A team of Sterling County 4-H Club members tied for first place in one of the thirty-three contests held at State 4-H Round Up in College Station last week. The contest was the Horse Demonstration Contest and team members were Patti Bynum and Melinda Terry. Coach of the team was Mrs. Billy Ralph Bynum.

However, there are NO Ties in the state contests as all ties are broken by the judges. Since this is the procedure, the judges broke the tie in points and gave the second place silver medals to the Sterling County team and the gold medals to the team from Brazos County. Incidentally, this team was also two girls. Thus, the contest will go into the record book with the Sterling team in second place.

The local team did win the right to compete in the same contest on the regional basis. They will compete in the Southern Regional Contest at Jackson, Mississippi in August. Their demonstration, HORSE CARE BEGINS WITH A SPRING CHECKUP, covers the immunization of horses for the more common diseases such as the three types of sleeping sickness, influenza, and a periodic worming program.

Congratulations to Patti and Melinda and their coach, Patsy Bynum.

There are literally millions of pillbugs, or sowbugs, still around. They are found under flower pots, around the edges of the house, and under practically anything that will hide them. While not true insects, they often cause damage to tender plants.

They are about one-half inch long, light-gray to slate colored, and roll up in the shape of a pill when disturbed. They are relatively easy to control.

Sevin, chlordane, or lindane dust will control them or a spray made with sevin is also effective. The dusts or spray should be applied directly to the feeding area late in the evening or early in morning. The sevin dust as well as the chlordane in the form of a 5% dust is recommended. Lindane dust in the 2% formulation is also effective. The sevin is relatively harmless to pets.

The County ACP committee has set June 2 as the beginning date for aerial spraying of mesquite in Sterling County. This date is based on the late leaf-out of the mesquite this year and is forty days after the leafing out.

Prospects for aerial spraying are not good this year. The late emergence of the leaves, the showers which cause a new crop of tender leaves following the showers, and the worms are making aerial control of mesquite a touch and go situation this year.

The worms are the mesquite cutworms which work at night defoliating the trees and crawl down the trunk to the rough bark where they spend the daylight hours.

This same situation prevails over the majority of the mesquite infested rangeland area of the state. According to Garlyn Hoffman, Range Brush and Weed Control Specialist with the Agricultural Extension Service, the Statewide prospects are poor. An

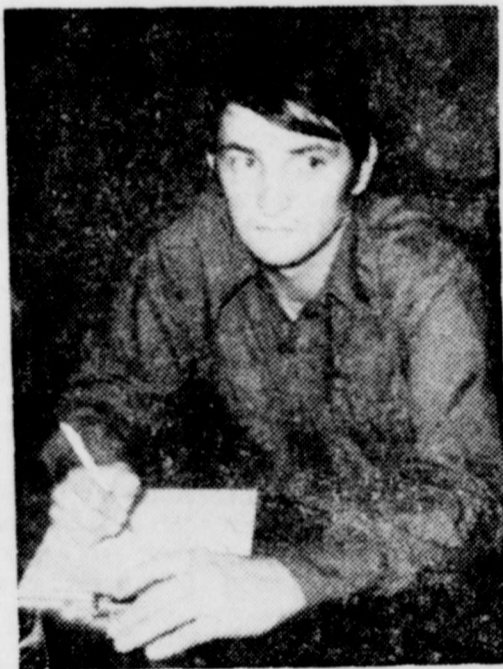

Social Security Tips

Social security checks should be cashed within a reasonable time to prevent loss or theft, even though there's no time limit on cashing them, according to social security officials here.

'If your check is lost or stolen, get in touch with your nearest social security office at once,' a spokesman said. 'The check can be replaced, but it takes time. Handle your check carefully when you get it and you won't have to wait while it's being replaced.'

Social security pays over \$4 billion a month in benefit checks to almost 29 million people—eligible retired and disabled workers and their families and families of deceased workers who worked long enough under social security.

RODENT CONTROL SPECIALIST AVAILABLE

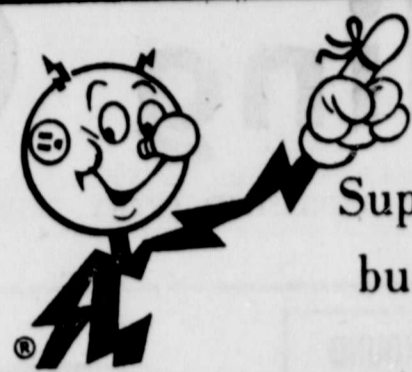

CERTIFIED AS FREE OF BRUCELLOSIS STERLING COUNTY

Dr. H. Q. Sibley, Executive Director of the Texas Animal Health Commission, announces receipt of the certificate designating Sterling County as a Certified Bovine Brucellosis Free Area.

This reconfirmation signifies that there is no known foci of bovine brucellosis in the county at this time, and that if the infection is re-introduced into the county immediate steps will be taken to confine and eradicate it.

In order to qualify as a Certified Bovine Brucellosis-Free Area all herds of cattle must be tested and found negative or at latest ten per cent of all breeding cattle in the county two years of age and older must be blood tested each year when shipped to market or at time of slaughter with follow-up testing of herd of origin of all reactors disclosed.
