Sterling County 4-H Club members did very well in the competition in the Rambouillet heep show at the State Fair on Saturday, October 14. Amy Hodges showed two champions and one reserve in the Open Rambouillet Show with little brother, Wesley, furnishing stiff competition in the classes where he had entries. In the Junior Rambouillet Show, Becky Hodges had both champions and one reserve. Judge of both Rambouillet shows was Dr. Carl Menzies, head of the Texas A&M University Research and Extension Center at San Angelo.

The champion ram was a ram bred and shown by Amy. The reserve champion ram was a yearling ram also bred and shown by Amy. Amy's yearling ewe was the champion ewe of the show.

In class placings, Amy had the first and second place ram lambs, the first place pen of three ram lambs, the first and second place yearling rams, the second and fifth place ewe lambs, the first place pen of three ewe lambs, the first and second place yearling ewes, first place pen of three yearling ewes, and the first place exhibitor's flock. Also in the Open Show, Wesley had the third and fourth place ram lambs and the third and eighth place ewe lambs.

In the Junior Rambouillet show, Becky's ram lamb was champion ram and her yearling ram was reserve champion ram. Her yearling ewe was champion ewe.

In the class placings, Becky had the first and third place ram lambs, the first and second place yearling rams, the first and second place ewe lambs, the first and third place yearling ewes, and the first place exhibitor's flock. Becky brought home all the blue ribbons in the Junior Show.

Amy was the premier exhibitor in the Open Show with a total of \$245 in prize money. The premier exhibitor award in the Junior Show was won by Becky with a total of \$170 in prize money. Wesley's prize money totaled \$42 in the two classes where he had entries. All together, the Hodges family captured 12 of the 13 blue ribbons possible in the two shows.

The pecan crop in Sterling County may not be much for the squirrels this year, but statewide, the October 1 prospects are for the second largest crop of record. Estimates on that date forecast a crop of 65 million pounds. The record crop is the 69 million pounds produced in 1968.

Nationwide, the crop is estimated at 186.3 million pounds. This is twenty-five percent below the 1971 crop. Florida and New Mexico show slight increases over 1971 while Texas is showing an increase of 171 percent over 1971. All other states show decreases.

Dry weather, insects, and diseases are the major causes of the decline in the South. In many areas, nuts are only partially filled. Nuts are maturing early in all areas.

Dr. Turner is using a somewhat different system in grazing his pastures. Cattle are run on the pasture for three weeks, then removed and followed by sheep for three weeks. The pastures are all in excellent condition with both native grasses and some introduced grasses on the tree-dozed and root plowed pastures. The predominant native grasses are sideoats and green sprangletop while Klein grass is the main introduced grass. At the present time, the stocking rate is 16 acres per animal on an annual basis.

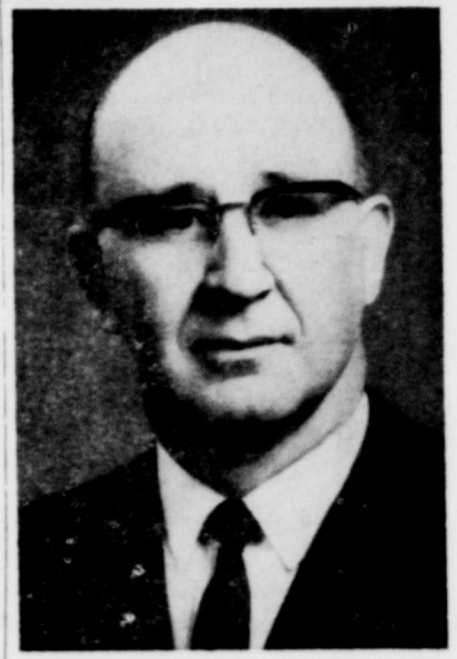

Social Security Tips

"Did you know that if you operate any type of agricultural business, the hired workers you have in that business may be covered by social security?" J. M. Talbot, social security manager, asks.

Any employee who works and earns \$150 or more for one employer during any year or works at least 20 days on a time basis for an agriculture business, is covered by social security. Even part-time employees could meet the earnings or work test. You, as their employer, would be liable to withhold social security tax from the employee's check, match that tax yourself, and report the earnings at the end of the year.

Worried about proving your age? J. M. Talbot, social security manager, said the people at your social security office may be able to help you make your claim. There are some things you can do ahead of time. If you were born in a state that kept birth records when you were born, write for your birth certificate. If the state where you were born wasn't keeping birth records at the time, the next best thing is a baptismal record.

If you were baptized before age 5, you'll be asked to find out if there is a record. If there is, it is all the proof of your age you'll need.

If you have no birth or baptismal record, the people working in the social security office will be happy to suggest some other possibilities. Some examples are an old family Bible, school records, and federal census records.

You may not recall now, but when you bought your marriage license you gave your age. You may also have some old insurance policies about the house. The list of proofs to try is quite long. When you file your claim, it helps if you have already fund the oldest thing you can that shows your age. Usually, the older the record the better it is for proving your age. It will help the people at the social security office pay your benefits sooner if you think ahead on your age.

Many times a telephone call before you visit the social security office will help. You may be able to file your claim by phone. Contact the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris Avenue (P. O. Box 3808) in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area. Persons who are unable to meet with him are encouraged to call the office in San Angelo at 949-4608.

REWARD NOTICE

A reward of \$500.00 will be paid by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association to any person (other than law enforcement officers) giving information causing the arrest and final conviction of any person or persons found butchering or stealing any sheep or lambs or goats belonging to any Association member in good standing. When two or more persons give information, the above sum will be divided at the discretion of the Board of the Association. When two or more defendants are involved in a single crime, the total reward is limited to \$500.00, but the conviction of one defendant, even though the other defendants are acquitted, will entitle the claimant or claimants to said sum of \$500.00. All claims must be submitted within ninety (90) days following conviction. If, upon conviction, a defendant confesses other thefts, no additional reward will be paid. All deviations concerning the payment of such reward and the conditions of payment will be made by the Board of Directors of the Association.

SOCIAL SECURITY

"If I apply for disability benefits, do I have to be examined by a social security doctor before I can get any checks?" This is a question frequently asked when disabled workers claim social security disability insurance benefits.

J. M. Talbot, social security manager, says the social security law requires the applicant to supply the medical records on his condition. When you apply for benefits, you must provide a report from your attending doctor or hospital. Information from the attending doctor and the hospital is generally all that is needed. However, in some instances, a specialist's report may be necessary to clarify a question or resolve a borderline situation. You may then be asked to go for a special examination to help provide the extra information.

When you apply for disability benefits, be ready to give the names and addresses of all your sources of medical treatment for your disabling condition.

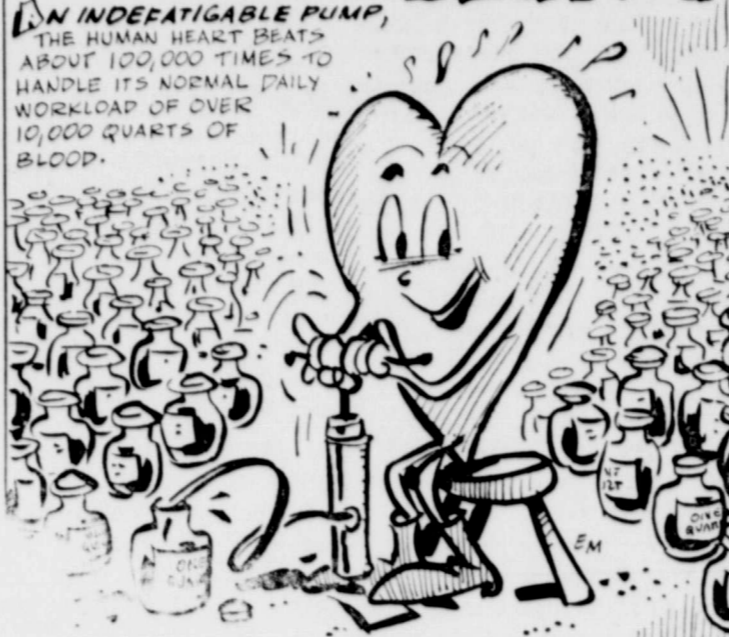

WHO MUST FILE SOCIAL SECURITY EARNINGS

Most social security beneficiaries who earned over \$1680 in 1970 are required to file a report of their earnings with the Social Security Administration by April 15, 1971. This report is in addition to any Federal or State tax return, and it must be filed with the Social Security Administration, according to J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

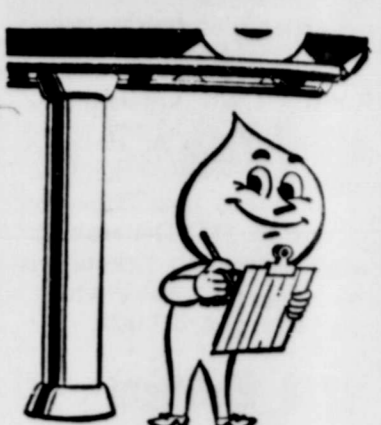
Beneficiaries who were 72 years old in all months of last year are not required to file the annual report of earnings. Disabled beneficiaries should report immediately if they become self-employed or take a job. All other beneficiaries, including families of disabled persons, are under the retirement test and must report their earnings annually.

The purpose of social security benefits is to replace earnings lost due to retirement, death, or disability. If an individual continues to earn a substantial amount — \$1680 or more — some adjustment is made in the amount of his benefits. One dollar for every two dollars earned between \$1680 and \$2880 is withheld. If an individual earns over \$2880, he gives up a dollar for each dollar earned over \$2880 regardless of the amount of yearly earnings. A beneficiary is entitled to his full social security check for any month in which he does not earn over \$140 and is not self-employed. The annual report will allow us to determine whether or not additional benefits are payable.
