Sterling Boy Winner in State Range Management Contest

College Station, Oct. 29 (Sp) David Durham, outstanding Sterling County 4-H Club boy, today was one of the two winners named in the 1959 State 4-H Range Management Result Demonstration program.

According to the State 4-H Club office, David will receive a scholarship to the 1960 Range Study Camp held each summer at Junction. Bill Williams of Crockett County was the other winner listed. Donor for the program is the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association.

David is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Durham and for seven years has been a member of the Sterling County 4-H Club. His major demonstration has been registered Rambouillet sheep with range management getting a lot of attention during the past 3 years. He has been in two state range judging contests as a member of the county team. In 1958 the team placed eighth and in 1959 third in the state contests. David was fifth high individual in 1959.

He says the training received in range judging and grass identification have proved very valuable to him and his family. He reports that he has been able to answer questions for his father and also for neighbors on grass problems. "All in all", he says, "I have gained a great deal from my range management demonstration and I plan to keep up my work in this field."

David is a Gold Star boy and the holder of many awards on the county basis. After college, he plans to use the fine flock of sheep he has developed and the knowledge gained from his 4-H experiences on a ranch of his own. County Agent Arthur Barlemann, Jr. describes the state winner as a good student in range management and one who is always willing to help others.

AROUND THE COUNTY by

For the second consecutive year, Crockett and Sterling County 4-H Club members were winners in the Range Management Awards contest sponsored by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association. This year's winners were David Durham of Sterling City and Bill Williams of Ozona. Last year's winners were Reynolds Lee Foster and Bill Jacoby.

Information on the awards was released from the state 4-H Club office at College Station. Both boys will attend the range camp next summer at the A&M College Adjunct at Junction. A complete story of David's accomplishments appears elsewhere in this paper.

A U.S. Department of Agriculture release just received shows that stocks of wheat and grain sorghum on October 1 were the highest on record on that date. Corn, oats, barley and other grains are down however.

Carryover of grain sorghum amounted to 501 million bushels, about three-fifths above last year's record of 309 million bushels. The stock on hand represents about four-fifths of last year's production. This carryover plus this year's crop which is being harvested will certainly increase the stocks carried over for next year. Anyone who is planning on feeding any livestock this year might well keep this in mind.

Speaking of feeding livestock brings to mind a recently released report on price-feeding ratios on beef cattle. The survey made in Central Texas as showed that 100 pounds of choice steer on the Ft. Worth market was worth 1450 lbs. of milo on the farm. Little change in the steer price-

feed ratio is expected for the next three months.

Steers used in the survey were fed silage, cottonseed meal, and milo. Yearling steers were figured at 26c, the cost, fed 120 days, and sold for 27c. Profit to labor, capital and management averaged a little over \$3 per 100 for the milo feed.

Mice and rats seem to be building up in various parts of the county again. The coming of cold weather will deprive them of some of their food supply and will drive them into the barns and areas where feed is stored.

The long recommended Warfarin remains one of the best rat and mouse killing agents available. It is not a poisonous material and is easy to use. An agent present in Warfarin causes the rodents to hemorrhage to death after eating it for four or more days.

Around barns where plenty of feed is available the Warfarin may not work as well as expected since it does contain grain. In these cases there is a liquid form available. Name of this liquid is Pivalin. Mixed with water and put out in water containers, it works the same way as the Warfarin.

The damage caused by rats is usually underestimated. Surveys have shown that it averages \$20 annually. This makes them rather expensive boarders on the ranch or farm. In addition, they often cause fires by gnawing the insulation off electrical wires in the home and barn; they are also carriers of such disease as typhus. Control is much cheaper than boarding the pesky creatures.

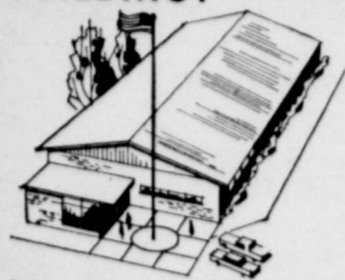

Eaglets vs. Silver

SILVER JUNIOR HIGH BEATS STERLING 14-12 IN AN ELEVEN MAN BOUT

Silver kicked to Sterling but got the ball. Sterling got the ball on their own territory on the 30 yard line and went to their own 38. Silver recovered and went four yards. They fumbled and Sterling recovered. They were deep in their own territory. The Eaglets just couldn't go anywhere. A pass was tried, but Silver intercepted and went to their own 30 yard line. The second play took them to their own 35 yard line. Silver's backfield in motion; 5 yd. penalty. TD from their own 20 yd. line after being set back. The extra points were made. 8-0 Silver.

Silver kicked to Sterling Vernon Asbill covered the ball. Sterling went to Silver's 26 yd. line. It seemed as if Sterling was up against a brick wall. Jerry Payne gained about a yard on a quarterback sneak. David Bautista gained about 5 yards up the middle. A pass was incomplete on the 4th and Silver got the ball. The quarter ended.

The Eaglets got the ball and Manuel Lujan goes for about 2 yards. Moses Rodriguez got a first down. Then Lujan got four yards and Silver drew a 5 yard penalty. With only 10 yards to go Bautista made a TD for Sterling. They try for point failed. 8-6 Silver.

Sterling kicked. Silver got a 15 yard penalty for tripping. Sterling got the ball with 19 yards to go for a touchdown. A pass is tried but it was incomplete and a yard is lost. Silver got the ball on their own 28; they pass for a TD and failed to make the point. 14-6 Silver.

At the half Sterling City pep squad marched. Majorettes Betty Barrett and Beverly Dunn gave an exhibition. After the marching, the smaller boys or substitutes played an eight minute game.

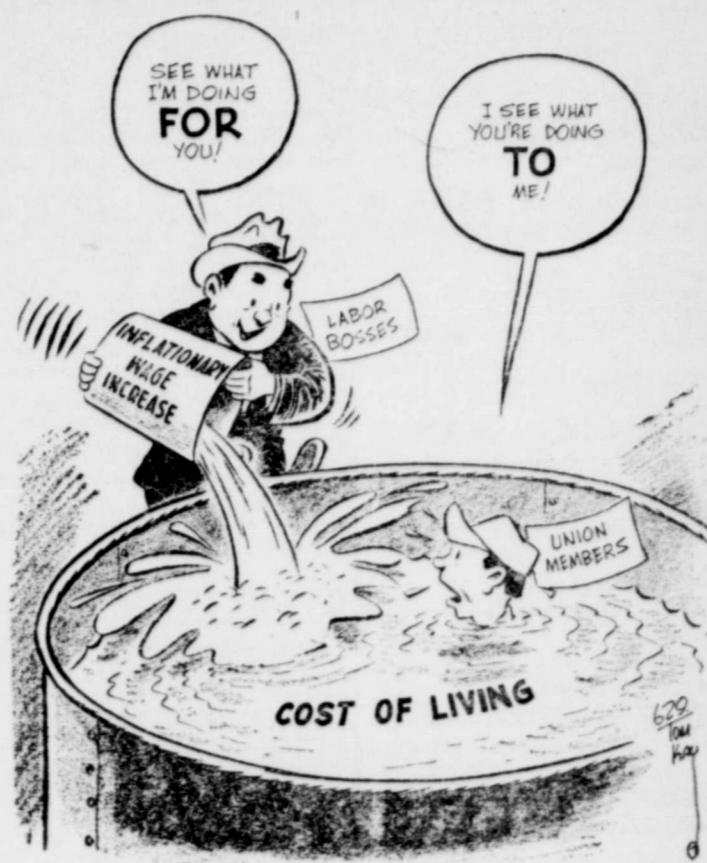
