Area pecan shows have started for the season in preparation for the regional shows. Growers are entering their pecans in the county shows with the top placing pecans in the county exhibitions being sent to the regional shows. The regional show for West Texas will be held in Odessa on December 12, 13, 14.

John Brock sent three varieties to the Trans Pecos Pecan Show in Rankin held his past Monday. John's entries and placings were as follows: Mohawk, first place; Wichita, second; and Apache, third. These three varieties are relatively new, having been developed at USDA Pecan Station at Brownwood as a result of crossing old varieties. The Mohawk is a Success-Mahan cross; the Wichita is a Halbert-Mahan cross and the Apache the result of a Burkett-Schley cross.

The Tom Green County Show will be held December 6-7 in the lobby of the courthouse in San Angelo. Local growers are invited to participate. Anyone wishing to enter pecans should call the Sterling County Extension Agent's office no later than Monday, December 2. Rules are available and help in preparing the entries will be gladly given.

Christmas is just a month away and many preparations for the season will soon get underway. For those who make the colorful fireplace logs of newspaper for use in the fireplace during the holiday season, its time to start those logs.

Varied color flames result from soaking newspaper logs in a chemical solution made by dissolving four pounds of copper sulfate and three pounds of rock salt in one gallon of water. The solution should be mixed and used to soak the paper log in plastic, glass or enameled containers as it will corrode other metal containers very quickly.

The newspaper logs should be rolled loosely and tied with heavy twine. Soak the logs in the solution for about a week, turning them occasionally during the week. After soaking, remove and allow them to dry thoroughly—this will take several days.

POSTAL SERVICE STATES UNPAID DELIVERY POLICY

Postmaster W.R. Brooks today reminded customers that effective Sunday, November 17, the U. S. Postal Service began discontinuing delivering mail on which there is no postage.

Postmaster Brooks said the new policy was instituted because of the high costs being incurred by the Postal Service in its attempts to deliver such mail. Officials estimate that such costs total approximately \$18 million annually.

In announcing the new policy last month, Postmaster General E.T. Klassen said—it is unfair to burden the vast majority of mailers with costs created by the few who mail without the prepayment of postage.

After November 17, letters mailed without postage will be returned to sender if there is a return address, or to the dead letter office, instead of being delivered to the address as postage due mail as has been the custom. Postal officials will attempt to find the sender of unpaid mail and return it for a slight fee, if there is no return address.

Naturally we realize that someone could inadvertently forget to put a stamp on a letter or that a stamp could come off prior to cancellation, so we urge mailers to be sure to include a correct return address on their mail, Brooks said.

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Ingenious Triumphs Of Chemistry

GOOD NEWS ABOUT SCIENTIFIC ADVANCES

CRACKING GETS THE RUBBING ALCOHOL OUT OF YOUR GAS TANK

What do a washing machine agitator, dog food, aspirin and perfume have in common?

Without propylene, one of the basic chemicals made from oil and natural gas, these and countless other everyday products could not be made.

Propylene holds a unique position as a chemical raw material. It is one of the most important petrochemical building blocks and is also a significant component of gasoline. Catalytic cracking of petroleum to make high octane gasoline produces large amounts of propylene. Last year, only one quarter of this or about 11.5 billion pounds of propylene was separated from the gasoline for chemical use.

Although this is a relatively small volume when compared to other petrochemical building blocks, propylene, an odorless, colorless gas, winds up in countless products vital to the comfort and well being of Americans and to the strength of their economy.

A very significant end-use application of propylene is isopropyl alcohol. Whether it's called 2-propanol, dimethyl carbinol, isopropanol or just plain IPA, this propylene-derived product is, in fact, the rubbing alcohol in your medicine chest.

The Many Uses of IPA

IPA, in addition to its use as a household antiseptic, is also an important ingredient in the manufacture of hydrogen peroxide, solvents, anti-

stalling agents, dyes, aspirin, de-icing agents, surface coatings, insect repellent, printing ink, paint and varnish removers, latex paints and fuel additives.

Another major use of propylene is to make polypropylene, one of the most versatile plastic resins. Because of its superior physical properties—



strength, resistance to work fatigue, chemical and heat resistance, colorability and flex strength—polypropylene is finding its way into applications that dispell the myth that plastics are only good for cheap toys and olive stabbers.

The medical field recently has discovered the many assets of polypropylene. Pacemakers and artificial hearts now have parts made of polypropylene. It is also used as through-the-bone marrow pins, screws, staples, and as sutures to close contaminated wounds. Polypropylene has other medical uses such as dentures, disposable hypodermic needles and syringes, test tubes, soap dishes, graduated basins and thermometer holders.

The appliance and automotive industries are using a great deal of polypropylene these days. For example,

washing machine agitators, dishwasher innerliners and many other parts for major and small appliances are made of it.

When the Going is Tough
One of the most revolutionary uses is in car batteries. Most of the 1974-model U.S. cars now have batteries—and numerous other parts such as steering wheels, bucket seat backs and accelerator pedals—made of tough polypropylene.

Polypropylene fibers are being also used by the furniture and carpet industries because of their resistance to stains. And its toughness is causing polypropylene to become widely used in making cordage. These are just some of the many ways polypropylene is being used to provide better quality products for American consumers.

In addition to IPA and polypropylene and their many end-uses, propylene finds its way into synthetic rubbers, medicines, cosmetics, safety glass, food flavoring agents, adhesives, photographic chemicals, epoxy resins, leather tanning products, perfume, antifreeze, brake fluids, herbicides, dog food and poultry feed additives, nylon, wood preservatives, polishes, explosives and paper coatings.

When the many vital chemical applications of propylene are coupled with the fact that it is one of the components of gasoline that keeps the car engine running efficiently, it's easy to understand why propylene often is termed "lifeblood" for American industry.

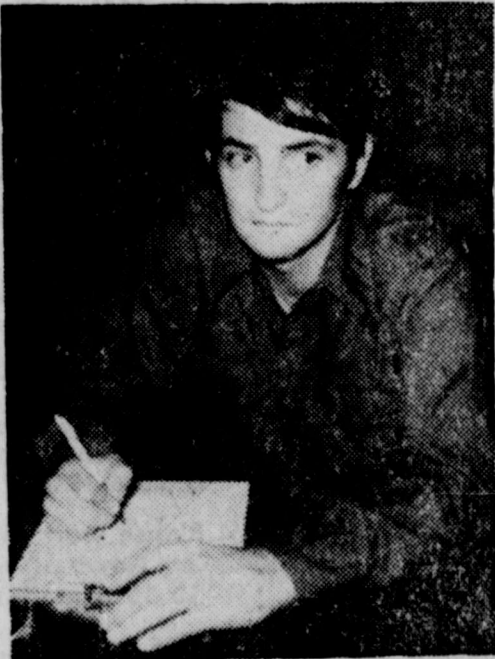

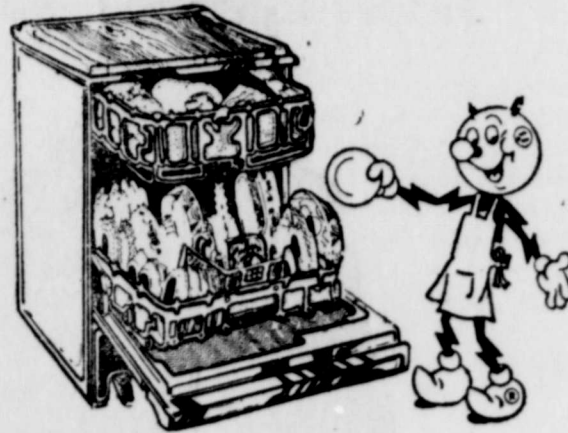

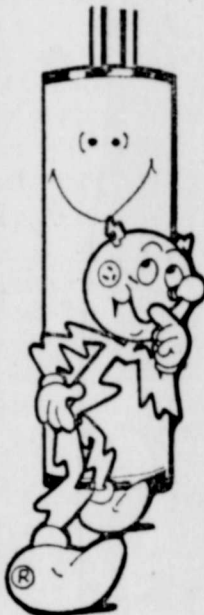


DISHWASHER SAVER-TIPS

A dishwasher will usually hold a whole day's dishes. It takes as much hot water and energy to wash 1 dish as it does a full load. Stack your dishes out of sight in your dishwasher and wait until you have a full load to turn it on.
 Use only detergents manufactured specifically for dishwashers. A wetting agent helps prevent water spots on glasses and silverware.
 Clean the filter screen often. A clogged filter can reduce the efficiency of your dishwasher.

WATER HEATER SAVER-TIPS

It's amazing how much water a leaky faucet will drip in a month's time and if the leaking faucet is a hot water faucet, it will waste both energy and water needlessly. As an example, a faucet dripping 90 drops per minute will waste 300 gallons per month.
 To assure long life and efficiency, the water heater tank should have a small amount of water drained periodically. Once a month should be adequate. The purpose of draining water from the tank is to prevent sediment build-up in the tank bottom.
 The thermostat controlling the water temperature is usually pre-set at the factory to deliver hot water at 150° F. This setting has proven satisfactory from the standpoint of operating cost and household needs.
 A water heater that's old, or too small for your family needs, can be wasteful, because it's working too hard and using too much energy to keep up with your hot water demands.

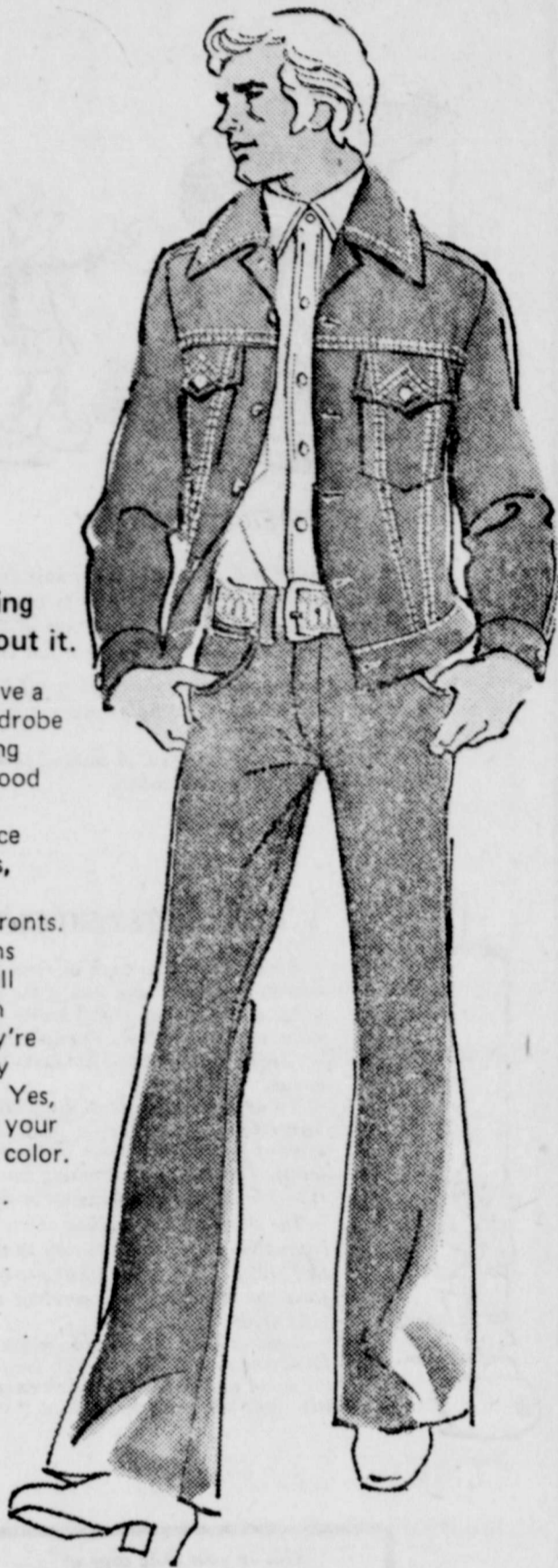

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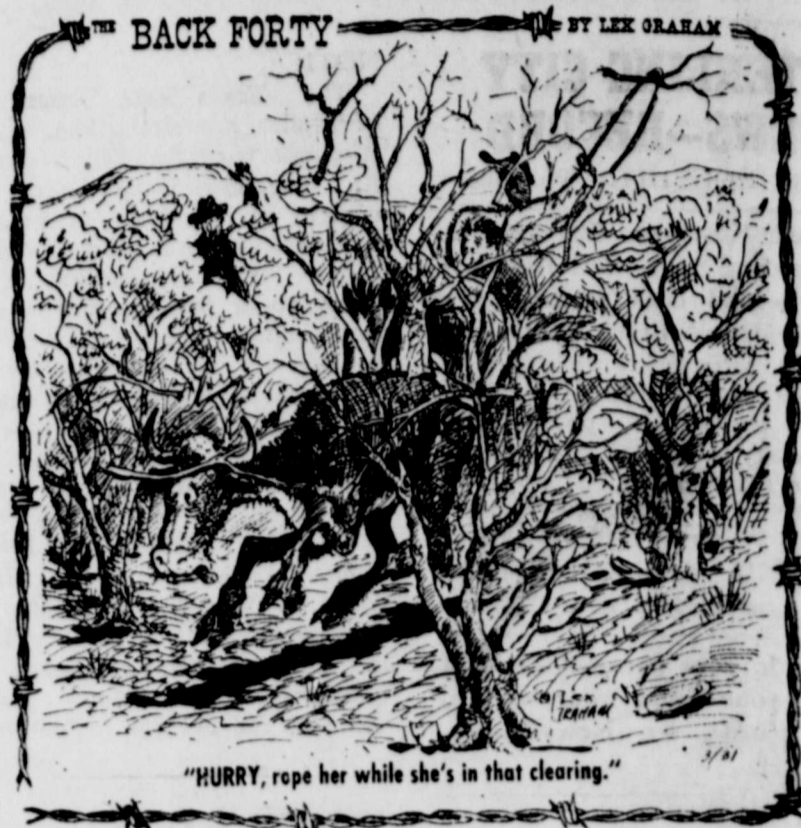
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
