Primaries Held Here Saturday

Carter and Reagan Tops in Presidential Primary

Sterling County Democrats went to the primary election poll here Saturday and selected nominees for the general election ballot next November.

Also, they named presidential delegates, giving Jimmy Carter the top spot with 97. Lloyd Bentsen was next with 66, George Wallace got 64 and uncommitted delegates got 24 votes.

In the race for U.S. Senator Lloyd Bentsen received 185, Phil Gramm 76, Hugh Wilson 20 and Leon Dugi 1.

For U.S. Representative District 21, Bob Krueger got 241 to 41 for Joe Sullivan.

For Railroad Commissioner Jerry Sadler got 146, Jon Newton 45, Lane Denton 25, Robert Wood 29, Woodrow Wilson Bean 20, R.R. Williams 5, Terence O'Rourke 4 and David Finney 3 (There will be a runoff primary between Sadler and Newton, it seems).

Jack Pope for Associate Justice of Supreme Court, Place 1, had no opponent and got 231.

For Associate Justice of Supreme Court, place 2, Don Yarbrough got 143 and Charles W. Barrow 133.

For Associate Justice, Supreme Court Place 3, James G. Denton got 224.

For Presiding Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, John Onion Jr. got 213.

For Judge Court of Criminal Appeals in a contested race, Truman Roberts got 170 and Jerome Chamberlain 70.

For Judge Court of Criminal Appeals, unexpired term, W.T. Phillips got 104, Jim Vollers 71 and Carl Dally 48.

For State Representative, 63rd District, incumbent Mike Ezzell got 182 and Bill Atwood Jr. 97.

For Member State Board of Education Jimmy Elrod got 220

For Associate Justice Court of Civil Appeals, 3rd district, Bob Shannon got 221.

For 51st District Judge, Earl W. Smith got 232.

For 51st District Attorney, Gerald Fohn got 145, F.W. Ferrell 134 and Thomas Goff (who had withdrawn) got 5.

For County Attorney here, a close race had developed and the incumbent Worth B. Durham got 155 and Howard Cudd 151.

REPUBLICAN HAVE 333 Votes

The Republicans held a primary in the one box for whole county. They favored Reagan for President 74 to 51 for Ford.

Republicans voting for U. S. Senator gave Steelman 19, Sween-

ey 5 and Leman 2.

For U.S. Congress 21s district they gave Locke 17 and Calnan 9.

Republicans favored in a big way all referendum propositions for stronger law enforcement.

Unless Newton withdraws before June 5, there will be a runoff primary between him and Jerry Sadler for the Texas Railroad Commission. The runoff primary will be held in one big box for all the county, in the district courtroom. So said Jack Douthit, county chairman, this week. Such is allowed when no precinct races are to be voted on he said.

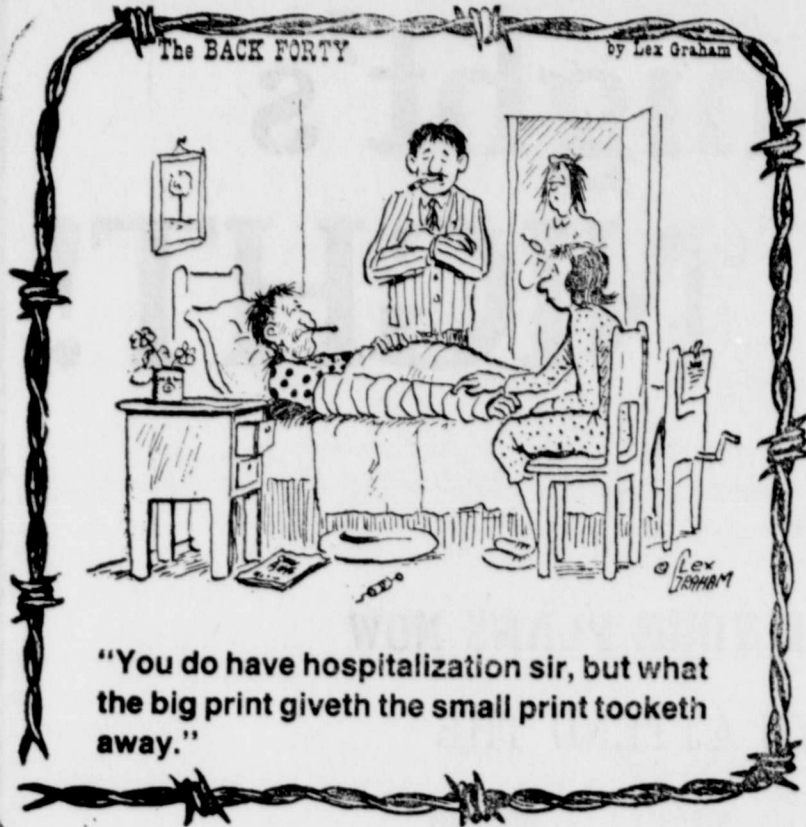
