AROUND THE COUNTY

ARTHUR BARLEMANN, JR. COUNTY AGENT

The hairy, dark brown to black-appearing caterpillars that are being seen in increasing numbers around here are salt marsh caterpillars. They are found in lawns, gardens, and crawling in many places. These caterpillars feed on the leaves of almost any crop available — grass or broadleaf—and will eat all but the heavy veins of the leaves.

The salt marsh caterpillar can be controlled with any one of several different sprays or dusts. Insecticides recommended for the control of these pests include carbaryl (Sevin), chlordane, malathion or toxaphene. The sprays or dusts should be applied to the plants or areas that are being bothered by the caterpillars.

Several other species of plant pests are present now and you may wish to use an insecticide that will control these as well as the caterpillars if necessary. If grasshoppers, sowbugs, and snails are a problem, carbaryl (Sevin) would be the best insecticide to use. It will give control of all at one time.

Sterling County beef cattle producers again came away from the feeder calf sale in San Angelo this week with a bundle of ribbons and awards at the show and sale held Monday. Winners at this week's sale and show included the T.F. Foster Estate and Copeland Brothers. The Foster Estate was the big winner in the Hereford division while Copeland Brothers achieved their winnings in the crossbred classes.

Sterling County Hereford calves and other breeds and crosses have an enviable reputation. The calves they produce are among the best in the area. The producers are to be commended for the excellent cattle they have produced for years—they'll stand up with the best.

This is National 4-H Club Week as proclaimed by President Nixon and in Texas by Governor Preston Smith. It is a salute to 4-H Club members who are now located in the city as well as the country. Not only is it a nationwide organization, it is a worldwide one with members in numerous foreign countries. Texas can be proud for in Texas the first 4-H Club idea was conceived and has since grown.

Officers of the Sterling County 4-H Club are Russell Davis, president; Steven Foster, vice-president; Patti Bynum, secretary-treasurer; Melinda Terry, reporter; and Amy Hodges, district council delegate. The forty club members last year had a good year with livestock projects in lambs, steers, breeding sheep and breeding cattle. In addition, a foods and nutrition group was formed; a county food show was held with twelve participants. One club member competed in the district foods show.

National School Lunch Focus Week

The goal of our school lunch program is to serve nutritionally adequate, attractive and moderately priced meals. The nutritional goal, set by the National Research Council, is for the school lunch to furnish at least one-third of the recommended daily dietary allowances for children. This is called a Type A lunch. The Type A lunch requirements provide the framework for nutritionally adequate school lunches.

As specified in the National School Lunch Regulations, a Type A lunch shall contain as a minimum: One-half pint of fluid whole milk as a beverage; two ounces of protein-rich foods; three-fourths cup serving consisting of two or more vegetables or fruits or both; one slice of whole-grain or enriched bread; two teaspoons of butter or fortified margarine.

As specified in the regulations, a breakfast shall contain, as a minimum, each of the following food components in the amounts indicated: One-half pint of fluid whole milk served as a beverage or on cereal or used in part for each purpose; a one-half cup serving of fruit or full-strength fruit or vegetable juice; one slice or whole-grain or enriched bread; or three-fourths cup of whole-grain cereal or enriched or fortified cereal.

To improve the nutrition of participating children, breakfasts shall also include as often a practicable protein-rich foods.

The second week in October is National School Lunch Week. On Tuesday, October 10, the public is invited to join their children for lunch.

Play Garden City Here Saturday in Homecoming Game

The Sterling Eagles continued their winning ways in conference play last Friday by beating Loop 52 to 16 in a game at Loop.

So far this season, coach Danny Slaughter's locals have won rather handily over the Klondike, Cotton Center, Threeway and Loop teams in conference play.

Tomorrow, October 7, the Eagles play Garden City here at 8 in a homecoming game. The following week is an open week for the locals.

In the Loop game Tommy Bynum carried the ball 16 times for 75 yards or an average of 4.6 yards. He made one touchdown and two extra PAT's. Jesse Lujan carried the ball 12 times for 75 yards or an average of 6.2 yards. He made four touchdowns and 1 PAT. Ken Peel carried six times for 22 yards and made 1 TD. Highway Work for Sterling Scheduled

The Texas Highway Commission, in their March meeting in Austin, approved the 1973-1974 Consolidated Highway Program.

J. A. Snell, District Engineer of San Angelo, stated that the new program provides funds totaling \$4,400,000 for purchase of right of way and construction of new projects in District 7, as well as additional finance for projects already approved.

A project in Sterling County that is included in this program is described as follows:

Purchase right of way and construct grading, structures and surfacing on State 158, from Coke County line, west a distance of 6.4 miles. Estimated cost—\$488,000.

SCOUTS GIVE TRASH THE SACK

Three billion dollars! That's the estimated annual bill Americans are paying for public collection and disposal of garbage and solid waste—the third most expensive community service in the land. . . . which is exceeded only by spending for highways and schools.

Concerned citizens, of course, can make significant contributions to cleaning up this national mess. As in Watertown, N. Y., where the initiative of the Environmental Systems Division of St. Regis Paper Company and a local Boy Scout Council is currently leading the way.

Recently, the more than 500 Boy Scouts of Jefferson and Lewis County launched an intensive environmental clean-up campaign to make their community a better place in which to live.

Soliciting the aid of the 30,000 homeowners in their area, the Scouts began their drive with the sale of St. Regis disposable refuse sacks. In addition to their 30-gallon capacity and convenience, these sacks were selected because—unlike plastic sacks—they will break down in sanitary land fill without adding to our ecological problems.

Watertown homeowners who purchase these sacks separate paper, cans, rags, metal, returnable bottles and miscellaneous glass. Then, free of charge, the Scouts pick up the differentiated sacks and dispose of them in ways compatible to our ecology. Glass bottles, for example, are sold for recycling; bio-degradable trash is sent to land fill sites. Provisions have even been made to tow away abandoned automobiles.



The best part about the program is that everyone profits. The community gets a cleaner environment; the Scouts get the credit for a job well done—and the modest proceeds from selling the sacks and whatever trash they can. . . for the support of other worthwhile Scouting programs.

Now—what are you doing in your community?

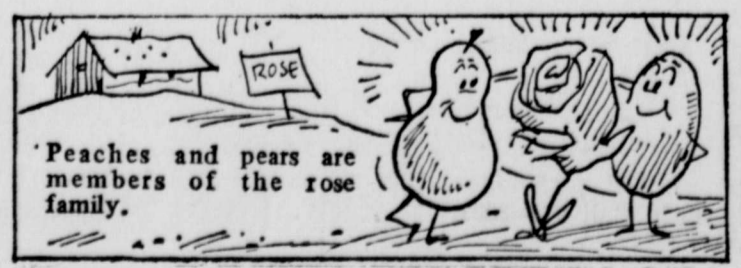

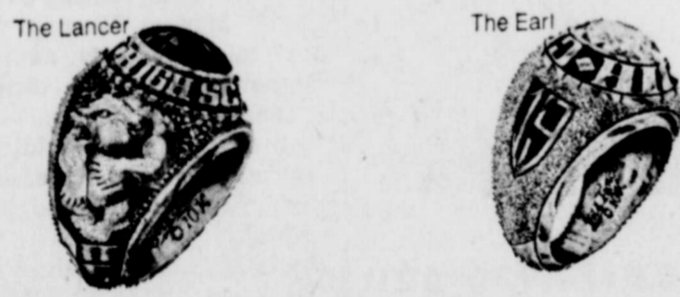

WHO MUST FILE SOCIAL SECURITY EARNINGS REPORT

Most social security beneficiaries who earned over \$1680 in 1970 are required to file a report of their earnings with the Social Security Administration by April 15, 1971. This report is in addition to any Federal or State tax return, and it must be filed with the Social Security Administration, according to J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

Beneficiaries who were 72 years old in all months of last year are not required to file the annual report of earnings. Disabled beneficiaries should report immediately if they become self-employed or take a job. All other beneficiaries, including families of disabled persons, are under the retirement test and must report their earnings annually.

The purpose of social security benefits is to replace earnings lost due to retirement, death, or disability. If an individual continues to earn a substantial amount — \$1680 or more — some adjustment is made in the amount of his benefits. One dollar for every two dollars earned between \$1680 and \$2880 is withheld. If a individual earns over \$2880, he gives up a dollar for each dollar earned over \$2880 regardless of the amount of yearly earnings. A beneficiary is entitled to his full social security check for any month in which he does not earn over \$140 and is not self-employed. The annual report will allow us to determine whether or not additional benefits are payable.

Oil Production Significant Here

Petroleum production continues to play a significant role in the economy of Sterling County with a direct input of \$7,377,608 last year.

According to the latest compilation of Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Assn., the county in 1970 produced 1,999,879 barrels of crude oil valued at \$6,599,601 and 5,328,816 thousand cubic feet of natural gas valued at \$788,007. It ranked 112th in value of petroleum produced.

In addition, the county received the stimulation of \$922,201 in royalty payments to landowners and others with mineral interests.

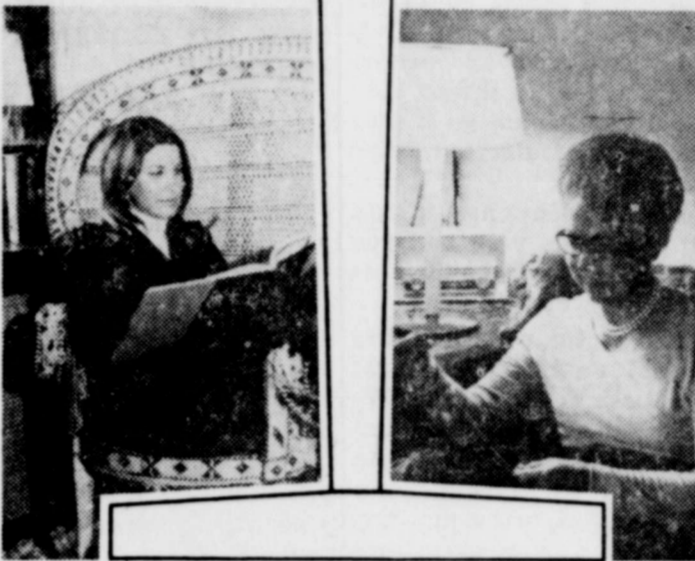
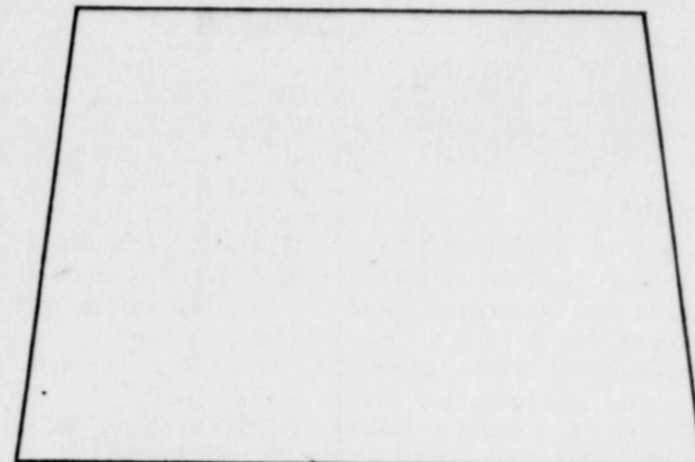
"Sterling was one of 187 Texas counties that had petroleum production valued at more than \$125,000", says Kenneth E. Montague, Texas Mid-Continent president.

Its ability to produce helped Texas meet a record demand with record production of both oil and gas in 1970. This demand has again diminished Texas petroleum reserves as additions failed to offset withdrawals. In Texas, we only drilled 8,114 wells, the smallest number since 1946.

Texas state government benefited from the county's petroleum, receiving \$303,582 in production taxes on crude oil and \$58,351 on natural gas.

Drilling expenditures in the county totaled \$3,871,213 with \$2,338,214 being lost on dry holes. Drillers completed 10 oil wells, 1 gas well and 17 dry holes. Eight wildcats were drilled with seven of them dry.

Texas oil and gas dollars paid for 22.7% of State cost of public education; 52.1% of State cost of teacher retirement.
