Three entries in the West Texas Regional Pecan Show held in Abilene last week from Sterling County placed in their respective variety classes. The three entries were sent in from the Tom Green County Show in early December where they were selected for entry in the regional show.

A San Saba entry grown by John Brock placed second in its class. John also had the third place entry in the Western Schley class.

A Wichita variety grown by A. C. Lively placed third in its class. The Wichita is one of the new varieties produced at the Brownwood Pecan Station and is a cross between a Halbert and a Mahan, both well-known old varieties.

Congratulations to John and Skipper on their successes in the pecan shows this year.

Fred Wilkinson, county agent of Crane County, has accepted the Sterling County Livestock Show Association's invitation to judge the entries in the Sterling County Show on January 18. Fred is well known for his successes at major lamb shows throughout Texas during the past years and is well qualified to judge the local show. He has served as judge at a number of county shows in the past as well as the Abilene Regional Lamb show.

He will judge all classes in the local show.

Several 4-H Club members have entries in the Sand Hills Hereford and Quarter Horse Show in Odessa. The Odessa show starts on January 2 and ends on January 9.

Club members with entries thus far are: Amy Hodges, Becky Hodges, registered Rambouillets; Larry Horwood, one Hereford steer; Eddie Probandt, one registered Hereford breeding heifer; and Victor Probandt, two Hereford breeding heifers. In addition, there will be several who will have fat lambs at the Odessa show. The entries, all finewool lambs, will be designated at a time in the week prior to the show.

During the last half of December some 7,500 Texas ranchers, if they have not already received them, receive a questionnaire on sheep and goats from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in Austin. This information will be used to make the official estimates of sheep and goat numbers for Texas and each county. Also, it will provide the basis for the official estimates of January 1 lambs on feed and wool production and mohair production.

This is an important survey and the information is widely used. All producers who receive the questionnaire are urged to complete it and return it to the Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. This survey is most important as Texas has about one-fifth of the sheep and nearly all of the goats produced in the United States. The returned reports are kept confidential; only the totals from a county are reported and used in the estimates.

This will be the final column for 1970 as the publisher does not plan to put out a paper on New Year's Day.

## AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

Washington, D. C. — High in the Swiss Alps is a beautiful little church with painted steeple and fine glass windows—but it has no lights.

A wealthy man gave the building to the mountain community with the understanding that there was never to be any artificial light in it. A strange covenant, some thought.

At Christmas time the bell in the steeple begins to ring in the twilight, but the church is in darkness.

Soon there is a flickering of lights along a path high on the side of the mountain and they increase in numbers as the church is approached. As the people enter, the building begins to light up and soon it is bright inside—for each who entered carried a candle.

This Christmas—any Christmas—marks the turn of another year. This Christmas could be a turn in our whole civilization if men and women everywhere would heed the simple lesson of carrying their own little light of accepting individual responsibilities as well as individual opportunities.

The rekindling of this spirit is the unfailing hope that keeps alive the courage to retain and regain the worthwhile values seemingly lost by many. A wise proverb expresses it: "The spirit of man is the candle of the Lord."

Man is in the shadows today. He stands in need of light. Men who destroy must build again. Man who plants sorrow must plant again the seeds of joy, gladness and goodwill. The only light by which man can walk is that within him which has been divinely given.

Saint Luke wrote: "whereby the dayspring from

on high hath visited us, to give light to them that sit in darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the way of peace."

Saint John put it even more succinctly when he wrote: "In Him was life; and the life was the light of men."

Touched to flame by the heavenly light of Christmas, may we be led through defeat to victory, through fear to faith, through sorrow to joy, through greed to gratitude; that in a better world, that we, by the light given us for guidance, help to build true freedom and be worthy of it. This is the kind of light no man can extinguish—Grace Crowell expressed it this way:

This slender, waxen thing that is my faith,

Fire it Lord with some divine white spark

Until its circle widening at my feet

Will mark my certain way across the dark.

Thou will light my candle—thus assured

I shall go forward in this unknown land;

The way can never grow too dark, too long.

For I shall bear Thy light within my hand.

Christmas is light for the darkness—light that no darkness can dispel. When we turn on the lights, darkness disappears.

As He is the light, the light of truth, the light of life; He is the light of man's hope and eternal fulfillment of his highest aspirations.

The greatest gift to be made at this Christmas is one to ourselves—the gift of service to others—of dedication to those things we know to be right.

These be my gifts, oh magnify them Lord.

Until they shine like diamonds in the light;

The clear illumination of Thy word,

A kindness like a lamp within the night;

The eager hand that reaches out and lifts,

Accept them Lord, they are my only gifts.

From our house to your house we wish for you the lingering light of this Christmas season.

**U.S. Border Patrol  
Seeks Applicants**

The U.S. Border Patrol of the Immigration and Naturalization Service has an urgent need for physically fit young men desiring a career in Federal law enforcement work. This is a career opportunity for those who like action and outdoor work.

The Border Patrol is the mobile, uniformed enforcement branch of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Its principle purpose is to prevent the smuggling and illegal entry of aliens into the United States. The border patrolmen, called Immigration Patrol Inspectors, work along international boundaries, although their duties are not necessarily confined to these areas. They work in jeeps, cars, on foot, in boats and even in airplanes. Officers investigate violations of the immigration laws and frequently make arrests. They are often required to work irregular hours, under all weather conditions. These duties demand mental alertness as well as exceptional physical vigor and stamina.

The entrance salary of an Immigration Patrol Inspector is \$7,639 a year (Grade GS-7). There are promotional opportunities up to executive levels in the Immigration and Naturalization Service. On-the-job training offers splendid opportunities for promotion to positions of greater responsibility.

No experience is required for these positions. To qualify, applicants must pass a written test of verbal abilities, judgment, and aptitude for learning a foreign language. Candidates who pass the written test are called for oral interviews in the order of their standing on the list. The oral interview is designed to determine if the candidate has the personal qualities needed for the work. Applicants must also pass a rigid physical examination. Candidates who are selected for appointment are assigned to the Border Patrol Academy for a period of intensive training in such subjects as immigration laws, Spanish, physical training and marksmanship. Trainees receive full pay while in the academy.

Applications are now being accepted for the civil service examination for Immigration Patrol Inspector which will be held on Saturday, January 24, 1970. An additional examination is scheduled for April, 1970. However, those wishing to be tested in January must submit their applications before December 19, 1969. Full information is given in Announcement No. WAM-911 which may be secured from Interagency Boards of Examiners and from many post offices as well as any office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Applications should be submitted on the tearout application form on the announcement or CSC Form 50000AB and forwarded to the Interagency Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners for Washington, D.C. 1900 E St., N.W., Washington, D.C. 20415.

## 4-H Members Win Honors

### Three Take State Honors In Various Club Projects

Sterling County 4-H Club members have carried on a variety of activities during the past years. Even though the membership of the club is small when compared to other counties, the accomplishments of the club and its members rate them among the tops.

Three of the club members have been state winners in 4-H club projects, one has served as a member of the State 4-H Club Council, two have been honored by the San Antonio Livestock Exposition, and many others have received recognition in livestock shows, district and state judging contests, and demonstration contests.

This article will salute the various club members for their achievements in their club work with some of the pictures available as well through this account.

Three boys were winners in consecutive years in the 4-H Range Management Awards Program. This program, sponsored by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association, provided each of the boys with a trip to the Range Camp held at Junction on the grounds of the Texas A&M University Adjunct.

The first winner in this program was Reynolds Lee Foster who was declared state winner in 1958. David Durham was named state winner of the award in 1959. The 1960 winner of the award was Clayton Stewart. Each of the boys attended Range Camp the year following their achievement as state winner and made a good record during their week's stay.

Two club members were honored by the San Antonio Livestock Exposition at the Rural Youth Honoree Banquet held during the San Antonio Show. The honorees for this are selected by each district with one boy and one girl being named by each of the Extension Service districts. In addition to being guest of honor at the banquet, each honoree receives a box seat

to the rodeo and is also named an honorary alcalde or mayor of San Antonio for the day. David Durham received this honor in 1960 while Raymond Thomas Foster was the recipient in 1964.

Reynolds Lee Foster served as co-chairman of the District 4-H Council in 1960. He also served as a member of the State 4-H Council that year.

4-H Club members have exhibited champion Rambouillet breeding sheep at the State Fair of Texas, shows at San Antonio, Fort Worth, Houston, El Paso, Abilene and the local county shows. Club members who exhibited these animals include Betty Jo Barrett, David and Barbara Durham, Janis and Lee Wayne Igo, Becky Hodges, and Amy Hodges who has had champion Hampshire breeding sheep as well as Rambouillets. Amy retired the Silver Shears, a rotating trophy at the San Antonio Livestock Exposition, by winning it for the third consecutive time at the 1970 show.

Three club members have also exhibited the champion group of range ewe lambs at the San Angelo Livestock Show. The winners of this class were Betty Jo Barrett, Lee Wayne Igo and Janis Igo.

Frank Price had the champion fleece of the Open Show at the San Antonio Livestock Exposition Wool Show in 1968. He also had the champion range fleece and the reserve champion fleece of the show. He was also the exhibitor of the grand champion fleece at the 1966 Sonora Wool Show and the 1967 show as well.

Allen Price exhibited the grand champion fleece of both the 1969 and 1970 Sonora Wool Show. In addition, Allen also entered the grand champion fleece of the 1970 National Western Livestock Show Wool Show in Denver and the grand champion fleece of the 1970 American Royal Wool Show in Kansas City.

### Gourmet Foods Come Easy To 4-H'ers With Know-How

SPECIAL — More and more young people want to entertain for and by themselves. And when they get ready for their friends' arrival they most often use easy-to-prepare foods that are either canned or frozen.

Girls in the 4-H food preservation program find they have even more versatility than usual. They have canned and frozen the foods they will use themselves.

Things like pizza sauce and the fixings for sloppy joes are common fare to these 4-H'ers. They've advanced to frozen beef stroganoff and pickle relish they've preserved themselves.

The 111,500 young canners and freezers have more going for them than just the accolades of their peers and the satisfaction of seeing their handiwork on the shelf or in the freezer.

Kerr Glass Manufacturing Corporation, national donor of the 4-H food preservation

program for the past 42 years, offers incentives and recognition. In 1969, over 5,400 young people received county medals for excellence in the program. Each state selected an outstanding girl to represent them at National 4-H food preservation program. Her expense-paid trip was provided by Kerr. Six educational scholarships of \$600 each were awarded to national winners in the program.

This year, medals of honor, a trip to the National 4-H Congress in Chicago, Nov. 29 through Dec. 3 and a scholarship are among the goals of 4-H'ers in the food preservation program. State winners will be hosted by Kerr at a recognition breakfast during the Congress. Scholarship winners will also be announced at the event.

The 4-H food preservation program and other 4-H activities are supervised by the Cooperative Extension Service.

### Texas 4-H'ers Take Part In Conference

Two members of the Texas 4-H Council attended the White House Conference on Children Dec. 13-18, according to state 4-H Club office at Texas A&M University.

Stella "Bo" Rose of Bracketville and Randy Miller of Edinburg were invited by President Nixon to attend the meeting in Washington, D. C. The conference is the first of a pair with the second dealing with the problems of youth scheduled for June of 1971. The purpose of these meetings, held every ten years, is to focus attention on the problems of young people and to develop policies and programs to deal with these problems.

Miller, 18, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Miller of Edinburg and is presently Chairman of the Texas 4-H

Soil and Water Conservation Demonstration Teams have placed in the top three

teams at the State Contests several years. The third place team in 1962 was composed of team members Barbara Durham and Jeanie McDonald. In 1963, Barbara teamed with Rosanne Foster to place second at the state contest; this same team placed third in 1964. Jeanie McDonald placed second in the individual demonstration of the Soil and Water Conservation Contest. In 1968, Pam McEntire and Janis Igo placed second in the team division of this contest.

All the girls and boys who took part in the various state contests listed above placed either first or second in the district division of the contests. In addition, several other teams have placed either first or second in the district contests but failed to gain recognition in the top three teams at the state contests.

Members of the second place Beef Cattle Business Demonstration team in 1970 were Tommy and Bobby Bynum. Janis Igo and Ray Sparks placed second in the Natural Resources Conservation Demonstration. The second place grass identification team members were Charlotte Foster, DeNeal Reed, Steven Foster and Skeets Foster. Patti Bynum and Melinda Terry placed first in the Junior Division of the Safety Demonstration contest in 1970's District Eliminations.

First place team in the Civil Defense Demonstration was made up of Jeff Cantrell and Russell Davis. Patti Bynum and Melinda Terry won second place honors in the 1969 Share the Fun Contest; Janis Igo and Pam McEntire won second in the 1969 Natural Resources Demonstration district contest; the range grass identification team composed of Charlotte Foster, DeNeal Reed and Skeets Foster won second place honors. Bobby and Tommy Bynum teamed together to win first place in the junior division of Natural Resources Conservation Demonstration three consecutive years — 1965, 1966 and 1967.

Space is not available to list all the club members who took part in the various contests during the past several years. Those listed above were those who placed high in the contests. Recognition is due to others though who have competed. These include Amy Hodges, Becky Hodges, Scott Davis, Jim Terry, Lee Wayne Igo, Payton Wilson, Dwayne Davis, Mackey McEntire, Drew Durham, Tommy Foster, James Ross, Randy Mixon, Frank Price and Kenny Blanek.

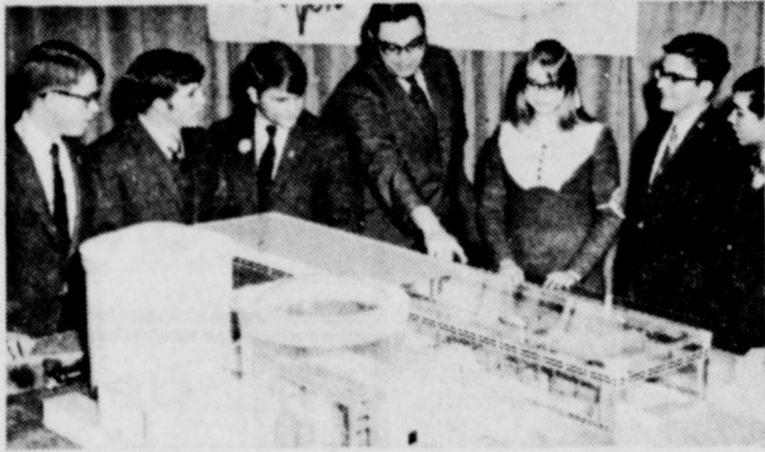

Large supplies of ruby red and golden yellow apples, oranges, tangerines and tangelos are now available. Other good buys include pineapples, Emperor or Ribier grapes and persimmons and pomegranates. To make the most

of your money, buy bags or small fruit sizes.

Dried fruits are also good holiday buys. They are good mixers plus they are nutritional. Raisins and prunes are the most popular dried fruits, followed by dates, figs, apples, apricots, pears, peaches and currants.

Most plentiful and reasonable of the fresh vegetables are potatoes, carrots, yellow onions and celery. Sweet potatoes and cabbage are also reasonable.

Fryers continue in good supply in most stores. Whole and cut-up birds and fryer parts are marked with attractive prices, as well as roasting hens.

Pork is featured frequently in local markets. Look for specials on loin cuts, shoulder roasts and a variety of hams. In addition to featured pork cuts, good meat buys are found on beef roasts, steaks and ground beef.

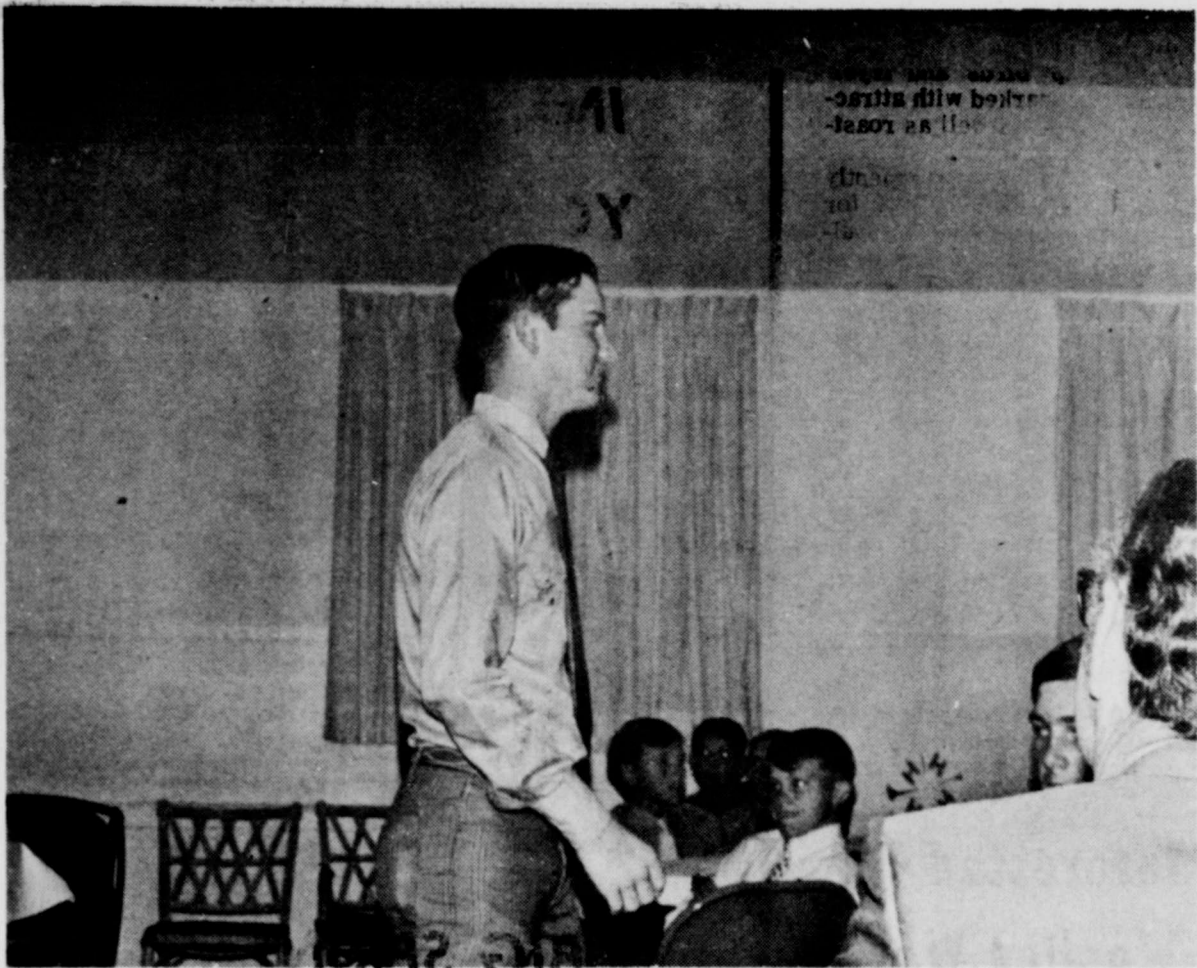

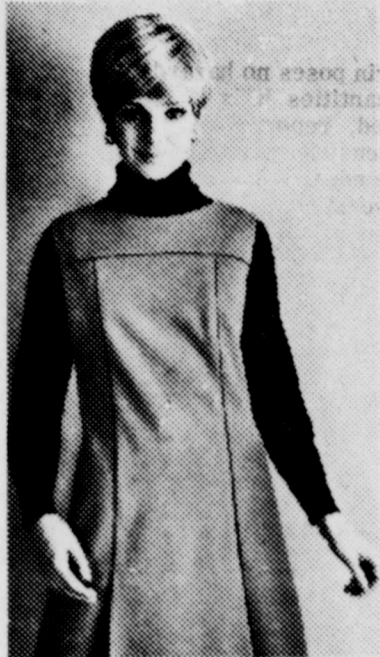

### Saccharin Determined Safe For Consumption

Saccharin poses no hazards in the quantities it is likely to be used, reports Minnie Bell, Extension specialist in family life education at Texas A&M University. The information is the result of a study on saccharin usage by a committee of the National Academy of Science and the National Research Council.

According to the committee reports, Miss Bell says, a safe level of about 12 to 18 quarter grain tablets per day may be used by adults. Actual usage is likely to fall far below the safety standard.

The use of saccharin covers an 80 year period. During World War I, heavy use of the sweetener in England and Germany has produced no adverse effects.

A recent cancer mortality study involving over 21,000 diabetics using saccharin showed no increased risk of cancer over a period of 28 years, the report showed.

Miss Bell added that the committee did recommend further investigation of specific items related to saccharin's long-term effects.

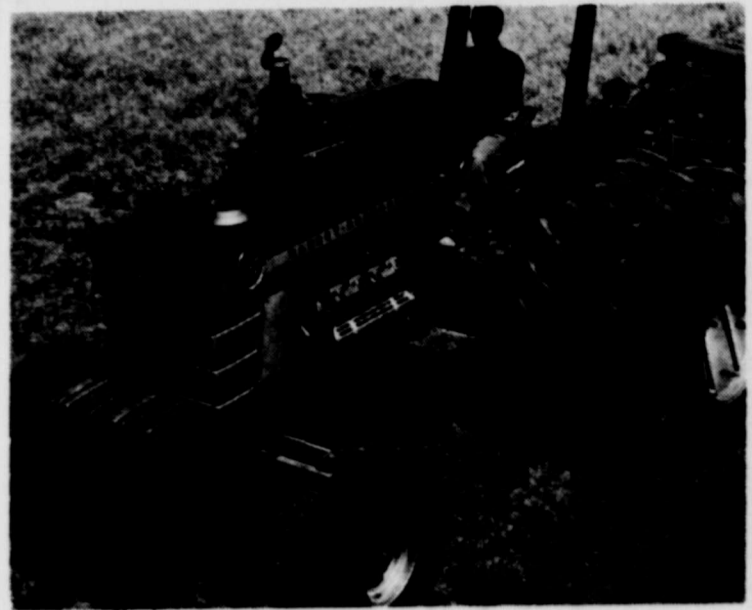

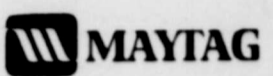

Representing the public and private sectors in support of 4-H are Mrs. Shirley Carlson, The Sperry and Hutchinson Company; Dr. E. Dean Vaughan, Extension Service, USDA; J. Roger Lennartson, Westinghouse Electric Corporation, and Norman C. Mindrum, National 4-H Service Committee, the nonprofit educational organization which performs a liaison function.

Last year about 4-million boys and girls 9 to 19 years of age received technical as well as practical training in 4-H and related programs.

With cooperation and support of business and government, the "learning-by-doing" educational program has expanded and

become a vital organization for urban as well as rural youths.

This year enrollments are expected to be at the highest point ever as young people everywhere find 4-H flexible and to their liking.

They meet in groups or clubs, work on self-determined proj-

ects and activities, learn through special 4-H television series and independent study. And 4-H'ers are encouraged to proceed in their educational activities and projects as far and rapidly as they desire.

Over the years the private sector has assisted 4-H youths in their quest for knowledge, fun and fellowship. Through the National 4-H Service Committee, corporations, foundations and individuals have been encouraged to share their technical expertise, to provide educational materials and visual aids. These donors also have found incentives and recognition useful in motivating young people.

This year nearly 60 donors are providing 4-H youths with challenging inspiration and recognition. Awards will include medals of honor, expense-paid trips to National 4-H Congress in Chicago and 286 scholarships valued at \$166,700.

Among donors whose support has continued since the 1920's are: Armour and Company; Burlington Northern Inc.; The Milwaukee Road and Wilson & Co., Inc.

As the 4-H program broadened its educational offerings, it has been strengthened by the support of additional corporations and foundations. Added to the donor roster were: General Motors; American Oil Foundation; Standard Oil Company (Kentucky); The Chicago Board of Trade; Livestock Conservation, Inc.; Sunbeam Corporation; Union Oil Company of California and the Conrad Hilton Hotel.

In the 1950's 4-H opportunities expanded further with the addition of donors such as Chevron Chemical Company - Ortho Division; Cities Service Company; Elgin National Industries, Inc.; Hercules Incorporated; Homelite, a Division of Textron, Inc.; Moorman Mfg. Co.; Olin Corporation; Ralston Purina Company; The Singer Company and White Farm Equipment.

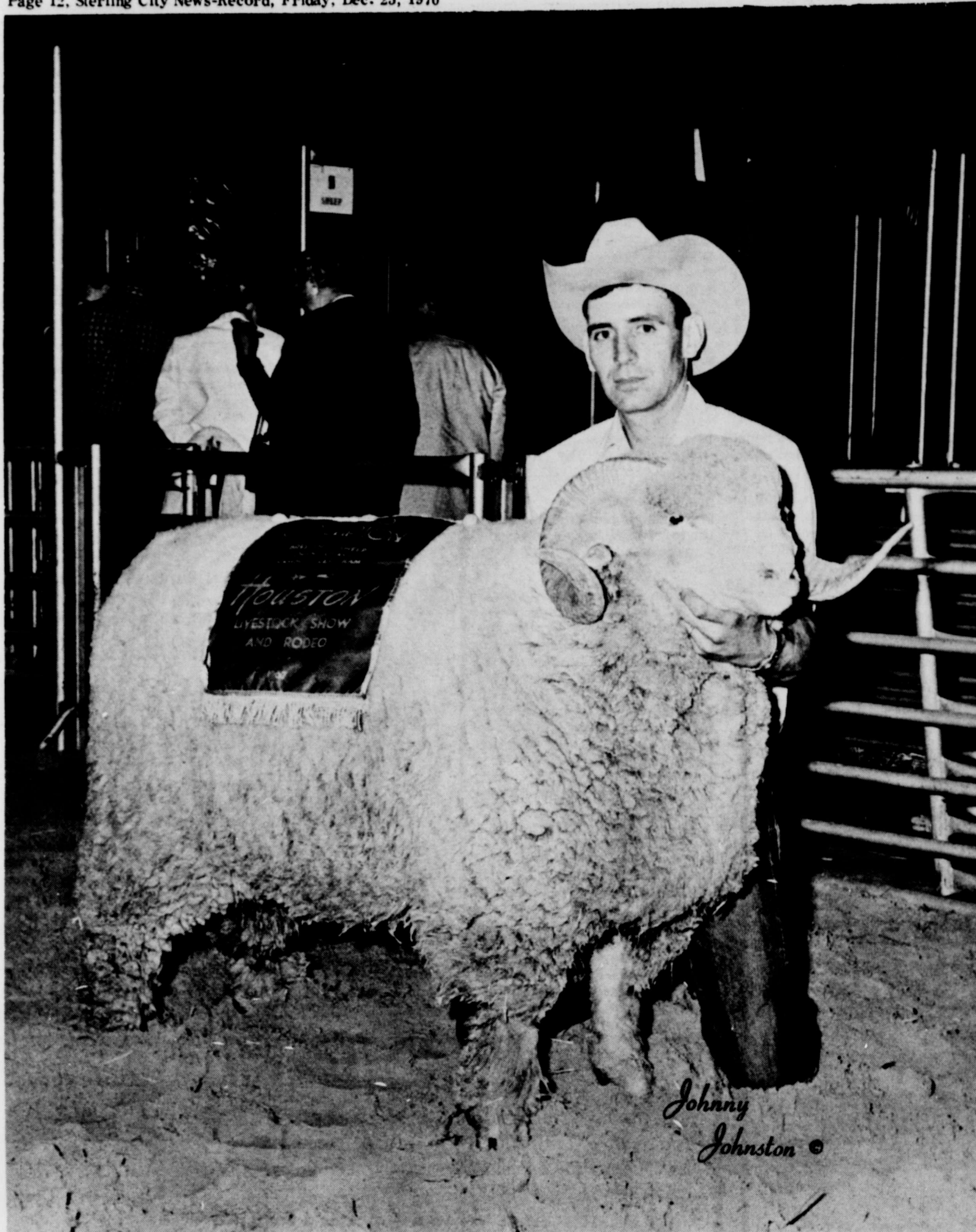

## Legislation To Protect Buyer

Each year, up to a million credit cards are lost and three hundred thousand are stolen. To protect a consumer plagued by disappearing credit cards, Congress has passed a new law that will be effective Jan. 23, reports Doris Myers, Extension specialist in home management.

The new law stated that an individual will not be liable for any loss from unauthorized use of his card after he has reported its disappearance to the issuer. Notice may be by telephone or by letter.

Most companies will cancel use of the card once they have been notified. If the notice is by letter, cancellation is effective the day the letter is post marked. For losses occurring before notification, liability is limited to \$50.

The \$50 liability applies separately to each card that is lost. So, if a billfold or purse containing five credit cards is misplaced, the potential maximum liability is a total of \$250. If a husband and wife lost their cards on a joint account, however, the total liability is limited to \$50.

The new law also prohibits banks and other firms from mailing out unrequested credit cards. Companies must inform the user of his rights and potential liabilities, plus they must assume the legal burden of paying for liabilities the card holder may suffer.

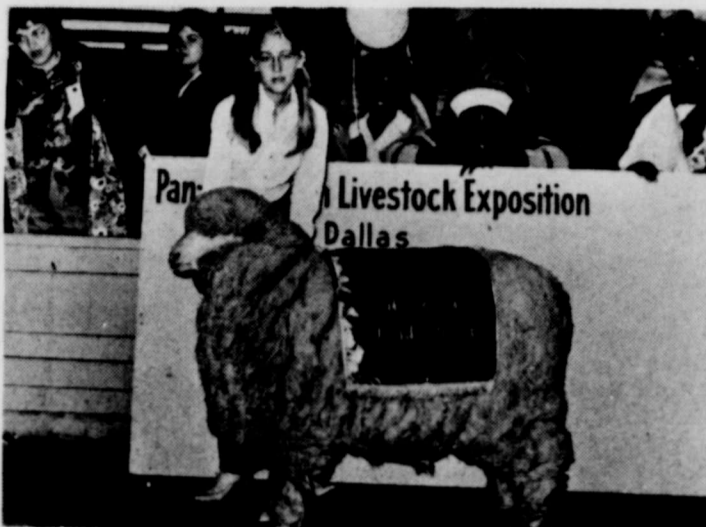

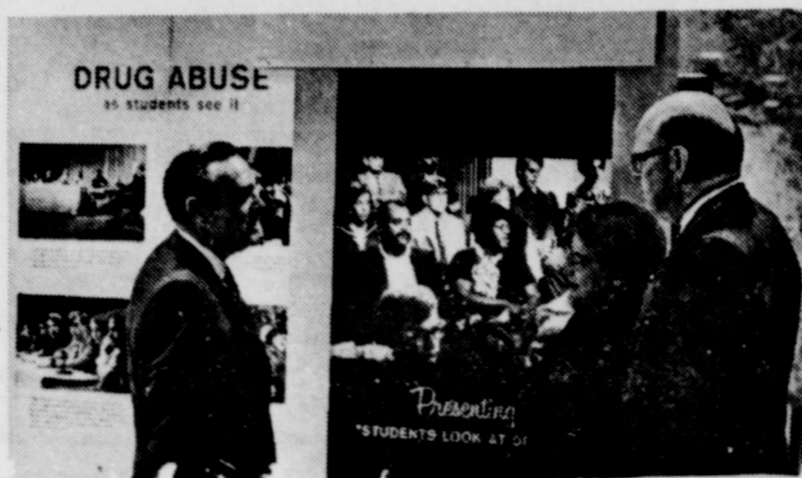

**4-H Fights Drug Abuse  
Through Education**



Over the years drugs have been associated with healing, health and the well-being of people. Today the word frequently has a new, distasteful and frightening meaning for the parents of young people.

**Social Security Tips CHECK YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY RECORD**

"How do I know my work under social security is being credited to my record, and how do I find out about it? This is one of the questions most frequently asked," says J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

In explaining the process involved in reporting social security, Mr. Talbot said, "When you work for wages, your employer deducts social security tax from your paycheck each pay day. At the end of each calendar quarter, he submits your name and number with payment for these taxes to Internal Revenue. Internal Revenue forwards copies to social security's main office in Baltimore, Maryland. Your wages are then posted to your record. The same process is followed for a self-employed person except that his earnings are recorded yearly."

Mr. Talbot states that the possibility of an error being made in the process does exist. He recommends that you request a statement of your earnings at least every three

"Processing time can be cut in half if people are prepared when the time comes to apply for social security benefits," says J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

Being prepared is not as difficult as many people believe. Remember to take along your social security card or the card of the person on whose record you are filing. For a widow, this would be the social security card of her late husband. This may sound hard to believe, but many people do come in to file their application and leave their number at home.

The next most important document to take with you is your birth certificate, if available. Proof of age is needed to qualify for nearly all social security benefits. If your birth was recorded when you were born or if you were baptized before age five, you will need one of these documents. If you don't have a copy, make arrangements now to get one, Mr. Talbot advises.

If your birth was not recorded and you were not baptized before age five, there are other documents you can use. In most cases, the earlier the record was made the better it is for helping to establish your date of birth.

The third thing that is needed in all claims is evidence of the worker's last year's earnings and an estimate of this year's earnings. Your W-2 Form or tax return for last year will give the information for last year. Be sure to bring these with you.

**DISABLED WORKER NEWS**

In most instances, disability claims take a longer period to process than other social security claims. The extra processing time is due to additional documentation, such as medical reports and different procedures in the claims process.

By applying as early as possible, the complete processing of the claim can be finished before the six months waiting period has expired. If the claim for benefits is approved, you get a check at the earliest possible time.

**File Early For Disability**  
What do you do if you get so sick or injured you can't work? One of the things you should do is see if you are eligible for disability payments under the social security law. Although there are no benefits payable during the first 6 months of a disability, J.M. Talbot, social security manager, urges everyone who believes he may be entitled to monthly benefits to apply for them as soon as possible after becoming disabled.

"Did you know that if you operate any type of agricultural business, the hired workers you have in that business may be covered by social security?" J. M. Talbot, social security manager, asks.

Any employee who works and earns \$150 or more for one employer during any year or works at least 20 days on a time basis for an agriculture business, is covered by social security. Even part-time employees could meet the earnings or work test. You, as their employer, would be liable to withhold social security tax from the employee's check, match that tax yourself, and report the earnings at the end of the year.

The report of agricultural employees must be filed with the Internal Revenue Service by January 31 of the fol-

lowing year. Reports should be on Internal Revenue Service Form 943—showing each employee's name, social security number, and amount paid. The report should be accompanied by tax withheld from employee's pay and matched by employer.  
To be sure which employees to report, Mr. Talbot recommends keeping records on anyone working for you in your agricultural business. For further information, contact the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris Avenue, (P. O. Box 3808) in San Angelo, Texas or see the representative when he is in your area.

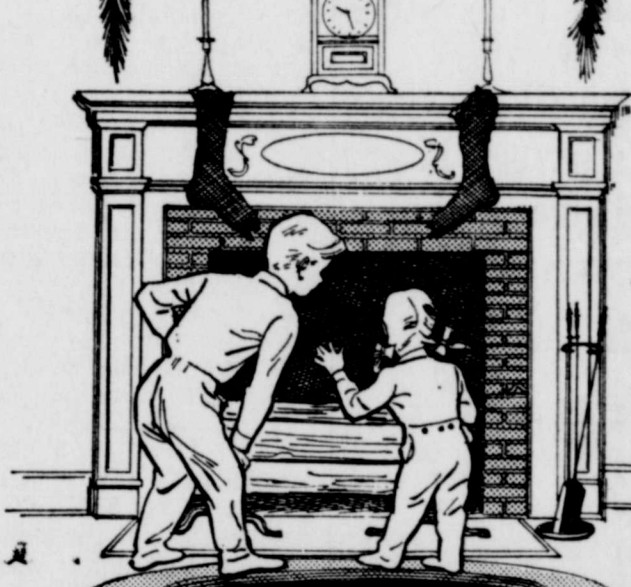

**Social Security  
DISABLED WIDOWS BENEFITS**

"Two years have passed and many persons are still not aware of the change in the social security law which provides monthly benefits for disabled widows at age 50," said J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

Since the law became effective in February, 1968, more than 32,000 disabled widows have qualified for monthly payments, Mr. Talbot estimated however that another 30,000 widows who might qualify for these benefits have never applied.

"The requirements for disabled widows' benefits are apparently not as well known as those for the more familiar widows' benefits at age 62, or reduced widows' benefits at age 60," Mr. Talbot continued.

To qualify for benefits a widow, age 50 to 60, must have an impairment so severe that it keeps her from engaging in any work. The condition must also be expected to last for at least twelve months. The widow's disability must have begun before her husband's death or not later than seven years after his death. A widow who has previously been entitled to benefits if she becomes disabled before payments to the children end or within seven years after they end.

Mr. Talbot encourages those who may qualify to call the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris Avenue (P. O. Box 3808) in San Angelo, Texas or see the representative when he is in your area.

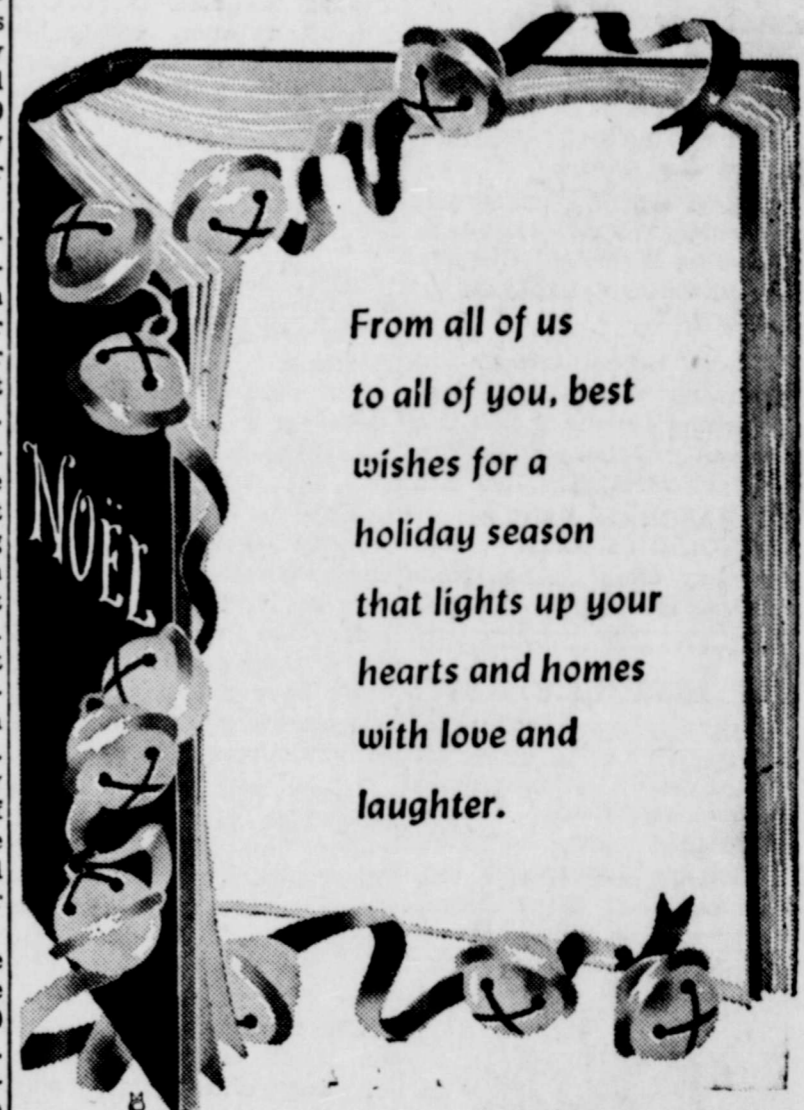
