Sterling's County Livestock Show Here Monday

The Sterling County Junior Livestock Show will get underway in the show barn this weekend. All fat lambs must be in the barn by 6:00 p. m. Saturday when weighing will be completed. The market steers will be weighed Monday morning at Stockman's Supply on the scales three. Breeding sheep, pigs, and heifers will be brought in Monday morning also.

Judging will begin at 8:00 a. m. Monday morning with the lightweight finewool lambs being the first class in the arena. Fred Wilkinson, county agent of Crane County, will do the judging. The exhibitors will also be judged in showmanship. Two silver belt buckles have been provided by Holland Jewelers of San Angelo. One buckle will go to the outstanding showman in the fat lamb division and the other to the showman in the breeding sheep division. Exhibitors need not own the animals they show in order to compete.

The show is sponsored by the Sterling County Livestock Show Association. President of the group is Charlie Davis, he is assisted by S.K. Horwood, vice-president and treasurer Charles Probandt. Superintendent of the show is Bill Barrett and assistant superintendents are Marvin Foster and David Foster.

The sale will begin at 2:30 p.m. with Riley King serving as auctioneer. Sales clerks are Worth Durham, Charles Probandt and Hugh Lackey. Bill Ralph Bynum is in charge of resale of the lambs.

This year there will be a Chinese auction of a lamb which will be dressed, barbecued and prepared for the freezer. In a Chinese auction, the bidder pays only what he raises the bid. For example, if the bid is \$100 and the bidder bids \$101, he pays one dollar, not \$101. Money raised by this auction will be used to help defray expenses of the show in addition to the money raised through donations by many interested individuals. The auction is an excellent chance for someone to get a delicious barbecued lamb for their use, at a nominal price.

Ribbons, banners, and rosettes for the show are again being provided by the Concho Valley Electric Cooperative Incorporated. This group has provided the ribbons and banners for several years Carroll Land of San Angelo is manager of the cooperative.

Fourteen trophies have again been provided by a number of interested supporters. There will also be two medals awarded along with the belt buckles and trophies at the awards presentation at 2:00 p.m.

In addition, the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association will award a medallion to the exhibitor of the outstanding fat lamb of the show. The Sterling County Auxiliary of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association will award a like medallion to the exhibitor of the outstanding breeding sheep.

A barbecued chicken dinner will be served at noon in the community center. The Women's Society of Christian Service of the First United Methodist Church is in charge of the dinner.

The steer show and the Hereford heifer show are new to the local show. The 4-H Club members and FFA chapter members will exhibit thirteen steers and four heifers in the show. In addition, there will be approximately 150 lambs, 16 to 20 Rambouillets, 10 pigs, several groups of range ewe lambs, and Hampshire breeding sheep.

The weather at the Sand Hills Hereford and Quarter Horse Show in Odessa really went all out in providing atmosphere for the show last week. Traditionally, it is cold in Odessa for the show but last week the weather was beyond that. The best part about it was the fact that there was little or no wind during the frigid temperatures.

Lambs were shown by 4-H Club members Amy Hodges, Becky Hodges, Carl Igo and Janis Igo. None of the lambs entered placed in the lamb show which was one of the largest in recent years. There were 376 finewool lambs entered in the three classes and all were exceptionally good lambs.

Larry Horwood showed his medium weight Hereford steer but failed to place in the show. Here, too, the entry list was larger than usual with 295 steers entered in the four weight divisions of the show.

Amy Hodges showed the reserve champion ewe of the Rambouillet show while Becky showed the reserve champion ram. There were over sixty head of Rambouillets entered by eleven exhibitors to make this the largest Rambouillet show at Odessa in years.

In the singles classes, Amy had the eighth place ewe lamb while Becky had the ninth place entry. Amy showed the second and sixth place two-tooth ewes and Becky had the fourth place entry in that class. In the four to six tooth ewe class, Amy's ewes placed first and second.

Becky had the second and tenth place rams while Amy had the fifth place animal. Amy's two-tooth rams stood second and fourth in their class. She also had the second place four to six tooth ram.

In the group classes, Amy had the first place exhibitor's flock with Becky's group placing third. Becky had the second place pen of lambs. In the get of sire class, Amy had the second place group with Becky showing the fourth place group.

Eddie and Victor Probandt entered their Hereford heifers in the Junior Breeding Hereford Show held Friday morning. Victor's junior calf, born in January 1970 and purchased from Harold Henke of Fredericksburg, placed tenth while Eddie had the eleventh place heifer in the same class. Burleson's Bill Helps Small Hospital

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Congressman Omar Burleson has been successful in passage of legislation which he authored to relieve small hospitals of the requirement of having a registered nurse on duty at all times. The House of Representatives passed the bill on December 22 and the Senate passed it on January 2. The Bill, H. R. 19470 now goes to the President for signature.

The need for such legislation was evidenced by the difficulty many small rural hospitals have encountered in qualifying for Medicare due to this requirement. In his remarks before the House, Congressman Burleson stated, "There is, however, the practical aspect of what can be immediately provided in certain areas of the Country

"In many small towns of the more rural sections there is only one hospital. In many instances it is miles removed from a larger town hospital and is necessary to the community. To establish standards and requirements which can not be met at this time and a few years in the immediate future would work an extreme hardship on Medicare patients who have no other place to go. "Medicare patients shouldn't be required to leave their home community, their familiar surroundings and, particularly, their doctor for care in another area not familiar to them."

Burleson's bill permits discretion on the part of the Secretary of HEW to determine, under certain criteria, whether a registered nurse must be required around the clock at these particular hospitals. The bill is temporary in nature in that it allows the nursing requirement to be waived by the Secretary year by year for the next five years. Originally, the bill included a relaxation of rather stringent requirements in connection with physical facilities. Since there is some latitude already permitted in connection with these standards, H. R. 19470 was amended in the Ways and Means Committee to apply only to registered nurses. In this regard, Burleson stated, "It is my feeling that a greater latitude should be given in the requirements of physical facilities but, in this measure, we are reaching for the possible and it is needed immediately. It is hoped that with narrowing my original proposal we can get this much accomplished in the hope that these other things will come along in due time."

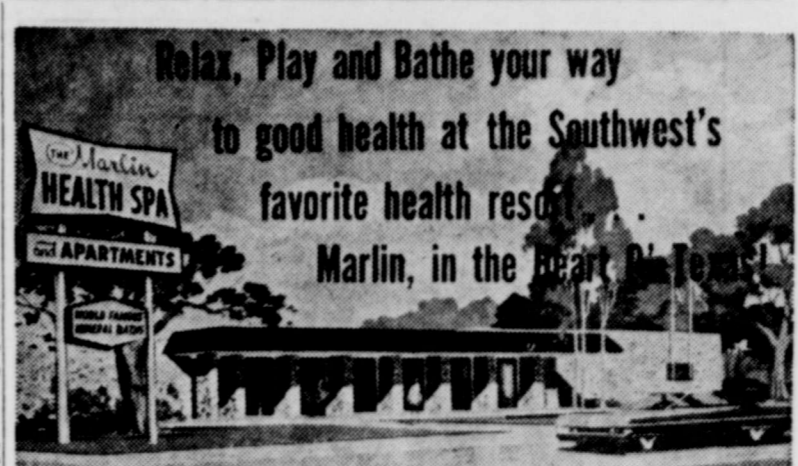
