Seth M. Bailey, 76, Buried Tuesday

Seth M. Bailey, 76, a resident of Sterling City for nearly fifty years, toppled over dead on his bicycle here Sunday morning at about 9:30 a.m. He was taking his morning constitutional on a bicycle, as he did almost every day when the apparent heart attack felled him. He fell in front of the James Thompson house and an across the street neighbor O.T. Jones saw him. Mr. Thompson and Jones tried to revive him with resusitation but to no avail.

Services were held here in the First United Methodist Church at 10 a.m. Tuesday with burial following in the Montvale Cemetery. The pastor, Rev. Harold Orr officiated and he was assisted by the Presbyterian minister here, Rev. Charles Tucker. Ross Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

He was born July 3, 1897 in Red River County. He was married to Allie Moss of Texarkana June 6, 1923 and moved to Sterling City in 1927. He operated the Men's Store in Sterling City for 42 years before retiring.

Mr. Bailey was a longtime and faithful member of the First Methodist Church here. He was a 45 year charter member of the Sterling City Lions Club and was to have been honored with a plaque and 45 year chevron on ladies night here May 7. He had served as the club's Lion Tamer for many years and had a hand in all the activities of the club and especially the fund raising drives. He was a long time member of the local American Legion-he was a veteran of World War I. He was the Sterling County parole officer.

In community fund raising drives through the years, Seth usually took the lead and was always successful in raising any amount needed—for such drives as Red Cross, War Chest, Community drives for Christmas lights and stock shows, and all such money raising activities.

After retiring from the Men's Store, he had helped promote the local golf course, worked in all Lions Club activities, kept his home yard the prettiest in the town, rode his bicycle daily and in general helped his neighbors and friends. He will be missed by all here.

Survivors include his wife; one son, Richard S. Bailey of Kansas City, Mo.; two sisters, Mrs. Leatha Carroll of Dallas and Mrs. Bertha Martin of Hurst; and one brother. Earskin Bailey of Wichita Falls.

FFA Range Judging Teams Win

The Sterling City FFA Range Judging teams took first and second place honors at the North Concho River and Concho Soil Conservation Districts sponsored event last Thursday in the North Concho Lake area.

Sterling team No. 1 scored 1,363 points to capture top honors. Team members were Victor Probandt, Michael Lackey, Ross Hord and Lee Fleming.

Sterling team No. 2 scored 1,138 points to win second place honors over teams from Stanton and San Angelo Central. Team members were Mike Bowen, Dow Ferguson and Dean Jones. Michael Lackey scored 157 in the plant identification portion of the contest to take top honors in that division. Victor Probandt was second high with a score of 156 in plant identification. The identification portion consists of identifying the plants in their natural habitat and giving season of growth. length of life, origin of plant, and the grazing value for livestock and wildlife.. Victor Probandt topped the range judging portion of the contest with a score of 163. Michael Lackey was second with a score of 158. and Mike Bowen was third with a score of 148. The range judging portion of the contest consists of placing four plots and giving the reasons on the basis of their value for live stock usage.

Victor Probandt topped the range condition classification portion of the contest with a score of 190; Mike Bowen tied for first with 190, but Mike received the second place ribbon. Dow Ferguson and Lee Fleming tied for third high individual in the range condition portion of the contest.

In the overall contest, Sterling FFA had the top four individuals in the contest. Victor Probandt was top judge with a score of 508; Michael Lackey was second with a score of 475; Mike Bowen came in third with 454 and Ross Hord made 380 for fourth place.

Mackey McEntire, student teacher from Texas Tech University, did most of the work in coaching the team. The team members wish to express their thanks to Hugh Lackey for his assistance in training for the the judging portion of the contest.

D.P.S. Recruiting Men and Women

mIDLAND — Major E. K prowning, Jr., Regional Commanuer of the Texas Department of rublic Safety's 49 County Wes, rexas Region, announced that an intensive effort is being made to recruit men and women.

Major Browning stated this is the first time since the Department was created in 1935 that applications are being accepted from women for the position of Patrolman.

Major Browning said the Department has been successful in recruiting persons from minority groups to the position of Patrolman. Efforts to recruit from these groups are continuing.

All persons making application for the position of Patrolman must be between 20 and 35 years of age, between 68 and 76 inche, in height, must weigh not less man two pounds nor more than 5½ pounds per inch of height, and visual acuity no worse than 20/40 correctable to 20/20. A person must be of good moral character, excellent physical condition and must have a minimum of 30 semester hours of college credit.

Persons selected as recruits wih be assigned to Austin for an 18-week training school at the Homes Garrison, Jr. Law Enforcement Academy. Successful graduates will be assigned to either the Highway Patrol Service, License and Weight Service, Motor Vehicle Inspection Service or the Driver License Service, according to the needs of the DPS and consideration of personal preference.

The salary during training will be \$600 per month. Room and board while at the Academy will be approximately \$55 per month.

When a person is commissioned as a Patrolman, his salary will increase to \$743 per month. Patrolmen also receive longevity pay after five years of service, a monthly uniform cleaning allowance and travel expenses when away from their home stations.

Recruits must furnish their own uniforms which consist of khaki shirts and pants, black shoes, belt and tie. When commissioned as a Patrolman. uniforms, vehicles, weapons, ammunition and related equipment are furnished.

Group life and hospitalization are paid for the employee, and dependent coverage is available at reasonable rates. Patrolmen participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, as well as Social Security. Vacation, holidays and sick leave are provided.

Browning said interested men and women should contact any DPS office or Patrolman for an application. After completing the application, it should be presented to the DPS office either in Midland, Abilene, San Angelo or El Paso for the examinations.





NEW TEXAS ALMANAC 1974-75 Almanacs

FOR

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THE PEOPLE OF TEXAS, a study of the many nationalities and ethnic groups that have combined to make up the state's population, is one of many new features in the 704 pages of the 1974-75 Texas Almanac, published by A. H. Belo Corporation, publishers of The Dallas Morning News.

The article is by R. Henderson Shuflfer, executive director of the University of Texas Institute of Texan Cultures at San Antonio.

Texans have always come in assorted sizes, shapes and colors, with a wide variety of mother tongues and hereditary customs and traditions, Shuffler writes. He has capsuled this variety of cultures in the special Almanac feature.

The new edition also contains a comprehensive history of the livestock feeding industry in Texas, which now leads the nation in numbers of cattle fattened in feedlots. The article was written by Sam A. Thomas Jr.. manager of agricultural development for Southwestern Public Service Company of Amarillo.

Two reports are of special interest to ecologists. One is a list of endangered plants and animals in the state, prepared by the Texas Organization for Endangered Species. The other is a list of state agencies responsible for pollution control.

Election results, listings of county, municipal and state officials, amendments to the Texas Constitution, appointive boards and commissions, officials of state and regional civic and trade organizations and many other listings are expected to make this edition widely used as a reference for offices, schools, public agencies and homes.

A new Texas map, in color, with major highways, distances and other information supplements 254 county maps. updated from maps prepared by the Texas Highway Department.

The county maps are published with information about each Texas county supplied by chambers of commerce, county agricultural agents and others.





Voter Guidelines

Here are the legal voter guidelines for the Democratic Party Primaries this year as put out by the Texas Democratic Party:

1. Register to vote at least 30 days prior to Democratic Primary, which is May 4, 1974.

2. All registered voters, 18 years and older, are eligible to vote in all Democratic Party elections.

3. Present registrations are valid if you have voted in a Democratic Primary or General Election within the last three years.

4. Register to vote at your County Tax Assessor-Collector's office or with a properly deputized person allowed to register voters.

5. Notify your County Tax—Assessor--Collector of change of address 5 days prior to election day so that you are registered in the proper precinct, if you

have moved within the county,
6. On moving from one county to another, you must re-register 30 days prior to the election. if you wish to vote in your new place of residence.

7. An April 14, 1974, the absentee voting for the first primary by personal appearance at the County Clerk's office begins and goes through the fourth day preceding the election.

8. Applications for absentee voting for the first primary must be received by the County Clerk not later than the close of business on April 30, 1974.

9. Marked absentee ballots for the first primary must be mailed back to the County Clerk and postmarked not later than midnight, on May 3, 1974.





AROUND THE COUNTY



ARTHUR BARLEMANN, JR. COUNTY AGENT

A 4-H Club horse judging team, all juniors, will be competing in the District 7 Horse Judging contest at the arena of the West Texas Fairgrounds in Abilene. The contest is being held this Saturday, April 27.

Team members are Sherri Foster, Deborah Miller. Loren Cantrell and Russell Jones. Coaches of the team have been Mr. and Mrs. Melvin Foster and Mr. and Mrs. Larry Miller.

Dry weather or not, screwworms have been on the move. The latest confirmed case was on the Werner Halfmann place near Lowake in Concho County. This case was confirmed on Monday of this week. Several weeks ago cases were confirmed in Brown and Haskell Counties.

Livestock producers should be aware that 1974 has the earmarks of an extremely bad screwworm season and should make every effort to reduce the number of outbreaks.

Program officials are asking producers to refrain from livestock surgery or other manmade wounds to prevent screwworm infestations. It has been pointed out that at least 30% of this season's cases have resulted from dehorning. branding, docking and similiar prac-

Livestock producers are urged to support the screwworm eradication effort by carrying out the three key practices: (1) Inspect animals frequently; (2) Treat all wounds with an approved product; (3) Collect and send worm samples to the laboratory. Collection vials and mailing tubes are available from the county agent's office and the local feed store.

As cases are confirmed. sterile v treatment is initiated by the United States Department of Agriculture. To do this effectively, it is vitally important for program officials to know where the cases are located.

Officials reared and distributed 771,654,800 sterile flies during March with 292,242,800 of those being released in Texas. The remainder were released in Arizona and Mexico.

Stockman's Supply in Sterling City has been approved as distributor for the M-44 springloaded ejector and sodium cyanide capsules to be used in the experimental coyote control program in 44 counties in Texas. The program has the approval of the Environmental Protection Agency.

Only those landowners who were certified to use the devices in the meeting here on March 4 will be permitted to purchase and use them. One of the requirements of the program was that each user be trained in using the device and the accompanying safety procedures. The certified users are permitted to purchase a specified number of the devices and capsules based on acreages operated.


