Three Sterling County 4-H Club members who exhibited their breeding sheep in the shows at the State Fair in Dallas did very well in the competition. Club members who were competing were Amy Hodges, Becky Hodges and Delmar Radde Jr. The three earned over \$600 in prize money in the Open and Junior divisions. This is the first time the young exhibitors were permitted to compete in both divisions.

In the Open Rambouillet show, Becky showed the champion ewe and champion ram, while Amy showed the reserve champion ram. Becky had the champion ram and ewe of the Junior Rambouillet show while Amy had the reserve champion ewe and ram. Becky also was the premier exhibitor of the Junior show winning the State Fair trophy for this achievement.

This year's show at the Fair was the largest in a number of years with seven breeders competing in the Open Division of the Rambouillet Show. Six Junior breeders were entered in the Junior Rambouillet Show.

Becky's ram lambs placed first and eighth in the Open Show while Amy's placed third and ninth. In the pen of three ram lambs Becky's entry was first and Amy's fourth. Beckys yearling ram placed first and Amy's ram lambs placed second and fifth.

In the ewe lamb class, Amy showed the fourth and sixth place entries while Becky showed the eighth and ninth place entries. Amy's pen of three ewe lambs placed third while Becky's placed fourth. In the yearling ewe class, Becky's entries placed first and ninth and Amy's placed third and fourth. Amy's pen of three placed second and Becky's third. Amy won second place in the exhibitor's flock and Becky third.

In the Junior Rambouillet Show, Becky's ram lambs placed first and eighth while Amy's stood second and sixth. Becky won first and fifth in the yearling ram class with Amy taking second and fourth.

Ewe lambs shown by Amy placed fourth and fifth while Becky's placed sixth and seventh. Becky's yearling ewes placed first and third and Amy's placed second and fourth. Amy won the exhibitor's flock class and Becky took second.

Delmar Radde Jr. showed his Delaines in both divisions of that breed. His ram lamb took fifth place and his pen of three ram lambs took third place honors in the Open Show. In the ewe lamb class, Delmar took first place and repeated by taking first in the pen of three ewe lambs.

In the Junior Delaine Show, Delmar took seventh and eighth places in the ram lamb class. His ewe lambs took first and fifth place honors.

Delmar is just starting his Delaine flock this year and it is limited to lambs at this time. By the time the spring shows come around he will have some older sheep.

Midland Community Theatre

JABBERWOCK, a new comedy by Jerome Lawrence and Robert E. Lee is opening at Midland Community Theatre on October 11th.

JABBERWOCK is funny. It is a distillation of the enormous wit and humor of James E. Thurber, brought to life on stage by the authors of MAME, the musical, and AUNTIE MAME, the play. Besides those two big comedy hits, the versatile Lawrence and Lee also wrote INHERIT THE WIND and THE NIGHT THOR-EAU SPENT IN JAIL.

In this case the authors have written one of those plays people don't write any more—a gentle family comedy, seasoned to taste, about the not quite typical family of young Jamie Thurber. They borrowed the title from Lewis Carroll's classic nonsense verse and have given this hilarious comedy surrounding the real and imagined characters of JABBERWOCK its unique flavor.

JABBERWOCK's setting is Columbus, Ohio, circa 1917, but it is also NOW and FAMILY and LOVE and AMERICA and FUNNY. Its language is at times salty and irreverent. It is a piece of Americana, rather loosely based on Thurber's own book, My Life and Hard Times, and is a brilliantly witty play, as believably absurd as it is nostalgic.

In MCT's production young Jamie will be played by Clay Guthrie with Gloria Stephenson in the pivotal role of his mother. His father will be Mark Guinan with Hal Coon and Robert Reeder as Jamie's brothers. The liveliest character in the household is Grampa Fisher age 77, who alternates between refigiting the Civil War and saddle-breaking the family's new electric car. Henry Goulet will appear in this role.

Many other characters make up the cast of this new play which was written for The American Playwrights Theatre, an organization of non-commercial theatres, formed to acquire the rights to new scripts before Broadway, touring groups and the movies have worn them out.

MCT's production of JABBERWOCK opens on October 11 for nine performances: October 12, 17, 18, 19, 20, 24, 25 and 26. Curtain times are 8:30 p.m. on Fridays and Saturdays, 8:00 p.m. on Thursdays and 2:30 p.m. on Sunday. Students may purchase tickets for the 17th and 20th at \$1 each; or school sponsored groups may attend any performance for the same price. Adult prices are \$2.50 and \$3, or by membership card. Reservations must be made in advance. The box office opens on October 3rd for members of MCT and on 7th to the public. Make plans now to see JABBERWOCK, a warm and funny show about warm and funny people.

Social Security Tips

Social security checks should be cashed within a reasonable time to prevent loss or theft, even though there's no time limit on cashing them, according to social security officials here.

'If your check is lost or stolen, get in touch with your nearest social security office at once,' a spokesman said. 'The check can be replaced, but it takes time. Handle your check carefully when you get it and you won't have to wait while it's being replaced.'

Social security pays over \$4 billion a month in benefit checks to almost 29 million people—eligible retired and disabled workers and their families and families of deceased workers who worked long enough under social security.

ENGINEERING FOR A BETTER WORLD

Bioenergetics, bioentrainment, bioenergotherapy, generic memory-scientific mumbo jumbo for ecology, right? Wrong! Translated, these words might sound more like dowsing, fire walking, mediums, levitation, faith healing and ESP, terms you might ordinarily associate with "hocus pocus" magic and occult. But not anymore. Engineers and scientists in Russia and more recently in the U.S. are taking these phenomena seriously while trying to explain how and why they occur and if there is practical value to these events. It's all called parapsychology.

At the recent International Convention of the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE), a team of American engineers described their investigations of parapsychological phenomena. With numerous referrals to Russian work in the new field, the group explained experiments to measure mental telepathy, to explain acupuncture, and to determine the effects of electric fields on human behavior.

One of the most widely heard-of forms of Extra Sensory Perception (ESP) is mental telepathy, the ability to pass information from one mind to another. ESP has three other subcategories—clairvoyance, direct passing of information from matter to mind; psychokinesis, mind over matter; and precognition, direct obtaining of information about the future.

Investigations both in this country and in Russia, parapsychology speakers told the IEEE audience, have convinced most researchers that one or all the forms of ESP exist. The Russians have conducted experiments with a woman who can move an object without touching it. They found that near the object that she moves there is enough electrical energy to light up a small florescent lamp. American scientists are seeking clues to clairvoyance and precognition.

While ESP is relatively easy to categorize, the phenomena associated with electromagnetic fields around living systems are much

more difficult to assign and analyze. The basic problem is measurement. How do you measure something that you can't prove exists?

One measurement method, discovered by the Russians, put a high voltage electric field around the subject which is then photographed with special film. This tech-

nique, called Kirlian photography, has helped to form some explanations of why acupuncture works. Kirlian photos show radiations around various body zones that coincide with acupuncture points. In fact a device called a tobiscopocan actually find acupuncture points by using electronic circuits. To explain this, one American scientist postulates the existence of an unknown circulatory system in the body that seems to be composed of energy and electric fields.

Certainly the practical aspects of telepathy are intriguing and the possibilities in the biomedical areas are encouraging. But, all the benefits or parapsychological research are by no means obvious. As one engineer told the IEEE International Convention, "The potentialities of the individual human being are far greater than we ordinarily imagine them to be and far greater than the in-vogue models of man would lead us to think possible. We are finally beginning to discover some of these potentialities."

PROFILE OF A COLD VICTIM

What are your chances of catching cold? According to a booklet on the subject, they're especially good if you're female, live in a large city in the western or north-eastern part of the U.S., and are the mother of a child under 6 years of age. Young children are the greatest cold-spreaders. Your chances are further enhanced if you're going through a period of stress and strain. "Contentment preserves one even from catching a cold," the great philosopher, Nietzsche once said.

The booklet, which discusses the common cold, is distributed by Winthrop Laboratories, the makers of Neo-Synephrine nose drops and nasal spray that are widely used in the U.S. and abroad.

Keeping up one's resistance helps to avoid the common cold, according to the publication, which advises getting sufficient fresh air and exercise, well-balanced meals, and as much sleep as possible in a well-ventilated bedroom. In cold weather areas, an extra hour a night is recommended.

Early stages of the common cold are the most contagious. Every sneeze fills the air with thousands of virus-laden droplets. To help

prevent spreading a cold to the rest of the family, to friends and to co-workers, everyone should have his own glass, cup, silverware and towels. Hands should be washed thoroughly and often, preferably with a liquid antibacterial skin cleanser. pHisoHex is the one that is used in most U.S. hospitals to help prevent spread of infections. Particularly during the cold season, it is wise to keep a handwashing preparation in the kitchen, as well as in the bathroom.

Your chances of catching a cold will be reduced if pre-



cautions are taken. However, the Winthrop booklet also states that it is not completely possible to avoid a cold. Just breathing the air that someone with a cold has merely talked into offers the possibility of infecting a healthy person.

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
