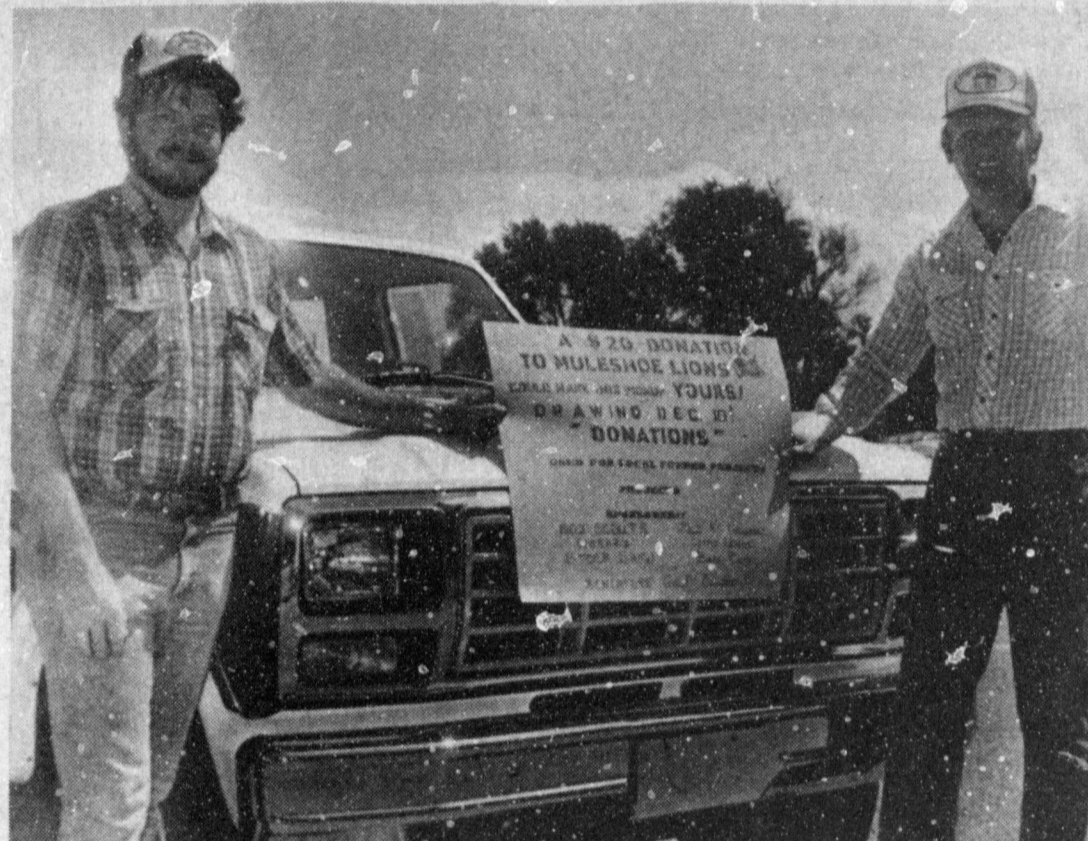

### Conservation Districts Receive Technical Assistance Funds

Soil Conservation Districts in need of additional technical personnel are expected to begin hiring qualified persons after September 1. "With the 68th Legislature recently appropriating \$1,176,000 to the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board to assist soil and water conservation districts acquire needed technical personnel, 164 SWCDs have applied for funds to boost their technical assistance program," said Harvey Davis, executive Director, TSSWCB.

"From a local standpoint, in getting conservation practices applied to the land in a voluntary program we need technical assistance available to landowners to assist them in using their own resources for implementing an individual conservation plan," said James Wedel, chairman, Blackwater Valley SWCD.

"Simply put, this means that we encourage landowners or operators within our district to take advantage of technical counseling in site selection, engineering and the design of measures or management systems which would solve a conservation problem on a farm or ranch," added Wedel.

According to information from the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District, Ralph Roming, a 44 year old Farmer County farmer from Bovina, is already on the job in Austin serving his four year term as a commissioner for the Texas Water Commission. The appointment was announced on September 2nd, and Ralph says he learned of it only an hour before being sworn in.

### Substantial Amounts Of Moisture Noted

Life-giving moisture fell on Bailey County on both Saturday and Monday of this week, leaving, however scattered, from near two inches in some places north and south of the County to as little as 3/10 in others.

A survey of farmers and agricultural businessmen in the area indicated that the moisture would be a great boon to the late feed grain, wheat lands and dry pasture lands within the County. Cotton has about reached the point where the rain will not make much difference some said, due to the extreme stress in previous weeks of hot, dry weather.

Bailey County Extension Agent, Spencer Tanksley told the Journal Wednesday morning that during the past few days, the heaviest of the rains seemed to be concentrated in the Bula-Enochs area with Clauch Gin reporting 1 to 1 1/2 inches of rain on Monday. However, other reports from Lazbuddie's Sherley-Anderson Grain indicated that rainfall to the south of Lazbuddie towards Muleshoe amounted to as much as two inches in some places. An employee of the Grain facility there stated that east of Lazbuddie reports of 1 9/10 were received and about 6 miles south at least 1 1/2 inches fell. Some pea sized hail came with the rain, but was not thought to have caused any damage. Corn harvest has just begun to get under way in that area and southwest of Lazbuddie is the direction it's coming from. So far, the turnout seems to be good, the employee stated. Farmers there are hoping for from 9 to 10 thousand pounds per acre this year. Late feed grain looks good in that area. Seven-tenths inches of rain was received at the elevator proper, but a mile north no moisture was recorded. Reports indicated that the rain fell hard and much of it ran off, leaving a question as to how much good it really did.

The Ruel Kirby farm north of Maple reported 1 8/10 inches of rain overall at their location. Kirby indicated that the rain was heavier on towards Maple to just past the County Barn. West of the Kirby's towards the New Mexico line, 7/10 inches were reported, however, the Goodland area received no moisture or little during the two rains. Kirby stated that the Enochs area had received in places, as much as two inches, but pointed out the fact that it was very spotted. According to Kirby, some of the crops in that southern part of the County had looked good prior to the last moisture because of previous rains.

#### STRAWBERRY PINEAPPLE JAM

2 cups prepared fruit (about 1 qt. fully ripe strawberries)  
1 can (8-1/4 oz.) crushed pineapple in syrup, drained  
2 tablespoons lemon juice 5 cups (2-1/4 lb.) sugar  
1 pouch Certo fruit pectin

First prepare the fruit. Stem and thoroughly crush, one layer at a time, about 1 quart strawberries. Measure 2 cups into 6- or 8-quart saucepot. Add pineapple and lemon juice.

Then make the jam. Thoroughly mix sugar into fruit in saucepot. Place over high heat, bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and at once stir in fruit pectin. Skim off foam with metal spoon. Ladle quickly into hot jars, filling to within 1/4 inch of top. Cover and process in boiling water bath for 5 minutes.

One invalid factor I see considered frequently is if the business can be bought on credit. No nation in the history of the world was ever sitting as pretty. If we want anything, all we have to do is go buy it on credit. That leaves us without any economic problems, except perhaps someday to have to pay.

There are a number of valid factors that enter into the value of any business, such as location, products sold, and age of the business.

There are several acceptable ways to "help" determine the value of a business.

The "book value" is simply the cost of the various assets less depreciation and the outstanding debt. Since this is not a true indication of the worth of the business, it is seldom used to determine a sales price.

The second method is the "asset replacement value." This method is not valid since it does not take into consideration the earning capacity of the assets.

Another is "liquidation value." This is the fair market value (auction value) of the various assets minus the debt owed against them. This value is the lowest any seller should accept since he could simply hold an auction and realize this amount.

The most common method of valuing a business is determined by the "right to future income." This figure is arrived at by some multiple of earnings. You may have heard it said that a business is worth four times net earnings, or eight times net earnings, or whatever. The multiple of earnings you pay is determined in part by the industry and nature of the business and by what percentage of return you are looking for on your investment.

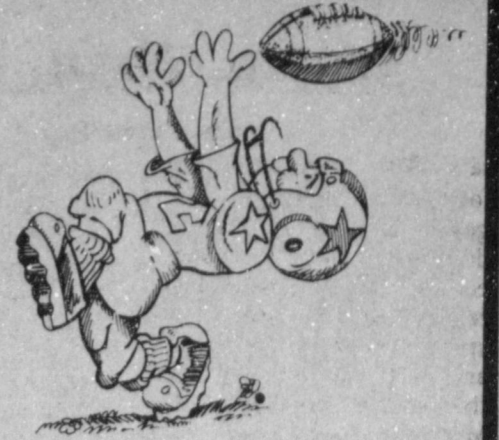

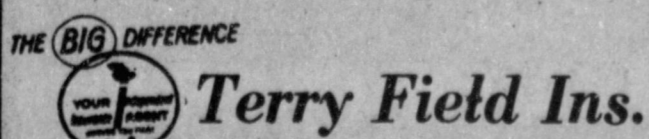

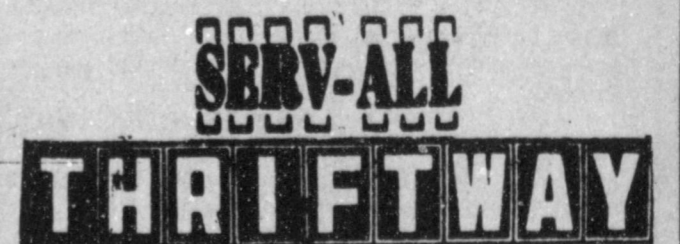

Those crops that looked and were stressed before the rains will not be helped much now, except for feed grain, wheat and pasture lands. The moisture will help to some extent however, he admitted.

Mrs. Don Seales who lives west of Muleshoe on FM 1760 told the Journal that only showers were received at their residence. However, Seales farms several other places and reports that east of Stegall at least 1 1/2 inches were received in two rains on Monday. In the Longview area about 3/10 inches of moisture fell and near the old Monument Church site area a total of 1 3/10 was received overall on Monday. There is a lot of pasture land in that area and it will be helped significantly by the moisture.

Other reports throughout the area showed that near the West Camp area about 2/10 inches of moisture was received. On the Buster Kittrell farm 8 miles south of Muleshoe on highway 214 about 9/10 inch fell and six miles northeast of Muleshoe on the Kenneth Hanks farm they received 1 4/10 inches of moisture. Reports west of Stegall and North showed from 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 inches on Saturday night. The Needmore area received showers of about 1/2 inch, however some isolated areas were heavier on the moisture count.

The city of Muleshoe received from 3/10 to an inch

or better in the town as a whole. Reports were varied from different locations, with the heaviest seeming to be in the southwestern part of the city.

According to Tanksley, and most of the farmers that the Journal talked with, the rain will help in most cases. The only crop that is questionable is cotton, since the growing season is about over for that crop. The general consensus is that feed grains will be helped and wheat land will be able to be planted now, or soon. Corn is near the harvest stage and most of it is irrigated in any case.

One farmer said that if just a little more moisture were received, it might help the situation on cotton crops for the areas of the county that have had previous moisture.

All in all, the moisture was considered to be good, but spotted. A front with a south-southwest movement was the major factor in the rains, and more showers are forecast throughout the week, along with cooler temperatures.

The recent moisture will be a great help to cattle feeders and cattlemen who need it for their parched range land. Most of the Journal talked with hoped to be able to hang on a little longer and not have to disperse their herds at a loss. The early thinning of herds will cause a surplus of beef now, but higher prices at the food markets in later months.

"To insure that SCS standards are met technical guidance, training, and direction will be provided by SCS personnel here," said Wedel.

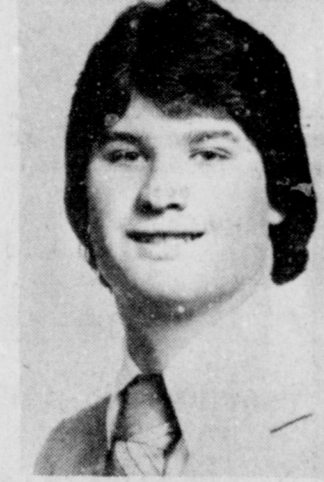
"Recent reductions in federal conservation programs has resulted in the SCS not being able to provide technical assistance at sufficient levels to meet current and future conservation needs in Texas. At the present time on a statewide basis, the SCS averages less than one technician per field office and does not employ any full time clerks in the field," said Davis.

The need for local technical assistance to landowners or operators can be illustrated this way. This fiscal year the Soil Conservation Service in Texas alone has received about 175 thousand technical assistance requests. Of that number, about 50 thousand persons were recipients of technical assistance through local conservation districts.

"In light of these figures it is obvious that if the conservation needs of farmers and ranchers in Texas are to be met in a satisfactory manner resources in addition to those provided by the federal government for technical assistance will be needed," said Davis.

"It became apparent to our state lawmakers in the last legislative session that Texas would have to take steps to provide a more stable method of protecting our agricultural lands so that they remain productive and viable. From our vantage point, we are seeing Texas change rapidly due

to a mushrooming population and economic growth. As a result, the state's land resources are being utilized more intensively than ever before," he added.
