### Chocolate Glossies

1 package (8 squares) Baker's Dot Chocolate; 1 cup sweetened condensed milk; 1 cup nut-like cereal kernels; 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Heat chocolate over hot water until partly melted; then remove from hot water and stir rapidly until entirely melted. Add milk and blend; then add cereal kernels and vanilla. Drop from teaspoon onto waxed paper. Cool until firm. Makes 5 dozen candies.

## AROUND THE COUNTY

The Sterling County Livestock Show Association last week set the date for the Sterling County Show and formulated plans for the show. Show date was set for January 18 which is a Monday. Association members felt that they have had better luck getting out of town buyers on Monday than on Saturday.

The show this year will follow the Odessa Show which ends on January 9. The Abilene Show follows the Sterling show with January 23-27 as its dates.

New rules for the county show this year will limit each exhibitor to four fine wool lambs and four crossbred lambs. In addition, lambs sold through the auction sale must be classified as fat lambs; no feeders will be sold through the auction.

Superintendent for this year's show will be William Foster. Assistant superintendents will be Marvin and Melvin Foster.

Reynolds Foster was elected president of the show association. Treasurer is Clinton Hodges.

Dr. Percy Turner, veterinarian, gave 57 dogs and cats rabies shots at the regular fall clinic Monday evening. This represented an increase in the number of pets given the shots during the fall session. A total of about 120 dogs and cats have been given the shots this year in the two sessions. In addition, another 15 were given shots while making the round in the county last Friday. Others have been taken to the veterinarians during the year by their owners and had the shots.

Thirty-five cows were tested for brucellosis by the veterinarian last Friday. These were all cows that were kept for milk production by their owners and were not range cattle.

Junior and senior high Eng-

lish students might be interested in a contest being sponsored in Texas on the subject of FOOD FOR YOUTHPOWER. Students are required to write a food-related story for a news story of editorial column. The 50 top winners in Texas will be invited to the YouthpowerFood Comes First breakfast in Austin in January. One boy and one girl from this group will receive a trip to the National Youthpower Congress in Chicago in February.

Suggested topics for the story are the farm-to-table story of food, food industry in my town, benefits from proper diet, food for health and others. County agents, vocational-agriculture instructors and homemaking instructors have further details and entry blanks for the contest which closes December 20.

How big is farming and ranching in Texas? In 1958, the total income from it was \$2.5 billion; this to the producer alone. Processors, distributors, and others added enough to raise it to \$6 billion.

Eleven percent of the states population operate 276,000 farms and ranches averaging 500 acres in size. Another 30 percent of the population is engaged in occupations related to agriculture. Machinery values now are eight times higher than in 1940; land values invested per farm are four times higher than the same time. Many units now have more than \$100,000 invested in land and machinery.

Production expenses are increasing at an average rate of two to five percent annually. Net farm income is decreasing at the same rate.

How big is agriculture in Texas? Big enough to provide one-third of the state's income and a livelihood for 40 percent of the population.

## J. S. COLE, 88, DIES FRIDAY 2:30 P. M.

J. S. Cole, 88, honorary vice-president of the First National Bank here, died in the Sterling County Hospital about 2:30 p.m. Friday. He had been ill for about two weeks and was taken to the hospital Friday morning at 11 a.m. by ambulance.

Born in Walker County, Alabama, the son of James and Harriet Cole, Mr. Cole came to Texas in October 1894. For two years he lived in Johnson County. He lived in Arizona in 1897-98 and came to Sterling County in July 1898.

Until 1900 he served as deputy in the County clerk's office here. In 1900 he was elected clerk and served that capacity through 1908. For two years he was an abstractor of Sterling County land titles (1909-1910).

In 1910 the First National Bank was organized here with Mr. Cole as cashier. He served as cashier until in the 1950's when he was named executive vice-president. The first of this year his title was made honorary and he went into semi-retirement.

He married Stella White in Johnson County on February 20, 1900. She died in 1939. A son, Thurman Cole of Fort Worth, survives, as well as two grandchildren, Elizabeth and Jackie Cole of Sterling City. Another son, J. S. Jr. preceded him in death.

Funeral arrangements are being handled by Lowe Funeral Home, but were not completed as this paper was printed Friday.

J. W. Blanek, owner, is the new Sterling City agent for the telegraph company, with Mrs. Glenda Fletcher providing the service by relaying messages by telephone through the Big Spring Western Union office. Hours of local service are 8 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. week days and 8 a.m. to 12 noon Saturday.

The new agency replaces the former arrangement by which Mrs. Lucy Onstott provided such service at the Sterling Motel, and was occasioned by Mrs. Onstott's recent retirement from her motel duties.

For many years the Santa Fe railroad supplied local telegraph service but other arrangements became necessary as the depot closed. Whenever the local agency is closed customers may send messages by telephoning Western Union at Big Spring or San Angelo.

Western Union telegraph money order service will continue to be provided by the First National Bank.
