### Social Security to Handle All Payments

State and Federal agencies are working together on the supplemental security income program that starts making payments in January to people with little or no income who are 65 or over, or blind or disabled. The program is a Federal-State partnership with each partner doing what it can do best. according to J.M. Talbot, social security manager.

Mr. Talbot said the Federal program will coperate with State and local public assistance programs to establish the Nation's first uniform income floor for people in need who are 65 or over. or blind, or disabled. Social security and the Department of Public Welfare are working together so the new payment system will get off to a new start in January, he said.

People getting welfare assistance payments in December because they're 65 or over, or blind, or disabled generally will continue to get payments in January, Mr. Talbot said. They don't have to apply. Their combined State and Federal assistance payments in January will be at least as much as their welfare assistance payments were in December, Mr. Talbot said. They will also be eligible for Medicaid.

Medicaid, vocational rehabilitation for disabled people and other social services, such as child care, family counselin, etc.. will be administered by the State Department of Public Welfare. The Social Security Administration will determine eligibility for supplemental security income, make the Federal payments, keep records, and work to prevent fraud, according to the social security manager.

The amount of the supplemental security income checks people will get will depend on other

income they might have. People with no other income at all will have a basic cash income of at least \$130 a month for one person and \$195 for a couple, Mr. Talbot said. People with other income may get reduced supplemental income checks.

Although the supplemental security income program will be administered by the Social Security Administration, payments will be financed by Federal general tax revenues-not by social security contributions from workers and employers, Mr. Talbot said.

Social security offices are taking applications from people who are 65 or over, or blind, or disabled and aren't getting public assisatnce but who think they might be eligible for supplemental income payments. People getting State or local assistance don't have to do anything about supplemental security income, Mr. Talbot said. They'll get additional information about the program from social security and the Department of Public Welfare. Until the supplemental security income program starts in January, Mr. Talbot said, the Department of Public Welfare will continue to make payments in the usual way.

### Highway Projects for Sterling County Set

Projects in Sterling County are included in a \$40.7 million program to increase safety and improve sections of non-Interstate highways in Texas.

District Engineer J.A. Snell of San Angelo said work to be performed under the annual program includes such things as widening of pavements and structures, reconditioning, resurfacing, providing additional surfacing, sodding, and improvement of shoulders and other miscellaneous work.

Statewide, the 1974 State Highway Safety and Betterment and Farm to Market Road Improvement Program includes work on 5,095.2 miles of US and State—numbered highways and Farm to Market Roads. The program includes 810 individual projects in 209 counties of the State.

Fifty-seven percent of the work statewide will be on US and State—numbered highways and 41 percent on Farm to Market Roads with two percent reserved for later assignment.

Projects in Sterling County are—U.S. Hwy. 87, from 1.3 miles south of Glassock County line to 7.0 miles west of Sterling City—Seal Coat.

State Hwy. 158, from U. S. Hwy. 87 to Glasscock County Line—Seal Coat.

### Social Security Tips

Social security checks should be cashed within a reasonable time to prevent loss or theft, even though there's no time limit on cashing them, according to social security officials here.

'If your check is lost or stolen, get in touch with your nearest social security office at once,' a spokesman said. 'The check can be replaced, but it takes time. Handle your check carefully when you get it and you won't have to wait while it's being replaced.'

Social security pays over \$4 billion a month in benefit checks to almost 29 million peopleeligible retired and disabled workers and their families and families of deceased workers who worked long enough under social security.

### SCOUTS GIVE TRASH THE SACK

Three billion dollars! That's the estimated annual bill Americans are paying for public collection and disposal of garbage and solid waste the third most expensive community service in the land. .which is exceeded only by spending for highways and schools.

Concerned citizens, of course, can make significant contributions to cleaning up this national mess. As in Watertown, N. Y., where the initiative of the Environmental Systems Division of St. Regis Paper Company and a local Boy Scout Council is currently leading the way.

Glass bottles, for example, are sold for recycling; bio-degradable trash is sent to land fill sites. Provi-



sions have even been made to tow away abandoned automobiles.

The best part about the program is that everyone profits. The community gets a cleaner environment; the Scouts get the credit for a job well done and the modest proceeds from selling the sacks and whatever break down in sanitary land fill trash they can. . . for the support of other worthwhile Scouting programs.


