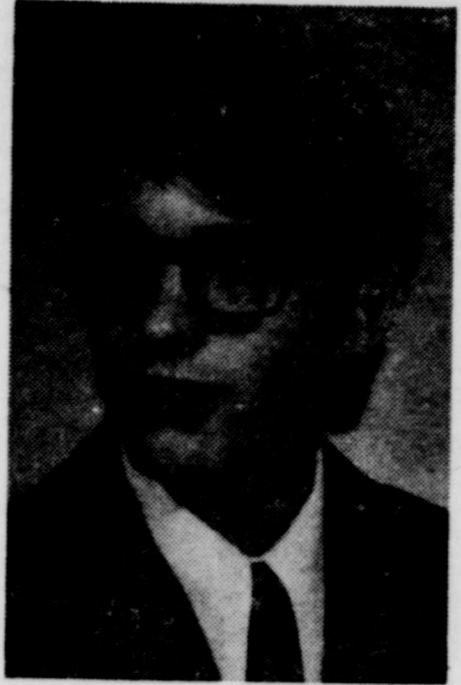
Mr. and Mrs. Garland Cates and family of near Fort Worth also visited with the group.

Wins Clark \$750 Scholarship

Michael E. Watts, 1974 graduate of Sterling City High School, has been awarded a \$750 Clark Foundation Scholarship by the Texas Interscholastic League Foundation.

The Clark Foundation provided funds for 64 of the \$750 grants to be given to outstanding competitors in University Interscholastic League academic and literary contests. The TILF administers the grants.

Michael earned eligibility for the Clark Scholarship by participating in the League Debate, One-Act Play, Slide Rule, Number Sense and Science contests. This year he won first in District, first in Regional and third in State Meet Conference B Science Contest. Last year he took a third place in District Science.

He competed in Debate in 1971; One-Act Play in 1972, 73 and 74; Slide Rule in 1971-1972 and in Number Sense from 1971 through 1974.

Michael, valedictorian of his graduating class, earned a perfect four-year straight A grade record with an average grade of 95.5. He was awarded the Sterling High School Math Award in 1973, and was given the school Science Awards for 1973 and 1974. Social Security Tips

Social security checks should be cashed within a reasonable time to prevent loss or theft, even though there's no time limit on cashing them, according to social security officials here.

'If your check is lost or stolen, get in touch with your nearest social security office at once,' a spokesman said. 'The check can be replaced, but it takes time. Handle your check carefully when you get it and you won't have to wait while it's being replaced.'

Social security pays over \$4 billion a month in benefit checks to almost 29 million people—eligible retired and disabled workers and their families and families of deceased workers who worked long enough under social security.

The two Sterling County 4-H Club teams that made the trip to 4-H Round Up and the State 4-H Contests last week did very well in the state-wide competition at College Station. This is where each of the thirteen Extension Service Districts send their two best teams in each of their thirty contest areas to determine the state winners.

The Sterling County Grass Identification team placed second in competition with sixteen other teams. Team members were Victor Probandt, Russell Davis, Michael Lackey and Amy Hodges. Victor was also second high individual of the contest and received a silver medal for this effort. Each of the team members also received a silver medal for the team's placing.

This year's contests was a more difficult one than some in the past have been. The local team was 49 points behind the first place team from Cooke County (Gainesville) and 67 points ahead of the third place team from Victoria County. A few walnut caterpillars have made their appearance on pecans around town. This is the fuzzy caterpillar, reddish brown with narrow yellowish lines the length of the body when small, changing to almost black with grayish lines when grown, that defoliates portions of the trees. It feeds in large groups on a particular branch or end of a branch when it has eaten all the leaves on a particular branch it moves onto another.

Thus far, the caterpillars have been limited in number. In such instances, it is best to cut off the small branch and burn them. When the infestation becomes heavier, it will be necessary to spray for control. Malathion, toxaphene, and sevin can be used now for control. Later in the fall when the shucks on the
