The Trustees of the Muleshoe Independent School Board met in a regular meeting on Monday, March 14 in the School Business office, with the main business at hand being to approve resignations of various teachers and to employ some others. Those whose resignations were approved Monday night included, Paul Hammer, Edith Henderson, Katherine Sanders, Nanette Soto, Leslie Soto and Eddie Chance. All resignations will be effective at the end of the 1982-83 school year.

The board in further business employed teachers, nurses, secretaries, special education director and Federal Program Director for the 1983-84 school year with reassignments to be made as needed due to decline in enrollment. A complete list of hired personnel can be seen at the school business office.

Approval was given to Update 19, Phase 2 to the Board Policy Manual and local textbook committee adoptions were approved.

A band trip which had been previously requested by the High School band to the Enid Oklahoma Tri State Music Festival on

May 4-7 was approved by the board members. Also approved was the purchase of a 1972 60 passenger school bus and the offered vs. served program for all cafeterias, grades kindergarten through twelfth. A roof replacement was approved for the DeShazo cafeteria and kitchen.

Easter holidays will get the approval of an early dismissal of school, with the time to be announced at a later date.

Official Says Contracts Will Be Honored

A previous article in the Sunday, March 13 Journal referring to the 'fold-up' of advance forward PIK cotton contracts buying by the Plains Cotton Cooperative Association of Lubbock was clarified Tuesday with PCCA Treasurer Van May. Upon first impression, the article seemed to indicate that all trade had been terminated in the advance forward PIK Cotton contract sales. May told the Journal on Tuesday that contract buying had been resumed and that the Company was contracting again as of 12:15 p.m. on Monday, March 14. "The temporary shut-down of contracting was merely a time of re-assessment," May said Tuesday. "Our contracting is no different than any other; we have to do this occasionally when the markets indicate it or when our Company feels the need for an assessment period."

Further on in the March 13 article, the Journal did state that all outstanding PIK Forward Contracts with PCCA would be honored. Another official of the Company Darryl Lindsey, operations manager told the Journal on Tuesday that when a contract taken through a member's Cooperative Gin is confirmed by telephone with the Lubbock offices, then it becomes a valid contract. "A contract is not valid until the time that it is confirmed in the Lubbock office," Lindsey stated.

Bailey County 4-H Finishes Show Trail for 1983 Year

Several High Plains and area youth who have been on the so-called 'show trail' for about three months wound up the season for 1983 with some big wins at the granddaddy of them all - the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.

The Future Farmers of America and 4-H members from this area took a fair share of the average \$24,702.88 paid out for the 26 breed champions. The final sale total of 413 steers consigned was \$1.7 million, an 18 percent increase over last year.

County Agent Spencer Tanksley told the Journal that fourteen out of the sixteen head of cattle taken to the Houston Show, made the sale with an average price of about \$2,000 each. "Those who had breed champions of course, received more premium," Tanksley stated. Some of these steers were shown a number of times. During the season, the agent stated that 52 steers were shown - with 43 head of them being sold at the shows. Bailey County youngsters in final count brought home twelve first places, ten seconds, ten thirds and 11 fourths.

buying on Friday, was merely a temporary measure and trading has again resumed by the PCCA. As mentioned in the article on the thirteenth, May had stated that a decision to re-open trading would be made as to the continuance of the program.

Darrell Lindsey told the Journal Tuesday that the Plains Cotton Cooperative Association had been a "viable Company for thirty years and is in the best financial condition ever right now." He also stated that the PIK cotton had actually been contracted every day to some extent since the opening of the program. May added that "PCCA plans to remain as a viable, continuous buyer and to have a competitive program that allows them to purchase Cooperative member's cotton." "We will back our contracts," he said.

As contracting continues, according to the two officials, prices will fluctuate and change as the time moves along. A temporary re-assessment period of the same kind that occurred on Friday can occur at any time, so long as the Com-
