Becky had the first and ninth place ewe lambs with Amy showing the seventh and eighth place animals. In the two-tooth ewe class, Amy had the second and sixth place entries while Becky had the third and eighth place animals.

In the Hampshire show Friday morning, Amy had the ninth place ram lamb.

The final show of the spring circuit for the local 4-H Club members is the San Angelo Show this week. The entries by the local club members were given in last week's column.

A Charolais-Hereford cross steer bred in Sterling County was the reserve champion Charolais steer of the Houston Show last week. The steer was bred by the Wilkinson Ranch and fed by Jamie Edwards of the Llano County 4-H Club. This steer placed second in the heavyweight class and was beaten by the steer that went on to become grand champion steer of the show.

Several persons have asked about pruning rose bushes now. Actually, it is a little early in this area to prune roses. You may have read that this should be done now and it should in areas a little removed from us but the chance of a killing freeze in the few weeks makes it advisable to postpone the job here.

The reason for waiting until late March or even early April here is the danger of frost. If the bushes are pruned now and we have several days of warm weather, the bushes will put out new growth. A freeze would kill this growth and it would be necessary to prune again below this growth which could result in too severe pruning and a very small bush. By waiting a little while, this can be avoided.

The same is true of fertilizing roses and pecans at this time. Fertilizer would stimulate growth and a hard freeze could damage the plants severely. This might endanger the life of the plant. Wait until the last week of this month or even the first week of April to fertilize.

## Church of Christ Meeting Mar. 15-18

Joe Malone, gospel minister of the Trail Lake Church of Christ in Fort Worth will preach in a series of evangelistic services here Monday—Thursday, March 15-18, at 7:30 each evening. Mr. Malone, former staff cartoonist with the Dallas Times Herald, has preached in meetings and campaigns across the United States. His background includes training for an art career which culminated in such assignments as a portrait of late House Speaker Sam Rayburn which was cast in bronze and presented to President Franklin Roosevelt and a drawing of Governor Pat Neff which now hangs in Baylor University in Waco. Malone was also featured cartoonist for the Texas Newspaper Syndicate for a number of years.

After becoming a member of the Church of Christ, Mr. Malone determined to become a gospel preacher. His study and previous art experience have qualified him as a unique speaker and lecturer. Two sons, Avon of Amarillo, Texas and David of Lamesa, California, are also gospel ministers.

"We feel quite fortunate in securing Brother Malone for our spring meeting", said Pat Brooks, local preacher, "because of the great demand for him as a speaker on both religious and patriotic themes. He is the kind of speaker who has wide appeal to a community such as ours."

## Lions See Medical Emergency Film

John Lukert, Field Consultant with the Division of Civil Defense and Traffic Safety of the Texas State Department of Health, brought a film to the Lions Club luncheon here Wednesday. The film was titled "Before the Emergency" which dramatically illustrates the value of good emergency care to individuals involved in all-to-common emergencies. The film pointed out that an estimated 20,000 accident victims die unnecessarily each year as a direct result of inadequate emergency care and at least another 25,000 are permanently disabled from the same cause.

The film showed how a Wisconsin town set up outstanding rescue, ambulance, and hospital services and how these saved the lives of many school children in a mock bus accident. The film ended with specific suggestions as to how a city or town can bring its emergency care up to a similar level.

The film was also shown by Lukert at the Sterling Volunteer Fire Department meeting Monday night.

## Notice Afferding Opportunity for Public Hearing Corridor and Design (Combined Hearing)

The Texas Highway Department is planning the improvement of State Highway 158, from U.S. Highway 87 at Sterling City, Northeast 6.4 miles.

Improvements will consist of complete reconstruction of the existing highway. The existing alignment will be relocated where considered necessary and the new right-of-way will vary in width from 100 to approximately 200 feet as needed.

Maps and other drawings showing the proposed location and geometric design and other information about the proposed project are on file and available for inspection and copying at the Resident Engineer's Office at Sterling City, Texas. Also the drawings showing the proposed geometric designs have been placed on file with Sterling County at Sterling City.

Information about the tentative schedules for acquisition of right-of-way and construction can be obtained at the Resident Engineer's Office.

Any interested citizen may request that a public hearing be held covering the social, economic and environmental effects of the proposed location and design for this highway project by delivering a written request to the Resident Engineer's Office on or before April 2, 1971.

In the event such a request is received, a public hearing will be scheduled and adequate notice will be publicized about the date and location of the hearing.

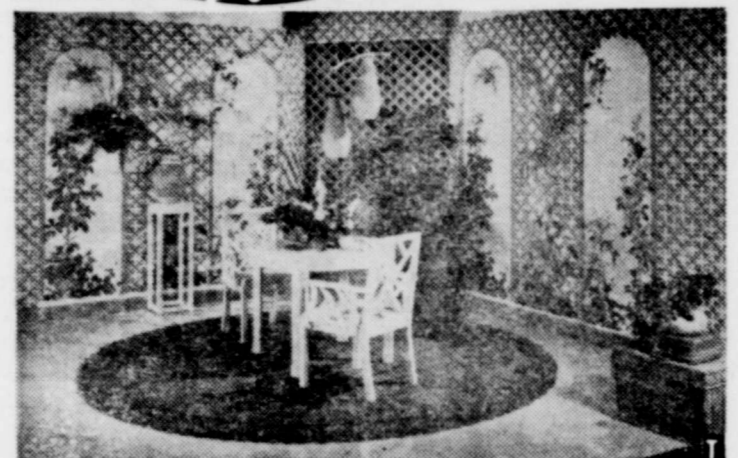

**DINING ROOMS AND AREAS**

Dining rooms—like old-fashioned parlors—give much pleasure. They enhance the ceremony of eating, their decoration, likewise, partakes of ritual: the centered table, the sideboard, the chandelier or wall sconces.

Somehow a deep dado is right for such a room, and above it a wallpaper mural or a large repeating pattern should be considered. Painted walls, or heavily paneled ones of wood, should be firmly rejected: the former because they lack richness and atmosphere, the latter because they have too much, like a clubroom.

In country houses, over a dado, a scenic "toile" might be an excellent choice, or even—if there is no dado—a broad floral stripe.

At present, the dining room is often just around the corner from the living room, and hence easy to decorate quite differently, with regard to both furniture and wallcovering. But it must be constantly remembered that even here, as in all adjacent and visible areas, the colors should be related, from one area to the next, although the change in pattern and texture can be as abrupt as you wish.

In a small apartment the "dining room" may consist of nothing but a table and some chairs. Should you attempt to enclose them by screens or curtains? If you do, you may make an already small room seem smaller. Rather than cut up your floor space it might be wise to define the different areas by means of well-chosen wallcoverings. It would be sad not to point up a dining room in some way. The evening meal in particular should be heightened by romantic lighting and a colorful background.

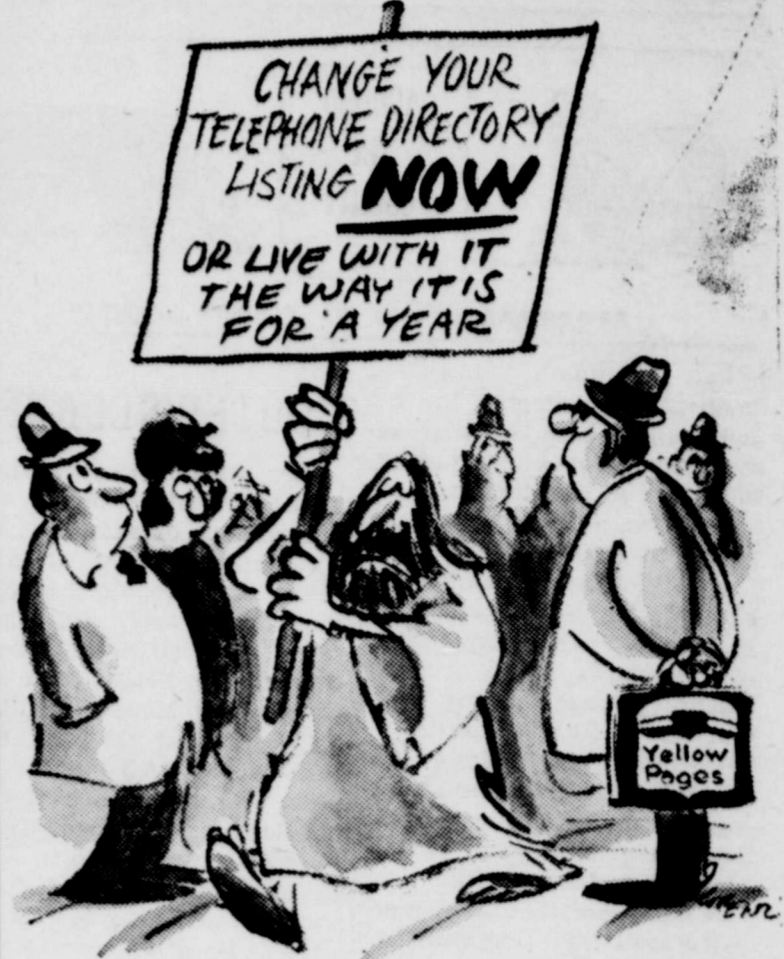

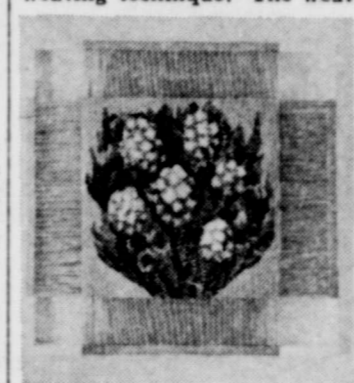

### Shrimp, Rice in Go-Go Party Dish



Blessings, we say, on the inventor of the buffet party table. Given a cold winter evening nothing cheers like helping oneself from a sparkling table, picking and choosing along a candlelit procession of surprises and delights.

Both delightful and surprising will be this shrimp and rice spectacular, a molded affair exactly right for buffet serving. And no ho-hum mixture, this. Flavor runs deep. And the texture, interesting with as many shrimp as can be spared, is blissfully moist and creamy.

**SHRIMP AND RICE CREAM MOLD**

2 cans (4 1/2 ounces each) shrimp  
3/4 cup uncooked rice  
1 1/4 cups chicken broth  
1 envelope unflavored gelatin  
1/2 cup freshly grated onion  
1/2 teaspoon white pepper  
1/2 cup mayonnaise  
1 cup heavy cream, whipped

Drain shrimp, reserving canned liquid. Chill. Combine rice and broth; simmer, covered, 20-25 minutes, stirring frequently to make rice "starchy." Soften gelatin in shrimp liquid; stir into hot rice. Cool rice; add onion, pepper, mayonnaise, and about 1 1/2 cans of the shrimp. Fold in cream; turn into a 1-quart mold and a 1-cup mold. Chill until firm. Unmold smaller mold on the larger one. Decorate with remaining shrimp, with parsley and lemon slices. Serve with Curried Mayonnaise, combining 1/2 cup mayonnaise, 1/2 teaspoon curry powder, 1 teaspoon Dijon style mustard. About 8 servings.
