According to information from areas around Sterling County who escaped the March 31 freeze and have a clean crop, now is the time to begin spraying for the pecan casebearer. A few persons are report having a few pecans on their trees and they may want to begin spraying to save those they do have.

A new material is on the market this year for the control of the casebearer and is labeled for use. The new insecticide is known as Zolone. According to the Extension Entomologists, this material will perform as well as any on the market or perhaps even better. Compared to four other materials in tests, it significantly reduced the number of casebearer-infested nut clusters.

The specific recommendations for the use of Zolone call for the use of one and one-third pints Zolone per hundred gallons of water. As with all insecticides, a complete coverage of the trees is necessary.

There is one precaution with the use of this material. Livestock cannot be grazed in orchards treated with Zolone; cover crops such as grass hay harvested from treated groves cannot be fed to stock.

Other recommended insecticides include Malathion at the rate of three pounds of 25% wettable powder or Toxaphene at the rate of five pounds 40% wettable powder to one hundred gallons of water. Servin still has not been cleared for use on pecans.

Last week, a representative of the USDA Animal and Plant Health Service was in the county seeking cooperation in a program to monitor the movement of Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis—better known as VEE (and easier to say and spell). This year, the Animal Health Service is setting up a narrow band of counties north of the 1971 VEE infested area to monitor the possible movement of the disease. The band of counties, about one hundred miles wide, stretches from El Paso to Huntsville; at Huntsville the area runs from Beaumont north to Texarkana along the Louisiana border.

Within the band of counties, veterinarians from the service would like to take blood samples from a number of rural dogs in each county. The disease is spread by mosquitoes and the dogs can be carriers of the disease after being bitten by infected mosquitoes. The blood samples will show if the disease is present. In addition to the dogs, they also plan to work with game wardens and game biologists in securing blood samples from wildlife.

We would like to get as many dogs as possible lined up for the veterinarians to bleed within the next few weeks. If you are not contacted but would like to volunteer your dogs blood for this, please contact me.

The screwworm situation continues to make news. Facing the worst year since the program was initiated in 1962, cases continue to be reported from areas that have not had a case in many years.

The screwworm has moved into Oklahoma where one case was confirmed several weeks

ago. Nearer home, several cases have been confirmed in Mitchell County and one case in Scurry County.

Weather conditions continue to be ideal in many areas. Livestockmen are also reporting that it is difficult to find screwworm-remedy drugs. The veterinary pharmaceutical companies slowed down production throughout the years because the demand for the material was not present. Now, it is needed and it is not available. Many producers here do have some on hand which they are using to treat livestock wounds. Program officials urge that all wounds be treated, that surgery not be performed on livestock unless necessary, and that all livestock be checked for possible cases.

NEWS OF ECOLOGY

SCOUTS GIVE TRASH THE SACK

Three billion dollars! That's the estimated annual bill Americans are paying for public collection and disposal of garbage and solid waste — the third most expensive community service in the land. . . . which is exceeded only by spending for highways and schools.

Concerned citizens, of course, can make significant contributions to cleaning up this national mess. As in Watertown, N. Y., where the initiative of the Environmental Systems Division of St. Regis Paper Company and a local Boy Scout Council is currently leading the way.

Recently, the more than 500 Boy Scouts of Jefferson and Lewis County launched an intensive environmental cleanup campaign to make their community a better place in which to live.

Soliciting the aid of the 30,000 homeowners in their area, the Scouts began their drive with the sale of St. Regis disposable refuse sacks. In addition to their 30-gallon capacity and convenience, these sacks were selected because — unlike plastic sacks — they will break down in sanitary land fill without adding to our ecological problems.

Watertown homeowners who purchase these sacks sepa-

rate paper, cans, rags, metal, returnable bottles and miscellaneous glass. Then, free of charge, the Scouts pick up the differentiated sacks and dispose of them in ways compatible to our ecology. Glass bottles, for example, are sold for recycling; bio-degradable trash is sent to land fill sites. Provi-



sions have even been made to tow away abandoned automobiles.

The best part about the program is that everyone profits. The community gets a cleaner environment; the Scouts get the credit for a job well done — and the modest proceeds from selling the sacks and whatever trash they can. . . . for the support of other worthwhile Scouting programs.

Purchase right of way and construct grading, structures and surfacing on State 158, from Coke County line, west a distance of 6.4 miles. Estimated cost—\$488,000.

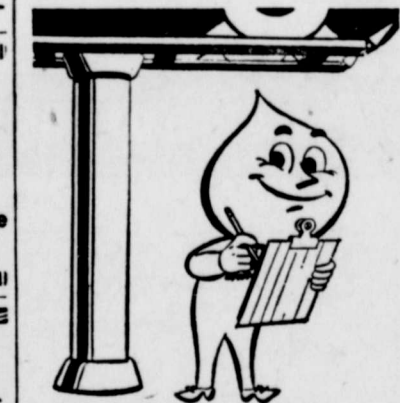

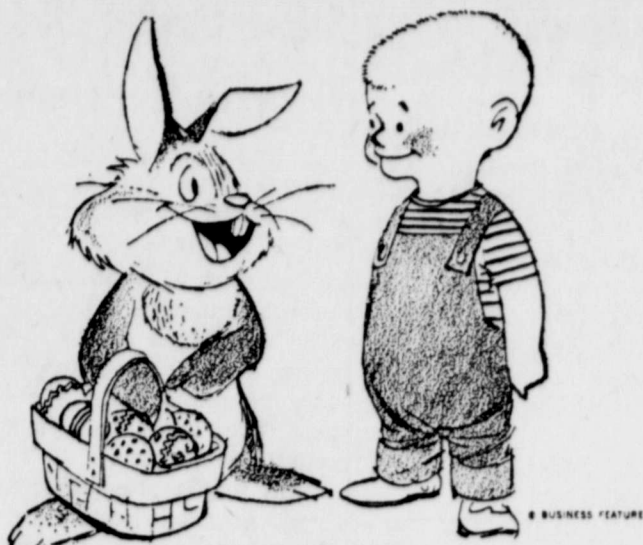

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Voting Laws Explained

AUSTIN — Voters in the June 3 runoff elections were warned Tuesday by Secretary of State Bob Bullock to "stay in the party primary where they voted on May 6."
"Judging from reports several county clerks are receiving, it looks like many Republicans are being tempted to switch over and vote in the Democratic runoff on June 3," Bullock said.

"Every voter needs to know that if they voted in the Republican primary on May 6, they cannot vote in the Democratic runoff. And if they voted Democratic the first time, they cannot switch and vote Republican on June 3.

"We want the public to know that this action violates Article 240 of the Texas Election Code and is punishable by a fine of from \$100 to \$500.

"We know that this type of voting has taken place in the past. A survey by State Senator Oscar Mauzy in 1968 showed that there were some 1,300 crossover voters in his district alone.

"Certainly, any crossover voting would distort the true strength of a candidate in the other party. I think the low-key campaign by the Republicans lends itself to making a Republican want to switch over, if only for excitement's sake.

"We hope that public awareness will discourage this type of voting. If we find that it still takes place, we will have no alternative but to pass this information along to the proper authorities," Bullock said.
"We want election officials to know that there is a law behind them and they should not permit this practice. This will be the only way we can preserve the integrity of the Texas election process."

Bullock said he wanted the voter to know that it is also against the law for a voter to cast a ballot in two different precincts, even within the same party.

"We know that there were instances of this reported during the May 6 primary. Like crossover voting, this dual voting practice is against the law and simply cannot be tolerated.

"I want the local election officials to bear down and make sure this doesn't happen in the runoff," Bullock said.
