The Sterling Broncs played the Wall Hawks here, Friday May 25. Wall beat the Broncs 11 to 7 in a fine contest that placed Wall all alone in first place and dropped the Broncs to second place with a lone loss.

Roy Currington went the distance on the mound for the Broncs, giving up 7 hits. Currington also led the Bronc hitting attack with a home run and 3 RBIs.

Monday, May 28, the Broncs played host to Garden City and outscored them 16 to 13.

Timmy Rich started on the mound for the Broncs and gained his first win against no losses. The little southpaw walked only two men in his four innings pitched. Russell Davis and Jeff Copeland had to come in for relief duty on the mound.

Copeland had 5 RBIs and Russell Davis had 3. Timmy Rich batted 1,000 for the night getting 2 singles, a double, and drew one walk.

Thursday, May 31, the Broncs traveled to Bronte and wrapped up win number 4, 17 to 8.

Russell Davis started on the mound and Roy Currington finished the last 3 innings. The two pitchers combined to pitch a no-hitter against the Bombers.

Currington led the hitting attack with a home run, a double, 2 singles, and a run-scoring sacrifice fly to left field. He had 8 RBIs for the night. Timmy Rich had 3 RBIs via 2 singles Russell Davis hit a solo home run.

Monday, June 4, the Broncs were host to Robert Lee and sent them home with an 18 to 6 defeat.

Timmy Rich started on the mound, giving up four runs and gained his second win against no defeats. Dean Jones pitched one inning and Currington shut the Steers out in the last three innings.

The Broncs had a powerful first inning as Timmy Rich and Roy Currington hit back to back home runs as the first two Broncs up. Timmy also hit a second home run in the first. Russell Davis also blasted 2 home runs in the game. He led in RBIs with 6, followed Timmy Rich, Scott Davis, and Roy Currington each with 2.

The Broncs played Carsbad here Monday night.

The Broncs record is now 5 and 1 and are still in second place behind Wall. We play Wall in Wall Monday for a showdown and a chance to tie for the lead with them.

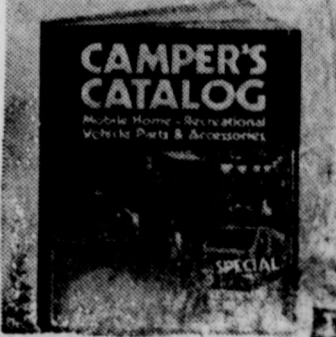

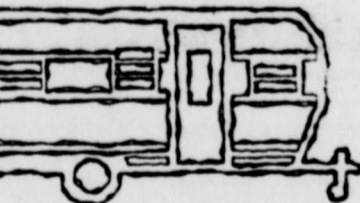

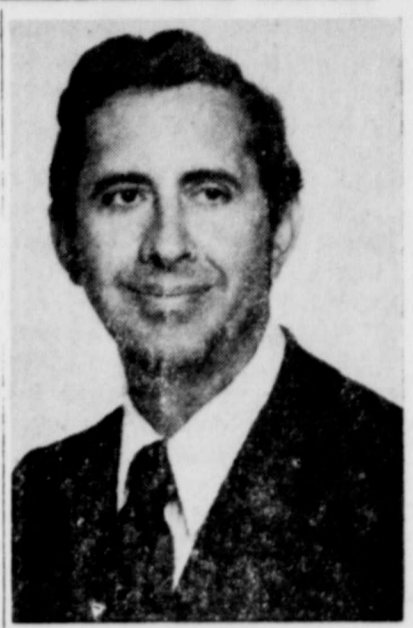

U.S. Border Patrol Seeks Applicants

The U.S. Border Patrol of the Immigration and Naturalization Service has an urgent need for physically fit young men desiring a career in Federal law enforcement work. This is a career opportunity for those who like action and outdoor work.

The Border Patrol is the mobile, uniformed enforcement branch of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Its principle purpose is to prevent the smuggling and illegal entry of aliens into the United States. The border patrolmen, called Immigration Patrol Inspectors, work along international boundaries, although their duties are not necessarily confined to these areas. They work in jeeps, cars, on foot, in boats and even in airplanes. Officers investigate violations of the immigration laws and frequently make arrests. They are often required to work irregular hours, under all weather conditions. These duties demand mental alertness as well as exceptional physical vigor and stamina.

The entrance salary of an Immigration Patrol Inspector is \$7,639 a year (Grade GS-7). There are promotional opportunities up to executive levels in the Immigration and Naturalization Service. On-the-job training offers splendid opportunities for promotion to positions of greater responsibility.

No experience is required for these positions. To qualify, applicants must pass a written test of verbal abilities, judgment, and aptitude for learning a foreign language. Candidates who pass the written test are called for oral interviews in the order of their standing on the list. The oral interview is designed to determine if the candidate has the personal qualities needed for the work. Applicants must also pass a rigid physical examination. Candidates who are selected for appointment are assigned to the Border Patrol Academy for a period of intensive training in such subjects as immigration laws, Spanish, physical training and marksmanship. Trainees receive full pay while in the academy.

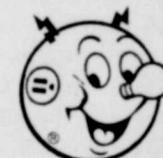

SCOUTS GIVE TRASH THE SACK

Three billion dollars! That's the estimated annual bill Americans are paying for public collection and disposal of garbage and solid waste — the third most expensive community service in the land...which is exceeded only by spending for highways and schools.

Concerned citizens, of course, can make significant contributions to cleaning up this national mess. As in Watertown, N. Y., where the initiative of the Environmental Systems Division of St. Regis Paper Company and a local Boy Scout Council is currently leading the way.

Recently, the more than 500 Boy Scouts of Jefferson and Lewis County launched an intensive environmental cleanup campaign to make their community a better place in which to live.

Soliciting the aid of the 30,000 homeowners in their area, the Scouts began their drive with the sale of St. Regis disposable refuse sacks. In addition to their 30-gallon capacity and convenience, these sacks were selected because — unlike plastic sacks — they will break down in sanitary land fill without adding to our ecological problems.

Watertown homeowners who purchase these sacks sep-

arate paper, cans, rags, metal, returnable bottles and miscellaneous glass. Then, free of charge, the Scouts pick up the differentiated sacks and dispose of them in ways compatible to our ecology. Glass bottles, for example, are sold for recycling; bio-degradable trash is sent to land fill sites. Provi-



sions have even been made to tow away abandoned automobiles.

The best part about the program is that everyone profits. The community gets a cleaner environment; the Scouts get the credit for a job well done — and the modest proceeds from selling the sacks and whatever trash they can...for the support of other worthwhile Scouting programs.

Social Security Tips

"Processing time can be cut in half if people are prepared when the time comes to apply for social security benefits," says J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

Being prepared is not as difficult as many people believe. Remember to take along your social security card or the card of the person on whose record you are filing. For a widow, this would be the social security card of her late husband. This may sound hard to believe, but many people do come in to file their application and leave their number at home.

The third thing that is needed in all claims is evidence of the worker's last year's earnings and an estimate of this year's earnings. Your W-2 Form or tax return for last year will give the information for last year. Be sure to bring these with you.

The next most important document to take with you is your birth certificate, if available. Proof of age is needed to qualify for nearly all social security benefits. If your birth was recorded when you were born or if you were baptized before age five, you will need one of these documents. If you don't have a copy, make arrangements now to get one, Mr. Talbot advises.

If your birth was not recorded and you were not baptized before age five, there are other documents you can use. In most cases, the earlier the record was made the better it is for helping to establish your date of birth.

"How do I know my work under social security is being credited to my record, and how do I find out about it? This is one of the questions most frequently asked," says J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

In explaining the process involved in reporting social security, Mr. Talbot said, "When you work for wages, your employer deducts social security tax from your paycheck each pay day. At the end of each calendar quarter, he submits your name and number with payment for these taxes to Internal Revenue. Internal Revenue forwards copies to social security's main office in Baltimore, Maryland. Your wages are then posted to your record. The same process is followed for a self-employed person except that his earnings are recorded yearly."

Mr. Talbot states that the possibility of an error being made in the process does exist. He recommends that you request a statement of your earnings at least every three years.

All you have to do to secure the statement is to send a post card request available at your social security office to Baltimore, Maryland. If the reply you receive is incorrect in any way, contact the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris Avenue (P. O. Box 3808) in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area.

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New Highway Construction for Sterling County

The Texas Highway Department has announced a new highway construction project on SH 158 from US 87 at Sterling City, Northeast for a distance of 6.5 miles. The work will consist of complete reconstruction of the existing highway. The Texas Highway Department and the contractor, Bailey Bridge Co., Inc., of Abilene and Seidel, Inc., of San Angelo stated that construction will begin about May 28th and will be completed by May 1974.

H. L. Bailey, Supervising Resident Engineer for the Texas Highway Department on the project, explained that traffic will be carried through the construction work on detours treated with emulsion and on completed base courses treated with emulsion as work progresses. Adequate barricades and warning signals will be prominently displayed, but motorists should use extreme caution along the work areas as it will be heavily traveled by large highway construction equipment. The entire project will be zoned for a maximum speed of 45 miles per hour which should be substantially reduced in the work areas. Cooperation of the public is requested in obeying all traffic signals, warning signs and speed zones.
