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The San Angelo Stock Show last week ended the spring show circuit for Sterling County 4-H Club members. Sixteen club members had thirty-one lambs, five steers, thirty-two Rambouillet, one pig, and one horse entered in the competition. Competition was very tough in all divisions and only the club members showing the Rambouillet managed to get into the prize money category.

Becky Hodges won the Wallace Dameron Memorial Award in the Junior Rambouillet show. This award, donated by some Texas Rambouillet breeders, goes to the premier exhibitor in the junior show. Each dollar in prize money is one point and Becky was the leading exhibitor. Prices of the livestock sold in the commercial sale this year reflected the drop in livestock prices and fluctuating markets. The lambs were sold for \$34.50 per hundred. Sifted lambs sold for \$30 Wednesday afternoon. The market price on the steers was \$41.50 per hundred.

The experimental coyote control program approved by the Environmental Protection Agency in forty-four counties in Texas, Sterling County being one of the counties, is now in state of temporary suspension. Future of the program now hinges on the outcome of the court hearing next Tuesday in Washington. The Humane Society secured a temporary restraining order against EPA and the program. All scheduled meetings after last Tuesday—March 5—were cancelled pending the outcome of the hearing.

The Sterling County meeting was held on Monday, March 4. At that time, 27 producers were certified to participate in the program.

At the Sonora Experiment Station Field Day on Wednesday of this week, Bill Sims, executive secretary of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association, reported on the program. Bill said he felt that the hearing would be favorable and that the program was in good shape.

There is much concern over the screwworm eradication program in Texas at this time. Confirmed cases in South Texas are higher than normal this year. There were more cases in Mexico during the winter also. Much of this is due to the warm weather in recent months. Livestock producers throughout the state are being urged to maintain a careful watch for these pests. Confirmed cases have already been found as far north as Real County, southwest of Kerrville.

Pork Referendum and Producer Board Election

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Texas Pork Producers Association, 2422 Taho, Sherman, Texas 75090, proposes a referendum election on May 14, 1974 under provision of Article 55c, Vernon's Civil Statutes, on the proposition of whether or not the pork producers in the State of Texas shall assess themselves a maximum amount of 10 cents per head on all slaughter animals to be collected at the point of first processing or sale and to elect members of a 15 member commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for research, predator control, disease and insect control, education, and promotion designed to encourage the production, marketing, and use of pork.

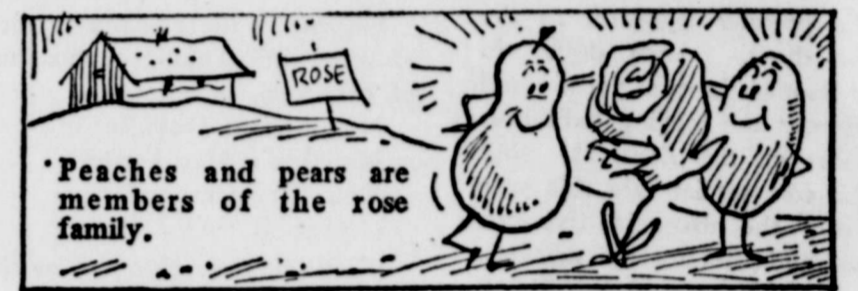
The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot which will be provided to all eligible voters not later than 15 days prior to the election. Ballots

must be mailed to the polling place at Sherman, Texas before midnight on the date of the election.

Any person within this state engaged in the business of producing, or causing to be produced slaughter hogs for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.

Any person qualified to vote at the referendum may place his name in nomination for membership on the proposed commodity producers board by application to the above organization signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such applications must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot prior to April 30, 1974 may obtain one at his local County Agent's Office.



Voter Guidelines

Here are the legal voter guidelines for the Democratic Party Primaries this year as put out by the Texas Democratic Party:

1. Register to vote at least 30 days prior to Democratic Primary, which is May 4, 1974.
2. All registered voters, 18 years and older, are eligible to vote in all Democratic Party elections.
3. Present registrations are valid if you have voted in a Democratic Primary or General Election within the last three years.
4. Register to vote at your County Tax Assessor-Collector's office or with a properly deputized person allowed to register voters.
5. Notify your County Tax-Assessor-Collector of change of address 5 days prior to election day so that you are registered in the proper precinct, if you have moved within the county.
6. On moving from one county to another, you must re-register 30 days prior to the election, if you wish to vote in your new place of residence.
7. An April 14, 1974, the absentee voting for the first primary by personal appearance at the County Clerk's office begins and goes through the fourth day preceding the election.
8. Applications for absentee voting for the first primary must be received by the County Clerk not later than the close of business on April 30, 1974.
9. Marked absentee ballots for the first primary must be mailed back to the County Clerk and postmarked not later than midnight, on May 3, 1974.

NEW TEXAS ALMANAC

1974-75 Almanacs

THE PEOPLE OF TEXAS, a study of the many nationalities and ethnic groups that have combined to make up the state's population, is one of many new features in the 704 pages of the 1974-75 Texas Almanac, published by A. H. Belo Corporation, publishers of The Dallas Morning News.

The article is by R. Henderson Shuffler, executive director of the University of Texas Institute of Texan Cultures at San Antonio.

Texans have always come in assorted sizes, shapes and colors, with a wide variety of mother tongues and hereditary customs and traditions, Shuffler writes. He has capsuled this variety of cultures in the special Almanac feature.

The new edition also contains a comprehensive history of the livestock feeding industry in Texas, which now leads the nation in numbers of cattle fattened in feedlots. The article was written by Sam A. Thomas Jr., manager of agricultural development for Southwestern Public Service Company of Amarillo.

Two reports are of special interest to ecologists. One is a list of endangered plants and animals in the state, prepared by the Texas Organization for Endangered Species. The other is a list of state agencies responsible for pollution control.

Election results, listings of county, municipal and state officials, amendments to the Texas Constitution, appointive boards and commissions, officials of state and regional civic and trade organizations and many other listings are expected to make this edition widely used as a reference for offices, schools, public agencies and homes.

A new Texas map, in color, with major highways, distances and other information supplements 254 county maps, updated from maps prepared by the Texas Highway Department.

The county maps are published with information about each Texas county supplied by chambers of commerce, county agricultural agents and others.

Tourism and recreation are featured, with listings of state and national parks.

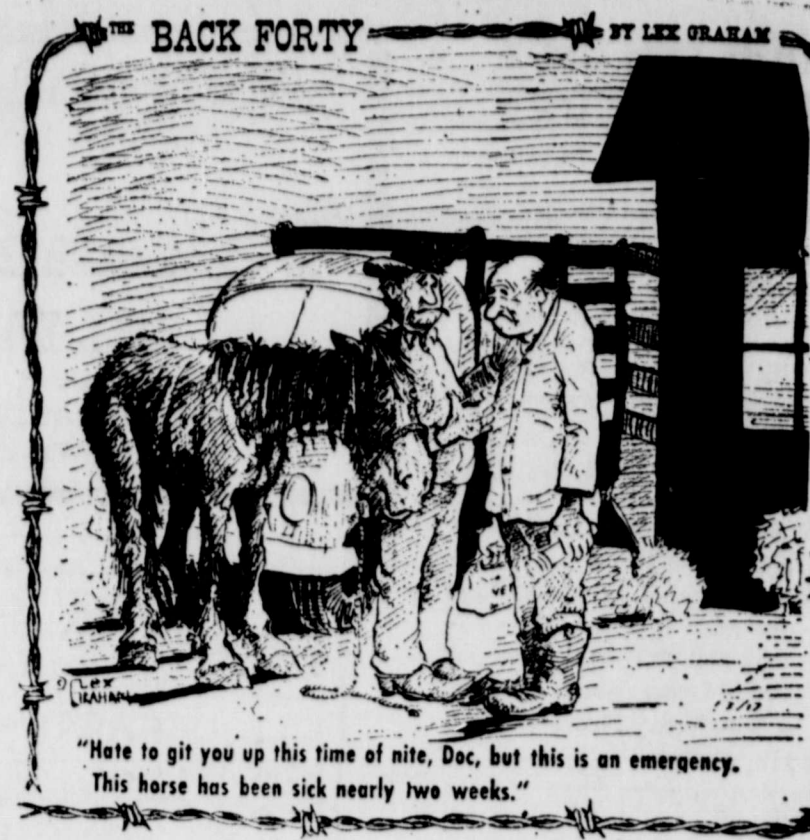
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
