Longtime Bailey County resident, Harold Mardis, 86, died at 9:43 a.m., Tuesday, Sept. 21, in West Plains Medical Center, following a lengthy illness.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. today, in the Ellis Chapel of the Chimes with the Rev. H.D. Hunter, pastor of the Community Church, officiating.

Burial was in the Muleshoe Cemetery under the direction of Ellis Funeral Home. Mardis was born June 8, 1896, in Nebraska and moved to the West Camp Community in 1908, from Nebraska. He served as a county commissioner from 1941 to 1946, and on the county school board from 1961 to 1978. He was a farmer and a member of the Congregational Church.

Dallas Oil Executive Speaks To Rotarians

Muleshoe Rotary met at noon on Tuesday, September 21, at the Civic Center for their regular meeting. Special guests included Neil Crow, Rotary Exchange student, Joe Dent, Mr. and Mrs. Tuffy Dent, Walter Hughes, Terry Fields and Gordon Wilson.

Jeff Smith reported the progress of the Bailey County West Plains Fair plans. Many booths, both for businesses and individuals have been scheduled.

Don Rempe was in charge of the program for the meeting and he presented Don Dent, a cousin of Tuffy Dent, who holds degrees in petroleum engineering and law. Don is the executive vice president of CKB Associates of Dallas.

Dent gave a resume' of oil activities. Dent stated that two years ago there were 4300 rigs where there are now 2500 and attributed this to the result of over production and low prices.

Dent gave a history of oil production starting with the 1950's and pointed out that exploration for oil and gas is so expensive at present costs, that it is now cheaper to buy companies with proven oil and gas reserves than it is to find new reserves. Dent explained that high inflation took gas prices up along with everything else and that he doubted that "we would ever see gas below one dollar again."

Dent explained that the only reason the cost of gas is as low as it is now is because of over production and low prices.

Muleshoe High School's cross country teams competed at Brownfield on Saturday, September 18, coming out with a third place in overall competition.

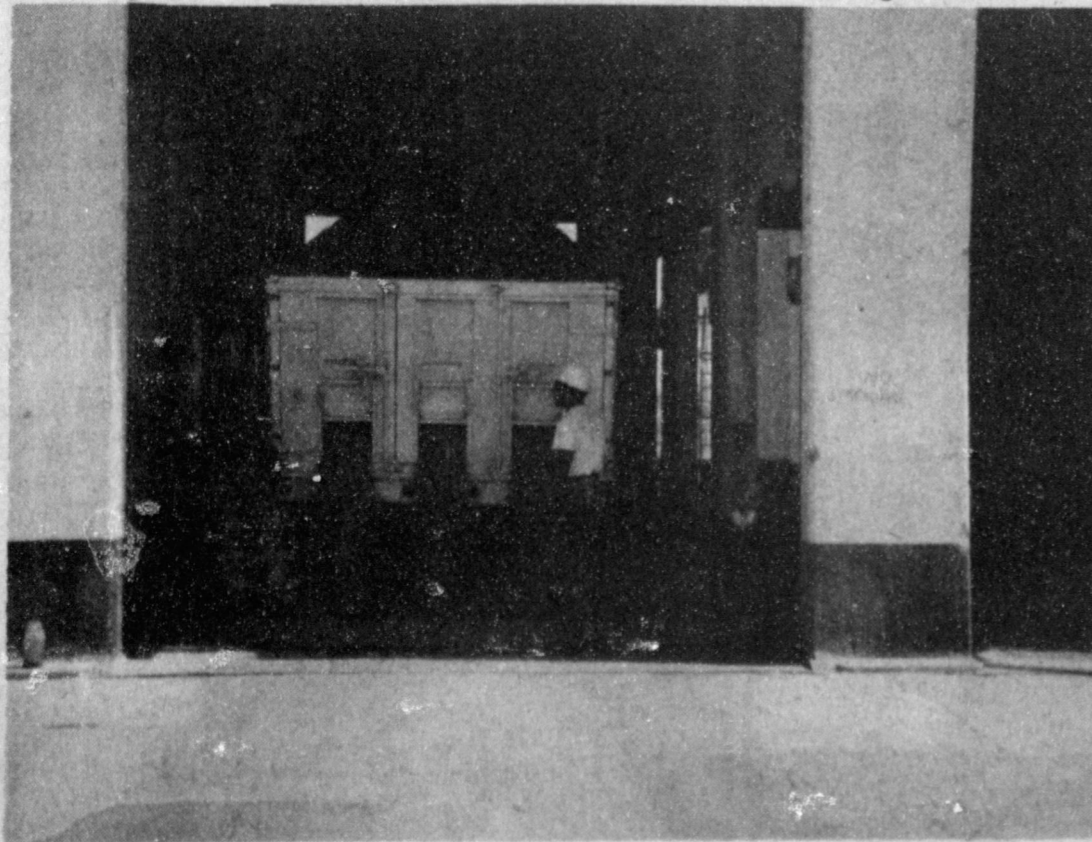

'Live It Up' With Fish This Fall

Why not put a touch of the "exotic" in your fall menus?

You can still enjoy the "flavor of other lands," even if this isn't your year to travel. With fish that's especially easy, says Annette Reddell Hegen, a seafood consumer education specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

An extra bonus is that this gourmet fare doesn't add inches to the waistline. And, since fish is very nutritious food, you can eat it in good health.

Here are some recipes from other lands that you may wish to try.

FISH MEXICALI

- 2 pounds fresh fish filets
- 2 tablespoons salad oil
- 2 tablespoons soy sauce
- 2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
- 1 teaspoon paprika
- 1/2 teaspoon chili powder
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
- Dash liquid hot pepper sauce

Place filets in a single layer, skin side down, on a well-greased broil-and-serve platter. Combine remaining ingredients. Pour sauce over filets. Broil about 4 inches from source of heat for 7 minutes, or until filets flake easily when tested with a fork. Baste once during broiling, with sauce in pan. Garnish with lemon wedges. Makes 6 servings.

BROILED FISH HAWAIIAN

- 2 pounds fish filets
- 1/2 cup pineapple juice
- 1/4 cup steak sauce
- 1 teaspoon salt
- Dash pepper

Skin filets and cut into serving-size portions. Place fish in a single layer in a shallow baking dish. Combine remaining ingredients and pour over fish. Let

stand for 30 minutes, turning fish once. Remove fish, reserving sauce for basting. Place fish on a well-greased broiler pan. Broil about 4 inches from source of heat for 4 to 6 minutes. Turn fish carefully and brush with sauce. Broil 4 to 6 minutes longer or until fish flakes easily when tested with a fork. Serves 6.

Decorating With Wallpaper

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

Local Democratic Party Takes Stands On Ag Issues

The Bailey County Democratic Executive Committee met on September 16, for a general business session in which several items were brought on the agenda.

County Chairman, Chuck Smith, reported to the group on the State Democratic Convention which was held in Dallas on September 10 & 11. Delegates attending were Linda Guelker, Chuck Smith and Hugh Young as an alternate. Young's wife, Pat, also accompanied the group.

Special emphasis was put on attendance of all meetings in the area which deal

with agriculture. The platform adopted by the state party is shown at the end of this article. All major candidates addressed the caucus and pledged to help Texas agriculture.

Democratic Presidential hopefuls (former VP Walter Mondale, Senator Alan Cranston, Senator Gary Hart, and Governor Reuben Ashen of Florida), addressed the convention. All hopefuls made specific mention of the problems that agriculture is now facing. Major points were agreed on as to the need of producers organization and the exertion of influence on

government regulations, marketing and development of foreign markets.

Other business discussed at the Thursday night meeting including the financing of media advertisements endorsing all local Democratic and State Democratic candidates. Special effort will be made to get voters out and the education of voters on write-in candidates.

A "Meet the Democratic Candidate" night was approved for Tuesday, October 26, and it is hoped that state candidates may possibly be in attendance. This rally will be held at the Bailey County Coliseum meeting room from 7:30 p.m. until 9 p.m.

The following is the platform by which the Democratic party will address agricultural issues, as stated by the State Democratic Party.

1. The basis of a sound agricultural system depends on a strong market. Foreign trade offices could inexpensively help boost exports and therefore, enlarge Texas's agricultural market.

2. The present system of regulation is restrictive as to entrance into the industry. Not only would shipping prices drop, due to deregulation, but we feel that service would be improved, rural areas included.

3. The partial payment of the premium for USDA All-Risk insurance will increase participation in the program, help stabilize the economy in crop loss areas, and strengthen the program for farmers involved.

4. This will allow rein-

statement of SCS technical personnel to regain 1969 levels. This is needed to combat wind and water erosion and to increase the wise use of water and topsoil.

5. Provide funds to enact this program that the people of Texas voted for. This program will help qualifying individuals enter into or expand agricultural production.

6. A permanent group of Texas agricultural producers is needed to advise the state concerning agricultural policy. This group will help bridge ideas from one administration to another and ensure Texas ag-

ricultural interests are continually supported.

7. To ensure that funds are available to improve Texas farm to market roads as they are crucial to the Texas agricultural system.

8. Agriculture's future lies in technical and marketing research. These findings must be, in turn, be transferred to the producer to be effective Texas needs to increase support for these areas if it is to maintain leadership in U.S. agriculture.

9. We support the Texas Homestead Law and oppose any changes in Homestead protection.
