Primary Elections Here Saturday

Democratic and Republican

The Texas primary elections will be held over the state Saturday, May 4—tomorrow. Both Democrats and Republicans will hold primaries here in Sterling County. The Democrats will hold primaries in the usual polling places—the courthouse, the William Foster ranch house, the Bill Blair ranch house, and the Bill J. Cole ranch house.

The Republicans will have one box, and it will be in the county commissioners courtroom.

The Democrats will have voting booths in the district courtroom, as usual.

There are no contested local precinct, county or such races.

DEMOCRATIC VOTING—

On the Democratic ballot, one referendum will be voted on—that of legalized pari-mutuel wagering on horse races.

For Congressman, 21st district, there are six candidates. They are Judge Allen Moore of Rankin, John H. Poerner of Hondo, Nelson W. Wolff of San Antonio, Robert Krueger of New Braunfels, Joe Sullivan of San Antonio and Patrick M. Ainsworth of Kingsland.

For Governor there are four hopefuls, being Steve S. Alexander, Dolph Briscoe, Frances Tarleton Sissy Farenthold and W.H. Posey.

Bill Hobby has no opponent for lieutenant governor. Neither does John Hill for attorney general.

For comptroller of public accounts, Bob Bullock and Hugh Edburg are candidates.

Jesse James, state treasurer, has an opponent, Donald B. Yarborough.

Bob Armstrong has no opponent for state commissioner of general land office.

John C. White, commissioner of agriculture, has an opponent, Herbert A. (Peanut) Schroeder.

Jim Langdon is running solo for full term of railroad commission. For unexpired term of that commission, Mack Wallace and C. A. Kelly are candidates.

Sears McGee has no opponent for the supreme court, and the same applies to Thomas M. Reavley and Zollie Steakley.

Neither W. A. Morrison or Leon Douglas have opponents for the court of criminal appeals.

For state board of education, two are candidates, being Jimmy L. Elrod and Tom R. Parrett.

State senator Pete Snelson of Midland has no opponent.

For state representative, 63rd district, there are three candidates, being County Judge (of Borden County) Glenn Toombs, Mary Thomas of Big Spring and Mike Ezzell of Snyder.

For court of civil appeals, 3rd district, Trueman E. O'Quinn is a lone runner.

COUNTY RACES—

For county judge Roland Lowe has no opposition. Neither does W.W. Durham for county and district clerk or Betty (Ovella) Garrett for county treasurer.

In precinct 2, Clinton Hodges is running solo for reelection as county commissioner, and so is Danny Stewart in precinct 4.

Eddie Edwards has no opposition as justice of the peace in precinct 1.

REPUBLICAN PRIMARY—

The Republicans have three referendums on their ballot. One is on the horse race wagering, same as the Democrats, and one for a right-to-work law in the state constitution and one

concerning the state income tax. For Congress, 21st district, the Republicans have four candidates, being Van Archer, Doug Harlan, Bobby A. Locke and Simon T. Garza, all residents of San Antonio.

Two are candidates for governor, being Odell McBrayer and Jim Granberry.

For lieutenant governor, there are two candidates, being Troy Skates and Gaylord Marshall.

For attorney general, Tom Cole is the lone candidate. So is Nick Rowe for comptroller of public accounts and state treasurer Robert G. Holt.

In fact, the rest of the offices have lone candidates, being Mary Lou Grier for commissioner of general land office, Zack Fisher for commissioner of agriculture, Joe P. Cain and Dale W. Steffes for the two places on the railroad commission, and John R. (Rich) Anderson for state representative, 63rd district.

Larry Glass is listed for county chairman and Mrs. Jim Davis as vice-chairman.

Voters can vote in only ONE of the primaries. It is illegal to vote in both primaries. Voters will have to choose the one they want to vote in and go to the proper polling place in the courthouse. Both places will be marked with signs, said Republican chairman Larry Glass and Democratic chairman Jack Douthit. In the primaries last year (1972) there were nine Republican votes cast and 272 Democratic votes cast.

It is hoped by both parties that a good turnout of voters will be seen Saturday.

Voter Guidelines

Here are the legal voter guidelines for the Democratic Party Primaries this year as put out by the Texas Democratic Party:

1. Register to vote at least 30 days prior to Democratic Primary, which is May 4, 1974.

2. All registered voters, 18 years and older, are eligible to vote in all Democratic Party elections.

3. Present registrations are valid if you have voted in a Democratic Primary or General Election within the last three years.

4. Register to vote at your County Tax Assessor-Collector's office or with a properly deputized person allowed to register voters.

5. Notify your County Tax-Assessor-Collector of change of

address 5 days prior to election day so that you are registered in the proper precinct, if you have moved within the county.

6. On moving from one county to another, you must re-register 30 days prior to the election, if you wish to vote in your new place of residence.

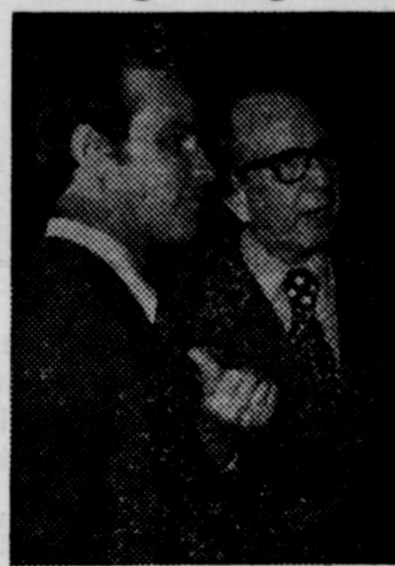
7. An April 14, 1974, the absentee voting for the first primary by personal appearance at the County Clerk's office begins and goes through the fourth day preceding the election.

8. Applications for absentee voting for the first primary must be received by the County Clerk not later than the close of business on April 30, 1974.

9. Marked absentee ballots for the first primary must be mailed back to the County Clerk and postmarked not later than midnight, on May 3, 1974.

SOD HOUSE SURVEY

Have You A Sod House Heritage?

Did you ever live in a sod house a dugout, or an adobe building; or were you born in one? Did you ever teach school, attend school or church services in such a building, or help build one? Or are you a child or perhaps a grandchild of a former pioneer sod house dweller or builder?

If you can answer yes to any of these questions, the Sod House Society of America, with headquarters at Colby, Kansas, would like to hear from you. The unique society is making an effort to compile a census of people who have had any kind of personal experience with sod houses, including dugouts, part sod, and adobe buildings, which were once common in the United States, Canada and Mexico; also the descendants of such persons.

If you are a former sod dweller or a direct descendant of a

family that can claim a part of the sod house heritage during the pioneer settlement era of North America, or in more recent times, the society wishes to have the information to include in a permanent historical record of sod, dugout, and adobe dwellers and their families.

To make this survey a success, information is needed from people in all parts of North America. Sod buildings in some form were used in well over half the North American continent. If you have any information concerning present or former sod dwellers, your report of this will be most welcome. 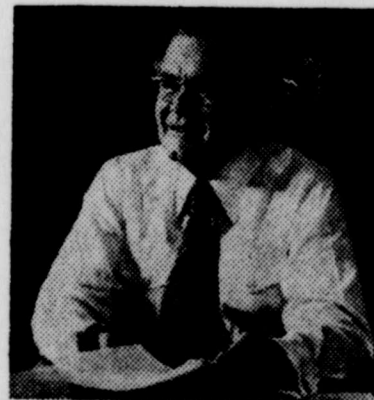
