of Commerce and as president of the Chamber of Commerce. He is also a member of the First United Methodist Church and serves on the Finance Committee. A believer in civic im-


### De Shazo Jump Rope Heart Raises Over \$5,000

### Additional Funds Okayed For County ACP Program

Bailey County irrigation farmers who failed to get in on the earlier cost-share agreements on underground pipe will get a second shot at it during the period of time from April 4 to April 8.

Rusty Williamson, Executive Director of the Bailey

County ASCS office told the Journal Tuesday that Bailey County had been allocated an additional \$44,000 - especially earmarked for 'underground pipe cost-sharing in the ACP program.

The Director also cautioned, "Those who wish to do so, need to take advantage of this program now, since we (Bailey County) stand a good chance of losing any future allocations if the present one is not used to the fullest." Williamson also stated that it might also be possible to get additional allocations besides the \$44,000 if there is an established need for the funds.

Farmers who wish to sign up in the ACP program need to contact the Bailey County ASCS office wherein other surrounding areas had received even more than the formally offered allocation. "Just be

Acres of canvas, including a large big top tent, which will be erected at the Boy Scout Camp Grounds on the South end of Main Street will provide the scene for the circus. The circus will be unloaded be-

tween 7 and 8 a.m. and the big top will be pulled into the air by elephants approximately between 9 and 10 a.m.

Paul Wilbanks, pharmacist at Western Drug, was guest speaker. Wilbanks said "It takes six years of school to become a registered pharmacist." He explained the use of computers in the pharmacy.

"Millions of dollars and much time go into research, only to find the drug unsafe. This is one cause of the high cost of medicines. Generic drugs have been on the market approximately a year. The law has changed to the extent that the Doctor may state on a prescription that the medication may be dispensed as written or in like form. They have to meet the same requirements as other drugs. All drugs do not have an equivalent to Generic. In most cases there is a 40 to 50 percent savings. Medicare will only allow three prescriptions a month, so Generic drugs are very beneficial," Wilbanks said.

Wilbanks also explained how medicine use has changed over the years and how Doctors must now write narcotic prescriptions in triplicate, one for doctors files, one for pharmacist and one to be filed with state police. He also explained how medicine continues to increase our life expectancy.



Pierce is also a member of the Odd-fellows and the Kiwanis and is very supportive of all athletic events in school, as well as others. The Pierces sponsor the Muleshoe cheerleaders and are active in Babe Ruth and Little League programs. Gerry relates his interest back to his own 15-year old son, and like any other father,

wants to make every effort to see that he and others like him get equal and fair opportunities.

R. D. "Tub" Angeley has announced his candidacy for re-election to the Board of Trustees of the Muleshoe Independent School District. A six year member of the Board, Angeley feels that it is important that "we have someone experienced in local school affairs and who is familiar with the financial structure. All of this comes in light with the employment of the new superintendent."

Angeley says that "I and my wife, Pat, have always been interested in our community and in the future of our schools. I have three children in Muleshoe school now and will have another one in school before long." Angeley stated, "I earnestly solicit your support this Saturday, April 2, in the election." 

Such applications must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date, in order to have his name place on the ballot.

Dear Editor:

Seventeen million people play bingo. The game consists in determining which player can first line up a series of five random numbers in a winning pattern on a card purchased for play from the operators of the game. Sponsoring agents of legal bingo are fraternities, sororities, veteran's organizations, clubs and some churches.

Bingo played on the basis of a charge and the winning of a prize is gambling. It is illegal in Texas unless approved in a local option election. We are faced with such an election on Saturday, April 2. Because some charitable groups utilize bingo to fund their benevolent work, many will be tolerant and favor the legalizing of "charitable" bingo. This toleration is on the basis that it is for a "good cause." Thus bingo at the church, the sorority, the club or the P.T.A. meeting is acceptable to some, although the same game in a professional gambling establishment would be condemned. When it comes to legalizing gambling in order for certain organizations to do benevolent work, it should not be tolerated. They should expect charitable organizations to utilize ethical and moral techniques in raising funds, not questionable ones.

We do not believe that those who are striving to legalize bingo are strategizing for the legalizing of other forms of gambling in our area. But those who are familiar with the gambling industry are well aware that the legalizing of any form of gambling is a "foot in the door" for more gambling to be legalized. It serves as merely the first round to open the flood gates for pari-mutuel betting, lotteries and casino gambling. Presently, there is a big push in our state for multiple forms of gambling. Because the shadow of gambling looms large over Texas, we should give no edge to the gambling industry by approving any form of gambling even though it presents itself as being innocent and for a good cause.


