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

**MIDLAND TO HAVE NEW HOSPITAL SOON**

Parkview Hospital, a modern, new 60-bed general hospital is rapidly nearing completion at Midland and will be opened early in the new year. The new facility will be a proprietary hospital, and is an integral part of a complete project of health-care and retirement facilities that will eventually encompass almost sixty acres of land in the northeast section of the city.

Parkview Manor, a 100-bed nursing home, was opened early this fall as the first step in this long planned venture which includes apartment housing for the elderly (the first unit of eight apartments is nearly completed) plus single family dwellings designed especially for elderly housing, a neighborhood shopping area, medical offices, and a community building, in addition to a non-denominational church.

**Business Backs 4-H Clubs Nation-Wide**

**Incentives Help Make Best Better**

U.S. business firms contributed \$1.25 million in 1963 toward recognition and encouragement of the nation's 2,225,000 4-H Club members, the director of the National 4-H Service Committee has announced.

Norman C. Mindrum, director of the committee, said the record figure made possible awarding of college scholarships and fellowships valued at \$145,000. They were presented this year to 275 of the nation's most outstanding 4-H youths and to young adults who once were 4-H'ers.

The financial support also was used for more than 180,000 other awards to members of the nation's more than 94,000 local 4-H Clubs. The clubs are in about 3,100 counties in all 50 states and Puerto Rico.

The national committee, headquartered in Chicago, utilizes the funds to assist the Cooperative Extension Service advance the 4-H program.

**Awards Since 1900**

"Awards are an integral part of 4-H," Mindrum said, "and have been provided as incentives and recognition for young people since the early 1900s."

Help from 57 business firms now backing 4-H dates back in some cases to the 1920s. The average tenure for all donors is 18 years.

The scholarships, nearly all for \$500 each, were awarded Dec. 1-5 during the 42nd National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, attended by more than 1,500 delegates. Their expense-paid trips, considered both educational and cultural, were awarded by more than 30 of these firms.

Funds for programs ranging from bread baking to entomology are channeled through the 4-H committee, incorporated in



1923 when a handful of business firms provided \$3,400 to help the growing club program. In the last 10 years alone, the number of county medals awarded has increased from about 85,000 to nearly 180,000.

"Each donor has an interest in boys and girls, an appreciation of the need for youth development and a feeling that the organization can serve 4-H in a wholesome manner with limited self-gain," Mindrum said.

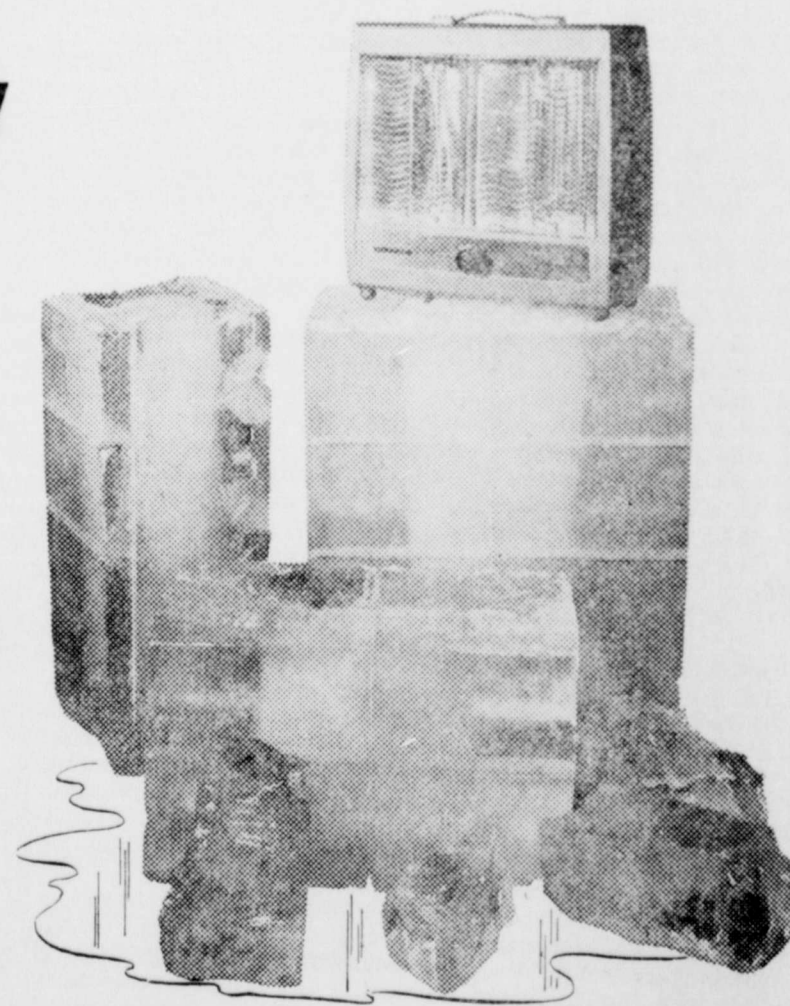

### NEW TEXAS ALMANACS

Many new features in the 1964-1965 Texas Almanac, just published by The Dallas Morning News, have been added to material that has made this 106-year-old publication the "Encyclopedia of Texas." Texas' increasing urbanization is emphasized in special pages containing photographs and comparative statistics for 21 metropolitan areas, including the cities of Abilene, Amarillo, Austin, Beaumont, Port Arthur, Corpus Christi, Harlingen, Brownsville, San Antonio, Dallas, El Paso, Fort Worth, Galveston, Texas City, Houston, Laredo, Lubbock, Midland, Odessa, San Angelo, San Antonio, Texarkana, Tyler, Waco and Wichita Falls. Maps of 254 counties and data on all counties and cities of Texas have been brought up-to-date, including population and other figures from the 1960 census. New features are a County Economic Index, and maps showing leading Texas counties in production of crops and livestock.

Texans who like to brag will find ample ammunition in two pages showing the rank of Texas among states, and in proportion of the United States total, in leading categories.

Other data appearing for the first time include carload shipments of fruits and vegetables and added information on export-import trade.

Texas landmarks are listed by counties in a special section, revised through information obtained from authorities on county histories.

All Governors of Texas and Presidents of the Republic of Texas are pictured in the historical section.

Agricultural information has been completely revised, with the help of authorities of Texas A&M, the U.S. Department of Agriculture and others. For this and other sections, several thousand Texans have supplied information and photographs, according to Walter B. Moore, editor.

Election returns, the text of the Constitution of Texas with amendments adopted through 1962, a list of wet and dry counties, map of Texas Senatorial, Representative and Congressional Districts, lists of state, county and municipal officials, and other information are found in the discussion of politics and elections.

Water, soils, plant life, weather, wild life, minerals, employment and labor, manufacturing, service industries, and hundreds of other topics are summarized in the 638 pages. A widely-used section is the list of more than 500 statewide civic organizations, with their chief executives and home addresses.

A comprehensive index increases the usefulness of the Texas Almanac's data for schools, businessmen, public officials, writers and speakers, and others. While it is primarily a reference publication, more than 400 illustrations, including a 4-color photograph

### Civil Service Opportunities

The U.S. Civil Service Commission has announced new examinations for Recreation Resource Specialists (paying \$6,675 to \$14,565 a year) and Public Health Educators (paying \$6,675 to \$12,845 a year) for work in Washington, D.C., and throughout the United States.

## Experience Teaches 4-H'ers Value of Their Club Work

Experience is a good teacher. And the experience of four Texas teen-agers has taught them the practical value of their 4-H Club work. All won special recognition for their best-in-state 1963 club projects.

Ann Williams, 18, of Angleton and Gayle Wagner, 18, of Victoria, earned expense-paid trips to the 42nd National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, which convenes the week after Thanksgiving.

### Watches For Two

Two other Texas teen-agers won honors for their efforts. Rique Bobbitt, 17, of Bryan and Margie Lux, 15, of Wetmore received 19-jewel engraved wrist watches.

Miss Lux ranked first in the dairy foods program sponsored by the Carnation Company. Bobbitt placed at the top of the list for those in the state dog care and training program supported by the Ralston Purina Company.

Miss Williams is one of those 4-H'ers who applies the club's motto: "Learn by doing." She began her clothing program in 1955 and by 1959 had won district honors for a tailored suit she made. This year her tweed coat rated highest in the statewide clothing program.

Miss Williams is one of 718,450 4-H'ers enrolled in the national program sponsored by Coats & Clark Inc. She is a freshman at Sam Houston State Teachers College and majors in home economics. Miss Williams is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Williams who operate a 2,063-acre cattle and rice ranch.

Miss Wagner won the dress revue title. This popular program has a national membership of 718,500 and is sponsored

by Simplicity Pattern Co. Inc. At the national congress Miss Wagner will again model her prize-winning pink mohair coat and wool flannel dress ensemble.

### Saves Money

"In the past nine months, I've saved about \$300 just by making my own clothes," says the Victoria College student. She is a seven-year club member and is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Victor Wagner.

Bobbitt enrolled in the 4-H dog care and training program in 1959, which today has a total enrollment of 19,100 members. Bobbitt has raised and trained five bird dogs.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Bobbitt. About 50 percent of the dogs in his club have come from breeding his own dogs. Bobbitt trains and sells puppies. Often, he gives a puppy to a new boy in his club.

For a feeling of accomplishment and satisfaction, there's nothing like watching your family enjoy some dairy foods dishes you've prepared. That's the opinion of Miss Lux who lives with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edward P. Lux, on their 385-acre farm.

Her efforts helped to win first place in the dairy foods program sponsored by the Carnation Company. That particular 4-H field boasts an enrollment of 699,300 members from coast-to-coast.

Miss Lux, a junior foods leader, made and exhibited an apricot cheese salad which took the top award.

All 4-H Club award winners are selected for special honors and recognition by the Cooperative Extension Service.

### SOCIAL SECURITY NOTES

Floyd B. Ellington of the San Angelo social security district office said today that applying for your social security benefits two or three months before you retire is a good step to take. Retirement from many years of working involves a great many details to be attended to at the last minute. It's best not to leave social security till then. Mr. Ellington said that his office can help speed your first check if you apply a little ahead of time.

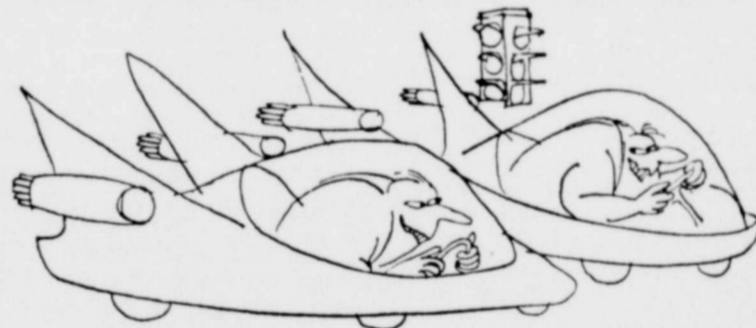
Applying early means you will get your social security benefit check soon after you retire. Your benefit will arrive when you need income most—after the familiar pay check has stopped.

Several months before you retire, you should call the social security office at 653-6861 to see what proofs to bring with you when you go in to apply for your benefits. You may be asked to bring proof of your age, proof of marriage or your last tax return or a W-2 form showing your wages. The social security office can tell you what you will need. Details peculiar to your particular case can be discussed and decided.

Even if you are not retiring Mr. Ellington said that his office would like to send you a pamphlet explaining the highlights of social security. If you are at least 62, it is extremely important to know about reduced benefits payable at that age. There is a good deal to know about social security options that might apply to your own situation. At age 65, benefits can be paid in full if you earn less than \$1200 a year. And even if you earn considerably more than \$1200 a year, some benefits may be payable.

Don't delay. Phone or go into the social security office at 204 Continental Building, San Angelo, Texas before you retire. They'll be able to answer a lot of questions for you. "Am I entitled to benefits? How Much? What about My Wife and Children?" These are only a few of the matters they can clear up for you. They'll make sure you don't lose any benefits to which you are entitled.

ROCKETS are being attached to cars by Detroit manufacturers but not to eclipse competition at a traffic light. Engineers studying the effects of motion mount rocket engines on the sides of autos. Their thrust simulates severe crosswinds.



'PUNCH-DRUNK' astronauts are a possibility if their brains are unshielded from continuous bombardment by low-level radiation, says Dr. Ray Snider of the University of Rochester Center for Brain Research. The nervous system will "roll with the radiation punches for a little while," Dr. Snider reports, "but, as the effects accumulate, the brain suddenly breaks down."
