Four Sterling County 4-H Club members showed eight market lambs in the market lamb show at Fort Worth on Friday of last week. One of the lambs placed in the singles class of the show. Lisa Horwood had the twenty-fifth place Southdown lamb of the show. The lamb was bred by Tommy Augustine of Water Valley. Other club members showing lambs were Melinda Terry, Larry Horwood and Lenard Horwood.

Amy Hodges showed her Rambouillet in the Junior Rambouillet Show Saturday morning. She had the reserve champion ram of the show. In the individual classes, Amy had the second and fourth place ram lambs; she also had the second and fourth place yearling rams. Amy's ewe lambs placed first and second while her yearling ewes placed third and fourth. She had the first place exhibitor's flock of four head.

For some reason in the results of the open Rambouillet on Tuesday, February 1, the results as given in all the newspaper accounts as well as the radio, took away one of Amy's champion banners. She had the champion ram, the champion ewe, and the reserve champion ewe of the show. By some method, all the news media gave credit for the champion ewe to another exhibitor. Amy won in all the ewe classes in the open show which guaranteed her the champion ewe. This portion of the results was given correctly in all the accounts but somewhere in the reporting, the champion banner was credited elsewhere.

A number of 4-H Club members will be participating in the San Antonio Livestock Exposition this week with a variety of livestock. Club members have entered six market steers, eight market lambs, twenty registered Rambouillet, and one Charolais heifer in the competition.

Amy Hodges has entered one Charolais steer in the carcass steer show on Wednesday of this week. The steer will be judged on hoof Wednesday with the top five steers in the class being slaughtered and the carcasses entered in competition Friday.

Amy also has a Hereford steer entered in the junior steer show on Saturday along with the Charolais if he is not slaughtered. Becky Hodges has a Hereford steer in competition on Saturday. Lisa Horwood has a Hereford steer and a Charolais steer in the show also. Another Hereford steer has been entered by Larry Horwood.

The eight market lambs are entered by Patti Bynum, Amy Hodges, Becky Hodges, and Freddie Thompson. They will show on Saturday also.

Amy and Becky also have Rambouillet entered in the show. Becky has four rams and four ewes entered in the junior show which will be judged at 8:00 A. M. Tuesday, February 15. The open Rambouillet show will be judged at 10:00 A. M. the same date; Amy has six rams and six ewes entered in the show.

Sterling City FFA members exhibited 37 market lambs and 3 registered Rambouillet in the Junior Show of the Fort Worth Livestock Show Feb. 4 and 5.

Jim Terry had the champion crossbred lamb of the junior show. He went on to show the lamb for the grand champion crossbred and other breeds against the three first place winners of open lamb show. Jim's lamb won out over the champion Corriedale, champion Dorset and champion other crosses and purebreds. The lamb sold in the premium sale Saturday for \$500.

Sterling City FFA members exhibited the first place pen of 15 finewool lambs and the first place pen of crossbred lambs of the show for the second year in a row.

Members exhibiting lambs in the show were Brandt Badger, Skeete Foster, Jeff Cantrell, Robert Bliznak, Allen Price, Jim Terry, Steven Foster, Tommy Bynum, Lee Igo, and Carl Igo. Lee and Carl Igo exhibited their registered Rambouillet also.

Placings in the finewool class were—Lee Igo 5th, Allen Price 17th and 19th, Carl Igo 20th and 29th, Brandt Badger 21st, Robert Bliznak 32nd, Jeff Cantrell 44th and Steven Foster 51st.

Placings in the finewool, crossbred class were—Jim Terry 1st, Lee Igo 5th and 12th, Carl Igo 11th and 46th, Tommy Bynum 18th and 42nd, Allen Price 22nd and 28th.

Jim Terry also had a 34th place medium wool lamb. Jim's champion lamb was bred by his father, I.W. Terry.

Lee and Carl Igo had 3rd and 5th ram lambs, 5th yearling ram, 3rd and 4th ewe lambs, 5th and 7th yearling ewes, and second exhibitors flock which consists of two ewe lambs, two yearling ewes, and one ram, lamb or yearling age.

The 31 lambs in the sale will bring \$53.20 per hundred pounds. The total from sale of the 31 lambs and the prize money will amount to approximately \$2,350.00.

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## For Social Security CHECK YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY RECORD

"How do I know my work under social security is being credited to my record, and how do I find out about it? This is one of the questions most frequently asked," says J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

In explaining the process involved in reporting social security, Mr. Talbot said, "When you work for wages, your employer deducts social security tax from your paycheck each pay day. At the end of each calendar quarter, he submits your name and number with payment for these taxes to Internal Revenue. Internal Revenue forwards copies to social security's main office in Baltimore, Maryland. Your wages are then posted to your record. The same process is followed for a self-employed person except that his earnings are recorded yearly."

Mr. Talbot states that the possibility of an error being made in the process does exist. He recommends that you request a statement of your earnings at least every three years.

All you have to do to secure the statement is to send a post card request available at your social security office to Baltimore, Maryland. If the reply you receive is incorrect in any way, contact the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris Avenue (P. O. Box 3808) in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area.

Each calendar quarter, the Social Security Administration receives employer reports of earnings showing incorrect social security numbers of employees, according to J.M. Talbot, social security manager. These incorrect reports, in many cases, happen when a girl has married but does not have her name changed on social security records.

Mr. Talbot stated that when a girl marries, she should complete a 'Request for Change in Social Security Record' form. After completing the form and returning it to the social security office with her old card, she will be issued a new social security card with the same number but showing the new name.

If the name and number reported by an employer do not match the name and number on file with the Social Security Administration, the earnings might not get to the proper account. This could result in a later loss of social security benefits or in a smaller benefit being paid.

"Did you know that if you operate any type of agricultural business, the hired workers you have in that business may be covered by social security?" J. M. Talbot, social security manager, asks.

Any employee who works and earns \$150 or more for one employer during any year or works at least 20 days on a time basis for an agriculture business, is covered by social security. Even part-time employees could meet the earnings or work test. You, as their employer, would be liable to withhold social security tax from the employee's check, match that tax yourself, and report the earnings at the end of the year.

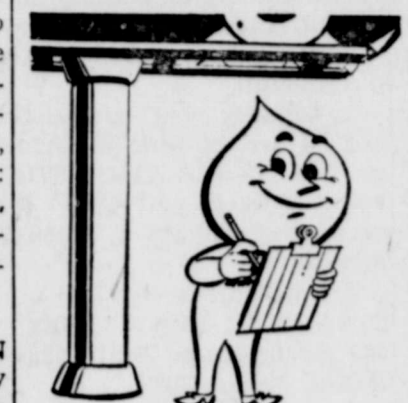
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**DISABLED WIDOWS BENEFITS**

"Two years have passed and many persons are still not aware of the change in the social security law which provides monthly benefits for disabled widows at age 50," said J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

Since the law became effective in February, 1968, more than 32,000 disabled widows have qualified for monthly payments, Mr. Talbot estimated however that another 30,000 widows who might qualify for these benefits have never applied.

"The requirements for disabled widows' benefits are apparently not as well known as those for the more familiar widows' benefits at age 62, or reduced widows' benefits at age 60," Mr. Talbot continued.

To qualify for benefits a widow, age 50 to 60, must have an impairment so severe that it keeps her from engaging in any work. The condition must also be expected to last for at least twelve months.

The widow's disability must have begun before her husband's death or not later than seven years after his death. A widow who has previously been entitled to benefits if she becomes disabled before payments to the children end or within seven years after they end.

**Register to Vote Now REGISTER TO VOTE; IT'S NOT TOO LATE**

Austin, Texas — There has been some confusion relating to registration deadlines under the new registration system imposed by S.B. 51. As all our former directives have pointed out, **REGISTRATION NEVER CLOSES.** It will NOT cease on January 31 as it has in past years. Those persons who have registered by that time will appear on the initial list of registered voters. Those persons registering after January 31 will appear on supplemental lists, which will be prepared 20 days prior to an election. Every person who submits an application to the Tax Assessor-Collector or a duly appointed deputy at least 30 days prior to an election will appear on either the original or supplemental lists which will be sent to the polls. Every person who registers as of April 5, 1972, will be eligible to vote in the May 2 primary; likewise, every person who registers by October 7, 1972, will be permitted to vote in the November 7 General Election.

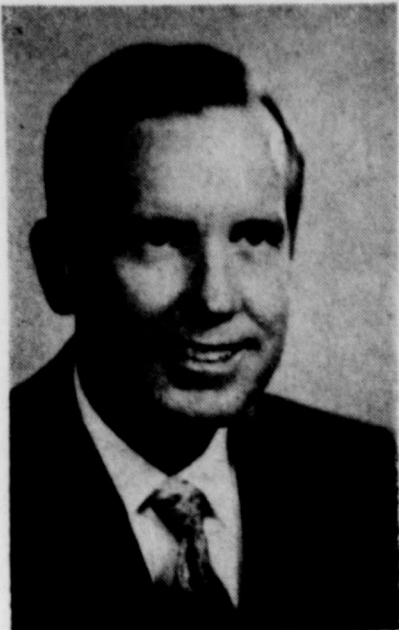
