost brings danger to livestockmen who are running their livestock on sorghum fields, sudan grass, Johnson grass or sorghum alum fields or in pastures where any of these plants are present. All these plants carry large amounts of hydrocyanic acid after frost and will kill livestock quickly.

This year there is more danger than usual in this area since the fall rains have caused these plants to put out much growth by means of suckers. These suckers and second growth is potentially more dangerous than the older growth; upper young leaves are more dangerous than older, lower leaves.

Nervousness, difficulty in breathing, difficulty in standing, and a wobbly gait are symptoms of the poisoning. An animal that has been poisoned can be saved only if quick measures are taken. Veterinarians can save an animal by means of injecting an antidote, this being done directly into the blood stream.

Any of the plants are dangerous can be safely grazed only after they are thoroughly dry. If ready to cut before frost for hay, the plants should be cut the first day after frost, left to dry thoroughly and then baled.

Mrs. Homemaker, what do you really pay for the edible portions of some of the food that you serve your family? How much difference is there between the price of the raw product and the cooked product when you place it on your family's table?

Certain cuts of meat like chuck roast of beef that you pay 59c per pound for costs \$1.51 per pound for edible, cooked portion you put on the table. Pork chops that cost 99c per pound wind up on your table at \$1.63 per pound for the edible portion.

Choice broiler chickens that cost 40c per pound in the market will cost 80c per pound cooked on your table. Eggs—

when figured on the pound cost basis—will do the best of all. A pound of large eggs which is usually about 8 since large eggs average 2 ounces each will cost you 50c. Fried, scrambled, or served in any other way without the shell will cost 56c per pound for the edible portion.

What is the big difference in the cost of the raw product and the edible portion? Usually it is a matter of shrinkage from cooking and the amount of fat and inedible bone that winds up as waste. When buying it is wise to take into consideration the amount of waste or inedible parts you are paying for.

A good kill on tumble weeds and lambs quarter with 2,4-D has been secured on the root plowed plot on the Tom Humble ranch. The plot was sprayed in July to kill off weeds and give the young grass seedlings a chance to get the benefit of the available moisture. However, the lack of moisture following the spraying made the kill slow and a long time in occurring.

The plot had been reseeded in April with a mixture and some of the seed did germinate but the dry, early part of the summer was hard on that that did germinate and kept much of it from germinating. The weeds were sprayed in hopes that a quick kill would release moisture to the seedlings and perhaps germinate some of the remaining seed. This did not occur, however. There are still a few seedlings in the plot and it is possible that some of the seed might germinate now with the amount of moisture that is available. Or, they may have germinated and died or rotted before germinating.

Time will tell which was the case. It is evident however, that if seeding is to be successful, it must be done under ideal conditions at the time of rootplowing or dozing. It is difficult to get a good seedbed after that.

For a Beautiful Cake!

HEAVENLY frosting, delicately honey-flavored, and covered with frosty-white flaked coconut, makes a "beauty" out of the simplest of cakes! You can use bakers' cake layers; or you can make layers of a large loaf from a mix, or from your own favorite recipe.

Coconut Honey Frosting
 2 egg whites; 1 1/4 cups sugar; 1/4 teaspoon salt; 1/2 cup water; 2 tablespoons light corn syrup; 2 tablespoons honey; 1/2 teaspoon vanilla; 1/2 cup Angel Flake Coconut.

Combine egg whites, sugar, salt, water, corn syrup, and honey in top of double boiler. Beat 1 minute until thoroughly mixed. Cook over rapidly boiling water, beating constantly with sturdy egg beater (or at high speed of electric beater) 7 minutes. Remove from boiling water. Add vanilla and beat 1 minute or until thick enough to spread. Frost cake and sprinkle with flaked coconut. Makes 5 1/2 cups frosting or enough to cover generously tops and sides of two 9-inch layers.

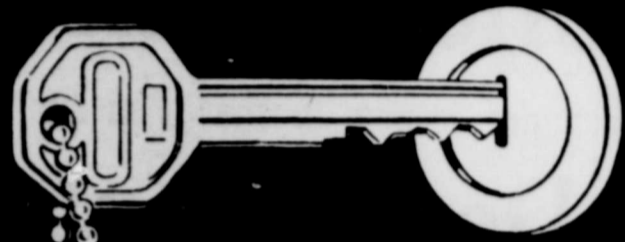
