John Brock exhibited the first place San Saba Improved Pecan at the State Pecan Show held in Austin the latter part of July. The show was held in conjunction with the 50th anniversary meeting of the Texas Pecan Growers Association.

The San Saba variety, entered by John and judged best in the state by the judges, had previously been first place winner in the Tom Green County Pecan Show last December. It was second in its class at the regional show in Abilene, last December. Congratulations to John.

In the lightest pecan class at the state show a Junction resident took first place honors. The entry required 907 pecans to make a one pound entry. At the other extreme it required 28 Mahons to make a one pound entry in the largest pecan class.

Locally, the pecan crop is going to be on the short side this year. The late freeze in early May killed many of the buds and set back the entire crop. Shucks are beginning to split already on some of the nuts. Usually, the San Saba variety is one of the first to do so, but John says his Western Schleys are ahead of the San Sabas this year.

The number of confirmed screwworm cases increased rapidly in the Trans-Pecos and Hill Country areas of Texas in recent weeks. During the three week period, August 29—September 18, eighty-two cases were confirmed in Texas. During the same period in 1970, twenty-eight cases were confirmed and in 1969 only three cases were confirmed.

In the Trans-Pecos and Hill Country, Val Verde County reported 20 cases, Kinney County 13, San Saba 8, Lampasas 7, and Crockett, Edwards, Presidio and Uvalde Counties had three each. Our neighboring county, Irion had two cases.

Early fall historically is one of the worst seasons for screwworm outbreaks. Rain and warm temperatures are favorable now for this pest. All producers are urged to double their vigilance and use recommended preventative practices. Mail in samples of all worms; if mailing vials are needed, they are available in the county agent's office and also at the feed store here—Stockman's Supply. Sterling County has recorded no confirmed cases this year but with all the activity around the area, continued vigilance is necessary.

Conditions are very favorable for an outbreak of the walnut caterpillars which prefer the pecan's foliage. Some neighboring counties have had large outbreaks of these pests recently. The caterpillars hit the ends of a limb in large numbers, strip off the leaf surfaces, and move on to another branch.

Control measures are very effective against these pests. Malathion or Sevin do a very good job. Use either 1½ table spoons of the 80% wettable Sevin powder or two table spoons of the 50% wettable Sevin per three gallons of water; three tablespoons of 25% wettable Malathion in three gallons of water is also effective.

Locals Attend Hospital Seminar

San Angelo—Mr. Pat Brooks, Sterling Church of Christ, Rev. Harold Orr, First Methodist Church, Rev. Charles A. Tucker, First Presbyterian Church, and the Rev. Andy Daniels, of the First Baptist Church of Sterling, attended a one-day seminar at the St. John's Hospital here Wednesday, September 29.

The seminar entitled "The Role of the Clergyman in the Diagnosed and Treatment of the Hospitalized Sick" was organized by the St. John's medical and nursing staff to better acquaint clergymen of all faiths with the need of the patient for a coordinated approach by medical personnel and the clergy in time of illness.

Featured speakers on the program were Dr. Wade Lewis of San Antonio, medical director of Villa Rosa Psychiatric and Rehabilitation Center and Dr. William O'Zee, Angelo State University dean of students.

Dr. Lewis discussed recognition of anger in patients, while Dr. O'Zee explored the patient's family's problems and interview actions.

Oil Production Is Significant Here

Petroleum production continues to play a significant role in the economy of Sterling County with a direct input of \$7,377,608 last year.

According to the latest compilation of Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Assn., the county in 1970 produced 1,999,879 barrels of crude oil valued at \$6,599,601 and 5,328,816 thousand cubic feet of natural gas valued at \$788,007. It ranked 112th in value of petroleum produced.

In addition, the county received the stimulation of \$922,201 in royalty payments to landowners and others with mineral interests.

"Sterling was one of 187 Texas counties that had petroleum production valued at more than \$125,000", says Kenneth E. Montague, Texas Mid-Continent president.

Its ability to produce helped Texas meet a record demand with record production of both oil and gas in 1970. This demand has again diminished Texas petroleum reserves as additions failed to offset withdrawals. In Texas, we only drilled 8,114 wells, the smallest number since 1946.

Texas state government benefited from the county's petroleum, receiving \$303,582 in production taxes on crude oil and \$58,351 on natural gas.

Drilling expenditures in the county totaled \$3,871,213 with \$2,338,214 being lost on dry holes. Drillers completed 10 oil wells, 1 gas well and 17 dry holes. Eight wildcats were drilled with seven of them dry.

Neither team could manage a score in the initial period and it looked like it might be a tough defense game, but the Eagles broke loose for 16 points before halftime and added another 32 before the game was over.

Ray Escobar scrambled 75 yards to paydirt and Bobby Bynum stepped over on the first Eagle scores. Escobar soon collected his second TD on a 29 yard scamper. He also ran over the two extra points.

Jim Kelley intercepted a Sterling pitchout before intermission and ran it back 70 yards for the one Bobcat score. The try for point after TD was no good.

Stering opened up the third period as Bobby Bynum scored on runs of 6 and 12 yards. Ray Escobar picked up the two extra points as he ran back one of the PAT attempts. The other fell short. Charley Lyons of Smyer was thrown for a safety by Dwayne Davis in the third quarter.


Conference play starts on October 14 with a game at Gail with the Borden County Coyotes.

Social Security Tips CHECK YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY RECORD

"How do I know my work under social security is being credited to my record, and how do I find out about it? This is one of the questions most frequently asked," says J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

In explaining the process involved in reporting social security, Mr. Talbot said, "When you work for wages, your employer deducts social security tax from your paycheck each pay day. At the end of each calendar quarter, he submits your name and number with payment for these taxes to Internal Revenue. Internal Revenue forwards copies to social security's main office in Baltimore, Maryland. Your wages are then posted to your record. The same process is followed for a self-employed person except that his earnings are recorded yearly."

Mr. Talbot states that the possibility of an error being made in the process does exist. He recommends that you request a statement of your earnings at least every three years.

All you have to do to secure the statement is to send a post card request available at your social security office to Baltimore, Maryland. If the reply you receive is incorrect in any way, contact the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris Avenue (P. O. Box 3808) in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area.

Each calendar quarter, the Social Security Administration receives employer reports of earnings showing incorrect social security numbers of employees, according to J.M. Talbot, social security manager. These incorrect reports, in many cases, happen when a girl has married but does not have her name changed on social security records.

Mr. Talbot stated that when a girl marries, she should complete a 'Request for Change in Social Security Record' form. After completing the form and returning it to the social security office with her old card, she will be issued a new social security card with the same number but showing the new name.

If the name and number reported by an employer do not match the name and number on file with the Social Security Administration, the earnings might not get to the proper account. This could result in a later loss of social security benefits or in a smaller benefit being paid.

"Did you know that if you operate any type of agricultural business, the hired workers you have in that business may be covered by social security?" J. M. Talbot, social security manager, asks.

Any employee who works and earns \$150 or more for one employer during any year or works at least 20 days on a time basis for an agriculture business, is covered by social security. Even part-time employees could meet the earnings or work test. You, as their employer, would be liable to withhold social security tax from the employee's check, match that tax yourself, and report the earnings at the end of the year. The report of agricultural employees must be filed with the Internal Revenue Service by January 31 of the following year. Reports should be on Internal Revenue Service Form 943—showing each employee's name, social security number, and amount paid. The report should be accompanied by tax withheld from employee's pay and matched by employer.

To be sure which employees to report, Mr. Talbot recommends keeping records on anyone working for you in your agricultural business.
