Ewing F. McEntire Buried Monday

Dies from Accident Suffered Eleven Days Earlier

Ewing Fowler McEntire, 46, died in the Shannon Hospital in San Angelo, as a result of injuries suffered eleven days earlier on a ranch working cattle. He was thrown from his horse as a cow cut into his horse—and a separated collarbone.

Ewing had been unconscious all the time from the accident. Just twenty-nine years ago this month, his little brother, Billie Edwin, 13, was killed in an accident as his horse ran into a tree with him, striking his head.

Services were held here in the First Presbyterian Church at 2 p.m. with the pastor, C. A. Tucker, officiating. Burial was in the City Cemetery with Ross Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Ewing graduated from Sterling High School in 1943 and from New Mexico Military Institute in 1945. He served during and after World War II Army Occupational Forces in the Pacific. In 1950 he was graduated from Texas Tech University. He was a charter member of the Alpha Zeta fraternity and there he helped organized the Block and Bridle Club. He has ranched here in Sterling County since. He was married to Sallie Ann Heath of Colorado City on August 20, 1949.

Ewing was an elder in the First Presbyterian Church.

Survivors include his wife; two daughters, Pam McEntire, a student at Texas Tech and Melanie, of the home; one son, Mackey, a student also at Texas Tech; and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. F. McEntire. Pallbearers were Marvin and Melvin Foster, Jim Bob Clark, Jim Davis, Neal J. Reed, Delmar Radde, Charles Probandt, all of Sterling City and Duard Grosshans of California.

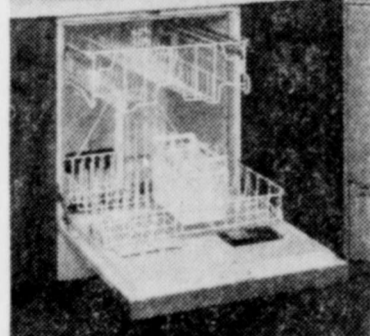

HIGHWAY WORK SET FOR STERLING COUNTY

AUSTIN—Contracts for highway construction in the San Angelo district have been awarded by the Texas Highway Commission.

The work will be under the supervision of District Engineer J.A. Snell and will be in Sterling County.

Bailey Bridge Company, Inc. and Seidel, Inc. of Abilene was awarded a contract for grading, structures, base and two course surface treatment on 6.4 miles of State Highway 158. Low bid was \$952,565.56.

The project extends from U.S. Highway 87 at Sterling City northeastward. H. L. Bailey of Sterling City is the Highway Department engineer in charge of the project which will take an estimated 200 working days.

Six Flags Over Texas Now Open

Arlington, Texas — SIX FLAGS Over Texas opened its 1973 season March 17.

The St. Patrick's Day opening is the earliest in the 12-year history of the theme park. Attendance figures—2,062,000 in 1972—rank the multi-million dollar entertainment center as Texas' top tourist attraction.

The Park, located in Arlington, midway between Dallas and Fort Worth, has played host to more than 20,000,000 visitors since 1961.

A new, 5-acre section is being added for the 1973 season. Called Good Time Square, the addition includes a games area, two major rides, a miniature circus, and other attractions.

Among other new features this year are a new fleet of miniature sports cars on the Happy Motoring Freeway, a strolling brass band, and entirely new shows in all of the Park's theatres.

SIX FLAGS will be open Saturdays and Sundays only until May 26 when daily operations begins the summer season. Spring and summer hours are 10 a.m. until 10 p.m.

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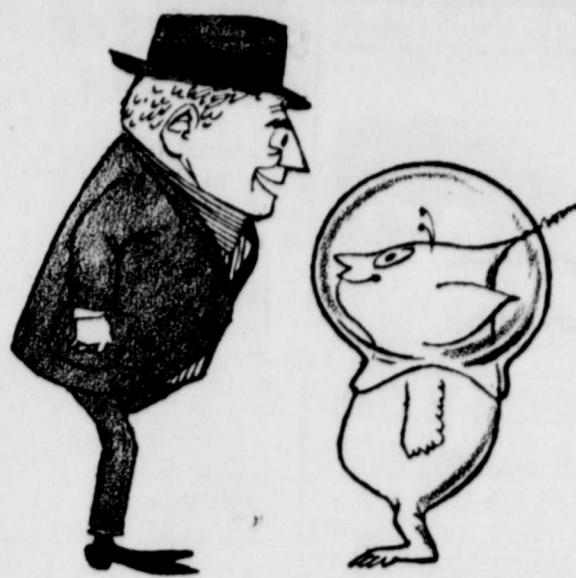

NOTARY PUBLIC APPOINTMENT TIME NEAR

Secretary of State Mark W. White, Jr., announced that all presently commissioned Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term which begins June 1, 1973 and ends June 1, 1975, must pay the required fee and file a new oath and bond with the County Clerk between May 1, 1973 and May 15, 1973, inclusive.

Mr. White emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State inasmuch as the law specifically requires that the County Clerk approve Notary Bonds and forward copies of the application to the Secretary of State.
