John Steinbeck Play Set by M.C.T. OF MICE AND MEN

OF MICE AND MEN, John Steinbeck's powerful play of the depression years will be on stage at Midland Community Theatre from April 26 through May 11.

OF MICE AND MEN was a sensation when it opened on Broadway in 1937, and won the Drama Critics' Circle Award for that season's best play by an American author.

Steinbeck had turned his short novel of MICE AND MEN into the play under the watchful eye of George S. Kaufman, who staged it. The transformation to the stage was made with remarkably little change from the novel and great fidelity to the original work. Among those in that original cast were Wallace Ford, Broderick Crawford, Will Geer and Claire Luce.

With Burgess Meredith and Lon Chaney, Jr., in the key roles of George and Lennie, OF MICE AND MEN became a highly successful motion picture.

Almost forty years after it was first published OF MICE AND MEN still stands as fresh, startling and poignant as ever.

It is safe to assume that not many theatre-goers saw the play in the late thirties, and that if any did they will want to see it again. For the younger generation it is a MUST experience.

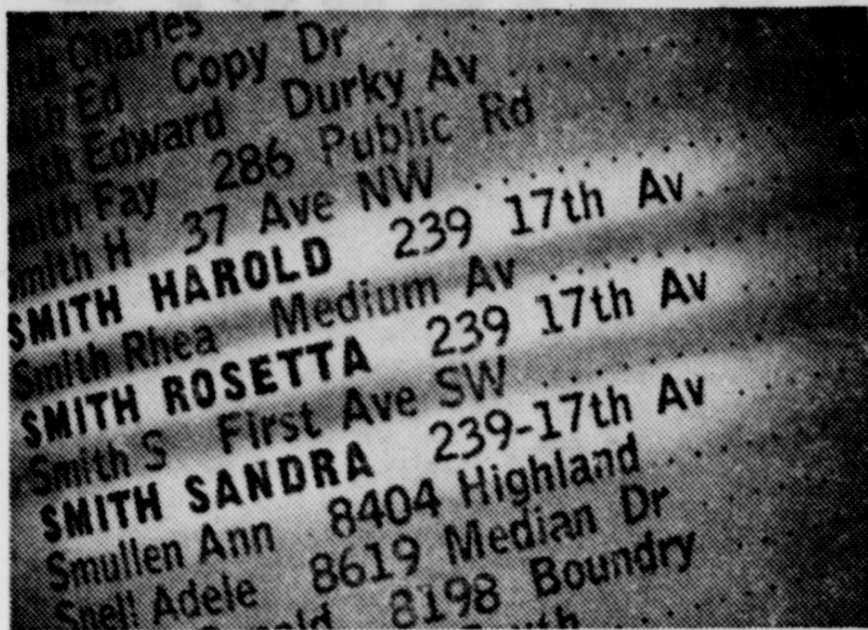
SPONSORS SHOWER

Voter Guidelines

Here are the legal voter guidelines for the Democratic Party Primaries this year as put out by the Texas Democratic Party:

1. Register to vote at least 30 days prior to Democratic Primary, which is May 4, 1974.

2. All registered voters, 18 years and older, are eligible to vote in all Democratic Party elections.

3. Present registrations are valid if you have voted in a Democratic Primary or General Election within the last three years.

4. Register to vote at your County Tax Assessor-Collector's office or with a properly deputized person allowed to register voters.

5. Notify your County Tax-Assessor-Collector of change of address 5 days prior to election day so that you are registered in the proper precinct, if you have moved within the county.

6. On moving from one county to another, you must re-register 30 days prior to the election, if you wish to vote in your new place of residence.

7. An April 14, 1974, the absentee voting for the first primary by personal appearance at the County Clerk's office begins and goes through the fourth day preceding the election.

8. Applications for absentee voting for the first primary must be received by the County Clerk not later than the close of business on April 30, 1974.

9. Marked absentee ballots for the first primary must be mailed back to the County Clerk and postmarked not later than midnight, on May 3, 1974.

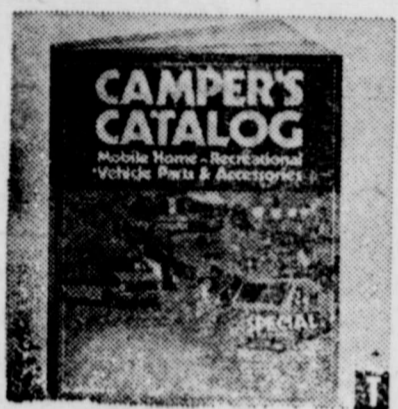
POINTERS FOR CAMPERS

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SOD HOUSE SURVEY

Have You A Sod House Heritage?

Did you ever live in a sod house a dugout, or an adobe building; or were you born in one? Did you ever teach school, attend school or church services in such a building, or help build one? Or are you a child or perhaps a grandchild of a former pioneer sod house dweller or builder?

If you can answer yes to any of these questions, the Sod House Society of America, with headquarters at Colby, Kansas, would like to hear from you. The unique society is making an effort to compile a census of people who have had any kind of personal experience with sod houses, including dugouts, part sod, and adobe buildings, which were once common in the United States, Canada and Mexico; also the descendants of such persons.

If you are a former sod dweller or a direct descendant of a family that can claim a part of the sod house heritage during the pioneer settlement era of North America, or in more recent times, the society wishes to have the information to include in a permanent historical record of sod, dugout, and adobe dwellers and their families.

To make this survey a success, information is needed from people in all parts of North America. Sod buildings in some form were used in well over half the North American continent. If you have any information concerning present or former sod dwellers, your report of this will be most welcome. 'If your check is lost or stolen, get in touch with your nearest social security office at once,' a spokesman said. 'The check can be replaced, but it takes time. Handle your check carefully when you get it and you won't have to wait while it's being replaced.'

Social security pays over \$4 billion a month in benefit checks to almost 29 million people—eligible retired and disabled workers and their families and families of deceased workers who worked long enough under social security.

PROFILE OF A COLD VICTIM

What are your chances of catching cold? According to a booklet on the subject, they're especially good if you're female, live in a large city in the western or north-eastern part of the U.S., and are the mother of a child under 6 years of age. Young children are the greatest cold-spreaders. Your chances are further enhanced if you're going through a period of stress and strain. "Contentment preserves one even from catching a cold," the great philosopher, Nietzsche once said.

The booklet, which discusses the common cold, is distributed by Winthrop Laboratories, the makers of Neo-Synephrine nose drops and nasal spray that are widely used in the U.S. and abroad.

Keeping up one's resistance helps to avoid the common cold, according to the publication, which advises getting sufficient fresh air and exercise, well-balanced meals, and as much sleep as possible in a well-ventilated bedroom. In cold weather areas, an extra hour a night is recommended.

Early stages of the common cold are the most contagious. Every sneeze fills the air with thousands of virus-laden drops. To help



Particularly during the cold season, it is wise to keep a handwashing preparation in the kitchen, as well as in the bathroom.

Your chances of catching a cold will be reduced if pre-




cautions are taken. However, the Winthrop booklet also states that it is not completely possible to avoid a cold. Just breathing the air that someone with a cold has merely talked into offers the possibility of infecting a healthy person.
