General Election Is Next Tuesday

No Local Contests Listed on Ballot

Next Tuesday, November 3 is general election day in the entire state. Offices from that of U.S. Senator down to the local precinct offices are listed.

On the ballot are only two parties candidates, that of the Democrat and Republican parties. There is a write in column for anyone wanting to write in a favorite, over the candidates listed. Such is legal in general elections.

Lloyd Bentsen, Democratic senatorial candidate, faces Republican George Bush for U.S. Senator. Also, the incumbent Demo governor, Preston Smith, faces Republican Paul Eggers. The Republicans have as usual, put up a slate of candidates on down through the Commissioner of Agriculture.

Locally, the names of the Democratic candidates are on the ballot—as J.K. Martin for county judge; W.W. Durham for county and district clerk; Mrs. Sallie Wallace for county treasurer, Clinton Hodges and Danny Stewart for county commissioners, and E.R. Edwards for justice of the peace. The polling places will be the county library in the courthouse, Bill Blair's, William Foster's and Bill Cole's ranch homes.

There are seven proposed amendments to the state constitution. No. 1 relates to the removal, retirement or censure of judges under prescribed circumstances.

No. 2 repeals the prohibition of open saloons in Texas.

No. 3 provides for an amendment to authorize the legislature to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment or ranch farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and or to produce farm and forest crops.

No. 4 reconstitutes the state building commission as a three-member appointive commission.

No. 5 authorizes any county on the vote of a majority of its qualified property tax-paying electors, to issue road bonds in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county.

No. 6 would increase the value of the homestead which is exempt from forced sale.

No. 7 would provide for the consolidating governmental offices and functions and for allowing political subdivisions to contract for performance of governmental functions in any county.

Sterling City FFA members exhibited 20 lambs in the junior lamb show at the State Fair of Texas last week. Allen Price, Payton Wilson, Steven Foster, Darow Atkins, Lee Igo, Jim Terry, Brandt Badger, Bobby Bynum, Janis Igo and Carl Igo had lambs entered in the show.

Five finewool lambs entered placed 24, 27, 31, 53 and 57 in a class consisting of approximately 80 lambs.

Payton Wilson had a fourth place Columbia cross lamb. The local exhibitors had eight Suffolk cross lambs in a class of approximately 30 lambs—Payton Wilson had a 7th and 12th in that class; Janis Igo had 20th place and Darow Atkins 21st. Steven Foster had 23rd and 29th, Darow Atkins 30th, and Allen Price 31st.

Janis Igo had a 2nd place Hampshire crossbred lamb and Carl Igo exhibited 21st place Hamp cross.

We have assumed the obligations as your County and District Clerk for many years, the records are accurate as the law requires and you as taxpayers have a right to expect of this office.

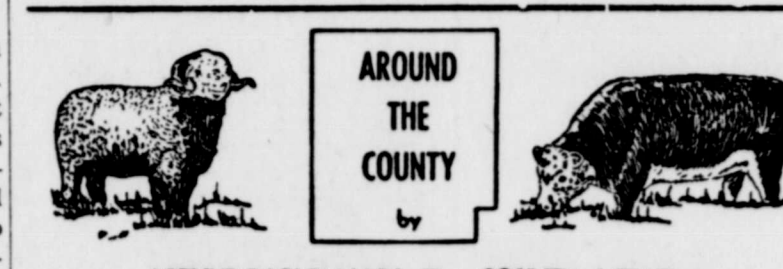
In fairness to you, those we serve, and in order to satisfy our own pride by doing a good job, we must handle the office courteously, accurately and honestly.

Bill, Wayland and Gary Foster attended the Artificial Insemination and Pregnancy Determination Short Course held in San Angelo this week. The course was jointly sponsored by the American Breeders Service and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. While the three were interested mainly in the pregnancy determination phase of the course, the sponsors felt it was necessary for those participating in this part of the course to take the artificial insemination phase for better background. They will now be able to help their fathers in testing the cows on the family ranches.

The frosts of this week have killed most season plants including the sorghum-types such as johnsongrass, blue panic, sorghum alum and similar ones. These plants are particularly vulnerable to frost and often cause prussic acid poisoning in livestock following frost.

All livestock should be removed from these fields or areas immediately following the frost—before is happens if possible—to prevent losses. After the forage dries thoroughly, it can be cut for hay or grazed with no danger.

One screwworm case was firmed in Texas last week

bringing the year's total to 85. The case was sent in from Dimmit County on the Rio Grande River. It was the first case for the county this year.

With the cooler weather, screwworm cases should continue to decline in the coming months. However, warm periods of weather sandwiched in between the colder days can increase fly activity and result in cases in the future. Livestock producers are urged to keep up their vigilance, report all suspected cases, and treat all wounds.

Next Tuesday, November 3, is General Election Day in Texas. Texas voters will face a heavier than usual responsibility on that day. In addition to casting ballots for the candidates of their choice, they will be voting for or against seven proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution.

Some of these have the potential for far-reaching effects. Every qualified person should exercise his basic responsibility to vote. We are reminded that the penalty that good people who refuse to take action in the selection of their elected officials often have to pay is living under the regime of bad men.

Social Security

Are you a social security beneficiary receiving his monthly check a few days late? According to J.M. Talbot, social security manager, it may be because you did not report a change of address.

When a beneficiary changes his address, he should notify the social security office in writing or in person. Reports should include the name of the person or persons moving, the social security claim number, and the old and new address.

Mr. Talbot said that notifying the Post Office alone is not sufficient. Even if the Post Office has a current address a delay still occurs because the check must be forwarded from one address to another.

Temporary financial hardship often results when checks are a few days late, particularly when social security benefits are the only source of income for a worker or his family. Beneficiaries can insure timely benefit payments only by keeping their address current.

Changes of address which have not already been reported to the Social Security Administration should be reported without further delay. Beneficiaries may report changes of address to the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris Ave. (P.O. Box 3808) in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area.

DISABLED WIDOWS BENEFITS

"Two years have passed and many persons are still not aware of the change in the social security law which provides monthly benefits for disabled widows at age 50," said J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

Since the law became effective in February, 1968, more than 32,000 disabled widows have qualified for monthly payments, Mr. Talbot estimated however that another 30,000 widows who might qualify for these benefits have never applied.

"The requirements for disabled widows' benefits are apparently not as well known as those for the more familiar widows' benefits at age 62, or reduced widows' benefits at age 60," Mr. Talbot continued.

To qualify for benefits a widow, age 50 to 60, must have an impairment so severe that it keeps her from engaging in any work. The condition must also be expected to last for at least twelve months.

The widow's disability must have begun before her husband's death or not later than seven years after his death. A widow who has previously been entitled to benefits if she becomes disabled before payments to the children end or within seven years after they end.

CHILDRENS' CAMP**

By mutual association with other handicapped children and by skillful and gentle counseling, these youngsters have found the freedom to grow, mentally and spiritually, into useful citizens of tomorrow.

For Social Security

CHECK YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY RECORD

"How do I know my work under social security is being credited to my record, and how do I find out about it? This is one of the questions most frequently asked," says J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

In explaining the process involved in reporting social security, Mr. Talbot said, "When you work for wages, your employer deducts social security tax from your paycheck each pay day. At the end of each calendar quarter, he submits your name and number with payment for these taxes to Internal Revenue. Internal Revenue forwards copies to social security's main office in Baltimore, Maryland. Your wages are then posted to your record. The same process is followed for a self-employed person except that his earnings are recorded yearly."

Mr. Talbot states that the possibility of an error being made in the process does exist. He recommends that you request a statement of your earnings at least every three years.

All you have to do to secure the statement is to send a post card request available at your social security office to Baltimore, Maryland. If the reply you receive is incorrect in any way, contact the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris Avenue (P. O. Box 3808) in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area.

Social Security News

"If I apply for disability benefits, do I have to be examined by a social security doctor before I can get any checks?" This is a question frequently asked when disabled workers claim social security disability insurance benefits.

J. M. Talbot, social security manager, says the social security law requires the applicant to supply the medical records on his condition. When you apply for benefits, you must provide a report from your attending doctor or hospital.

Information from the attending doctor and the hospital is generally all that is needed. However, in some instances, a specialist's report may be necessary to clarify a question or resolve a borderline situation. You may then be asked to go for a special examination to help provide the extra information.

If such a special examination is required, Mr. Talbot added, the Social Security Administration will pay for it. He stressed, however, that this is done only to supplement or clarify the initial information you have already provided.

When you apply for disability benefits, be ready to give the names and addresses of all your sources of medical treatment for your disabling condition. Contact the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris Avenue (P. O. Box 3808) in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area.

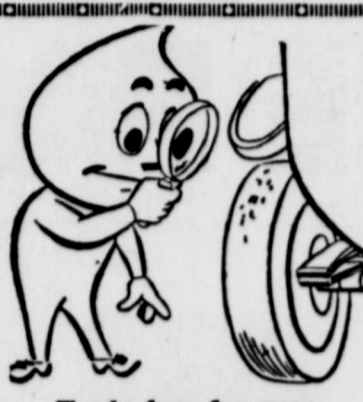

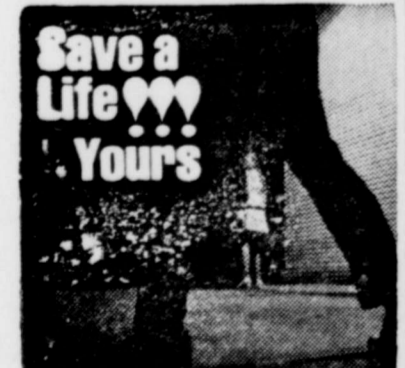
