A good many people have inquired about the presence of the pecan weevil here and spraying for its control. It would be much simpler if there was evidence for an across-the-board recommendation and answer.

A check was made of trees here this week and no weevils could be jarred from the trees in the John Brock grove. Trees with a known history of weevil infestation in the past were checked and no weevils could be found. According to the insect report issued by the Extension entomologist at the San Angelo Research and Extension Center, weevils were found in the San Angelo area two weeks ago.

The weevil overwinters in the ground and in August and early September following rain or irrigation, it makes its appearance. The weevil, which looks like a boll weevil, emerges following the moisture and the female chews a hole in the shell and deposits the eggs in the nuts. Creamy white grubs with a reddish-brown head which gives it the names sometimes used, red-heads feed inside the nut. Upon reaching maturity, the grubs chew a hole in the shell, emerge from the nut and drop to the ground to overwinter and begin their 2 to 3 year life cycle.

The only recommended control for the weevil is spraying with 2 to 3 pounds of wettable Sevin in one hundred gallons of water. repeat applications usually need to be made every 10 to 14 days. There is one precaution on the use of Sevin at this time of the year on pecans. Do not apply Sevin after the shucks have split. As was stated in the beginning of this article it is difficult to make an across the board recommendation to spray or not to spray. Since John Brock is watering his trees, the check was made there but no weevils found. However, to be on the safe side he is spraying two days after he waters.

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Several days ago, a report in the San Angelo paper stated a case of screwworms had been identified on the Fowler McEntire ranch. The report we received as well as the one Mr. McEntire got was that the sample was not screwworms.

The weather this week, showers, high humidity, and the like are made to order for the screwworms. All livestock producers are urged to check their livestock for possible cases. The counties south and southwest of us are experiencing the biggest caseload of screwworms in several years. All of the positive cases in Sterling County this year have been in the south part of the county near the Tom Green County panhandle and Reagan County lines.

Mailing tubes and collection vials are available if needed. Keep a supply on hand for sending in samples.

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The first place John Garner pecan in the State Pecan Show held at El Paso in late July was entered by John Brock. He has had the first place entry of this variety in the state show several times in the past. Congratulations, John.

who operate farms and cattle feedlots feeding from 100 head up said that in view of the present fed cattle prices, a possible short corn and soybean crop they were not planning to put cattle in the lots. Instead those who had grassland available were planning to buy light calves and run them on grass this fall. If conditions improved they would put them in the feedlot after this. In the event the fed cattle situation did not improve they would sell them as grass fat cattle later.

Grass fat beef is being pushed in some areas already. The advertising pitch on this type beef is that there is less waste fat to be trimmed and the customer has more edible red meat. If this movement gains much support it will be return to the beef of years ago when there was little grain-fed beef available. If this does occur, it will bear out the old saying that all things run in cycles and if you wait long enough, they will have run full cycle.

*Directions for Packing and Shipping Heads from Suspected Rabid Animals to the Laboratory*

Increasing difficulty to confirm a diagnosis of rabies is being experienced with the submission of animal heads for rabies examination when shipment by air takes as long as four days between shipping date and receipt. If at all possible, we recommend to those who use the State Department of Health laboratory service in Austin, that they USE THE VARIOUS BUS COMPANIES. Pack the animal head in a leakproof plastic bag. Enclose a second leak-proof plastic bag filled with ice or use water frozen in plastic bottles. An outside container of sturdy construction (styrofoam serves nicely and is inexpensive) must be used. Also, use packing material to absorb water in the event of leakage. The box should be securely taped down and marked, **KEEP UPRIGHT—PLEASE.** A note to telephone the Health Department Laboratory (454-3781 Ext. 313) on arrival, should be prominently displayed.





Social security checks should be cashed within a reasonable time to prevent loss or theft, even though there's no time limit on cashing them, according to social security officials here.

'If your check is lost or stolen, get in touch with your nearest social security office at once,' a spokesman said. 'The check can be replaced, but it takes time. Handle your check carefully when you get it and you won't have to wait while it's being replaced.'

Social security pays over \$4 billion a month in benefit checks to almost 29 million people—eligible retired and disabled workers and their families and families of deceased workers who worked long enough under social security.

When brightness is more important than bulb life—for reading, studying or working—choose the "standard" life bulb that gives you the most lumens for its wattage.

**PROFILE OF A COLD VICTIM**

What are your chances of catching cold? According to a booklet on the subject, they're especially good if you're female, live in a large city in the western or north-eastern part of the U.S., and are the mother of a child under 6 years of age. Young children are the greatest cold-spreaders. Your chances are further enhanced if you're going through a period of stress and strain.
