## Marion Hays to Sidney, Montana

Marion Hays, local Church of Christ minister, has resigned his ministry here and is moving to Sidney, Montana. He will be minister to the church there; where he has helped in meetings twice in past years.

The furniture truck left on Wednesday of this week and he and Mrs. Hays are on the way there.

Bro. Hays has been here almost fourteen years. It would be fourteen years in September. While he was minister in Sterling there were 150 responses; he had held or assisted with 75 funeral services; and he took part in community and civic work of the city and county.

The church building fund, which was started five years ago, has reached more than \$26,000.

Sidney, Montana, is a town of 6,000 and the population of the county is 10,000. The principal or biggest business in the town is the Holly Beet Sugar factor. The town is only about 100 miles from the Canadian border, which is the province of Saskatchewan.

Bro. Hays was the senior minister of Sterling, having been here fourteen years, and he and Mrs. Hays leave a large number of friends and well-wishers for them in their new home.

## HOSPITAL BID NOT ACCEPTED BY STATE BOARD OF HEALTH

The low bid of \$364,400.00 of the J.W. Cooper Construction Co., Odessa, was not acceptable to the State Board of Health, said County Judge Jake Martin this week. The Sterling County Commissioners Court had accepted that bid a week ago when bidders had bid on the job of the new nursing home and hospital additions here. Although the Cooper bid was low, the company had bid lower and then said they made a mistake in submitting the bid. When \$20,000 was added to the bid, it was still low, and the court accepted it, hoping to get the approval of state bodies.

The next bid up presumably will be accepted and the commissioners are trying to get Hill-Burton to match an extra amount needed to furnish the rooms and the kitchen, said Martin.

At this time no reply has been forthcoming, it was said.

Amy and Becky Hodges showed twenty-four fleeces of wool in the Texas Purebred Sheep Breeders Wool Show held at Brownwood last Friday. The two won a number of ribbons in the show and are to be commended on their showing there.

Becky exhibited the reserve champion fleece of the Range Wool Show with a second place aged ram fleece. Amy won the coveted blue ribbon in the group of five fleeces from one exhibitor with Becky just behind her in second place in the class. Amy was second high premier exhibitor based on money won in the show while Becky was third.

In the various classes, placings went like this: Rambouillet yearling ewe, third-Becky; fourth-Amy; Rambouillet aged ewe, first and third-Becky; second-Amy; Rambouillet yearling ram, fourth-Becky; Rambouillet aged ram-first and second-Amy, third and fourth-Becky; aged range ram, second and fourth-Becky, third-Amy; and yearling range ram, third-Amy. Wool show judge Fred Campbell of Sonora commented that the fleeces entered in the show were all high quality fleeces and competition was keen.

Amy also sold one Rambouillet stud ram in the sale Saturday afternoon for \$130. She also sold two Hampshire rams for \$65 and one for \$85.

The National Meat-Type Lamb Show will be held in

San Angelo on July 10 at the San Angelo Show grounds with the live show on that date. Carcasses will be evaluated on July 11 and 12 at the Armour Company plant. The show is sponsored by the Lamb Committee of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association to promote meat-type lambs.

An entry consists of three lambs with an entry fee of three dollars per group. The following live and carcass classes have been established: FINEWOOL-Rambouillet, Delaine, and Debouillet purebred or grade; MEDIUM wools, Hampshires, Dorsets, Suffolks, Columbias, Corriedale, Montadale, Romedale, Southdown, and Shropshire; FINEWOOL Crossbred-A first cross or finewool ewes with a medium wool ram; and OTHER BREEDS and crosses-lambs not falling into any of the other categories.

Lambs must have been shorn between May 1 and June 1. The first one hundred entries will be accepted. Lambs will be purchased on a chilled, dressed weight basis for choice lambs in San Angelo the day of the kill.

More information is available on the information sheets being distributed by the sponsoring association. There is also information in the Association's magazine this month. One copy is available in the county agent's office for information.

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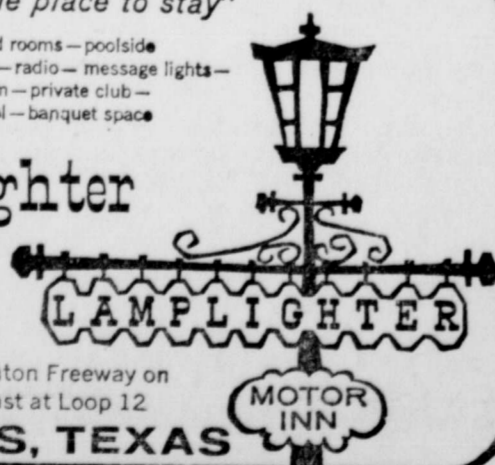

**U.S. Border Patrol Seeks Applicants**

The U.S. Border Patrol of the Immigration and Naturalization Service has an urgent need for physically fit young men desiring a career in Federal law enforcement work. This is a career opportunity for those who like action and outdoor work.

The Border Patrol is the mobile, uniformed enforcement branch of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Its principle purpose is to prevent the smuggling and illegal entry of aliens into the United States. The border patrolmen, called Immigration Patrol Inspectors, work along international boundaries, although their duties are not necessarily confined to these areas. They work in jeeps, cars, on foot, in boats and even in airplanes. Officers investigate violations of the immigration laws and frequently make arrests. They are often required to work irregular hours, under all weather conditions. These duties demand mental alertness as well as exceptional physical vigor and stamina.

The entrance salary of an Immigration Patrol Inspector is \$7,639 a year (Grade GS-7). There are promotional opportunities up to executive levels in the Immigration and Naturalization Service. On-the-job training offers splendid opportunities for promotion to positions of greater responsibility.

No experience is required for these positions. To qualify, applicants must pass a written test of verbal abilities, judgment, and aptitude for learning a foreign language. Candidates who pass the written test are called for oral interviews in the order of their standing on the list. The oral interview is designed to determine if the candidate has the personal qualities needed for the work. Applicants must also pass a rigid physical examination. Candidates who are selected for appointment are assigned to the Border Patrol Academy for a period of intensive training in such subjects as immigration laws, Spanish, physical training and marksmanship. Trainees receive full pay while in the academy.

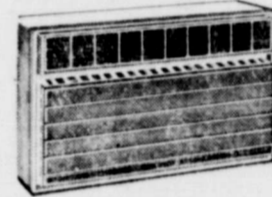
Applications are now being accepted for the civil service examination for Immigration Patrol Inspector which will be held on Saturday, January 24, 1970. An additional examination is scheduled for April, 1970. However, those wishing to be tested in January must submit their applications before December 19, 1969. Full information is given in Announcement No. WAM-911 which may be secured from Interagency Boards of Examiners and from many post offices as well as any office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Applications should be submitted on the tearout application form on the announcement or CSC Form 50000AB and forwarded to the Interagency Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners for Washington, D.C. 1900 E St., N.W., Washington, D.C. 0415.

### LEGAL NOTICE

MAY 11, 1970. The City of Sterling City adopted the following:

#### ORDINANCE

#### AIR GUNS, FIREARMS

Definitions  
Concealed Weapons  
Discharge of Firearms Prohibited  
Exceptions; Permits  
DEFINITIONS: Wherever the term "firearms" is used in this Chapter, the term shall mean any instrument used in the propulsion of shot, shell or bullets or other harmful objects by the action of gunpowder exploded within it, or by the action of compressed air within it, or by the power of springs and including what are commonly known as air rifles and B-B guns.

#### CONCEALED WEAPONS:

It shall be unlawful for any person to carry concealed upon his person any brass knuckles, revolver pistol, dagger, stiletto or other deadly weapon.

#### DISCHARGE OF FIREARMS PROHIBITED:

It shall be unlawful for any person to discharge firearms of any kind or description within the limits of the Municipality; provided however, that this shall not apply to police officers in the discharge of their duties.

#### EXCEPTIONS; PERMITS:

The Governing Body may at any time upon receipt of proper application, grant permits to shooting galleries, gun clubs and others for shooting in fixed locations and under specified rules. Such permits shall be in writing attested by the Clerk conforming to such requirements as the Governing Body shall demand, and the permit thus issued shall be subject to revocation at any time by action of the Governing Body.

### QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS ABOUT RANGE FORAGE PRODUCTION

By Herb Senne, Range Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service

Why rest a pasture following brush control? This is a question often asked. The answer is not a hard one, but it hard to explain. Resting a pasture at any time, and particularly following brush control increases the amount of leaves and stems each grass plant grows. This means an increase in the amount of pounds of grass that each acre of rangeland produces. An increase in pounds of grass means an increase in net return per acre because livestock performance also increases.

Why does a three or four month rest period increase the amount of leaves and stems a grass plant grows? Another good question. A plant makes its food in its leaves. It gets only nutrients and water from the soil, not plant food. The leaves make plant food by combining these nutrients and water with sunshine and carbon dioxide. So, the more leaves left ungrazed on a plant through its growing period, the more food it makes. The more food it makes the more healthy and vigorous it becomes. A vigorous plant can withstand more grazing and still produce more pounds per acre than an unhealthy plant.

Is it better to lightly stock a pasture following control, or is it better to take all the livestock out of it? Still another good question. Livestock are a lot like children. When given the opportunity, they will eat first what they like the best. What they like the best is the most tasty plants, or those highest in sugar content. These are the more productive plants. In most cases they are the ones which grow the tallest and have the widest leaf.

When brush is controlled the more productive grasses (those usually found under the protection of the brush canopy) have access to sunlight. When these plants gain access to sunlight, they become higher in sugar content, and are then grazed in preference to the other narrow leaf, shortgrowing plants.

If a few livestock are left in a pasture all the time, particularly following brush control, they graze those plants which need to be left alone to gain vigor and increase in numbers. These are the plants capable of producing the most pounds of grass per acre, when managed properly. So, leaving just a few livestock in a pasture, really defeats the purpose of deferment. All it does is save some forage for later use, rather than improve the present composition of the plant community.

Sometime in June will be the time to begin aerial spraying mesquite. Conditions so far look real favorable. 2,4,5-T, the chemical used in aerial spraying, will be available in sufficient amounts. Several aerial applicators will be available and ready to spray brush this year. So, while planning on what to aerial spray next, also make plans on how to rest the sprayed area, to get the most for your money.

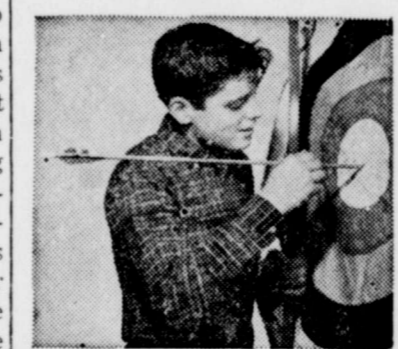

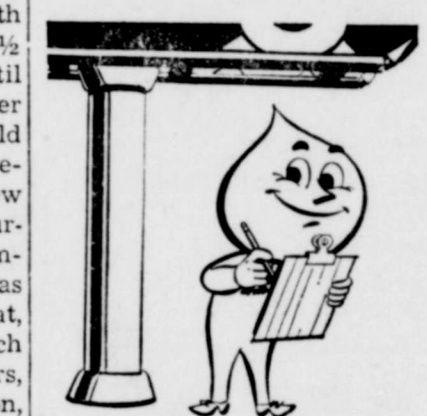
