Renal Rosson, representative in the Texas House of the Legislature, was guest speaker at the Lions Club luncheon on Wednesday noon in the community center. He said Houston would have 24 representatives in the House next January and seven state senators. Dallas would have 18 representatives and four senators. ## Play Cotton Center There at 6 Tonight

The Sterling City Eagles opened the 1972 conference season last Friday night with a win over Klondike of 58 to 6. Klondike's lone score came early in the first quarter and from then on it was the Eagles all the way.

The Eagles journey to Cotton Center tonight for a conference game there at six o'clock.

In the first quarter against Klondike halfback Tommy Bynum ran five yards for his first TD of the evening and halfback Jesse Lujan added the extra two points.

The second quarter saw Lujan take a 10-yard pass for one TD and run a second from the three, with Bynum adding the two extra points. Then it was Bynum's turn as he scored on an 8-yard run with Lujan making the extra two. Ray Sparks, end, also scored on a 40-yard pass play with no PAT.

In the third quarter Lujan scored with Bynum adding 2 points.

In the fourth quarter Chris Gartman ran for 10 yards for Sterling's final TD.

Bynum carried the ball for 10 tries, making 73 yards or an average of 7.3 yards; Lujan carried seven times for 45 yards or an average of 6.4; Ken Peel carried the ball five times for 36 yards or an average of 7.2; Gartman carried the ball five times for 41, or an average of 8.2; and Tony Munoz carried the ball for four times for an average of 3.5.

Bynum accounted for 18 of the Eagles' points, he made 2 TD's and six extra points; Lujan made 3 TD's and scored 4 extra points for 22; Peel, Gartman and Sparks all made one TD each for 6 each.

The Eagles made 301 yards while Klondike made 71. Sterling had 17 first downs to 6 for Klondike.

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**Spotlight on HEALTH**

**PROFILE OF A COLD VICTIM**

What are your chances of catching cold? According to a booklet on the subject, they're especially good if you're female, live in a large city in the western or northeastern part of the U.S., and are the mother of a child under 6 years of age. Young children are the greatest cold-spreaders. Your chances are further enhanced if you're going through a period of stress and strain. "Contentment preserves one even from catching a cold," the great philosopher, Nietzsche once said.

The booklet, which discusses the common cold, is distributed by Winthrop Laboratories, the makers of Neo-Synephrine nose drops and nasal spray that are widely used in the U.S. and abroad.

Keeping up one's resistance helps to avoid the common cold, according to the publication, which advises getting sufficient fresh air and exercise, well-balanced meals, and as much sleep as possible in a well-ventilated bedroom. In cold weather areas, an extra hour a night is recommended.

Early stages of the common cold are the most contagious. Every sneeze fills the air with thousands of virus-laden droplets. To help

prevent spreading a cold to the rest of the family, to friends and to co-workers, everyone should have his own glass, cup, silverware and towels. Hands should be washed thoroughly and often, preferably with a liquid antibacterial skin cleanser, pHisoHex is the one that is used in most U.S. hospitals to help prevent spread of infections. Particularly during the cold season, it is wise to keep a handwashing preparation in the kitchen, as well as in the bathroom.

Your chances of catching a cold will be reduced if pre-



cautions are taken. However, the Winthrop booklet also states that it is not completely possible to avoid a cold. Just breathing the air that someone with a cold has merely talked into offers the possibility of infecting a healthy person.

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**WHO MUST FILE SOCIAL SECURITY EARNINGS REPORT**

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 in 1970 are required to file a  
 report of their earnings with  
 the Social Security Adminis-  
 tration by April 15, 1971. This  
 report is in addition to any  
 Federal or State tax return,  
 and it must be filed with the  
 Social Security Adminis-  
 tration, according to J. M. Talbot,  
 social security manager.

Beneficiaries who were 72  
 years old in all months of last  
 year are not required to file  
 the annual report of earnings.  
 Disabled beneficiaries should  
 report immediately if they be-  
 come self-employed or take a  
 job. All other beneficiaries, in-  
 cluding families of disabled  
 persons, are under the retire-  
 ment test and must report their  
 earnings annually.

The purpose of social securi-  
 ty benefits is to replace earn-  
 ings lost due to retirement,  
 death, or disability. If an in-  
 dividual continues to earn a  
 substantial amount—\$1689 or  
 more—some adjustment is  
 made in the amount of his  
 benefits. One dollar for every  
 two dollars earned between  
 \$1680 and \$2880 is withheld.  
 If an individual earns over  
 \$2880, he gives up a dollar for  
 each dollar earned over \$2880  
 regardless of the amount of  
 yearly earnings. A beneficiary  
 is entitled to his full social  
 security check for any month  
 in which he does not earn over  
 \$140 and is not self-employed.  
 The annual report will allow  
 us to determine whether or  
 not additional benefits are pay-  
 able.

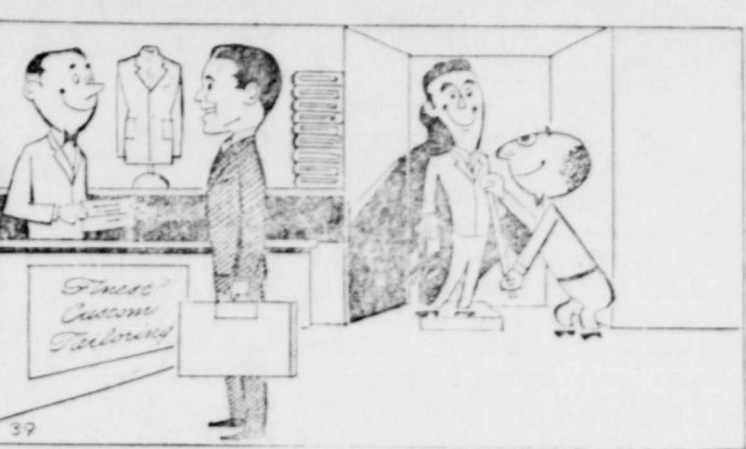

First and second places in the ewe lamb class went to Amy with Wesley showing third and fourth places. First pen of three ewe lambs was shown by Amy. In the yearling ewe class, Amy showed the first and fourth place animals while Becky had second and third places with the first place pen of three ribbon going to Amy. In the pen of three, both sexes, Amy had first place, Becky second, and Wesley third with the same placings in the get of sire class. Amy had the first place exhibitors flock.

The first field day for the new San Angelo Research and Extension Center at San Angelo will be held on Tuesday, October 3. This will be sponsored by both the Research and Extension groups headquartered at the center. Theme of the Field Day is "Improving Productive Efficiency in Sheep."

The complete program is not ready but will be made available shortly. When it is announced, more publicity will be given the event. All sheep producers are invited and encouraged to plan to attend.

Confirmed screwworm cases continue to increase in Sterling County as they do elsewhere in the state. The total for the year now stands at 250 cases. Certainly, this is not the total since there are cases which are not being sent to the laboratory at Mission for confirmation.

Livestock producers are urged to continue to send in samples wherever possible. Officials need to know the location of the cases in planning their program for the remainder of this year as well as for the future.

**For Social Security  
CHECK YOUR SOCIAL  
SECURITY RECORD**

"How do I know my work under social security is being credited to my record, and how do I find out about it? This is one of the questions most frequently asked," says J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

In explaining the process involved in reporting social security, Mr. Talbot said, "When you work for wages, your employer deducts social security tax from your paycheck each pay day. At the end of each calendar quarter, he submits your name and number with payment for these taxes to Internal Revenue. Internal Revenue forwards copies to social security's main office in Baltimore, Maryland. Your wages are then posted to your record. The same process is followed for a self-employed person except that his earnings are recorded yearly."

Mr. Talbot states that the possibility of an error being made in the process does exist. He recommends that you request a statement of your earnings at least every three years.

All you have to do to secure the statement is to send a post card request available at your social security office to Baltimore, Maryland. If the reply you receive is incorrect in any way, contact the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris Avenue (P. O. Box 3808) in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area.

Each calendar quarter, the Social Security Administration receives employer reports of earnings showing incorrect social security numbers of employees, according to J.M. Talbot, social security manager. These incorrect reports, in many cases, happen when a girl has married but does not have her name changed on social security records.

Mr. Talbot stated that when a girl marries, she should complete a 'Request for Change in Social Security Record' form. After completing the form and returning it to the social security office with her old card, she will be issued a new social security card with the same number but showing the new name.

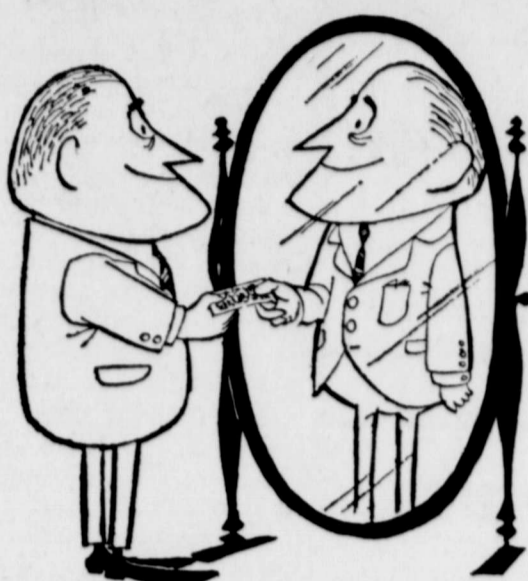
If the name and number reported by an employer do not match the name and number on file with the Social Security Administration, the earnings might not get to the proper account. This could result in a later loss of social security benefits or in a smaller benefit being paid.

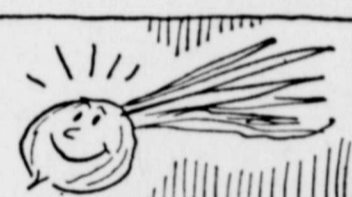
