NORATADATA BAZAAR HELD FRIDAY

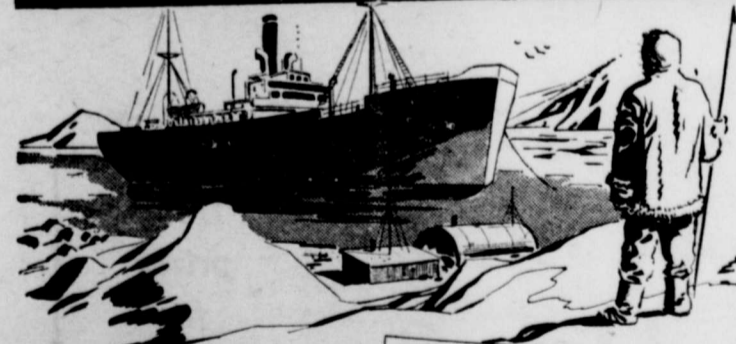
The members of the Noratadata Club held the annual Christmas bazaar Friday morning in the community center clubroom. Approximately \$130 was made, it was said.

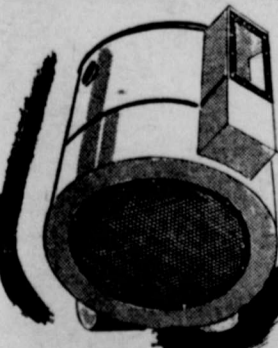

AROUND THE COUNTY

ARTHUR BARLEMANN, JR. COUNTY AGENT

Reynolds Lee Foster and David Durham, 4-H Club members, will appear on the program at the annual meeting of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association next Wednesday morning. The annual meeting starts in Austin with registration from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. and committee meetings next Monday afternoon.

Tuesday's program will consist of addresses by Will Wilson, attorney general of Texas; Stephen Hart, tax attorney, National Livestock Tax Commission, Denver; Ed Marsh, secretary, National Wool Growers' Association; Don Clyde of the American Sheep Producers Council; and W. N. Stokes, president Federal Intermediate Credit Bank, Houston.

Wednesday morning's program will consist of the awards to the winners in the 4-H Club programs sponsored by the association, a report by last year's winners at which time Reynolds Lee will report on his trip to the range camp sponsored by the association. David will receive his certificate as a state winner in the range program to attend next year's range camp.

Dr. R. C. Bushland, USDA Entomology Research Branch at Kerrville, will conclude the morning program of speakers. He will speak on the screw-worm control program.

A limited supply of the 1960 issue of FARMERS' TAX GUIDE has been received and is now available in the county agent's office. This guide is valuable in helping to prepare your income tax as it contains information on how to report various soil and water conservation payments the reporting of trades, condemnations, sale of diseased livestock, casualty losses and thefts and the self-employ-

ment social security tax. A copy now might help you determine the best way to handle an impending sale. You can get a copy by dropping by the office, calling or dropping us a postcard asking for the FARMERS' TAX GUIDE.

The 1959 Census of Agriculture is now being taken in this area of the state. T. C. "Cutter" Davis is the enumerator for Sterling County and is now at work taking the count.

Several weeks ago the report form was mailed to every box holder in the county. If you own any cattle, sheep, or goats, 20 or more chickens, turkeys, or ducks; 20 or more fruit trees, grapevines, planted nut trees, or operate any type farm or ranch, you were requested to fill out the form. Then the enumerator would call for the form and help you complete it.

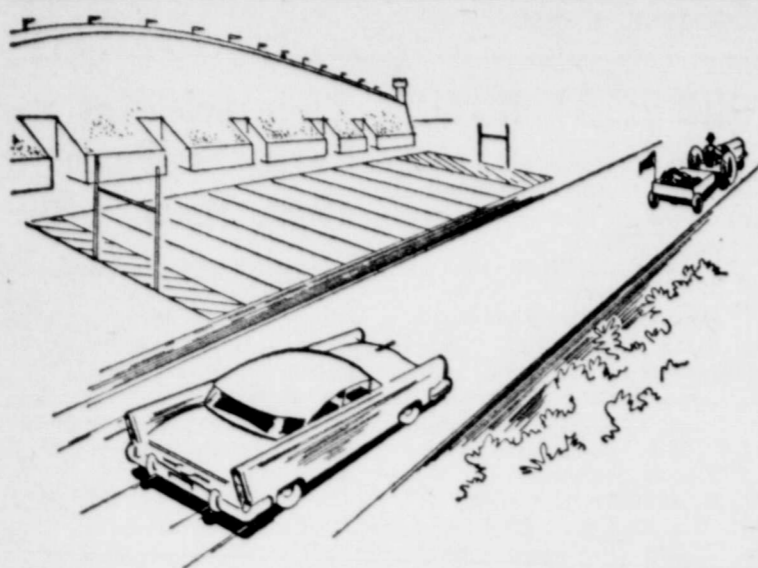
Information on the form is used only to determine county totals for agriculture. When released next year, it will show the total number of sheep, cattle, horses, tractors, pounds of wool sold, and much other agricultural information. Census takers and others who handle the form cannot disclose any information on the form nor can it be used for the purpose of taxation or investigation by anyone. All persons handling the forms are under oath and penalty of \$1,000 fine or two years imprisonment for disclosing any information they receive from the form.

The Agricultural Census is taken every five years; the last year it was taken was 1954. In 1960 the federal population census will be taken as is customary every ten years.

Can You Stop In Time?



It takes more than the distance between goal posts on a football field (100 yards) to stop a car traveling at 60 miles per hour under the best driving conditions, 4-H Club members point out. At 60 mph a car travels 88 feet per second. There's not much "time" to come to a dead stop upon approaching a tractor or other slow-moving farm machinery.

"Highway safety is everyone's responsibility," 4-H leaders declare, and during the summer when traffic is at its peak the obligation becomes greater. The devastating fact that three out of four traffic fatalities occur in rural areas makes the 4-H Safety program the "number one crop" for nearly a million conscientious club members.

Statistics reveal that there are more teen-age drivers on the highways today than ever before.

It is also true that drivers under 20 years of age have a worse safety record than older drivers.

So each 4-H boy and girl enrolled in the safety project is encouraged to become a "self-policing committee of one." These 4-H'ers make certain that the family car, truck, and tractor are in safe operating condition at all times.

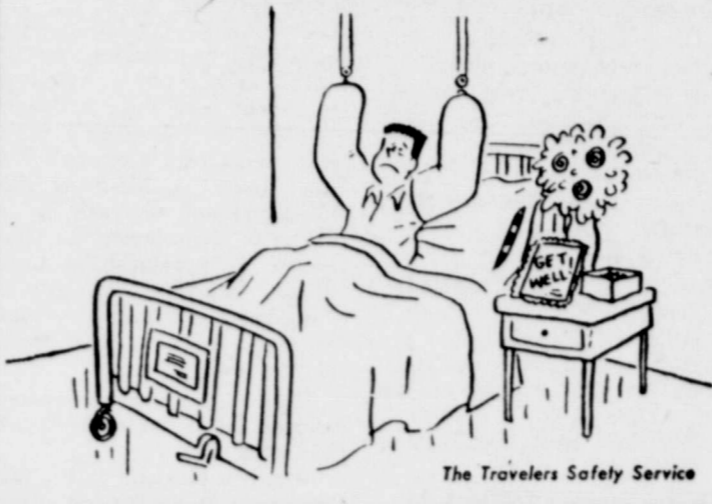
For the past 15 years the 4-H Safety program has been supported nationally by General Motors, which among other things provides incentive awards for top ranking club members in each state. The awards consist of \$400 college scholarships, all-expense paid trips to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, medals of honor, and plaques. The program is under the direction of the Cooperative Extension Service, United States Department of Agriculture.

An easy-to-please **Raisin Nut Pudding** made with pudding and pie filling mix can be prepared in about fifteen minutes, and, when served as a sweet ending to the meal, will bring extra dividends of praise from the family.

Raisin Nut Pudding
1 package butterscotch pudding and pie filling mix; 2 1/2 cups milk; 1/2 cup cut raisins; 1/4 cup chopped walnuts.
Combine pudding mix and milk in saucepan. Then add raisins. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture comes to a full boil. Remove from heat and add walnuts. Pour into sherbet glasses. Chill. Serve plain or with cream. Makes 5 or 6 servings.

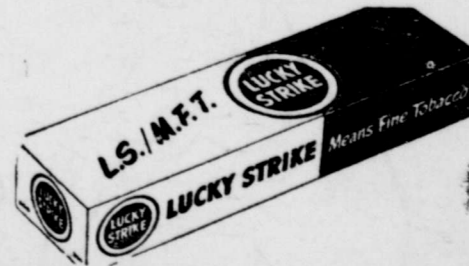

INQUIRE BEFORE YOU RETIRE

Naturally you want to receive your first social security check soon after you retire. To accomplish this, Floyd B. Ellington of the San Angelo social security office offers this bit of advice. "Inquire before you retire at you; local social security office."
According to Ellington, if you are a working woman 62 or more or a man age 65 or older planning to retire, you should contact your social security office two or three months before your retirement.
"Why wait those extra weeks for your first social security check when a little foresight will bring it to you soon after your last pay check," Ellington concluded.
