Medicare Premiums Up on July 1

Premiums for the supplementary part of Medicare go up July 1, 1970. According to J. M. Talbot, social security manager, the new premium for most people will be \$5.30 monthly, an increase of \$1.30 over the current premium.

Mr. Talbot explained that the supplementary part of Medicare is the part which helps pay doctors bills. The program is financed by the premiums beneficiaries pay, matched dollar for dollar by the Federal Government.

Mr. Talbot said the premium increase is necessary because of rising medical costs. Each year, the financing is evaluated by the Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare.

The law requires that premiums be raised each year the cost of the program indicates a need. The last premium increase was in January, 1968, when premiums were raised to \$4 monthly.

Social Security beneficiaries receiving cash payments will have the additional premiums held out of their checks beginning with the check delivered about July 3, 1970. Those who pay premiums directly will be billed \$5.30 a month or \$15.90 per quarter. The relatively small group of people who now pay more than \$4.00 per month, because they were late enrolling will pay proportionately higher under the new schedule.

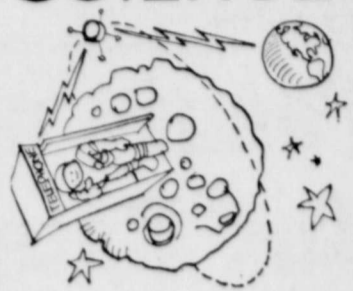

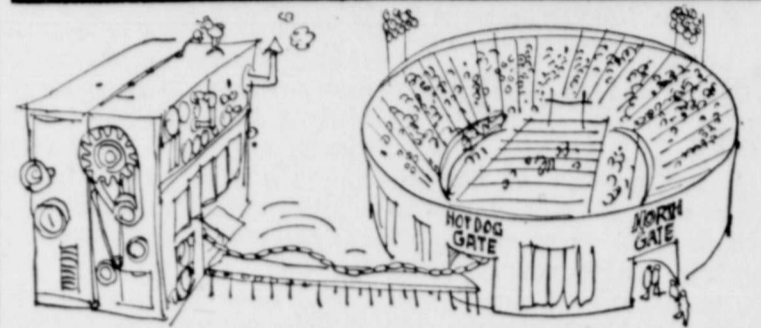

U.S. Border Patrol Seeks Applicants

The U.S. Border Patrol of the Immigration and Naturalization Service has an urgent need for physically fit young men desiring a career in Federal law enforcement work. This is a career opportunity for those who like action and outdoor work.

The Border Patrol is the mobile, uniformed enforcement branch of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Its principle purpose is to prevent the smuggling and illegal entry of aliens into the United States. The border patrolmen, called Immigration Patrol Inspectors, work along international boundaries, although their duties are not necessarily confined to these areas. They work in jeeps, cars, on foot, in boats and even in airplanes. Officers investigate violations of the immigration laws and frequently make arrests. They are often required to work irregular hours, under all weather conditions. These duties demand mental alertness as well as exceptional physical vigor and stamina.

The entrance salary of an Immigration Patrol Inspector is \$7,639 a year (Grade GS-7). There are promotional opportunities up to executive levels in the Immigration and Naturalization Service. On-the-job training offers splendid opportunities for promotion to positions of greater responsibility.

No experience is required for these positions. To qualify, applicants must pass a written test of verbal abilities, judgment, and aptitude for learning a foreign language. Candidates who pass the written test are called for oral interviews in the order of their standing on the list. The oral interview is designed to determine if the candidate has the personal qualities needed for the work. Applicants must also pass a rigid physical examination. Candidates who are selected for appointment are assigned to the Border Patrol Academy for a period of intensive training in such subjects as immigration laws, Spanish, physical training and marksmanship. Trainees receive full pay while in the academy.

Applications are now being accepted for the civil service examination for Immigration Patrol Inspector which will be held on Saturday, January 24, 1970. An additional examination is scheduled for April, 1970. However, those wishing to be tested in January must submit their applications before December 19, 1969. Full information is given in Announcement No. WAM-911 which may be secured from Interagency Boards of Examiners and from many post offices as well as any office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Applications should be submitted on the tearout application form on the announcement or CSC Form 50000AB and forwarded to the Interagency Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners for Washington, D.C. 1900 E St., N.W., Washington, D.C. 20415.

Social Security Tips

LOST MEDICARE CARD

Have you lost your Medicare card?

Your Medicare card should be in your possession at all times. J.M. Talbot, social security manager, said today. It is your proof to your doctor and to the hospital that Medicare will help pay your medical bills. The doctor or hospital can tell at what point you became entitled to Medicare benefits, and whether you are entitled to payment for both your hospital and your doctor bills—if you show him the Medicare card.

Perhaps the most important function of your Medicare card is that it furnishes your own claim number to the doctor and to the hospital. Any claims for payment on your behalf must contain this complete number in order for Medicare to assist with the payment of the bills.

If you do lose your card, call or visit your nearest social security office, and a free duplicate card will be obtained for you. However, it will take about three weeks to get this duplicate, so make your request as soon as you realize that you have lost your original. The hospital can, if necessary, admit you without your Medicare card; but, you can avoid considerable difficulty if you secure a new card before you become ill and need it.

The three-piece outfit, quick to make and fun to wear, includes a skirt worked from the waistband down in easy double, treble crochet stitches. The fringed bolero is worked from the waist up in one piece to the squared armholes. And the beret is made from a double strand of yarn.

The ensemble sets the style in fun for a gay assortment of crafts for the whole family. McCall's Annual of Creative Handcrafts also contains 24 pages of bewitching stitching and instructions for more than 38 different stitches.

AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

WASHINGTON, D. C. -- In writing about the Secret Service last week, it was indicated the subject this week would be counterfeit money. The Secret Service, which has the responsibility of coping with counterfeiting, has a big job.

Counterfeiting is one of the oldest games in history and is today on the rise. One reason is the fact that large quantities can be produced by improvements in photography in printing equipment. The Secret Service says that the counterfeiter, unlike earlier times need not be a master craftsman. Amateurs, working in legitimate print shops, have been able to produce passable currency.

Although our bills are produced from plates made by the finest engravers in the world, counterfeiters are able to fool the unsuspecting. The Treasury Department is now studying ways to make it even more difficult to copy our currency.

Counterfeiters usually stick to producing bills of 10.00 and 20.00 denominations although \$1 to \$50 bills have been in circulation.

The producer of bogus bills usually sells them to a dealer for 10c or 15c on the dollar. The dealer then sells them to a distributor for another reduction and finally to the passer who pays from 25c to 35c on the dollar, depending on the quality. These people are expert and the appearance of genuineness reduces the risk of being caught. The risk is great and counterfeiters are finally apprehended but not before a lot of people have been their victims. It is a very difficult task but the Secret Service is doggedly expert in its work.

The passer or "shover," as they are referred to, practices detection. Large stores are usually passed up mainly because currency goes to a cashier and there is a waiting period to receive change. If the cashier is suspicious, the police may have been called in the meantime. The passer is constantly on the move.

People are cheated before the Secret Service learns of the spurious money. By careful observation, most anyone can tell good money from bad. A belief has been common that rubbing a bill on white paper, is a test of its genuineness. This is not the case since ink on both good and bad will rub off.

A few pointers are helpful in identifying counterfeit bills. It is important to examine the portrait. The portrait is most intricate and an example of the fine art of engraving. Counterfeiters have never been able to exactly duplicate the picture. The fine screen of regular lines forming the background in genuine currency usually become broken and ragged on counterfeit. This is particularly true of the eyes. On the genuine currency they stand out, almost sparkling. They are clear and on a clean background. The counterfeit blends into a sort of a smudgy background and will likely be too light or too dark.

trait distinguishes the bill's denomination. Some counterfeiters raise the denomination by scraping off the number on small bills and replacing a higher one. The denomination and the portrait always go together from the portrait of George Washington on the \$1 to that of Chase on the \$10,000 bill. This leaves nine in between and presents a pretty good game to be able to name the denomination which goes with the picture.

The seal on the bill is taleatale if examined carefully. On good currency the saw-tooth points around the circle are identical and sharp at the tips. Fake notes are likely to be irregular and broken.

Color is important. Federal Reserve notes have green seal and serial number while United States notes have a red seal. Should colors of the seal and serial number differ, it is an imitation. Unevenly spaced serial numbers should be a warning.

Counterfeiters have a difficult time in imitating the blue silk threads imbedded below the surface in genuine bills. More often the threads in counterfeit are more coarse and the color not true. Some manage to imitate these threads with pen and ink lines but they are detectable on close examination.

The thickness of currency is often a sign of good or bad money.

To be profitable, large batches of bogus money must be produced. Swindlers smuggling counterfeit out of the United States to people in foreign countries run a double risk but is has been done. Right now Ireland is experiencing a wave of fake U.S. bills. Since American money is acceptable most any place around the world, foreigners are likely to be easier prey but Americans, somewhere, are swindled about every day.

TGRA Talk Good Roads

Austin--Discussions centering on environmental problems relating to highway construction highlighted the Annual Convention of the Texas Good Roads Association here (June 22-23).

State Highway Engineer J. C. Dingwall promised delegates that the Highway Department was doing everything possible to meet today's environmental demands, and that within a few months the Department would add an archeologist, a sociologist, an ecologist, and a noise expert.

"Times have changed," James D. Pitcock of Houston, TGRA's public relations committee head, pointed out, "and the highway planning, location and design must be made responsive to the social and environmental, as well as to the economic, values of a community."

Federal Judge Hal Woodward, former chairman of the Texas Highway Commission, urged that women be recruited to help solve today's problems. "If you want your story told, tell it to a woman," he said, pointing out that women rather than men, were more involved with automobiles, safety and traffic problems.

Resolutions adopted by the TGRA, whose mission is to promote the construction and maintenance of an adequate highway system to meet the transportation needs of the people of the State, included: (1) Endorsement of a Constitutional amendment, to be voted on in November, that would lower to a simple majority rather than a two-thirds approval, in road bond elections; 2 continuation of the present Federal Highway Trust Fund system so that Texas can complete the Interstate system on schedule. (Unless Congress acts, the trust fund will run out in 1972, and the Interstate system in Texas will not be completed before 1975).

TAX MAN SAM SEZ:

This week is our Nation's birthday. If you are pessimistic, and look at the fraction of one percent of Americans who act like idiots on the college campuses instead of pursuing their education, or those who try to reason with us with riots over every imaginable cause, you will probably conclude that our country has had it. If, on the other hand, you remember our government's Astronauts' accuracy, if you remember the wide margin we have in education over every other nation (in spite of the present campus ruckus) and if you remember our fabulous economic power, you will recognize that in spite of thousands of defects, we have national, state and local governments that have unequalled capability. Social Security DISABLED WORKER NEWS

In most instances, disability claims take a longer period to process than other social security claims. The extra processing time is due to additional documentation, such as medical reports and different procedures in the claims process.

By applying as early as possible, the complete processing of the claim can be finished before the six months waiting period has expired. If the claim for benefits is approved, you get a check at the earliest possible time.

File Early For Disability What do you do if you get so sick or injured you can't work? One of the things you should do is see if you are eligible for disability payments under the social security law. Although there are no benefits payable during the first 6 months of a disability, J.M. Talbot, social security manager, urges everyone who believes he may be entitled to monthly benefits to apply for them as soon as possible after becoming disabled.

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
