ETIOUETTE OF GOLF-Please be courteous. Allow

faster players to play through. All players are required to carry a bag and clubs: do not play out of someone else's bag.

No player should stand close to or directly behind the ball. move, or talk, when a player is making a stroke.

No player should play from the tee until the golfers in front have played their second strokes and are out of range, nor play up to the putting green until the golfers in front have holed out and moved away. Don't try putts over again when others are following you.

Players looking for a lost ball should allow other matches coming up to pass them; they should signal them to come through and having given such signal, they should not continue their play until these players have passed and are out of range.

#### Food Stamp Program Set Up for Sterling

The first Post Office issuance of Food Stamps under the new state-wide Food Stamps Program will take place at 10 a.m., October 1, 1973, in the Sterling City Post Office, according to Postmaster W. R. Brooks and Carrol D. Crum, Regional Administrator of the Texas Department of Public Welfare.

Sterling County currently has a Food Stamp program, but it will be replaced with the new state-wide plan which has installed this new issuance system. Certified households will be able to go to the Post Office at their own convenience and buy their allotment of Food Stamps. They can buy their stamps between the hours of 10 a.m. and 3 pm. Monday throuh Friday. except on Federal holidays

Pilot projects in three Texas counties have shown that Post Office issuance is a faster and better way for certified households to get their stamps

Eligibility is determined by size of household, total net income. resources. and other con-siderations. Persons who are unemployed, work part-time, or receive small pension checks should contact the Food Stamp Office at the Commissioners' courtroom in Sterling City. People who are not employed must register for and accept work.

The new state-wide Food Stamp program is administered by the Texas Department of Public Welfare and is financed by the State of Texas. The Food Stamps are provided by the United States Department of Agri-

## Food Stamp Program To Begin October 1

The new statewide food stamp program will begin operating on October 1. 1973, in Sterling County This was announced by Archie Morris, acting supervisor of the State Department of Public Welfare.

The statewide food stamp program will replace the commodity foods program currently operating in this county—explains Mr. Morris. The statewide program was made possible when the 1972 Texas Legislature appropriated \$7.7 million for a state-administered, state-financed state-wide food stamp program.

The State Department of Public Welfare will administer the

new program and the United States Department of Agriculture will provide the food stamps and bonus stamps.

Eligible households pay a determined amount for food stamps and are then given bonus stamps based on the size of the household and their total net income. Bonus stamps make up the difference between what a household can pay for food and what is necessary for a nutritious diet.

Also, bonus stamps mean many dollars worth of new business for the community. Bonus stamps represent money that low-income households would not otherwise have to spend at local grocery stores.

A recent study of three rural food stamp communities showed that food stamps represented from five to ten percent of the total retail food sales. Households are certified eligible for food stamps at the food stamp office located in the Commissioner's Court Room, 1st floor of the Sterling County ourt House. Food Stamp workers will be in Sterling City each Tuesday, 9:30 a.m. to 3;30 p.m.

Certified households will then receive Authorization to Purchase (ATP) cards in the mail which will tell them how many stamps they are eligible for and how much money, if any, they must pay for them.

The ATP card and the necessary cards are redeemable for food stamps at local issuance offices.

Participating grocers accept food stamps for the purchase of most foods and food products. Food stamps cannot be used to buy alcoholic beverages, tobacco, paper goods, etc.

Participation in the food stamp

program is voluntary and does not prevent the household from receiving any other benefits for which the members might be eligible.

## OF CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS PROPOSED SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1973

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 8)

Article III, Sections 5, 24 and 49a and Article VIII, Section 6 of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Provide for regular annual sessions of the Legislature. The regular session in each odd-numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 180 days. The regular session in each even numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 60 days and would be limited to consideration of fiscal matters and any emergency matters submitted by the Governor. The 60 day session could be extended by the Governor for a period not to exceed 30 days;

Provide an annual salary for members of the Legislature not exceeding \$15,000 per year and a per diem not exceeding \$18 per day for each day of each regular session or special session;

Provide that no appropriation of money shall be made for a longer term than one year and direct the Comptroller to make annual estimates of anticipated revenue rather than biennial estimates.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for annual regular sessions of the legislature; and to provide an annual salary of \$15,000 and per diem for the members of the legislature, effective in January, 1975."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 7)

Article XVI, Sections 50 and 51 of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses.

Presently a single adult person is not entitled to claim a homestead exemption and a married man can abandon a family homestead without the consent of his wife.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses."

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

Article VIII, Sections 1-a and 1-b of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

(S.J.R. 13)

Extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the residential homesteads of unmarried adults.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the homesteads of unmarried adults."

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 1)

Article XVI, Section 59, of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Subsection (e) which:

Provides that no law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless a copy of the oposed law is delivered the commissioners court of each county and to the gov-erning body of each incorporated city or town in whose jurisdiction said district or any part thereof is or will be located. Each such commissioners court and governing body may file its written consent or opposition to the proposed law with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives. Each special law creating such a district must comply with general laws then in effect relating to consent by political subdivisions to the creation of such districts.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as

follows:

"The constitutional amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws creating certain conservation and reclamation districts."

NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 12)

Article XI, Section 7 of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide that all counties and cities bordering on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico are authorized to levy a tax to pay for bonds issued for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a majority vote of the resident property tax-payers. Counties and cities are presently authorized to levy such taxes and this amendment only changes the required vote from a two-thirds majority to a simple majority.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional

"The constitutional amendment authorizing counties and cities bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to issue bonds

for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a vote of the resident property taxpayers."

> NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 26)

Article V, Section 8 of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new paragraph which:

Provides that the district court, concurrently with the county court, shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court and in a probate proceeding shall also have the jurisdiction otherwise conferred on it by law. It also provides that the legislature may increase, diminish, or eliminate the jurisdic-tion of the district court or county court in probate matters, may adopt rules governing the filing, distri-bution, or transfer of cases and proceedings as between the courts having jurisdiction of probate matters, and may provide that all appeals in probate matters shall be to the courts of civil ap-

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment stating that the district court concurrently with the county court shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court, and providing the jurisdiction thereof, and further pro-viding that in any pro-bate proceeding the district court shall also have jurisdiction otherwise conferred upon it by law, and further providing that the legislature may increase, diminish or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, and further pro-viding that the legislature shall have power to adopt rules governing the filing, distribution and transfer of all such cases and proceedings as be-tween district courts, county courts, and other courts having jurisdiction thereof, and further providing that the legislature may provide that all appeals in such matters shall be to the courts of (civil) appeals."

> NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 6)

Article III, Section 49-b of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund. This amendment increases the present \$400 million authorization to \$500 million;

Remove the present provision which permits buying of land only by those veterans who served between September 16, 1940 and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the armed conflict in Viet Nam. This amendment would allow all veterans who serve after September 16, 1940 to buy land from the Veterans' Land Fund, provided they are otherwise qualified;

Provide that, in the event of the death of an eligible

Texas veteran after the veteran has filed with the Board an application and contract of sale to purchase through the Board the tract selected by him or her and before the purchase has been completed, then the surviving spouse may complete the transaction.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutionalamendment to provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund."

NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 29)

Article XI, of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 5(a)

Authorizes and requires incorporated cities, towns, and villages, regardless of population and notwithstanding the constitutional limitations on total tax rates, to levy such annual ad valorem taxes on the taxable property in the city, town or village as are necessary to pay the principal of and interest on, when due, the general obligations hereinafter issued town, or village. The legislature is empowered to limit by general or special law the total principal amount of general obligations which may be issued, but unless and until the legislature acts to do so, the limitations established by statute with respect to the total principal amount of bonds which may be issued by independent school districts shall apply as the rate limitation on cities, towns, and vil-

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it appears on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize cities, towns, and villages to levy such ad valorem taxes as are sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on their general obligations hereafter issued subject to the restrictions provided by law."

NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 25)

Article VIII of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 2C

Allows the Legislature, by general law, to exempt all real and personal property used by non-profit water supply corporations or cooperatives from all property taxes. The exemption would apply only to such property as is reasonably necessary to conduct the business of a non-profit water supply corporation or cooperative.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from property taxes certain property used by a non-profit water supply corporation or a non-profit water supply co-operative."

NOTICE OF COMPLIANCE WITH THE CIVIL RIGHTS ACT OF 1964 PUBLIC NOTICE

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
