

## Party Primaries Last Saturday

### 272 Democrats and 9 Republicans Vote

Due to no contested local or precinct races, a light voter turnout marked the Sterling County Democratic and Republican primaries here last Saturday. Only 272 voted in the Democratic primary and 9 in the Republican primary.

On the Republican ballot were referendums concerning daylight savings time and the busing of school children to achieve racial balances. One was for daylight savings time and 8 against. On busing, six were for and three against.

On the ballots, John Tower for the U.S. Senate got all 9 votes; for U.S. Representative Doug Harlan and Pete Williams got 4 each.

For Governor Albert Fay got 4, Joseph Jenkins 2, Hall, McElroy, Grover got 1 each and Reagan 0.

Unopposed Maurice Angly got 9 votes for state treasurer, Jim Segrest 9 for railroad commissioner and Larry Glass 9 for county chairman.

### Methodist Church

The District Superintendent of San Angelo, Rev. Charles Giesler, will preach in the evening service at the United Methodist Church here this Sunday evening at 7:20 p.m. A church conference will follow the service.

At this time, these leaves should not be removed. Many of the trees have been slow to put forth other leaves after the freeze. Since the leaves of the trees take in the carbon dioxide from the air along with other elements and convert it into plant food through a process and then transmit it to the remainder of the trees, these leaves should be left in place. The trees are suffering from the freeze and need every bit of plant food they can get and since the other leaves are slow to put out, this is the one 'factory' they have. The trees will appear trashy this year but this growth can be removed later; some of it may die in time.

Sterling County livestock producers are reminded that this county is among the many counties that have confirmed cases of screwworms this year. Every precaution should be taken to keep from having an outbreak here by checking stock periodically, taking samples of all suspected cases and mailing them to the Mission lab, and treating all wounds.

There have been no cases other than the one confirmed on the Worth Durham ranch on the divide; this was two weeks ago. The case was checked by the inspector, marked for the sterile fly drop, and Co-Ral furnished to spray exposed animals.

### GOOD RAINS HERE

Last Saturday about six o'clock heavy showers put up to 4.6 inches of rain in more favored spots in Sterling and practically missed some areas altogether. Then on Monday morning real early showers left .30 inch here in town and again on early Wednesday morning about a tenth of an inch fell.

Cool fronts moving through the state have triggered the rain showers, and caused wind damage in some areas of the state. But, not in Sterling.

The Texas Highway Commission, in their March meeting in Austin, approved the 1973-1974 Consolidated Highway Program.

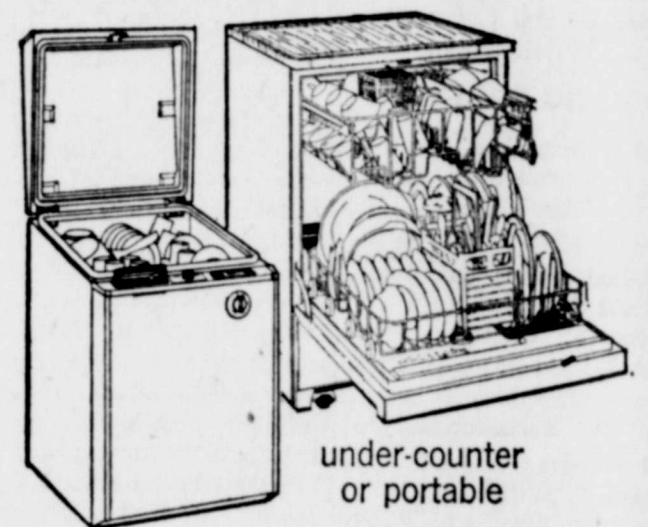

According to a booklet on the subject, they're especially good if you're female, live in a large city in the western or north-eastern part of the U.S., and are the mother of a child under 6 years of age.
