The situation regarding spraying for the pecan casebearer has not cleared much this week in this area. From reports from other sections of the state, the situation throughout the state is also somewhat muddled.

Cool nights are affecting the emergence from the pupae stage of this insect. In many areas, the emergence has been very slow. Here, we have not found any pupae in the bands on the trees in John Brock's orchard as of this writing—Thursday morning. In areas where they have had emergence, they are setting this weekend as the first spray date for areas similar to ours.

It appears that this will be a difficult year for casebearer control. The emergence from the pupae is taking longer than usual and is strung out over a longer usual period of time. Also, the emergence through strung out is greater than normal also.

The entomologists feel that this year it will take more than the usual number of sprays to get control of this pest. Also, Sevin has been removed from the insecticides approved for use on pecans due to abeling technicality. The approved insecticides include Malathion, Toxaphene, or Nicotine Sulfate, and others such as Parathion, Endosulfan, and Guhion which should be used by trained, commercial operators only.

MEDICARE'S PREMIUMS INCREASE

Because of increased medical costs, Medicare's medical insurance premium will be increased from \$5.30 to \$5.60 per month effective July 1, 1971, according to J. M. Talbot, social security manager. Those who are enrolled in the medical insurance program and who receive social security, railroad retirement, or a federal civil service pension simply have the premium deducted from their checks. People not receiving one of these payments must pay their premiums direct.

Mr. Talbot said, "Even with the impending premium increase, Medicare's medical insurance is still considered a good buy for those age 65 and over. The federal government pays one-half the cost of this insurance from general tax revenues. Those covered by medical insurance will be receiving \$11.20 worth of insurance for \$5.60."

Medical insurance helps pay for a variety of medical services including doctor bills, ambulance service, outpatient hospital treatment, and durable medical equipment such as wheelchairs or hospital beds.

Mr. Talbot stressed that the premium applies only to medical insurance. Hospital insurance, which pays the inpatient hospital service, is financed by social security payroll contributions.

AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Soon to be decided in the Congress is the extent to which the Space Program will be carried on.

The program, as we have known it, is being phased out. In front of us is the Sky Lab Program, which is a space station to be placed in low-earth orbit. It will contain life-support systems and other facilities to accommodate as many as three astronauts at all times. First the laboratory will be placed in orbit and then a space vehicle will join it with the astronauts transferring to the laboratory to stay for 28 days. The second crew will be launched to remain 56 days and later on a third crew will stay for a longer period not yet determined.

Following the sky lab is the space shuttle. Thus far this effort has received little national attention.

The space shuttle is exactly what the name implies — a system for shuttling people and things in and out of space, using the same vehicle again and again in a manner similar to the handling of aircraft.

By using the same vehicle, costs should be reduced for placing a payload in orbit from about \$1,000 per pound to about \$100 per pound. Today's satellites, like the boosters which place them in orbit, are expendable.

The shuttle system can play a key role in our national defense by affording operational assignments but requiring human on-the-spot judgement not possible by unmanned vehicles. From the beginning of time man has looked to the high ground for his protection. In ancient times castles were built on hills. The high grounds are the sites for firebases in South Vietnam.

In modern times air power has been the key to victory. In the future, we can expect the nation that controls space to control the area below. While we have no desire to control any area except our own, certainly this control should not be handed to another world power which could determine our national survival.

Some people have looked upon the Space Program as a tremendous fireworks display where after the flame and thunder fade away, nothing remains but an exciting memory. Actually our scientists continue to assess the benefits already gained from space experiments. Weather satellites report on conditions throughout the world which have permitted more accurate forecasts of storm warnings than has ever been known. Satellites show patterns of plant and crop diseases better than can be observed on the ground. They have been able to locate ore deposits, expand communications and benefit medical research to the point that there are people livink today because of discoveries made

in space research. New materials have been developed that are almost impervious to heat, cold and erosion and stronger than any other material ever known.

The spin-off of accomplishments in these scientific advances are still being catalogued by the experts.

Comparative costs can be misleading but the fact is that only 1.4 percent of the total Government budget is devoted to the Space Program. Another way of putting it, if the entire cost of the Space Program was distributed among our population, it would amount to less than the price of two loaves of bread each.

The value of space exploration is sometimes assessed by the number and weight of rocks brought back from the moon. The value, however, has not been in the riches found in space but in the wealth of knowledge accumulated in getting there. This now is being put to practical use in about every field of human endeavor — from manufacturing to farming to national defense.

Just as England's position of world power diminished with the disintegration of her sea power, so America stands the chance of having her position eroded if we fail to maintain air and space superiority.

America no longer dominates the markets of the world. Other nations with lower labor costs have adopted our mass production techniques and now produce and undersell us with products as good as our own. Our advantage today lies more in brainpower than in industrial advantages. If we are to maintain a competitive position, the right decisions must be made for charting our destiny as a world power but more importantly to protect our survival as a Nation.

For Social Security WHO MUST FILE SOCIAL SECURITY EARNINGS REPORT

Most social security beneficiaries who earned over \$1680 in 1970 are required to file a report of their earnings with the Social Security Administration by April 15, 1971. This report is in addition to any Federal or State tax return, and it must be filed with the Social Security Administration, according to J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

Beneficiaries who were 72 years old in all months of last year are not required to file the annual report of earnings. Disabled beneficiaries should report immediately if they become self-employed or take a job. All other beneficiaries, including families of disabled persons, are under the retirement test and must report their earnings annually.

The purpose of social security benefits is to replace earnings lost due to retirement, death, or disability. If an individual continues to earn a substantial amount — \$1680 or more — some adjustment is made in the amount of his benefits. One dollar for every two dollars earned between \$1680 and \$2880 is withheld. If a individual earns over \$2880, he gives up a dollar for each dollar earned over \$2880 regardless of the amount of yearly earnings. A beneficiary is entitled to his full social security check for any month in which he does not earn over \$140 and is not self-employed. The annual report will allow us to determine whether or not additional benefits are payable.

CHECK YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY RECORD

"How do I know my work under social security is being credited to my record, and how do I find out about it? This is one of the questions most frequently asked," says J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

In explaining the process involved in reporting social security, Mr. Talbot said, "When you work for wages, your employer deducts social security tax from your paycheck each pay day. At the end of each calendar quarter, he submits your name and number with payment for these taxes to Internal Revenue. Internal Revenue forwards copies to social security's main office in Baltimore, Maryland. Your wages are then posted to your record. The same process is followed for a self-employed person except that his earnings are recorded yearly."

Mr. Talbot states that the possibility of an error being made in the process does exist. He recommends that you request a statement of your earnings at least every three years.

All you have to do to secure the statement is to send a post card request available at your social security office to Baltimore, Maryland. If the reply you receive is incorrect in any way, contact the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris Avenue (P. O. Box 3808) in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area.

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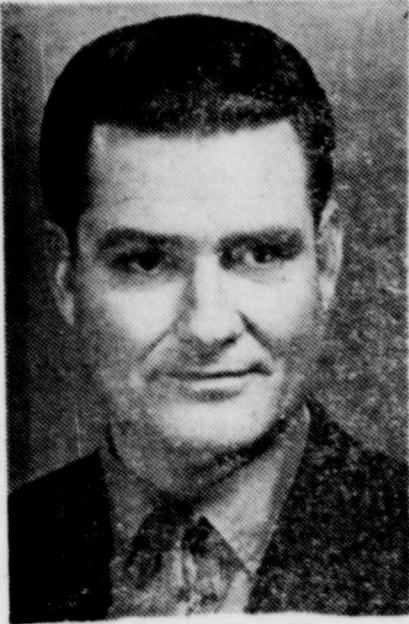

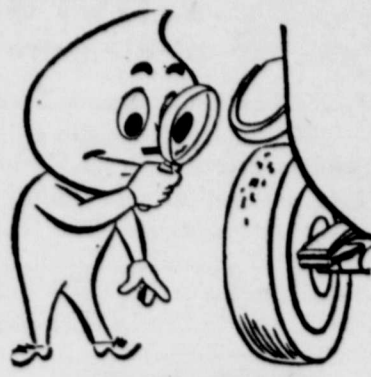

LARGER SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFITS IN JUNE

Social security beneficiaries will begin receiving 10% larger benefits in June, according to J. M. Talbot, social security manager. Although the recently enacted social security increase is effective January 1, 1971, necessary processing of the increase will delay actual payment of it until June, Mr. Talbot explained. The June payment will reflect the increased benefit for May, and a separate check later that month will cover the increase due for January through April, he said.

The congressional action raises the minimum lump sum death payment made by social security also, Mr. Talbot stated. Effective March 1, that payment goes from \$192 to \$211.20. Before January 1 of this year, social security maximum family benefits ranged from a low of \$96 to a high of \$434.40. The recent social security amendments increased these figures to range from \$105.60 to a high of \$517.00.

"Social security beneficiaries need take no action to receive the higher payments," Mr. Talbot explained. "Their higher benefits will be paid to them automatically."

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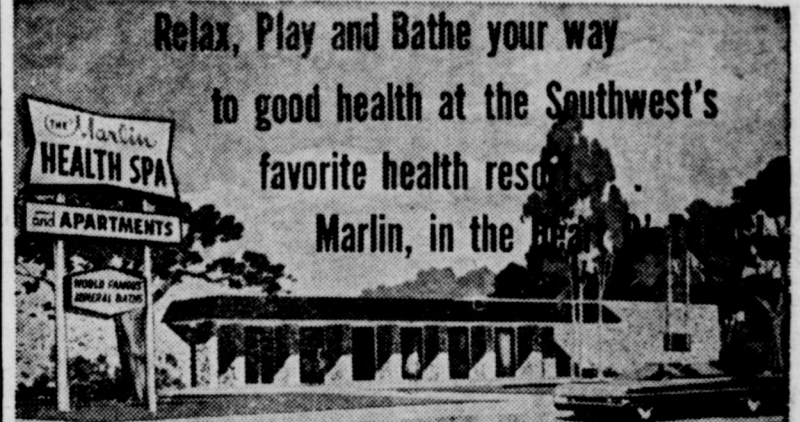
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
