## Notice Affording Opportunity for Public Hearing Corridor (Location) and Design (Combined Hearing)

The Texas Highway Department is planning the improvement of State Highway 158 from the Coke County Line, West 6.4 miles. The proposed highway project will not pass through any city or town.

Improvements will consist of complete reconstruction of the existing highway to modern standards. The completed road will have two 13 foot traffic lanes with 9 foot paved shoulders. The existing alignment will be retained and the new right-of-way will have a usual width of 140 feet.

Maps and other drawings showing the proposed location and geometric design, environmental studies, and other information about the proposed project are on file and available for inspection and copying at the Resident Engineer's office at Sterling City, Texas. Also, the drawings showing the proposed geometric design have been placed on file with Sterling County at Sterling City.

There will not be any displacements as a result of acquisition of right-of-way for this project. However, information is available about the State's Relocation Assistance Program as well as information about the tentative schedules for acquisition of right-of-way and construction at the Resident Engineer's Office.

Any interested citizen may request that a public hearing be held covering the social, economic and environmental effects of the proposed location and design for this highway project by delivering a written request to the Resident Engineer's Office on or before July 14, 1972.

In the event such a request is received, a public hearing will be scheduled and adequate notice will be publicized about the date and location of the hearing.

## Pet Rabies Shots Set for Today

The annual rabies shot clinic will be held this afternoon, Friday, June 23, between the hours of 4:00 and 5:30 P. M. on the west side of the courthouse yard. Dr. Percy Turner of Water Valley will be present to give the pet rabies shots. All pets vaccinated last June need to have this shot renewed. In addition, all pets not having had the shots previously need them. Pets over six months of age are protected for one year while those under six months of age receive a shorter immunity.

The shot is the only protection against rabies; if an animal contracts rabies and the disease becomes active in that animal, there is no treatment.

Each year, there is a number of rabid animals in the county. The most common offenders are wildlife—skunks, foxes, and coons. Other cases have been confirmed here in cattle, horses, sheep, cats and dogs in the past.

Dr. W. B. Grene, veterinarian with the Animal Health Division of the USDA, will also be present. Dr. Grene would like to take blood samples from a number of rural dogs to use in the VEE (Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis) monitoring program being conducted in the state to prevent a recurrence of last year's outbreak of the disease.

Under the surveillance program, a narrow band of counties from east to west in Texas has been outlined as the surveillance zone. This zone is beyond where any cases were confirmed last year. Within this band of counties, blood samples are being taken from rural dogs and sent to a laboratory for testing for the presence of the virus. Mosquitos carry the virus and dogs bitten by the mosquitos carrying the virus will carry it in their blood; however, it does not affect the dogs. Since most horses were vaccinated last summer, their blood will carry the virus from the vaccine and would not serve as a true test, hence the use of the dogs in the monitoring program. Veterinarians have been taking blood samples from unvaccinated horses when brought to them for treatment or when on ranch calls for use in the program. Game biologist with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department are also taking blood samples from several species of wildlife for the same program.

## To Meeting of Lamb Promotion Coordinating Committee

Worth Durham, secretary—treasurer of the American Sheep Producers Council and Mrs. Durham are leaving for Monterey, California today.

Worth has been invited to a meeting of the Lamb Promotion Coordinating Committee there. Item for discussion is how to protect the U. S. lamb producers market from the imports of carcasses from Australia and New Zealand.

Worth said it was impossible to get government controls on the imports so it has to be on the basis of orderly marketing by the countries involved.

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## Six to Las Vegas

Six boys left here Monday by plane to Las Vegas for a week. They are Billy Blair, Larry Wilson, Bobby Westbrook, Johnny Copeland, Bill and Wayland Foster.

For the fifth time in the last six years, a fleece from the Price Debouillet sheep won grand championship honors at the Sonora Wool and Mohair Show. The grand champion fleece at the show last week was a 25 pound fleece from an aged ram entered by Frank Price. Previous fleeces from this ram have placed in the top category at Sonora and other shows. This year's fleece was exactly twelve month's growth.

Entries by the Prices won three of the four classes in the range division of the show. The grand champion fleece of the adult show was also the \$4 for the champion range fleece.

Other placings by the Prices were: Yearling ewe, first—Allen Price; Aged ewe, first—Allen Price; second—Frank Price, second and third—Allen; Yearling ram class, second—Allen; Yearling ewe, first and third—Frank; Ag-ten will be ram, first and third—Frank and second—Allen.

Sterling County has had six confirmed cases of screw-worms, the most in over three years. The cases have been widely scattered in nearly all sections of the county. Ranchers with confirmed cases are: Worth Durham (Divide ranch) 1, Will Durham (home ranch and east of Sterling City) 2, Jim Davis (Red Barn) 1, Chesley McDonald (home pens) 1, and Curtis Wilson (Bailey headquarters) 1.

Confirmed cases have been increasing throughout the state; on Wednesday June 14, 50 cases were confirmed in the state. The majority of the cases are occurring in South Texas where they have been having heavy rains and the humidity has been high but there have been confirmed cases as far north as Vernon.

All the counties adjoining Sterling County have had confirmed cases. Coke, Mitchell, Reagan, Glasscock, Howard, Tom Green and Irion have all had one or more cases. One sterile fly box was found on the courthouse yard in San Angelo, according to Rex Jones, county agent.

The walnut caterpillars have been working on pecan trees in all parts of the county. These are the brownish caterpillars with the red line on each side. They gather on the end of a branch and completely strip it of its leaves; when they have done this they move on to another branch. Usually there will be one to three generations of these pests during the summer but the humidity we are having is conducive to insect growth and there may be more before the summer is over.

The caterpillars are easily controlled. If there are just a few of them on a tree, the end of the branch with the caterpillars may be cut off and burned. If there is too many for this, they may be sprayed with malathion, chloroform or toxaphene. Mix according to the directions on the container.

### Nearly \$7 Million in Oil -- Gas Production Here in 1971

Sale of Sterling County oil and gas production accounted for \$6,814,608 of the county's economic output for 1971, according to a study by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

In producing 1,718,825 barrels of crude oil and 5 billion cu. feet of natural gas, the county ranked 120 in Texas. Value of its crude oil was \$6,050,264; natural gas value was \$764,344.

The county is among 190 Texas counties with oil and gas production value topping \$100,000, although 211 counties produce oil and gas.

Sterling County oil and gas wells made a significant contribution to Texas' share of the nation's energy needs last year, but growing demand is sapping reserves in Texas faster than they can be replaced, Robert A. Buschman, Association president said. As fewer new fields are discovered, due to less drilling, the continuing strong economy and tax base of many Texas counties may now depend on updating Texas oil conservation laws to encourage wider use of new recovery technology, he said.

The Association study showed that Sterling County farmers, ranchers, and other royalty owners received \$851,826 as their share of production.

The county's wells generated \$278,312 in crude oil production taxes for state government and \$57,326 in state taxes on natural gas. Oil and gas producers spent \$1,547,010 in drilling 11 wells in the county last year, \$1,220,842 of which was lost in drilling 7 dry holes.

Texas Employment Commission figures showed 16 oil and gas industry employees in the county last year, with an annual payroll of \$54,856.

**SCOUTS GIVE TRASH THE SACK**

Three billion dollars! That's the estimated annual bill Americans are paying for public collection and disposal of garbage and solid waste—the third most expensive community service in the land, which is exceeded only by spending for highways and schools.

Concerned citizens, of course, can make significant contributions to cleaning up this national mess. As in Watertown, N. Y., where the initiative of the Environmental Systems Division of St. Regis Paper Company and a local Boy Scout Council is currently leading the way.

Recently, the more than 500 Boy Scouts of Jefferson and Lewis County launched an intensive environmental clean-up campaign to make their community a better place in which to live.

Soliciting the aid of the 30,000 homeowners in their area, the Scouts began their drive with the sale of St. Regis disposable refuse sacks. In addition to their 30-gallon capacity and convenience, these sacks were selected because—unlike plastic sacks—they will break down in sanitary land fill without adding to our ecological problems.

Watertown homeowners who purchase these sacks sepa-

rate paper, cans, rags, metal, returnable bottles and miscellaneous glass. Then, free of charge, the Scouts pick up the differentiated sacks and dispose of them in ways compatible to our ecology. Glass bottles, for example, are sold for recycling; bio-degradable trash is sent to land fill sites. Provi-



sions have even been made to tow away abandoned automobiles.

The best part about the program is that everyone profits. The community gets a cleaner environment; the Scouts get the credit for a job well done—and the modest proceeds from selling the sacks and whatever trash they can. . . for the support of other worthwhile Scouting programs.

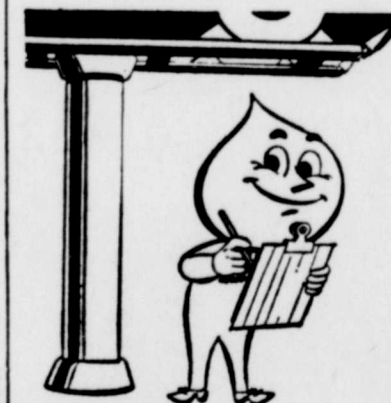

The Mennonites and Methodists (and others) refused to join and will leave.
