AROUND THE COUNTY by

There have been one or two requests for the formula to spray mulberry trees to prevent or at least cut down on the number of berries produced. The formula is as follows: two tablespoons lead arsenate, three tablespoons hydrated lime, three tablespoons dry lime sulphur and three gallons of water. The trees, or blooms, should be sprayed when they are in full bloom.

This will drastically reduce the number of berries. Like all such treatments, it is not always one hundred per cent effective but it will reduce the berry crop and do away with much of the nuisance of the berries on the ground, sidewalks, and driveways. Mulberries are fast growing shade trees but the berries have always been a drawback associated with the old mulberries. There are now some non-bearing types available that are just as good as a shade tree as the old bearing type.

Beautiful lawns don't just happen. They are the product of good management which includes the application of a complete fertilizer about the time the grass begins to green up and grow. One of these days, its going to warm up when the cold weather has blown itself out and the grass is going to begin its growth. When it does, it needs the necessary plant food or nutrients to keep it going.

For many years, it was felt that a fertilizer containing nitrogen and possibly phosphate was all that was needed in this area. During the last few years, the application of potash, the last number in the formula of complete fertilizer, has been tried in this area with good success. The grass has responded to the additional nutrient. Our problem is not the shortage of the potash but the availability of it.

A good fertilizer to use is one with a 1-1-1 ratio such as 8-8-8 or a 2-1-1 ratio such as 10-5-5. All grasses need two pounds of actual nitrogen per thousand square feet. With an 8-8-8 formulation, this is 12 pounds of fertilizer per thousand. Follow the application with a thorough watering. If you haven't checked your yard in the last few days, it's drier than you think. At least the top or surface is dry and packed even though we had lots of moisture during the winter months. The vegetation is sapping the surface and moisture is needed.

U.S. Border Patrol Seeks Applicants

The U.S. Border Patrol of the Immigration and Naturalization Service has an urgent need for physically fit young men desiring a career in Federal law enforcement work. This is a career opportunity for those who like action and outdoor work.

The Border Patrol is the mobile, uniformed enforcement branch of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Its principle purpose is to prevent the smuggling and illegal entry of aliens into the United States. The border patrolmen, called Immigration Patrol Inspectors, work along international boundaries, although their duties are not necessarily confined to these areas. They work in jeeps, cars, on foot, in boats and even in airplanes. Officers investigate violations of the immigration laws and frequently make arrests. They are often required to work irregular hours, under all weather conditions. These duties demand mental alertness as well as exceptional physical vigor and stamina.

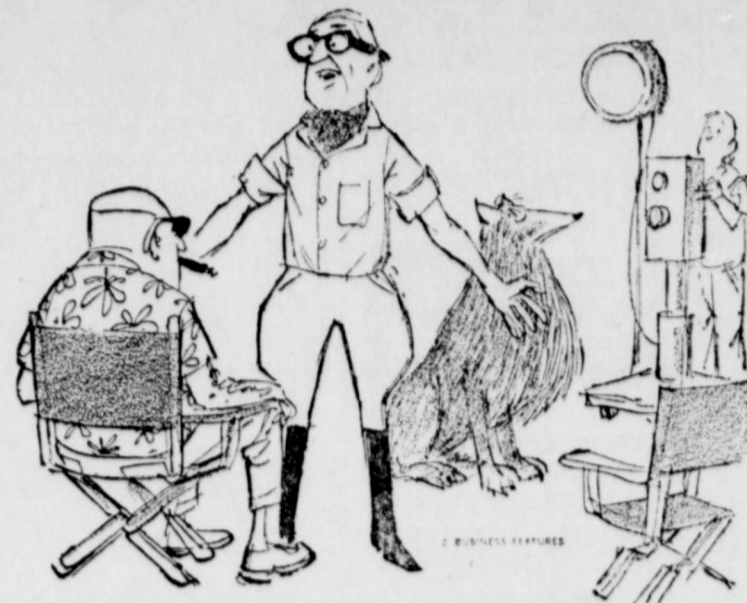
The entrance salary of an Immigration Patrol Inspector is \$7,639 a year (Grade GS-7). There are promotional opportunities up to executive levels in the Immigration and Naturalization Service. On-the-job training offers splendid opportunities for promotion to positions of greater responsibility.

No experience is required for these positions. To qualify, applicants must pass a written test of verbal abilities, judgment, and aptitude for learning a foreign language. Candidates who pass the written test are called for oral interviews in the order of their standing on the list. The oral interview is designed to determine if the candidate has the personal qualities needed for the work. Applicants must also pass a rigid physical examination. Candidates who are selected for appointment are assigned to the Border Patrol Academy for a period of intensive training in such subjects as immigration laws, Spanish, physical training and marksmanship. Trainees receive full pay while in the academy.

Applications are now being accepted for the civil service examination for Immigration Patrol Inspector which will be held on Saturday, January 24, 1970. An additional examination is scheduled for April, 1970. However, those wishing to be tested in January must submit their applications before December 19, 1969. Full information is given in Announcement No. WAM-911 which may be secured from Interagency Boards of Examiners and from many post offices as well as any office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Applications should be submitted on the tearout application form on the announcement or CSC Form 50000AB and forwarded to the Interagency Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners for Washington, D.C. 1900 E St., N.W., Washington, D.C. 20415. Information concerning the patrol inspector position and this announcement may be obtained from the U. S. Immigration and Naturalization Service, P. O. Box 2539, San Antonio, Texas 78206, or by calling 512-225-5511, Extension 214.

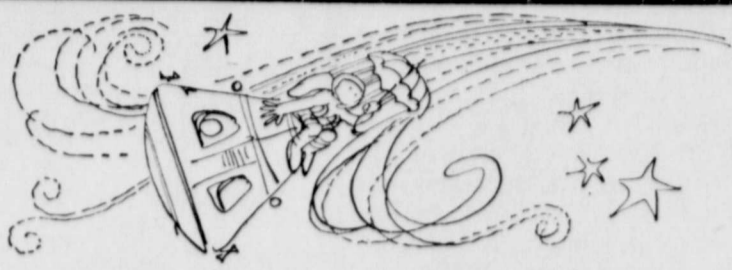

TAP Agri-Tour Mobile Unit To Visit Sterling City in June

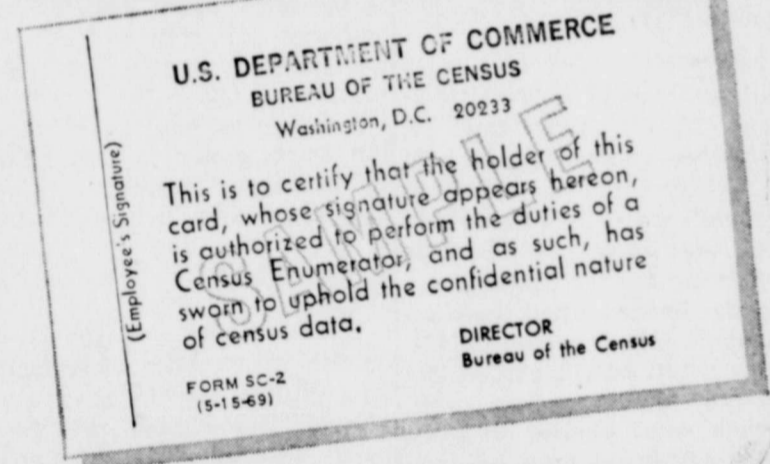

TEXAS OIL PRODUCTION

Texas, the nation's leading oil producer, has yielded more than 21 billion barrels of oil during the past 79 years of recorded production, according to the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

This has meant a statewide distribution of income which currently averages about \$3.4 billion a year. With 207 of the state's 254 counties producing crude oil, each section of the state is marked by several prolific fields. Texas' daily oil production is more than 1.1 million barrels.

"More investment is needed to find new oil fields to replace those now being depleted," says Corbin J. Robertson, Association president. "By the end of this century the demand for oil and gas will have doubled. Between now and 1980, some \$200 billion will have to be spent to find enough energy to continue our present standard of living and guarantee national security. Clearly, the country needs policies which will stimulate the drilling of more wells. Our reserves are shrinking."

Sterling County, which has had recorded production since 1947, has had a total crude oil output of 20,419,986 barrels up to the beginning of last year. Sterling County production in 1968 was 2,715,453 barrels at the rate of 7,419 barrels a day. At the end of 1969 more than 25 millions barrels of oil had been produced here.

Texas has 36 counties scattered over the state which produced at the rate of 25,000 barrels or more per day. The three largest are: Andrews, 203,520 barrels per day; Ector, 172,654 barrels per day; and Crane, 128,839 barrels per day.

Gregg County is the only county that has produced more than two billion barrels of oil. Andrews, Ector and Rusk counties have produced more than one billion barrels of oil.

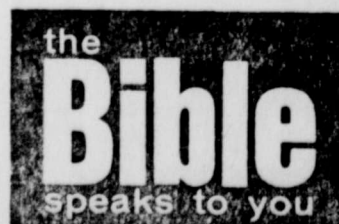
