General Election on November 5

Sterling County, along with the rest of Texas, will be holding the general election Tuesday, November 5. Polling will be in the four usual places in Sterling County—being the courthouse, William Foster ranchhouse, Bill Blairs ranch-house and Bill J. Cole's.

There are the usual Democratic candidates, ranging from the Congressional race to the local justice of the peace. Republicans have candidates down through the state races, and a candidate. Rich Anderson, for our legislative district. He is opposing Mike Ezzell.

The Raza Unida Party has a candidate for governor, Ramsey Muniz, and a candidate for railroad commissioner, Fred Garza.

The Socialist Workers Party has six candidates for state offices and the American Party has candidates for U.S. Congress and governor. Then there is a write-in column in case none of the listed candidates suit the voters.

A voter can vote a straight ticket by putting an X in the top listing by parties—or one can split up and vote mixed if he so desires.

A rather light turnout of voters is expected in Sterling, due to lack of voter interest. There are no local race contests—and no presidential voting this year.

The Sterling Eagles won handily over Hawley last Friday night there 25 to 7. This victory gives the locals a 5 to 1 season record.

Scoring for the Eagles were—Jeff Copeland two TDs, Russell Davis and Tony Munoz one TD each and 1 PAT by Ronny Hord. (1 point kick).

Sterling made 12 first downs to Hawley's 9. The Eagles completed two out of 6 passes for 28 yards gain, and Hawley completed 5 out of 15 for 33 yards.

The Sterling boys gained 269 yards rushing to 115 for Hawley. The Eagles lost 2 balls by fumbles and Hawley 5. Sterling was assessed 6 penalties for 60 yards to 7 for Hawley for 78 yards.

Jeff Copeland carried the ball 17 carries for 142 yards, or an average of 8.3 yards; Russell Davis carried 21 times for 81 yards or an average of 3.8; Tony Munoz carried the ball for 15 carries for a total of 45 yards or an average of 3; and Kenneth Gaston carried the pigskin for 8 times for 21 yards.

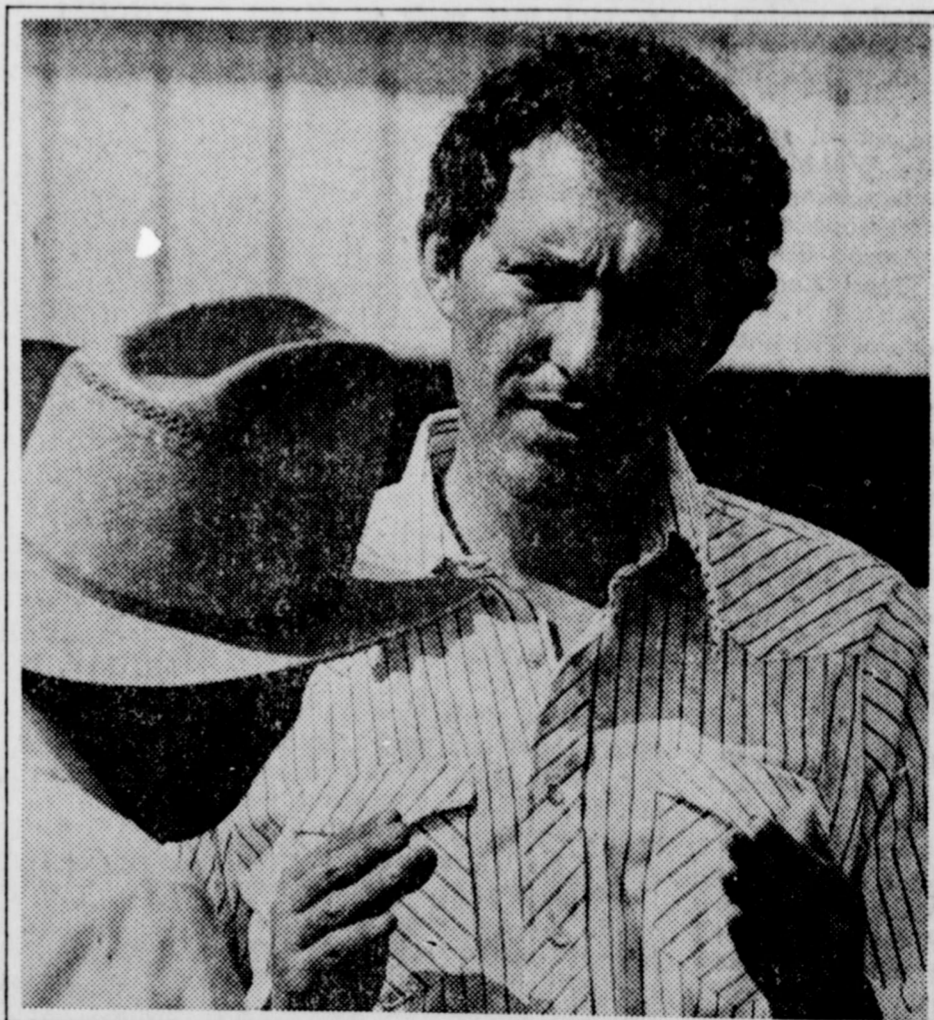

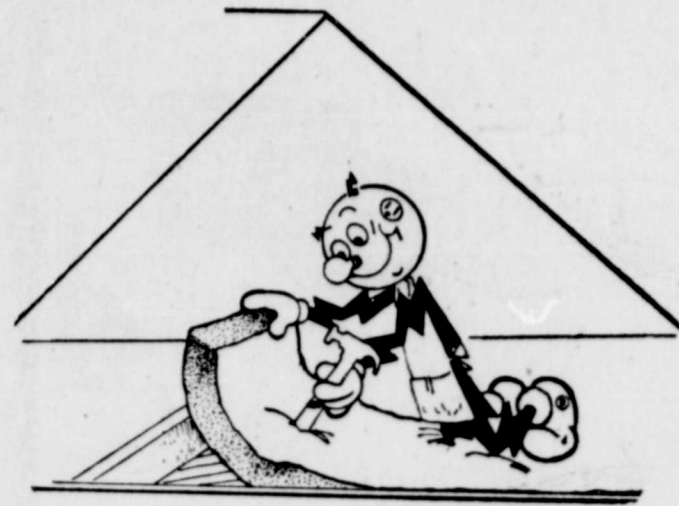

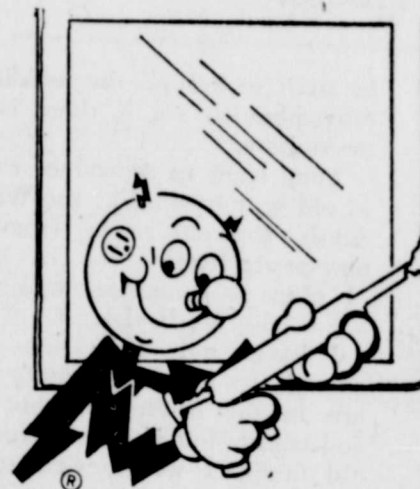

8-BALL

Collecting photographs of Texas and adjoining states is a project of Texas Tech's Southwest Collection designed to preserve approximately 100 to 150 pictures of historical interest from each county desiring to cooperate and participate. It is hoped that the photographs, which will be selected and identified (names, places, dates) by local citizens, will include:

1. Various scenes portraying the county's development.
2. Individuals and family groups of pioneers or early settlers.
3. Street scenes of towns or ghost towns.
4. Business buildings, landmarks, cemeteries, schools and churches.
5. School classes, church groups and clubs, political meetings, reunions, weddings, baptisms, county fairs, rodeos, races, dances, sports events, picnics, recreational activities.
6. Interiors of homes, offices, factories, stores, gins, saloons.
7. Work activities and scenes at farms, ranches, mines, oil fields.
8. Disasters such as floods, tornadoes, dust storms, fires, drouths wrecks, explosions and bilzazrds.

Pictures will be picked up by a representative of the Southwest Collection (Texas Tech) and returned by him. All pictures will be checked out and in via receipts. Approximately 30 to 45 days will be required for copying. Then the field representative will return the original photos to their original owners or the group responsible for their collection. Copies and negatives will be preserved in the Southwest Collection at Texas Tech University where they will be available for display and for study by historians, teachers, students, research workers, and interested citizens in the years ahead.

Since the man who will be gathering up the old photos will have less trouble, I suggested (and he liked the idea) that our people who will let their old pictures be a part of this display at Tech, bring in their old pictures with the names and dates to County Judge Roland Lowe. There Mr. Carpenter (from Tech) can get them all at once and in returning—do the same. He will

be back in around the middle of November to see if there is interest here.

They want to reproduce copies of old year books, like the Wimodausis, and old stories from the newspaper files.

I plan to cooperate, will you?
