School Consolidation Vote April 10

The date for voting of consolidation of the Sterling City and Water Valley school districts has been set by county judges in both counties—for April 10. County judge Jake Martin of Sterling County and Judge Ed Keys of Tom Green County set the date on Thursday of last week after the petitions calling for such election had been properly presented in both counties.

Water Valley is short on scholastics and some parents are afraid their school will be swallowed up by another district in Tom Green County—or the common school board of the county. Some would prefer to join Sterling rather than be taken in by another district. Under the state set-up now, a school that is below the minimum scholastics number, can be absorbed by a larger school district (in the same county) it is said, by those for consolidation.

As in all cases, some of the Water Valley people do not want to consolidate or lose their school, so opinion in the matter is divided there.

Both districts have to approve consolidation or the measure falls through. If the proposal passes, consolidation would take place as of next school year and all classes would be held in the Sterling school building. The new name would have to have the word 'Consolidated' in it.

Now, students from Carlsbad and Grape Creek attend the Water Valley school, and they would not be transferred with the actual Water Valley pupils. Now over 100 pupils attend the school there but the true district has only 50 scholastics residing in the district, it is said.

Mr. Smith ran a truck line from Sterling to San Angelo, operated the wood yard and drilled water wells in Sterling County for many years. He was noted for his honesty and integrity. He was preceded in death by daughter, Mrs. Dora Simmons in 1959.

FRANCES GOMEZ

A varmint control program has been scheduled for the community center at 4:00 p.m. Monday, March 29. The program is being held in response to requests from a number of local ranchers in an attempt to cut down on the varmint population which is also causing some concern in regards to a rabies outbreak here, according to Arthur Barlemann, Jr., county agent.

The program will be under the direction of Milton Caroline, supervisor of the Rodent and Predatory Animal Control Service of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service headquartered in San Antonio. Mr. Caroline will outline the program briefly at the meeting. He will have a number of his men with him who will be available to go with interested ranchers who desire to control the varmints. They will go to the ranch, put out the baits with the rancher, instruct him, and later recover the baits. These men will be available to work in the county as long as it takes to cover the territory of the interested ranchers. The baits are reasonable in cost and this is the only cost involved.

To date, five persons have taken the series of fourteen shots as a result of exposure to rabies since the first of this year here. There have been confirmed cases in cattle, horses and skunks. In addition, there have been additional suspected cases but a positive diagnosis was not made since no humans were involved. At the present time, the State Department Laboratory at Austin, which makes the diagnosis, is being taxed to perform the diagnosis because of the large number of cases. They have requested that only heads or brains of animals where humans are involved be submitted.

Livestock losses are also possible due to rabies. A number of ranchers feel that some livestock has been lost but no estimate is available. Losses are a distinct possibility however here.

Skunks and fox are considered carriers of rabies and as everyone knows, there are large numbers of these varmints here now. Because of the drought situation and shortage of water, these animals are watering with livestock at the same locations and pose a threat in this respect.

The program Monday is designed to control these varmints on the rangeland and cut down on the possibility of a large scale outbreak of rabies here. All interested ranchers are invited to attend the meeting Monday. If for some reason you cannot attend, let your interest be known. Your name will be given to Mr. Caroline and his group and they will contact you and work out a schedule.

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Social Security

CHECK YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY RECORD

"How do I know my work under social security is being credited to my record, and how do I find out about it? This is one of the questions most frequently asked," says J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

In explaining the process involved in reporting social security, Mr. Talbot said, "When you work for wages, your employer deducts social security tax from your paycheck each pay day. At the end of each calendar quarter, he submits your name and number with payment for these taxes to Internal Revenue. Internal Revenue forwards copies to social security's main office in Baltimore, Maryland. Your wages are then posted to your record. The same process is followed for a self-employed person except that his earnings are recorded yearly."

Mr. Talbot states that the possibility of an error being made in the process does exist. He recommends that you request a statement of your earnings at least every three years.

All you have to do to secure the statement is to send a post card request available at your social security office to Baltimore, Maryland. If the reply you receive is incorrect in any way, contact the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris Avenue (P. O. Box 3808) in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area.

"Did you know that if you operate any type of agricultural business, the hired workers you have in that business may be covered by social security?" J. M. Talbot, social security manager, asks.

Any employee who works and earns \$150 or more for one employer during any year or works at least 20 days on a time basis for an agriculture business, is covered by social security. Even part-time employees could meet the earnings or work test. You, as their employer, would be liable to withhold social security tax from the employee's check, match that tax yourself, and report the earnings at the end of the year.

The report of agricultural employees must be filed with the Internal Revenue Service by January 31 of the following year. Reports should be on Internal Revenue Service Form 943—showing each employee's name, social security number, and amount paid. The report should be accompanied by tax withheld from employee's pay and matched by employer.

To be sure which employees to report, Mr. Talbot recommends keeping records on anyone working for you in your agricultural business.

The Texas Highway Department is planning the improvement of State Highway 158, from U.S. Highway 87 at Sterling City, Northeast 6.4 miles. Improvements will consist of complete reconstruction of the existing highway. The existing alignment will be relocated where considered necessary and the new right-of-way will vary in width from 100 to approximately 200 feet as needed.

Maps and other drawings showing the proposed location and geometric design and other information about the proposed project are on file and available for inspection and copying at the Resident Engineer's Office at Sterling City, Texas. Also the drawings showing the proposed geometric designs have been placed on file with Sterling County at Sterling City.

Information about the tentative schedules for acquisition of right-of-way and construction can be obtained at the Resident Engineer's Office.

Any interested citizen may request that a public hearing be held covering the social, economic and environmental effects of the proposed location and design for this highway project by delivering a written request to the Resident Engineer's Office on or before April 2, 1971.

In the event such a request is received, a public hearing will be scheduled and adequate notice will be publicized about the date and location of the hearing.

Social Security Tips

INCREASED SOCIAL SECURITY CHECKS DUE

First checks to include the new 10 percent monthly benefit increase authorized in legislation acted upon this week by Congress will reach 26 million social security beneficiaries on June 3. Robert M. Ball, Commissioner of Social Security, said today that the regular June 3 checks covering benefits for the month of May will reflect the new higher amount. Separate checks, scheduled to reach beneficiaries later in June, will cover the amount of the increase for the months of January through April. Ball emphasized that social security beneficiaries do not need to get in touch with a social security office to get the checks. The payments will be mailed to beneficiaries automatically.

"Processing time can be cut in half if people are prepared when the time comes to apply for social security benefits," says J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

Being prepared is not as difficult as many people believe. Remember to take along your social security card or the card of the person on whose record you are filing. For a widow, this would be the social security card of her late husband. This may sound hard to believe, but many people do come in to file their application and leave their number at home.

The next most important document to take with you is your birth certificate, if available. Proof of age is needed to qualify for nearly all social security benefits. If your birth was recorded when you were born or if you were baptized before age five, you will need one of these documents. If you don't have a copy, make arrangements now to get one, Mr. Talbot advises.

If you birth was not recorded and you were not baptized before age five, there are other documents you can use. In most cases, the earlier the record was made the better it is for helping to establish your date of birth.

The third thing that is needed in all claims is evidence of the worker's last year's earnings and an estimate of this year's earnings. Your W-2 Form or tax return for last year will give the information for last year. Be sure to bring these with you.

"If I apply for disability benefits, do I have to be examined by a social security doctor before I can get any checks?" This is a question frequently asked when disabled workers claim social security disability insurance benefits.

J. M. Talbot, social security manager, says the social security law requires the applicant to supply the medical records on his condition. When you apply for benefits, you must provide a report from your attending doctor or hospital.

Information from the attending doctor and the hospital is generally all that is needed. However, in some instances, a specialist's report may be necessary to clarify a question or resolve a borderline situation. You may then be asked to go for a special examination to help provide the extra information.

When you apply for disability benefits, be ready to give the names and addresses of all your sources of medical treatment for your disabling condition.

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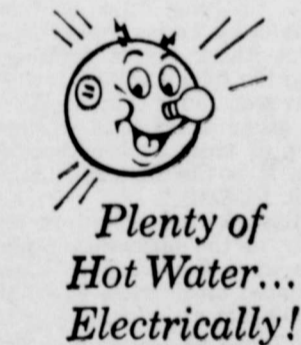

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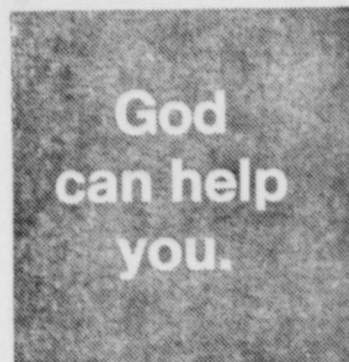

Ten years ago a new concept in family entertainment—a blend of fun and history—was born as SIX FLAGS Over Texas made its debut on what had once been a stretch of Texas ranch land.

New for 1971 is a lively Country and Western music show in the Western Pavilion. Guests can take part in the square dance sequence of the colorful show, "Six Flags Shindig."

Sid and Marty Krofft's popular TV and movie character H. R. Pufnstuf is the star of the new show in the Puppet Theatre.

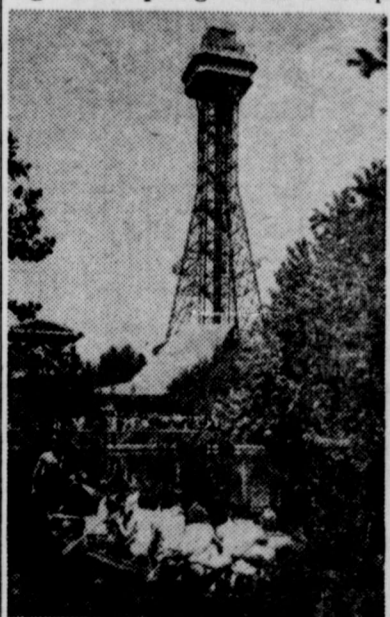
