A few over 200 Democrats went to the polls here Saturday and voted in the Democratic primary. 109 voted for the referendum to legalize parimutuel betting on horse races and 80 voted against.

There were no other contested races in state, district, county or precinct races. Winning their races in state races were Bill Hobby, lieutenant governor; John Hill for attorney general; Bob Armstrong for commissioner of the general land office; Jim C. Langdon for railroad commissioner; Sears McGee, Thomas M. Reavley and Zollie Steakley for the supreme court; W. A. Morrison and Leon Douglas for court of criminal appeals; Pete Snelson for state senator; and Trueman O'Quinn for court of civil appeals.

Local races (uncontested) went as follows: Roland Lowe 200 votes for county judge; W. W. Durham, 179 votes for county and district clerk; Ovella (Betty) Garrett 198 votes for county treasurer; E. R. Edwards 129 votes for justice of the peace of Precinct 1; Clinton Hodges 19 votes for commissioner of Prec. 2 and Danny Stewart 18 votes for commissioner Prec. 4, and Jack Douthit 192 votes for Democratic County Chairman.

Statewide all races were decided. Briscoe won the governor's race; Bob Bullock won the comptroller's spot; Jesse James was renominated as state treasurer; John C. White was renominated commissioner of agriculture; Mack Wallace won the race for railroad commissioner.

RUNOFF JUNE 1—

There will be two runoffs in Sterling County on June 1. The race for congressman, 21st district will be between Nelson W. Wolff of San Antonio and Bob Krueger of New Braunfels.

Glenn Toombs of Borden County (now county judge) is to face a runoff with Michael H. Ezzell of Snyder for the legislative seat, 63rd district.

The turnout of voters was very light all over the state. The runoff on June 1 is expected to be exceptionally light over the state and Democratic chairman Jack Douthit says he does not expect even a hundred votes in Sterling County then.

All voting will be done in

one box at the courthouse, due to no precinct races on that day.

The senior division entries placings were as follows: Grass Identification—first; Range Judging—first; team members on these teams were Amy Hodges, Russell Davis, Michael Lackey and Victor Probandt.

The Senior Share the Fun group placed second. Members of the group were Patti Bynum, Jennifer Lackey, Kim Rich and Melinda Terry. Coaches of this group were Mrs. Bill Bynum and Mrs. Hugh Lackey.

The two range judging teams will compete in the State 4-H Range Judging Contest to be held in San Angelo on Saturday May 18. This is the only state contest in which both senior and junior teams compete, though in their own age divisions. The contest held this past Saturday has bearing on the state contest as do the other contests. It, and the Wool and Mohair Judging Contest, are the only contests held away from the campus of Texas A&M University in addition to being the only state contests in which juniors compete.

Other entries in last Saturday's District Contests from the local club were in Junior Livestock Judging, Junior Rifle Team and Senior Public Speaking.

Much appreciation is due to the coaches of these teams for their efforts in preparing them for the contests. The adults who accompanied the teams and provided assistance is also appreciated. Without the help of all, it would not have been possible.

During the last half of May, some 24,000 Texas ranchers and farmers will receive a crop acreage questionnaire from Charles E. Caudill, Agricultural Statistician in charge of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in Austin. Some of those will undoubtedly be sent to selected Sterling County producers.

This information will be the basis for determining planted acreage for the state and each county. Reports are needed from many producers so that each county will be well represented. Accurate estimates are of great importance to producers in planning production and marketings and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture.

Producers receiving the questionnaire are urged to complete and return it to help in this matter.

A confirmed case of screw-worms was found in Rannels County last week. Confirmed cases are being found in more counties as the year progresses. Thus far, confirmed cases were found in Brown and Haskell

Counties earlier in the year. With shearing in full swing in this area, producers are urged to keep a close watch on all their livestock. Shearing, with the accompanying cuts, provides more opportunity for worm cases in sheep than any other species at the present time, thus the emphasis on sheep. If worms are found in any wound, take a sample and send it in for examination by the laboratory at Mission. Collection vials and mailing tubes are available in the feed store as well as the county agent's office.

Social security pays over \$4 billion a month in benefit checks to almost 29 million people—eligible retired and disabled workers and their families and families of deceased workers who worked long enough under social security.
