Behind the 8-Ball



By the editor.

How can the stores or markets sell beef at present day prices? They, by rights, should be higher than they are — really, folks.

Take a calf up till its ready for the slaughter pens. It (to be prime or choice) would weigh around 1,000 pounds then. First the rancher had to have on investment in a 1200-pound mother cow (and maybe a bull). There's no short cut really — the mother cow has to be pastured and fed, watered, salted and tended to.

It takes 2,500 pounds of grain, 450 pounds of protein supplement and 12,300 pounds of hay, silage and pasture to get that calf up to 1,000 pounds. Plus substantial amounts of labor and capital to get that calf to the feedlot for finishing. The cost of feed and trucking has increased so much in recent months (and years) it is a wonder that beef is as cheap as it is.

Everyone gets a profit on that meat after the feed lot, too. The butcher, the processor, the wholesaler and the final retailer. All make a profit.

Feed supplement now costs from \$100 to \$190 a ton — if you can get it. Hay is high.

A steer dresses out about 65%. The meat is cut into several price cuts — from soup bones to sirloin steaks. (Maybe some one makes a big profit — but it looks like everyone makes a little or normal one to me.

Most ranchers could take their investment on their land, fences, wells, stock, etc. and sell out and invest that money at a safe 6% in government

Soil Map of Texas Now Available

A multi-colored general soil map of Texas has now been published and is available for sale to the public, a local conservation official said this week.

Hugh Lackey, district conservationist for the U. S. Soil Conservation Service at Sterling City, said the beautiful 36-by-45-inch map can be seen in his office. It shows soil information compiled from years of detailed soil survey work by the Soil Conservation Service in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Lackey said the map lists basic soil information which should be useful to teachers, planners, conservationists, contractors, engineers, developers, realtors, farmers, ranchers, researchers, and others.

The map give color delineations of the 73 major soil associations (containing 161 separate soil series) in the state and their extent. It also lists special limitations of the soils that affect their use.

Inset maps show rainfall, temperature, and length of growing season across the state. Current and potential urban and rural uses by soil associations are also listed.

Published cooperatively by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Soil Conservation Service, the map is available in two sheets or printed front and back. Printed front and back, the map costs \$3.00. Printed on two separate sheets, the map costs \$4.00.

For mounting on a wall, Lackey recommended the two-sheet style. For folding and filing, he said the map printed on both sides might be the best.

The map may be purchased from the Department of Agricultural Communications, Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas 77843.

Order blanks can be obtained from the SCS office at Sterling City.

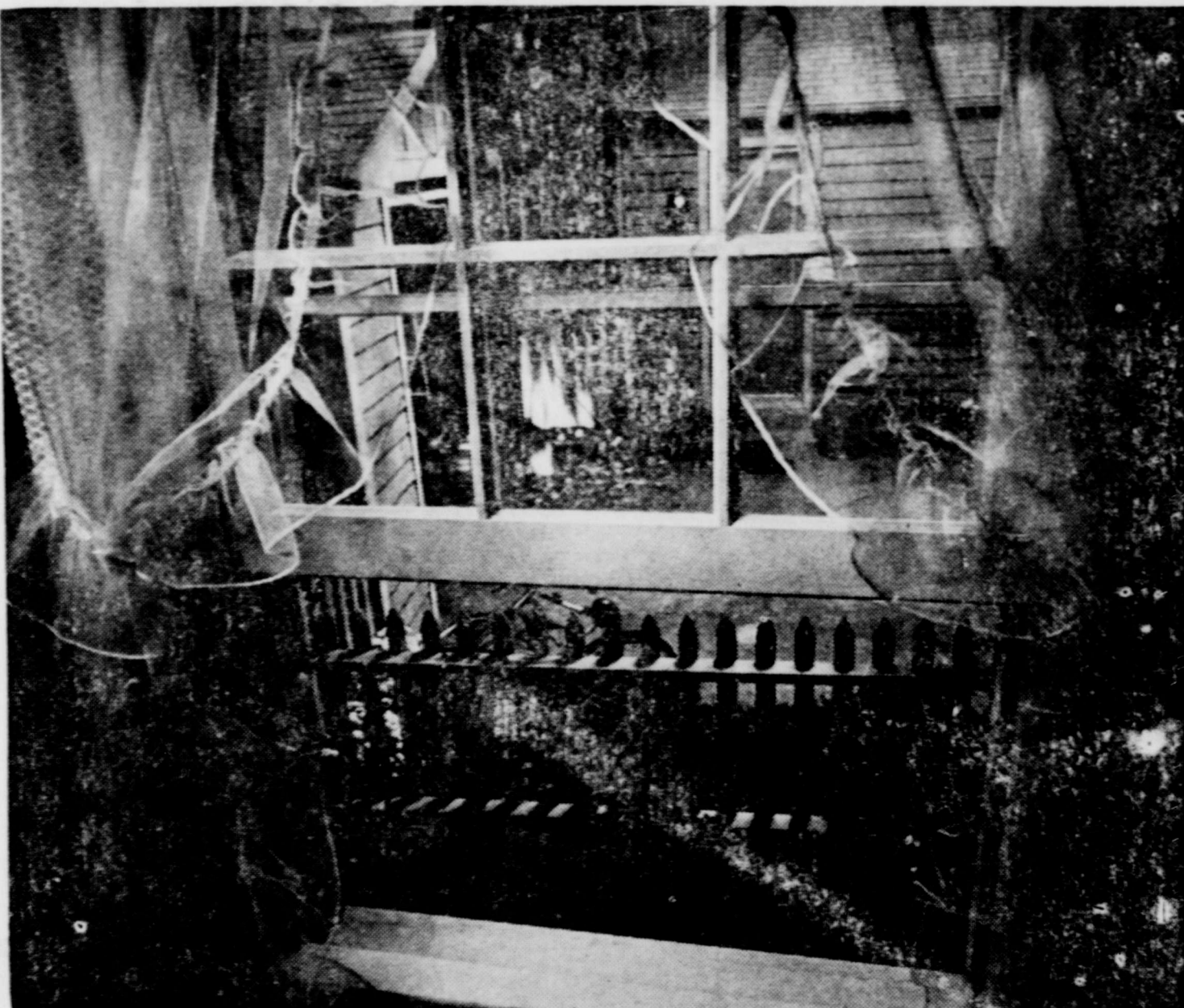

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO ENGAGE IN WEATHER MODIFICATION ACTIVITIES

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, THAT METEOROLOGY RESEARCH, INC., of 464 WEST WOODBURY ROAD, ALTADENA, CALIF. 91001 (State of Texas Weather Modification License No. 73-3), intends to engage in an operation to change or attempt to change by artificial methods the natural development of any and all atmospheric cloud forms or precipitation forms which occur in the troposphere for and on behalf of Texas Water Development Board located at P.O. Box 13087, Austin, Texas 78711, and will conduct a program of weather modification involving research, development, and associated investigations in atmospheric water resources leading to application of practical procedures for beneficially managing precipitation in Texas and other Southern Plains and Gulf States areas as follows:

1. Area in which equipment will be operated: In the vicinity of San Angelo, Texas, within the area bounded by Ballinger westward along State Highway 158 to the west boundary of Glasscock County; thence southward to the southwest corner of Reagan County; thence eastward to the southeast corner of Sutton County; thence northward to Menard County; thence northeast to Brady, and along Highway 233 to the Colorado River; thence northwest along the river to Ballinger. The area includes portions of the counties of Runnels, Coke, Sterling, Glasscock, Reagan, Irion, Tom Green, Concho, McCulloch, Menard, Schleicher, Crockett and Sutton.

2. The primary target area will be: Ballinger due west to a point about 12 miles southeast of Garden City (in Glasscock County); thence south to U.S. Highway 67 and south-southeast to Interstate 10 at the west border of Sutton County thence east to the east border of Sutton County and north-northeast to Eden, Millersview, and the Colorado River; thence northwest along the river to Ballinger.

3. The areas adjacent to target area which may be subject to effects of the operation are: Those lying within 25 miles of the target area described above.

4. The materials and methods to be used in conducting the operation are: A ground network consisting of rain-gages a weather radar, and a radiosonde set for taking upper-level atmospheric measurements; a cloud seeding aircraft equipped with a dispenser for seeding small quantities of hygroscopic materials below clouds; meteorological measurements in clouds.

The operation will extend during the period beginning about 15 May 1973 and ending about 30 June 1973.

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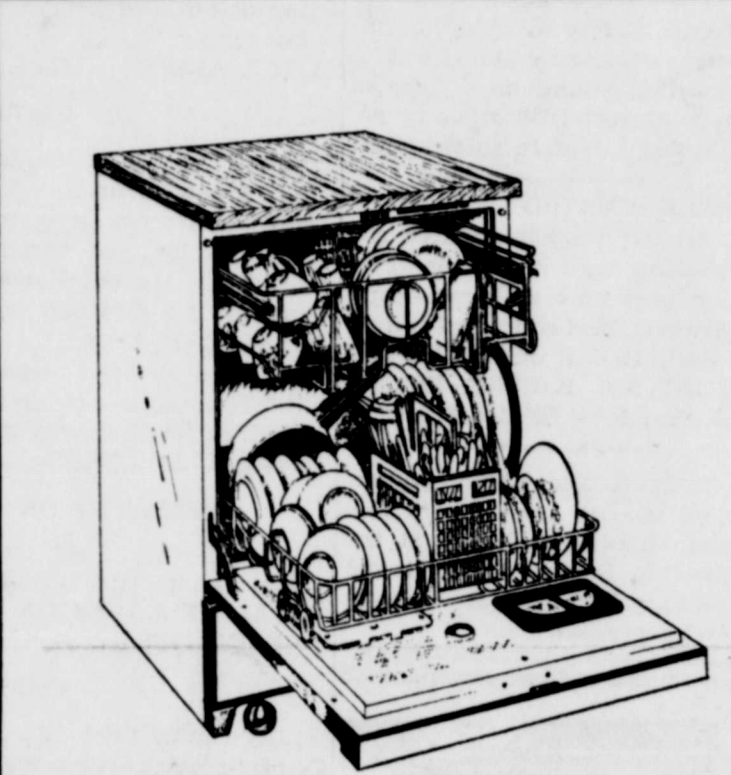

SCOUTS GIVE TRASH THE SACK

Three billion dollars! That's the estimated annual bill Americans are paying for public collection and disposal of garbage and solid waste — the third most expensive community service in the land, which is exceeded only by spending for highways and schools.
