## Eagles to Gail for Title Game Tonight

The Sterling City Eagles go to Gail to play the Borden County Coyotes in the final and most important game of the season. The winner will represent this district in the state semi-finals with Goree next week. Borden County has not yet lost a game. Sterling has lost one to Dawson, but if they win tonight they will be the district winners, because they beat Gail. There are no ties, regular games are decided on twenty yard penetrations (like Sterling over Smyer) and if two teams are tied for the district, the one who won over the one tied with—gets the nod.

### Eagles Win Over Whitharral 72 to 8

In the game here last Friday night with Whitharral, the Panthers did not score until the final quarter when Benito Lopez took a long pass and scored a TD, and Bud Reding added the two extra points.

In the opening minutes of the game, Tommy Bynum got a TD for Sterling on a two yard push. Jesse Lujan added the two extra points. Then Lujan got a TD and Bynum added the PAT. Then Bynum racked up a TD and Lujan picked up the two. Before the first quarter ended Tony Munoz and Chris Gartman added 6 points each. The first quarter saw Sterling with 36 and Whitharral 0.

In the second quarter Bynum again scored and Munoz added the PAT. Then Gartman picked up a TD and Munoz added the two. At the half the score was 52 for the locals and Whitharral was 0.

In the third quarter Bynum added two TDs, and Skeete Foster one. Bynum added a PAT to give Sterling 72.

Sterling did not score in the last quarter, and Whitharral made their points.

Tommy Bynum carried the ball 27 times and gained 193 yards for an average of 7.1 yards; he made five TD's and 3 PAT's.

Chris Gartman carried the ball sixteen times, gaining 99 yards for an average of 6.1 yards; he made two TD's.

Russell Davis carried the ball six times for 51 yards or an average of 8.5 yards.

Tony Munoz carried ten times for 57 yards or an average of 5.7 yards; he made one touchdown and two extra points.

Jesse Lujan carried three times for 15 yards, making 1 TD and 1 PAT.

Skeete Foster carried one time for 10 yards, making 1 TD.

Hord kicked off 12 times for 463 yards or an average of 38.5 yards.

Sterling made 28 first downs to 5 for Whitharral. The Eagles had 10 twenty yard penetrations to 2 for the Panthers.

Sterling made 393 yards in the game to 103 for the Panthers.

Last year Sterling and Borden County tied for first place in the district and Gail got to represent the district in bi-district play. The locals hope to reverse that by winning tonight's game.

**Social Security Tips**  
 "Did you know that if you operate any type of agricultural business, the hired workers you have in that business may be covered by social security?" J. M. Talbot, social security manager, asks.  
 Any employee who works and earns \$150 or more for one employer during any year or works at least 20 days on a time basis for an agriculture business, is covered by social security. Even part-time employees could meet the earnings or work test. You, as their employer, would be able to withhold social security tax from the employee's check, match that tax yourself, and report the earnings at the end of the year.

**WHO MUST FILE SOCIAL SECURITY EARNINGS**  
 Most social security beneficiaries who earned over \$1680 in 1970 are required to file a report of their earnings with the Social Security Administration by April 15, 1971. This report is in addition to any Federal or State tax return, and it must be filed with the Social Security Administration, according to J. M. Talbot, social security manager.  
 Beneficiaries who were 72 years old in all months of last year are not required to file the annual report of earnings. Disabled beneficiaries should report immediately if they become self-employed or take a job. All other beneficiaries, including families of disabled persons, are under the retirement test and must report their earnings annually.  
 The purpose of social security benefits is to replace earnings lost due to retirement, death, or disability. If an individual continues to earn a substantial amount — \$1680 or more — some adjustment is made in the amount of his benefits. One dollar for every two dollars earned between \$1680 and \$2880 is withheld. If a individual earns over \$2880, he gives up a dollar for each dollar earned over \$2880 regardless of the amount of yearly earnings. A beneficiary is entitled to his full social security check for any month in which he does not earn over \$140 and is not self-employed. The annual report will allow us to determine whether or not additional benefits are payable.

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**'Wanted by the FBI'—CLERICAL EMPLOYEES**

The Dallas Office of the FBI through its Special Agent in Charge, Mr. J. Gordon Shanlin, has announced it is again in urgent need of clerical employees to fill the positions of Cler and Typist at Bureau headquarters in Washington, D.C. These positions present an excellent opportunity for young people, male or female, who are at least 16 years of age, United States citizens, and have at least a high school education, provided they can pass a rigid investigation of loyalty, reputation, and character, and are in good physical condition. No previous experience is required. Future vacancies are also anticipated in the Fingerprint Clerk and Stenographer positions.

The entrance salary for a Clerk is \$4,897 (GS-2) per year with a raise in thirty to ninety days to \$5,524 (GS-3) per year, if their work is satisfactory. A twenty word spelling test must be passed to qualify for the Clerk position.

As openings occur, applicants for the Clerk position who are interested, are considered for the Fingerprint Clerk position which starts at \$5,524 (GS-3) per year. Successful candidates are considered for promotion to \$6,202 (GS-4) per year after six months; to \$6,938 (GS-5) per year after one year; and to \$7,727 (GS-6) per year after two years experience in fingerprint work.

A Typist starts at \$5,524 (GS-3) per year. Applicants for the the Typist position must pass a ten minute typing test of 45 words per minute and a twenty word spelling test.

A Stenographer starts at \$6,202 (GS-4) per year. To qualify for the Stenographer position applicants must pass a three minute dictation test at the rate of eighty words per minute; pass a ten minute typing test at the rate of forty five words per minute; pass a twenty word spelling test; and a twenty word vocabulary test. Qualified Stenographers must be willing to accept a Typist position until vacancies for the Stenographer position exist.


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**AROUND THE COUNTY**

Texans have always been proud of their state, and the Texas BRAG is well known. However, when it comes to agriculture, that BRAG is very real because agriculture is BIG in Texas.

"It's appropriate to take a look at the state's agricultural industry during the month of November, the month designated as Texas Food and Fiber Abundance Month, says Charles Baker, marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Texas A&M University.

For instance, consider that agriculture is a \$10 billion industry in Texas, second only to the oil and gas industry. points out Baker. In addition the agricultural industry provides employment for 35 to 40 percent of the Texas labor force.

Of the state's approximate land area of 168 million acres, some 143 million acres are in farmland—more than any other state in the nation. Texas also boasts more and bigger farms than any other state.

And talk about diversity—Texas produces more than 200 different types of crops and livestock. So, in many ways, the state is self-sustaining, notes Baker. In addition, it provides food and fiber for consumers throughout this country as well as abroad. Texas is the third leading agricultural state in the nation and ranks fourth among the leading agricultural exporting states.

In the United States, Texas leads in the production of all cattle, beef cattle, rice, sheep and wool, goats and mohair, cotton and grain sorghum. It is also a leading producer of peanuts, pecans, hay, citrus, and vegetables. Not to be overlooked are the dairy, poultry and egg, swine, corn, soybean, honey, wheat, timber, horses, and catfish and shrimp farming industries.

It's a good bet that consumers in Texas come in contact with a food or fiber product produced in the state every day, says Baker. We're indeed fortunate to have such a wide variety of high quality food and fiber products at our fingertips at reasonable prices.

During the coming Thanksgiving season, it's appropriate for all of us to reflect on our good fortune of living in such a state as Texas that is overflowing with food and fiber abundance. It is indeed a

time for everyone to count his blessings.

The approach of the holiday season means it's time to begin making preparations for the season. One of the colorful additions to the season is a colorful fire in the fireplace if you have one in your home.

Varied color flames result from soaking newspaper logs in a chemical solution made by dissolving four pounds of copper sulfate and three pounds of rock salt in one gallon of water. If more than one gallon of solution is desired, increase at the above rates. The solution should be made and used in a plastic glass or enameled container as it will corrode other metal containers in a few hours.

Roll newspapers into logs loosely and tie with heavy twine. Soak the logs in the solution for about a week, allow them to dry thoroughly—this will take several days.

During the Christmas season, place the logs on the burning wood. The result will be multi-colored flames of blue, green, red and orange to highlight the holiday season.
