### NORMAN DURHAM DUE HONORS

Dr. Norman N. Durham of Stillwater, Okla., microbiologist and dean of the Graduate College at Oklahoma State University was to be honored as a "Distinguished Alumni" at North Texas State University, Denton, on May 8.

Dr. Durham, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Durham of Eastland, is a native of Ranger, Texas. He is a graduate of NTSU with the bachelor of science degree in 1949 and the master of science in 1951.

He was awarded a doctor of philosophy degree in bacteriology and biochemistry from the University of Texas at Austin in 1954 and that same year joined the microbiology faculty at Oklahoma State.

He is author of over 65 scientific articles and is currently researching protein and enzyme synthesis; mechanism of antibiotic action; metabolic regulations, cell growth and reproduction; and genetic transformations.

Two larvae samples have been sent to the Mission laboratory of the screwworm eradication program by Sterling County producers so far this year. Both were identified as non-screwworm samples by the laboratory.

The first sample sent in came from the Lester Foster ranch eleven miles east on highway 87. It was taken from cattle by J.Q. Foster.

A sample taken from sheep by Jimmy Cole on the Bill Cole place west of town was also negative.

Thus far, there has been only one positive case of screwworms in the state. The lab has a total of 678 samples submitted thus far.


A check of bands placed on the pecan trees in John Brock's orchard for movement of the pecan casebearer early this week revealed that the worms were just beginning to move out of the terminals where they had overwintered. They overwinter as a partially grown larvae in a tiny cocoon at the base of buds in the shoot. When the new leaves are put forth, these larvae tunnel into the developing shoot, feed there, and mature there. As they reach maturity, the larvae, or worms, migrate back to the rough bark on the limbs where they pupate.

A very few of these worms were found in the bands when checked early this week. The

bands will be checked later this week and the pupae removed and placed in the cage where they will be observed. As the moths emerge from this stage, they will be watched when 5 to 10 per cent of them have emerged as moths, it will be possible to time the spray application.

According to the weekly reports from south of this area, the development has been quite rapid once the pupae were found in the bands. Moth emergence has been fairly rapid due in part to warm weather there which was favorable to the development. From reports from around San Angelo, the time to spray there has been scheduled for this weekend and early next week. Weather conditions slowed development here and it will probably be a week or ten days later here than in the San Angelo area.

Those who are planning to spray might want to get their materials and be ready when the time comes. Recommendations call for the use of three pounds of wettable malathion, two pounds of 80% wettable Sevin, and four to six pounds of zinc sulfate per hundred gallons of water. For smaller amounts of spray use three gallons of water and add three tablespoons malathion, 1 1/2 tablespoons Sevin, and 8 to 12 tablespoons zinc sulfate.

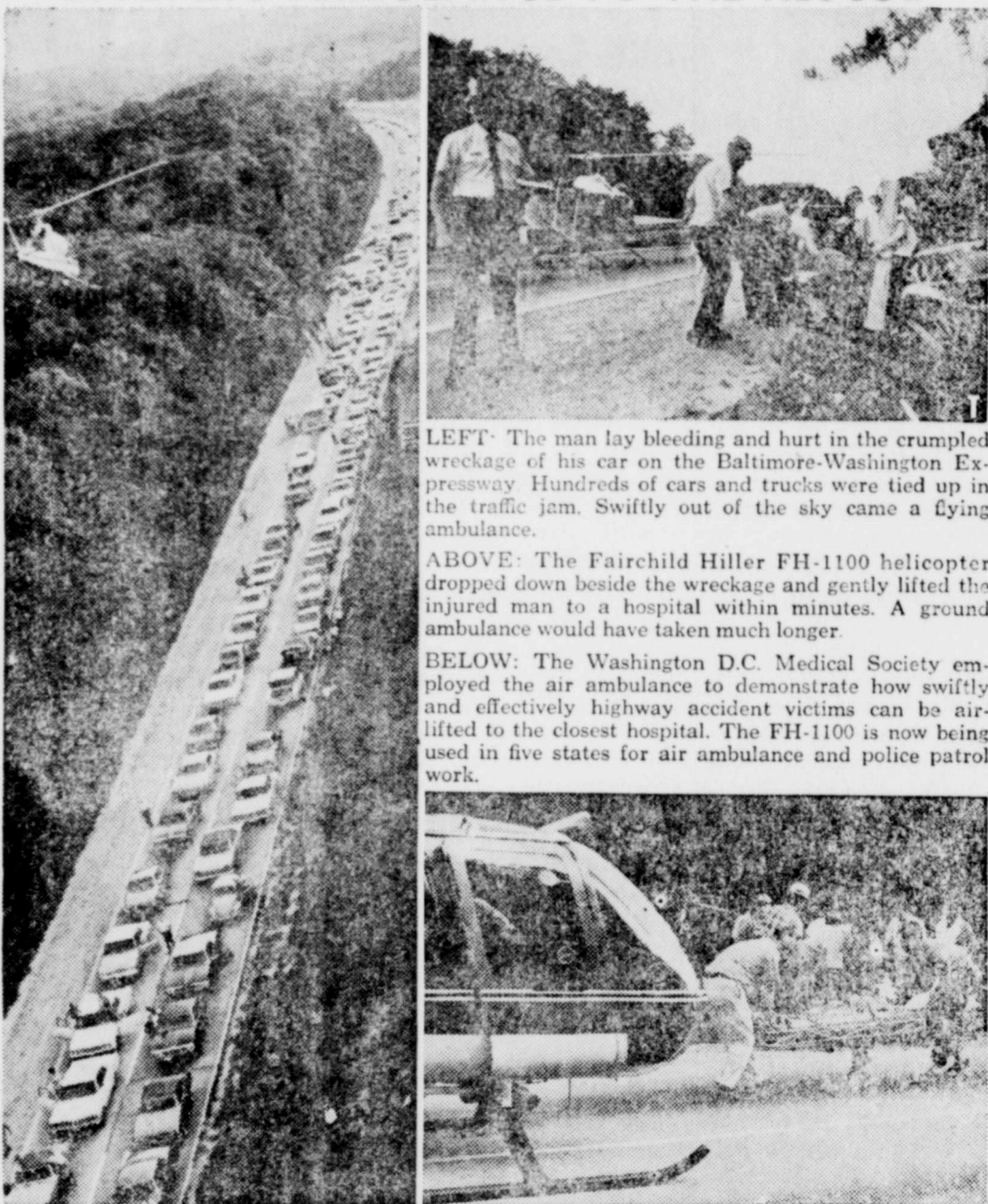

LEFT: The man lay bleeding and hurt in the crumpled wreckage of his car on the Baltimore-Washington Expressway. Hundreds of cars and trucks were tied up in the traffic jam. Swiftly out of the sky came a flying ambulance.

MAY 11, 1970, The City of Sterling City adopted the following:

**ORDINANCE**  
**AIR GUNS, FIREARMS**  
Definitions  
Concealed Weapons  
Discharge of Firearms Prohibited  
Exceptions; Permits

**DEFINITIONS:** Wherever the term "firearms" is used in this Chapter, the term shall mean any instrument used in the propulsion of shot, shell or bullets or other harmful objects by the action of gunpowder exploded within it, or by the action of compressed air within it, or by the power of springs and including what are commonly known as air rifles and B-B guns.

**CONCEALED WEAPONS:** It shall be unlawful for any person to carry concealed upon his person any brass knuckles, revolver pistol, dagger, stiletto or other deadly weapon.

**DISCHARGE OF FIREARMS PROHIBITED:** It shall be unlawful for any person to discharge firearms of any kind or discription within the limits of the Municipalty; provided however, that this shall not apply to police officers in the discharge of their duties.

**EXCEPTIONS; PERMITS:** The Governing Body may at any time upon receipt of proper application, grant permits to shooting galleries, gun clubs and others for shooting in fixed locations and under specified rules. Such permits shall be in writing attested by the Clerk conforming to such requirements as the Governing Body shall demand, and the permit thus issued shall be subject to revocation at any time by action of the Governing Body.

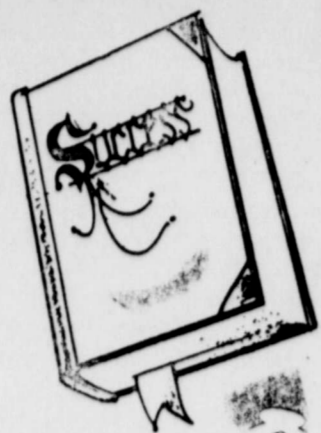

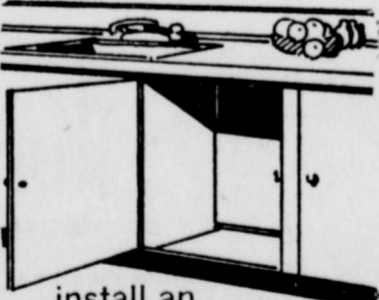

**QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS ABOUT RANGE FORAGE PRODUCTION**

By Herb Senne, Range Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service

Why rest a pasture following brush control? This is a question often asked. The answer is not a hard one, but it hard to explain. Resting a pasture at any time, and particularly following brush control increases the amount of leaves and stems each grass plant grows. This means an increase in the amount of pounds of grass that each acre of rangeland produces. An increase in pounds of grass means an increase in net return per acre because livestock performance also increases.

Why does a three or four month rest period increase the amount of leaves and stems a grass plant grows? Another good question. A plant makes its food in its leaves. It gets only nutrients and water from the soil, not plant food. The leaves make plant food by combining these nutrients and water with sunshine and carbon dioxide. So, the more leaves left ungrazed on a plant through its growing period, the more food it makes. The more food it makes the more healthy and vigorous it becomes. A vigorous plant can withstand more grazing and still produce more pounds per acre than an unhealthy plant.

Is it better to lightly stock a pasture following control, or is it better to take all the livestock out of it? Still another good question. Livestock are a lot like children. When given the opportunity, they will eat first what they like the best. What they like the best is the most tasty plants, or those highest in sugar content. These are the more productive plants. In most cases they are the ones which grow the tallest and have the widest leaf.

When brush is controlled the more productive grasses (those usually found under the protection of the brush canopy) have access to sunlight. When these plants gain access to sunlight, they become higher in sugar content, and are then grazed in preference to the other narrow leaf, shortgrowing plants.

If a few livestock are left in a pasture all the time, particularly following brush control, they graze those plants which need to be left alone to gain vigor and increase in numbers. These are the plants capable of producing the most pounds of grass per acre, when managed properly. So, leaving just a few livestock in a pasture, really defeats the purpose of deferment. All it does is save some forage for later use, rather than improve the present composition of the plant community.

Sometime in June will be the time to begin aerial spraying mesquite. Conditions so far look real favorable. 2,4,5-T, the chemical used in aerial spraying, will be available in sufficient amounts. Several aerial applicators will be available and ready to spray brush this year. So, while planning on what to aerial spray next, also make plans on how to rest the sprayed area, to get the most for your money.

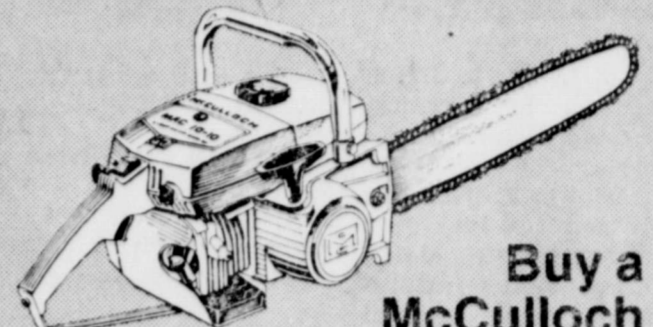

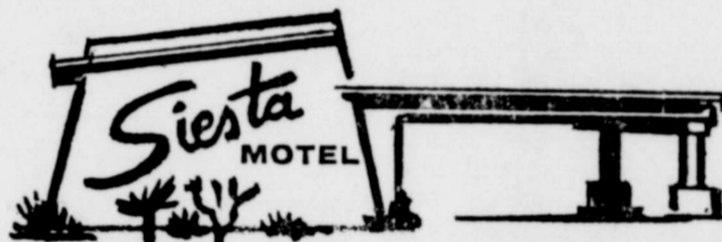

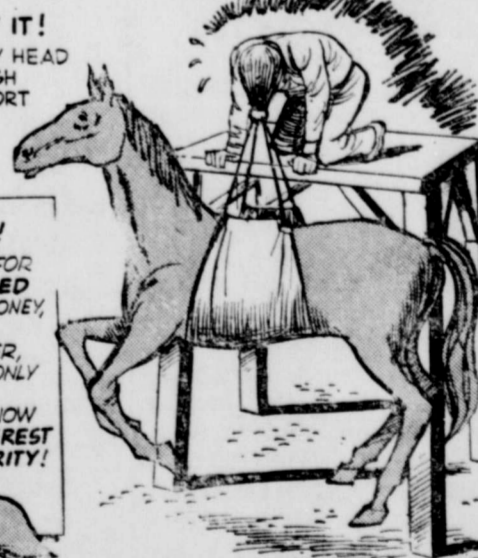
