## General Election Next Tuesday

### President and Senate Races Dominant

Next Tuesday, November 7, is general election day in the nation and of course, here in Texas and Sterling County.

Dominating the interest, is of course, the presidential race pitting incumbent Republican Richard Nixon against Democrat George McGovern, senator from South Dakota.

The Democrats have a complete roster on the ballot in Sterling from president on to local precinct offices. The Republicans have candidates in presidential, senatorial, congressional, governor and the state treasurer; then in the race for state representative of the 63rd district, pitting Rich Anderson of Luther against incumbent Democrat Renal B. Rosson.

The Socialist Workers Party has candidates for president, senator, governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, comptroller of public accounts and commissioner of general land office.

The Raza Unida Party has a candidate for senator, for governor, lieutenant governor, state treasurer and railroad commissioner.

Then there is a write-in column in the very right of the ballot for those who do not want to vote for anyone in an office—to write in their choice.

In the past, most state and district offices were won in the Democratic Primaries and was tantamount to election in Texas. Now, sometimes a Republican will win a state office. Texas has gone Republican for president three times—like for Herbert Hoover in 1928 and for Eisenhower in 1952 and 1956.

In the Democratic column candidates are: for president and vice-president, George McGovern and Sargent Schriver; for U.S. senator, Barefoot Sanders; for congress, O. C. Fisher; for governor, Dolph Briscoe; for lieutenant governor, Bill Hobby; for attorney general, John Hill; for comptroller of public accounts, Robert S. Calvert; for state treasurer, Jesse James; for commissioner of general land office, Bob Armstrong; for commissioner of agriculture, John C. White; for railroad commissioner, Byron Tunnell; for chief justice of supreme court, Joe Greenhill; for associate justice supreme court, place 1, Price Daniel; for associate justice supreme court, place 2, Sam Johnson; for judge court of criminal appeals, Wendell A. Odom; for state senator, W. E. (Pete) Snelson; for state representative, 63rd district, Renal B. Rosson; for member state board of education, 21st district, Frank M. Pool; for court of civil appeals, 3rd district, John C. Phillips; for district judge, Earl W. Smith; for district attorney, Frank C. Dick; for county judge, Roland L. Lowe; for sheriff, tax assessor and collector, F. J. Cantrell; for county attorney, Worth B. Durham; for county treasurer, Betty Garrett; for county commissioner, Precinct 1, C.W. Smith; for county commissioner, Precinct 3, Bill R. Bynum.

In the Republican column Richard M. Nixon and Spiro T. Agnew are candidates for president and vice-president; John G. Tower for U.S. senator; Doug Harlan for U.S. representative; Henry C. (Hank)

### Rates on Home Insurance to be Cut

Area residents can expect a major reduction in the cost of extended coverage insurance on their homes by January 1, state Rep. Renal B. Rosson said today.

The announcement came after a day-long meeting Monday between State Insurance Commissioners and Rep. Rosson, chairman, and Rep. Joe C. Hanna, co-chairman, of the House Interim Committee studying extended coverage insurance in Texas.

The savings to area residents will be brought about by changing not only rates but territorial lines. Rep. Rosson believes that the changes will result in a 15 to 25% reduction to the people.

According to Rep. Rosson Insurance Commissioners-Durwood Manford and Ed Price agreed that extended coverage insurance was definitely excessive in this area, and that meaningful changes would be made, bringing about reduced rates to the people. Rates and territorial lines are scheduled to be changed effective January 1, according to the Commissioners.

### You Have to be Registered 30 Days to Vote

Although you can vote for free, one has to be registered for 30 days before an election—regardless of your age like 18 year olds. If you registered within the past three years and have voted, you ARE registered (so go vote) but if you just became 18 recently and have not yet registered, you cannot vote this general election.

### Fourteen Amendments

To compound matters there are fourteen amendments to the Texas state constitution to be voted on. In August, this paper ran comprehensive accounts of the amendments and listed them as to what they would do. Some are undoubtedly good and some are not. It's a hit or miss type thing for the average voter. In such a small paper as this, one can not possibly give comprehensive outlines and facts about them in space permitted.

Anyway most candidates for big offices, are still working for victory; lots of money is being spent by parties in the big races and in four (4) more days, it'll be over.

Just be sure you vote next Tuesday. All the regular polling places in the county are open, No. 1 in the courthouse, No. 2 at Bill Blairs ranch house; No. 3 at William Fosters ranch house and No. 4 at the Bill J. Cole ranch house.

### Loses 22 to 20 in District Game

The Sterling City Eagles, the leaders of the district in conference play, dropped their first game here last Friday night to Dawson 22 to 20.

The Eagles were leading at the last of the game, but in the fourth quarter Dawson's quarterback Kalith Brown, zoomed a pass to John Nelson and tied the score 20—20 and then on the try for PAT, he zoomed another pass to Jack Nelson for the two extras—and Sterling had lost a ball game—the first loss of this season.

The game was close all the way. In the first quarter, the Eagles did not score, but the Dragon's Glen Phipps pushed over three yards for a Dawson TD and then he passed to John Nelson for the 2 extra points. The end of the first quarter saw the Eagles trailing 8 to 0.

In the second quarter, Sterling quarterback Ken Peel passed to Jesse Lujan for a Sterling TD and then Peel ran over for the two points. Before the quarter ended Ken repeated on a pass to Lujan for another TD and the try for extra point failed. Ronnie Moore of the Dragons, on an 18 yard run, gained a TD for Dawson, tying the score, 14 to 14 at halftime.

In the third quarter Peel, on a keeper, ran 25 yards for Sterling touchdown, but the try for extra point failed, but Sterling was ahead at the end of the third quarter 20 to 14.

BUT, in the fourth quarter, those passes to John Nelson—racked up 8 points for the opponents and Sterling lost by 2 little points.

### EAGLES PLAY TONIGHT AT SMYER

Coach Danny Slaughter's Eagles go to Smyer tonight for a conference game at 7 o'clock. It is a crucial game, in fact the next three games of the Eagles are crucial. They will have to win all three if they are to get out of district play—and into state playoffs.

Dawson made 6 penetrations to 4 for Sterling. They made 14 first downs to 7 for Sterling City. They gained 325 yards to 164 for Sterling.

**U.S. Border Patrol Seeks Applicants**

The U.S. Border Patrol of the Immigration and Naturalization Service has an urgent need for physically fit young men desiring a career in Federal law enforcement work. This is a career opportunity for those who like action and outdoor work.

The Border Patrol is the mobile, uniformed enforcement branch of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Its principle purpose is to prevent the smuggling and illegal entry of aliens into the United States. The border patrolmen, called Immigration Patrol Inspectors, work along international boundaries, although their duties are not necessarily confined to these areas. They work in jeeps, cars, on foot, in boats and even in airplanes. Officers investigate violations of the immigration laws and frequently make arrests. They are often required to work irregular hours, under all weather conditions. These duties demand mental alertness as well as exceptional physical vigor and stamina.

The entrance salary of an Immigration Patrol Inspector is \$7,639 a year (Grade GS-7). There are promotional opportunities up to executive levels in the Immigration and Naturalization Service. On-the-job training offers splendid opportunities for promotion to positions of greater responsibility.

No experience is required for these positions. To qual-

ify, applicants must pass a written test of verbal abilities, judgment, and aptitude for learning a foreign language.

Candidates who pass the written test are called for oral interviews in the order of their standing on the list. The oral interview is designed to determine if the candidate has the personal qualities needed for the work. Applicants must also pass a rigid physical examination. Candidates who are selected for appointment are assigned to the Border Patrol Academy for a period of intensive training in such subjects as immigration

laws, Spanish, physical training and marksmanship. Trainees receive full pay while in the academy.
