Sterling County marked up its third confirmed case of screwworms for 1973 this week. The sample, taken from a cancer eyed cow, was sent in by the McDonald and Son ranch twenty-five miles west of Sterling City.

The three confirmed cases this year is far behind last year's total for the same time. This applies to the State of Texas as well as Sterling County. Through the end of August 1972, a total of 18,341 cases had been confirmed in Texas compared to 1,013 for this year; Sterling County had confirmed over 200 cases by the same time last year compared to the three cases up to the present time.

Screwworms have usually been worse during the fall months of the year in this area. In view of this, livestock producers are urged to maintain their vigilance for all suspected cases. The showers and high humidity we are experiencing make ideal conditions for the pests. This will continue until the first real cold weather of the fall.

Mailing tubes and collection vials are available as usual in the county agent's office and the feed store here. Keep a couple handy in the pickup.

Interested livestock producers are reminded of the hearing in Austin on Monday, October 1, regarding the new brucellosis control regulations for Texas. The changes being proposed will move Texas toward a Certified-Brucellosis Free Status and put the state in compliance with the standards of other states to which cattle are shipped. The hearing is to be held in Room 117 of the Sam Houston State Office Building in Austin beginning at 9:00 A. M. Any interested person is invited to attend.

When the new regulations are approved, they will be published and until that time they are only *proposed* regulations.

For about one week in March the sheep barn on the San Angelo Stock Show Grounds is full of sheep. For the remainder of the year, with the exception of the Rambouillet and Suffolk ram sales, the barn has been empty. But, that has been changed this year.

In the barn now are 228 feeder lambs, the subject of nutrition and disease research by scientists of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. The sheep barn was offered to the Experiment Station by the San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo Association last spring when they learned the center near San Angelo did not have the facilities to carry out this research at the present time.

Dr. Millard Calhoun is in charge of the nutrition study comparing the relative value of alfalfa hay, peanut hulls, and all-grain rations in the feedlot. The disease research project is under the direction of Dr. Charles Livingston. Information obtained in the project should prove of value to lamb feedlot

### Social Security Tips

Social security checks should be cashed within a reasonable time to prevent loss or theft, even though there's no time limit on cashing them, according to social security officials here.

'If your check is lost or stolen, get in touch with your nearest social security office at once,' a spokesman said. 'The check can be replaced, but it takes time. Handle your check carefully when you get it and you won't have to wait while it's being replaced.'

Social security pays over \$4 billion a month in benefit checks to almost 29 million people—eligible retired and disabled workers and their families and families of deceased workers who worked long enough under social security.

The San Angelo Social Security Office is now taking applications for supplemental security income payments, a Federal program scheduled to start in 1974 that will establish an income floor for people in financial need who are 65 or over, or blind, or disabled, according to J.M. Talbot, social security manager.

But, people already getting State old age assistance or State aid because they are blind or disabled don't have to apply, he said. They'll be getting more information later this year about how the program will help them.

'The first monthly payments under the Federal program will be made in January, 1974,' Mr. Talbot said. 'Until then, State and local public assistance offices will continue to make payments in the usual way.'

People not getting public assistance now who think they may be eligible for the new Federal

payments should call or write social security to find out if they should apply, according to J.M. Talbot.

'Federal supplemental security income payments will be made by the Social Security Administration,' Mr. Talbot said. 'But the program will be financed by Federal general revenues—not by social security contributions from workers and employers. It's not the same as social security.'

The aim of the new program is to provide supplemental payments in cases of need so that people 65 or over, or blind, or disabled will have a basic cash income of at least \$130 a month for one person and \$195 a month for a couple.

'This doesn't mean that every eligible person or couple will be getting that much from the Federal Government every month,' Mr. Talbot said. 'The amount of the Federal payment any person gets will depend on how much other income he has.'

'Eligibility for Federal payments will depend not only on the amount of income people have but on the value of their assets,' Mr. Talbot said.

'If you're single—or married but not living with your husband or wife—you can own things worth up to \$1500 and still get Federal payments,' he said. 'A couple can own things worth up to \$2250 and get payments. Not everything you own has to be counted toward your total assets, however.'

'A home of reasonable value will not be counted as an asset,' Mr. Talbot said. Personal effects and household goods won't count in most cases. Insurance policies or a car may not affect eligibility either, but it will depend on their value.

Certain income will be considered in deciding on an application for supplemental security in-

come. The first \$20 a month of income generally won't affect the Federal payment at all, Mr. Talbot said. 'In addition, people who are working part time should know that the first \$65 a month of earnings won't be included in counting their income and only half of the rest of their additional earnings will be counted, he said.

Apart from earnings, other income above the first \$20 a month generally will reduce the Federal payment. This includes social security checks, veterans payments, workmen's compensation, pensions, annuities, and gifts, Mr. Talbot said. And, if you live in someone else's household, your basic Federal payment will be reduced by one-third before other income that may affect your payment is deducted.

Even though payments cannot start until January, 1974, we're starting to take applications now so we can process them ahead of time and avoid delays that might occur if there's a rush of applications right at the end of the year, Mr. Talbot said.

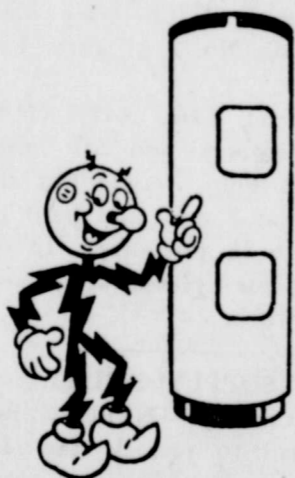

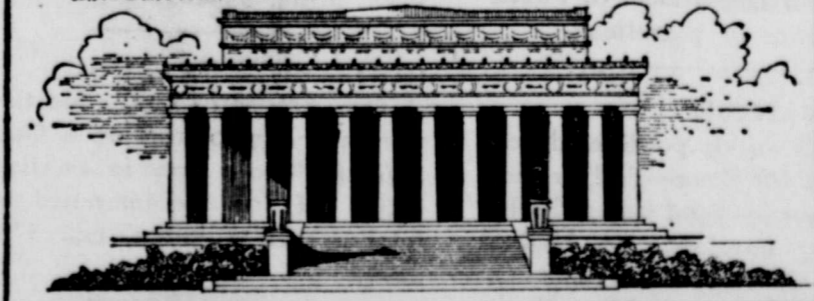

### Food Stamp Program Set Up for Sterling

The first Post Office issuance of Food Stamps under the new state-wide Food Stamps Program will take place at 10 a.m., October 1, 1973, in the Sterling City Post Office, according to Postmaster W. R. Brooks and Carrol D. Crum, Regional Administrator of the Texas Department of Public Welfare.

Sterling County currently has a Food Stamp program, but it will be replaced with the new state-wide plan which has installed this new issuance system. Certified households will be able to go to the Post Office at their own convenience and buy their allotment of Food Stamps. They can buy their stamps between the hours of 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. Monday through Friday, except on Federal holidays.

Pilot projects in three Texas counties have shown that Post Office issuance is a faster and better way for certified households to get their stamps.

Eligibility is determined by size of household, total net income, resources, and other considerations. Persons who are unemployed, work part-time, or receive small pension checks should contact the Food Stamp Office at the Commissioners' courtroom in Sterling City. People who are not employed must register for and accept work.

The new state-wide Food Stamp program is administered by the Texas Department of Public Welfare and is financed by the State of Texas. The Food Stamps are provided by the United States Department of Agriculture.

#### STERLING GOLF ASSOCIATION RULES

U.S.G.A. rules to govern play except where modified by local rules.

1. Out of bounds—in or across all public streets, highways or fences.

PENALTY—1 stroke: Ball must be played from point at which it went out of bounds.

2. Fairway Markers—RED—100 yards from green—YELLOW—50 yards from green.

3. No bicycles or motorcycles on course.

4. All golfers must start at Number One Tee box.

5. Cars must be parked east of Scout Hut and east of Number One Tee box.

6. No power driven carts allowed on course. Keep all carts off greens: do not lay bags on greens.

7. More than Fivesome not allowed at any time.

FAIRWAYS: You may improve your lie 12" laterally with club head—but not your position and tee up.

SHOES: Ladies high heels, western boots, track, football and baseball shoes not allowed on course.

Any flagrant destruction of the course will be cause for removal.

#### ETIQUETTE OF GOLF—

Please be courteous. Allow faster players to play through. All players are required to carry a bag and clubs: do not play out of someone else's bag.

No player should stand close to or directly behind the ball, move, or talk, when a player is making a stroke.

No player should play from the tee until the golfers in front have played their second strokes and are out of range, nor play up to the putting green until the golfers in front have holed out and moved away. Don't try putts over again when others are following you.

Players looking for a lost ball should allow other matches coming up to pass them; they should signal them to come through and having given such signal, they should not continue their play until these players have passed and are out of range.

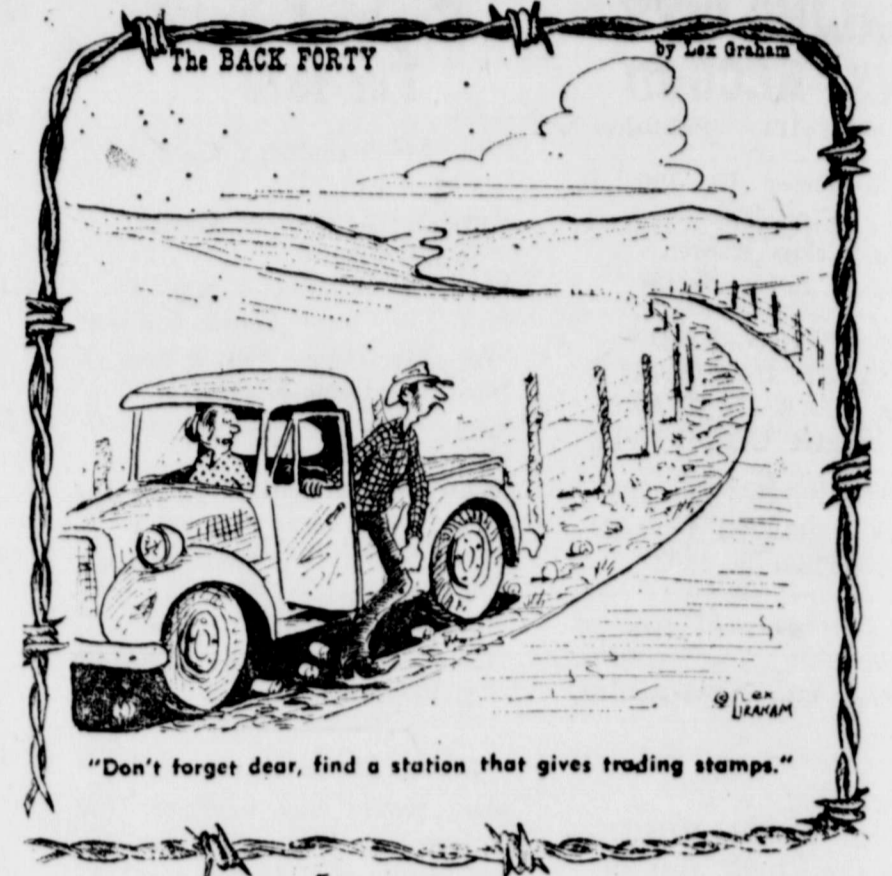
