Friday, the thirteenth! The traditional day of bad luck. What has your day been like thus far?

In the past, days like this have really been of concern to people. Actually, many believed in these 'symbols' but today more and more of them are being forgotten. People still talk about them but fewer actually believe in them.

Some 40,000 Texas ranchers and farmers, including a representative number from Sterling County, will be involved in the 1970 state livestock survey.

During the last half of November survey questionnaires will be mailed to selected livestock producers by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Each questionnaire should be filled out and returned as soon as possible. A return envelope is enclosed for this.

These reports will be used by the state statistician in making accurate estimates of the cattle, hogs, and chickens on farms and ranches in Texas. There are many uses for this information. The more of the questionnaires returned, the more accurate will be the estimates; therefore it is important that each producer in Sterling County who receives a questionnaire complete and return it.

Prices for cottonseed meal and soybean meal at Ft. Worth have shown advances over the recent years. This, coming at a time when our area is faced with a prolonged period of feeding, adds little cheer to the livestock business.

Cottonseed meal prices have shown added strength between April and September, according to John Seibert, grain marketing specialist with the Agricultural Extension Service. The low price thus far in 1970 for wholesale price, bulk, Ft. Worth, was \$70 a ton in April. The high was in February and September with an average price of \$98 a ton. Average wholesale price as of September was \$85.60 per ton.

Cottonseed meal supplies for 1970-1971 are expected to total 2.1 million tons, five per cent above the 1969-1970 total. Domestic use is projected at 2.0 million tons for 1970-1971, up slightly from the previous year. This estimate is based on continued strong demand.

Soybean meal production forecast for the year beginning October 1, 1970 is around 18.3 million tons, up from the 17.7 million tons of the previous year. Domestic use is expected to total 14 million tons. Exports may total slightly over 4 million tons.

The 1970 prices for soybean meal are higher than in the previous two years. Prices for 1970 were at a high in January, \$102, and low in March, \$78 per ton. Average wholesale price in September was \$90.40 per ton.

**Social Security**

Are you a social security beneficiary receiving his monthly check a few days late? According to J.M. Talbot, social security manager, it may be because you did not report a change of address.

When a beneficiary changes his address, he should notify the social security office in writing or in person. Reports should include the name of the person or persons moving, the social security claim number, and the old and new address.

Mr. Talbot said that notifying the Post Office alone is not sufficient. Even if the Post Office has a current address a delay still occurs because the check must be forwarded from one address to another.

Temporary financial hardship often results when checks are a few days late, particularly when social security benefits are the only source of income for a worker or his family. Beneficiaries can insure timely benefit payments only by keeping their address current.

Changes of address which have not already been reported to the Social Security Administration should be reported without further delay. Beneficiaries may report changes of address to the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris Ave. (P.O. Box 3808) in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area.

**DISABLED WIDOWS BENEFITS**

"Two years have passed and many persons are still not aware of the change in the social security law which provides monthly benefits for disabled widows at age 50," said J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

Since the law became effective in February, 1968, more than 32,000 disabled widows have qualified for monthly payments. Mr. Talbot estimated however that another 30,000 widows who might qualify for these benefits have never applied.

"The requirements for disabled widows' benefits are apparently not as well known as those for the more familiar widows' benefits at age 62, or reduced widows' benefits at age 60," Mr. Talbot continued.

To qualify for benefits a widow, age 50 to 60, must have an impairment so severe that it keeps her from engaging in any work. The condition must also be expected to last for at least twelve months.

The widow's disability must have begun before her husband's death or not later than seven years after his death. A widow who has previously been entitled to benefits if she becomes disabled before payments to the children end or within seven years after they end.

**FEDERAL CAREER OPPORTUNITIES**

The U.S. Civil Service Commission has issued three nationwide announcements of mid-level Federal career opportunities in professional fields, and a fourth outlining opportunities for Stenographers and Typists in Washington, D. C. and vicinity.

Interested applicants can get the announcements from Federal Job Information Centers in many large cities, from many post offices, except in cities where Federal Job Information Centers are located or from the Interagency Board of U.S. Civil Service Examiners, 1900 E St. N.W., Washington, D.C. 20415.

The announcements are:

1. Professional Opportunities for Social Scientists. GS grades 9 through 12. Covered are such positions as Economist, Social Science Analyst, Social Science Program Specialist, Sociologist, Historian, Anthropologist, Manpower Analyst, Social Work Program Specialist, and additional closely related positions in other social science fields. Many of the opportunities are in various Federal agencies in Washington, D. C. and vicinity and in foreign countries. Some are in other parts of the United States. Annual starting salaries currently range from \$8,462 to \$12,174. They are expected to increase by about 9 percent in the middle of this year. There are no written test requirements. Applicants will be rated on the basis of professional experience, education, and training. 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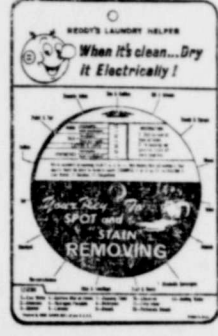

### PROGRESS REPORT: GIVING POLLUTION THE AIR

In the summer of 1928, thousands of weekenders and vacationers flocking to Lake Erie's sandy beaches found a strange and disturbing sight. Large areas of the lake, seemingly overnight, had become covered with a thick, green, evil-smelling carpet of scum.

Lake Erie, 42 years ago, had become one of the earliest victims of man-accelerated eutrophication—the stimulation of excessive algal growth. This is how it happened, and is still happening all over America:

Waste materials dumped into the water stimulate algal growth by supplying an overabundance of the essential nutrients on which algae feed. When the algae die, they decay and form large masses on the surface of the water (called "mats" or "blooms"), which are vile-smelling and which foul the surface of the lakes and inundate the shore. The decay process uses up much of the oxygen dissolved in the water, making it unsuitable for many forms of aquatic life, like game and commercial fish.

Though eutrophication is a normal, and very slow, occurrence in nature, it is greatly accelerated by the unchecked introduction of the raw waste products of our society into our waters.

Though the long-term solution to this problem is a nationwide commitment to proper and complete sewage treatment, there exists today an effective intermediary means of improving water quality. Formerly polluted lakes have already been successfully reclaimed by aeration.

Mechanical aeration purifies waters and controls accelerated eutrophication the way nature does—by mixing water with air. It also stimulates a return of game fish and other forms of desirable aquatic life.

This man-made nature's aid has proven itself in bodies of water ranging in size from one-acre ponds to a 3½ mile long, 140-foot deep reservoir and has been employed on portions of major U.S. rivers such as the Passaic and Delaware.

In the past, it was widely believed that by limiting the supply of the 15 to 20 different nutrient elements that algae feed on, effective eutrophication controls could be established. Phosphorus, in particular, was the element thought to be the easiest to control. It was even suggested that phosphates be removed from household detergents, in an effort to minimize algal growth.

It was later discovered, however, that even if it were possible to completely eliminate phosphorus input into Lake Erie, phosphates already deposited in the bottom sediments could still support algal growth for at least another 100 years. Therefore, the removal of phosphates from detergents as a "first step" would be no step at all in solving the eutrophication problem.

The American people need and deserve action—effective action—in the protection and restoration of water purity, and the key fact about aeration as an immediate answer is that it works.
