Eagles Lose Forsan Game 30 to 8

FORSAN NOW LEADS CONFERENCE

The Forsan Buffaloes killed (in all likelihood) Sterling City's chances to be the district champion this year. This was accomplished by the Forsan boys defeating the Eagles here last Friday night 30-8. Forsan is the district's champion team from last year. They will probably be again this year. The only thing that would stop them would be for Garden City to beat them and then there would be three teams with one loss each, being Garden City, Sterling City and Forsan. Naturally, this is what Sterling Citizens are hoping happens.

In the game last Friday Forsan kicked off to Sterling City. Danny Gonzales took the opening kick and returned it about 18 yards. The locals could not make a first and kicked on the fourth down. Forsan's Parks picked up 8 and then 2 yards for a first down. Forsan, on a sneak play, made another first and Bardwell racked up another all in a row. Bardwell got the ball to the 18 yard line and Forsan drew a 15 yard penalty for holding. On pass play they regained 10 of the yards lost but couldn't quite make a first down in three more tries, so the Eagles got the ball. Don McDonald made 7 yards, but a 5 yard penalty hurt the Eagles and Gonzales punted. The kick was very short, and put the ball on the Eagles' 28 yard line.

END OF 1st QUARTER

The Buffaloes failed to gain a first down and Sterling took over. The Eagles, with Don McDonald carrying, almost made a first down, but the ball went over to Forsan. At this point, Sterling drew a 15 yard penalty, giving the Buffaloes a first down. Parks put the pigskin on the goal line and Bardwell pushed it over for a Forsan TD. They made the two extra points.

Robert Carter took the Forsan kick and made a good return. Gonzales made a first plunging right threw the line, but then the Eagles lost the ball on downs. Forsan drew a 15 yard penalty on a personal foul and lost the ball. McDonald picked up 8 and Danny Gonzales two yards for a 1st for the Eagles.

HALF-TIME

Sterling kicked to Forsan and Barnett made two first downs for the Buffaloes and Parks went over for a touchdown. The try for the extra points was good. They kicked to Sterling and a little desultory play resulted. The locals then started a wide-spread wing formation with passes as the order of the night. Forsan's Parks, when they finally got possession of the oval, took the pigskin over for a counter. They made the extra 2 points on a run.

THIRD QUARTER

A long pass from Carter to Bill Davis brought the only Eagle score of the night. The try for extra point was no good. Forsan's center made a bad pass and the ball went over into the end zone, giving Sterling a two point safety. But, the Buffaloes made one more score to rack up the game in a big way.

The game ended 30-8 in favor of Forsan.

AROUND THE COUNTY



ARTHUR BARLEMANN, JR. COUNTY AGENT

Twenty-three 4-H Club member are feeding ninety-nine head of mutton lambs this year for the county show and various district and state stock shows. In addition five club members are feeding commercial ewe lambs and three have registered Rambouillets. Several more have range sheep as their club demonstration.

Club members feeding lambs and the number of lambs being fed are as follows: Royce Sparks, 4 lambs; Mike Payne, 2 lambs; Freddie and Jamie Kay Fields, 4 lambs; Diana Cole, 5 lambs; Mitsy Davis, 3 lambs; Kenneth Fincher, 3 lambs; Cecilia and Jeanie McDonald, 18 lambs; Tommy Foster, 7 lambs; Phil and Jimmie Cole, 6 lambs; LeRuth Reed, 11 lambs; Albert Dale Fields, 2 lambs; Barbara and Jack Clark, 8 lambs; Rosanne Foster, 2 lambs; Larry Stewart, 2 lambs; Joy and Randy Flynt, 2 lambs; David Foster, 10 lambs; Billy Boyd Allen, 4 lambs; Marsha Stewart 1 lamb.

Club members feeding groups of commercial ewe lambs are Betty Jo Barrett, Jack Clark, Barbara Clark, Tommy Foster, and David Foster. Barbara Durham, Drew Durham and Betty Jo Barrett have registered Rambouillets.

Sterling County 4-H Club members will participate in the Odessa show, January 4-9; the Abilene show, January 23-27; the San Antonio show February 12-21; and the San Angelo show, March 4-9. Dates for the Sterling County show have not been set but will be set in the very near future.

There have been several ranchers who have requested me to mention the fact that skunks and coons are becoming quite numerous again. This fact is further backed by the number of dead skunks and coons that are found along the highways in the mornings. Wandering up and down or across the road at night, many are struck and killed by cars and trucks. Also, few nights pass without the delicate aroma of the "sachet kitty" being wafted by the winds.

These animals are carriers of rabies and many other diseases. The skunk is the reservoir of rabies; when it is

stamped out in all other forms of animal life, they still carry it and are responsible for the spread.

The Game Management Association will soon set up the plans for control work during the winter months to combat these varmints. The rabies vaccination program will take place in the next few weeks as soon as arrangements can be worked out with the veterinarian.

Last week the Texas County Agricultural Agents Association held their annual state meeting in Lubbock. The Lubbock Chamber of Commerce and all Lubbock worked hard to make this meeting a success by offering all the facilities in the area for the meeting Friday and Saturday.

On Friday afternoon, a tour of the Lewter Feedlots and the Plains Coop Cotton Oil Mill and the Frank Gray irrigated farms was held. Weather was not too cooperative since it was cold and rainy and it was nearly impossible to leave the busses.

But we were able to see most of the operations of the place. We did leave the busses at Lewter's to go through the mill where the feed is mixed.

Lewter feeds 25,000 head of cattle at a time for about 120 to 150 days. Total annual output of the lot is 75,000 head. No hand labor is used in mixing the feed; the entire operation is a pushbutton affair with one man at a huge panel controlling the switches that weigh each ingredient for the mixer. From the mixer it goes into trucks which auger the feed into the troughs, again with no hand labor except a driver in the truck.

The Gray farm comprises 2,000 acres of land watered with the output of the Lubbock sewer plant. Each day from 7 million to 10 million gallons of water are received at the farm. Since the water must be used, there is a problem of what to do with it sometimes. Storage on the farm will hold only 130 million gallons so it must be kept on the move. At times, Mr. Gray must water carless weeds to get rid of the water; however when turned under these weeds furnish lots of organic matter. Main crops on the farm are grain sorghum and cotton.


Twenty-three persons were present at the breakfast and soliciting cards were passed to the workers.






