## Highway 158 Work Begun

The Texas Highway Department has announced a new construction project on State Highway 158, 4 miles west of Sterling City. The construction will consist of widening the North Concho River bridge and approaches. The contractor, Ferrier Brother Bridge Company of Seymour, stated that construction began June 14, 1971 and they estimate the work to be completed by September, 1971.

H. L. Bailey, Supervising Resident Engineer, in charge of construction on this project, explained that traffic will be routed over the existing bridge during the widening process. Although traffic will continue to use the existing bridge and pavement at all times, motorists should use extreme caution while passing the construction area which will be zoned for a maximum speed of 45 miles per hour. Cooperation of the public is requested in obeying all traffic signals, warning signs, and speed zones.

The undergraduate honor is awarded students who have excelled academically. Recipients must earn at least a 3.25 grade point ratio (out of a possible 4.0) during the grade period.

In addition to a 3.25 or higher GPR, a student qualifying for "Distinguished Student" honors must have been enrolled in a minimum of 12 hours and have no grade lower than a C.

"Distinguished Student" ranking is limited to 10 percent of Texas A&M's undergraduate enrollment.

Lanny Henniger, minister of the Richland Hills Church of Christ in Fort Worth, will return to Sterling City for an eight-day gospel meeting June 20-27. Henniger is a native of Baytown, Texas, graduated from A.C.C. in 1956 and has done graduate work there and at Texas Christian University. Having served as a local preacher in Odessa for a number of years until 1966, Mr. Henniger moved to Fort Worth where he continues his present work.

"We are really fortunate to be able to have Lanny with us," Pat Brooks, local minister, said. Demands for him as a speaker and lecturer are great." He has preached in special religious services in several states. In 1969 he was featured in a series held in both England and Scotland and has appeared on lecture-ship programs of six Christian colleges. He has written for Power for Today and 20th Century Christian. During his Odessa ministry Henniger spoke on a five-minute daily television program.

Returning after a meeting held here in 1967, he will speak at both the 11:00 A.M. and 7:00 P.M. Sunday services and twice daily Mon.-Fri. at 7:00 A.M. and 8:00 P.M. (Sat. 8:00 P.M.)

A special feature during this year's meeting will be the presentation of the talented Bel Canto Singers of Boles Home Thursday evening. These young musicians are highly trained and will present a varied program of inspirational hymns, gospel songs, and stirring spirituals. The chorus is currently on its 21st annual summer tour. It has appeared in 46 states, Canada and Mexico under the sponsorship of churches of Christ. All ages will be inspired by the songs performed by these teenagers.

The climax of the church's June meeting is homecoming. "This day is always a big one," said Brooks. "We expect the largest turnout ever the 27th, and as all will attest who have attended previous homecomings, ample provision is always made, both in physical and spiritual realms."

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**For Social Security**

**WHO MUST FILE SOCIAL SECURITY EARNINGS REPORT**

Most social security beneficiaries who earned over \$1680 in 1970 are required to file a report of their earnings with the Social Security Administration by April 15, 1971. This report is in addition to any Federal or State tax return, and it must be filed with the Social Security Administration, according to J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

Beneficiaries who were 72 years old in all months of last year are not required to file the annual report of earnings. Disabled beneficiaries should report immediately if they become self-employed or take a job. All other beneficiaries, including families of disabled persons, are under the retirement test and must report their earnings annually.

The purpose of social security benefits is to replace earnings lost due to retirement, death, or disability. If an individual continues to earn a substantial amount — \$1680 or more — some adjustment is made in the amount of his benefits. One dollar for every two dollars earned between \$1680 and \$2880 is withheld. If a individual earns over \$2880, he gives up a dollar for each dollar earned over \$2880 regardless of the amount of yearly earnings. A beneficiary is entitled to his full social security check for any month in which he does not earn over \$140 and is not self-employed. The annual report will allow us to determine whether or not additional benefits are payable.

**CHECK YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY RECORD**

"How do I know my work under social security is being credited to my record, and how do I find out about it? This is one of the questions most frequently asked," says J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

In explaining the process involved in reporting social security, Mr. Talbot said, "When you work for wages, your employer deducts social security tax from your paycheck each pay day. At the end of each calendar quarter, he submits your name and number with payment for these taxes to Internal Revenue. Internal Revenue forwards copies to social security's main office in Baltimore, Maryland. Your wages are then posted to your record. The same process is followed for a self-employed person except that his earnings are recorded yearly."

Mr. Talbot states that the possibility of an error being made in the process does exist. He recommends that you request a statement of your earnings at least every three years.

All you have to do to secure the statement is to send a post card request available at your social security office to Baltimore, Maryland. If the reply you receive is incorrect in any way, contact the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris Avenue (P. O. Box 3808) in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area.

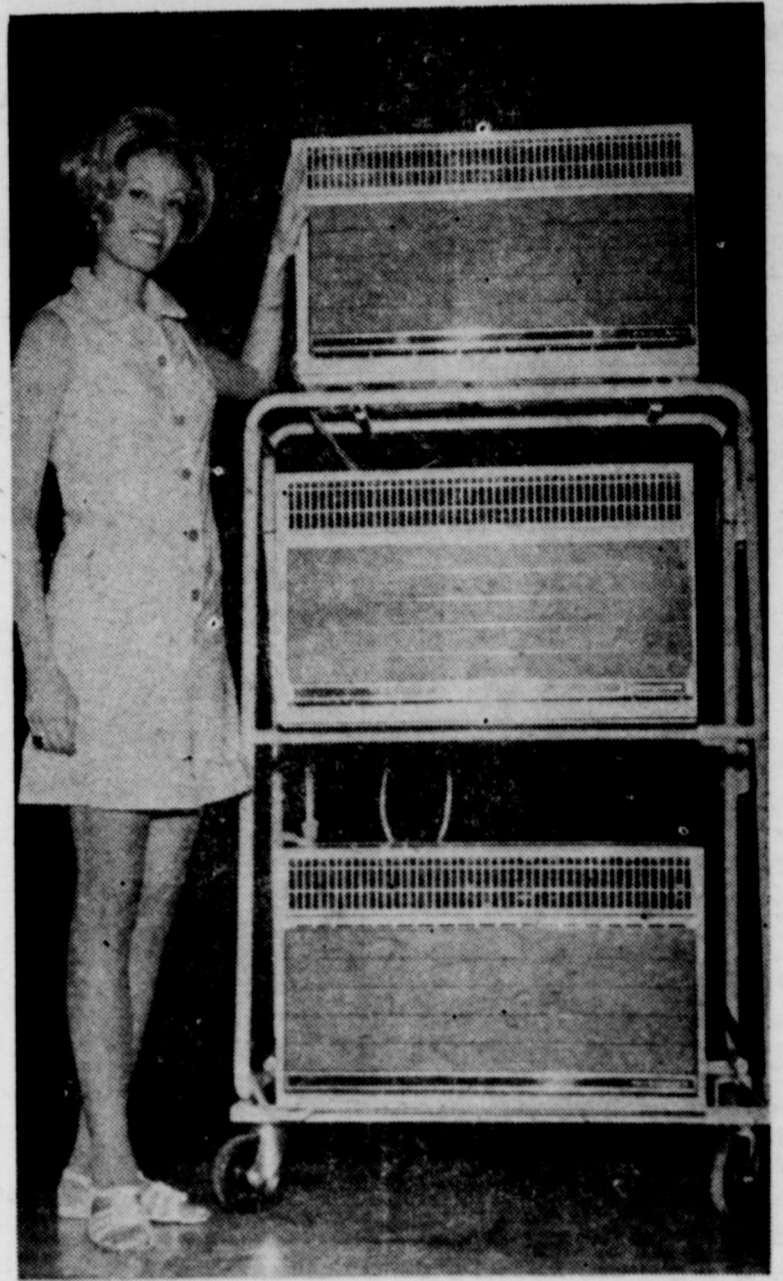

Allen Price showed the grand champion wool fleece of the Sonora Wool Show for the third consecutive year last week. This is the 5th time in the past six years that a Price fleece has been grand champion at Sonora. Frank entered the winning fleece in 1966 and 1967, and Allen won the honor in 1969, 1970, and this year. The winning fleece was from an aged ram and weighed in at 22 pounds.

In the yearling ewe fleece class, Allen had the first and second place fleeces while Frank entered the third and sixth place fleeces. Foster S. Price had the fifth place fleece. Allen entered the first and fourth place aged ewe fleeces; Frank had the second and third place entries, and Foster had the fifth and sixth place entries. Allen had the first place yearling ram fleece and the first and second place aged ram fleeces. The aged ram fleece was judged champion range fleece before being selected grand champion.

Burlington Industries bought all the show fleeces that the owners wanted to sell for 30c per pound. The Prices brought all the first and second place fleeces home for entry in the Kansas City or Denver Wool shows.

Today, Friday June 18, is the last day for getting in your ballots on the new promotion agreement between the American Sheep Producers Council and the Secretary of Agriculture. The ballots must be delivered to the local ASCS offices today or postmarked today if they are to be counted.

The agreement provides for the Secretary of Agriculture to withhold a part of the support payments to producers on shorn wool and unshorn lambs marketed during 1971, 1972, and 1973. This agreement in effect since 1954, provides for withholding 1 1/2 cents per pound of shorn wool and 7 1/2 cents per hundredweight on unshorn lambs. The funds are used for two programs—one for wool promotion and one for lamb promotion. The wool promotion program is on a national basis while the lamb promotion program is concentrated in high lamb consuming areas as well as on a national scale.

Each producer is urged to vote according to his feelings on this referendum. The agreement becomes effective if two-thirds of the total number of producers, or two-thirds of the total volume of production represented in the referendum approve the de-

**AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE**

Washington, D. C.—There was a time when golfers went to the course to forget about everything except to keep the head down, a straight left arm on the back swing, shift weight to the left side on down-swing and carry the club through with a high finish.

Now worries are besetting some older clubs and their members with courses closed in with building developments. The space is needed for other things, some say, (other than golfers.) but there are other problems too.

Pending lawsuits allege that it is discriminatory to limit or qualify memberships or to charge fees of any kind. Contention is made that golf courses are public responsibility and should be publicly owned and operated as a service.

Safety on the golf course is getting attention too. Several years ago someone came up with statistics to show that in proportion to the number of players, golf was the most hazardous of all American sports. Doubts on such a conclusion are, of course, in order. As recalled, included in the statistics were heart failures, lightning and probably apoplexy following a slice or a missed putt.

The National Safety Council now adds a dimension not present a few years ago—the unsafe golf cart. The National Safety Council confidently predicts "several thousand" injuries from golf cart accidents during the summer season.

The Council calls the carts "a safety problem that warrants attention." It says that many carts are unstable and roll over while traversing slopes on the bias and others lose their brakes completely, crash into players, other carts, trees and fences, resulting in some serious injuries.

America being what it is, there is, of course, an American Golf Car Association. It claims to be working on the safety problem right at this minute. According to their report they are financing a study on proposed new standards to provide greater cart safety.

Safety, though, is not really the thing that sort of saddens the heart about all this. It is rather the idea that grown men can't use a little common sense for their own protection. If everything is going to be fixed up where no judgment is necessary, then the golfer should also be forbidden to take a shower before changing into his other clothes. Just let him smell like a golfer, whether he plays well or not! Aah then too, there is that 19th hole which could hold some hazards. Better, maybe he should give up golf for croquet. (There are probably records to show some nasty falls over wickets. Everybody is in the act some way or other. The Transportation Department doesn't want under 21 year olds to drive farm trucks on the highway. It proposes that those who do be required to have a medical certificate not more than 24 months old and to pass a Federal written test.

We could live without the pleasant, quiet, natural activity of the golf course—but not as well. Many farmers or ranchers would be in pretty bad shape if their boys are prohibited in operating trucks and tractors. There's not much future in croquet if it's depended on for a living.
